





Approve Initial

News Staff Write City officials have begun study of a new proposal by trustees of the M.K. Brown Foundation, Inc., to provide Pampa with a municipal auditorium.

They took a preliminary look at the proposal Friday and ndicated initial approval.

make immediately available around \$400,000 and the city would issue possibly an additional \$400,000 in revenue bonds or warrants, all of which would be retired with income from Foundation property, nentual sale of ranch lands and other property owned by the

The proposition made by the Foundation for building the auditorium and equipping it would not involve tax obligation oonds and would not mean an ncrease in the city tax rate.

In his first comment on the offer, Mayor Milo Carlson said:

* I have long hoped something could be worked out for Pampa to have a civic auditorium. I am enthused over the offer from the Brown Foundation and since it would not increase city taxes. I can't see how anyone could have any objection to it."

Mayor Carlson said the Foundation's proposition would be placed on the agenda for discussion at the next meeting of the city commission April 28.

"We want to go into it thoroughly." the mayor said, and study all the legal angles and procedures that would have to be followed '

In the written proposition to the mayor and members of the amna City released Saturday by Atty. William Jarrel Smith, Foundation secretary-treasurer, the

trustees stated: "If you will deliver to the Foundation within six months from this date plans and specifications for a civic auditorium acceptable to the Foundation on a location in Pampa also acceptable to the Foundation trustees, with a contract with an acceptable contractor for its construction and equipping, the Foundation will deliver to you or pledge to you or deliver or pledge to the contractor certificates of deposits in banks and savings and loan associations and cashwhich will aggregate approxi-

mately \$400,000. * "The Foundation will pay or pledge all income from the Brown Ranch to retire principal and interest on any bonds or warrants you may issue for this auditorium and its facilities.

This income should aggregate somewhere between \$60,000 and \$70,000 for the current year though some part of the current year's income may be needed to complete the \$400,000 mentioned above. The income from the Brown Ranch will gradually decrease approximately 10 per cent or less per year until it reaches the vanishing point, which is estimated to be somewhere in the 1990s.

The Foundation will likewise, for retirement of such bonds, deliver the proceeds from the sale of the surface interests in the Brown Ranch. which amounts to an undivided 2,800-acre interest in lands in Carson and Hutchinson Counties. This land is held by trustees named in the M.K. Brown will (Amarillo National Bank and others), who have 20 years from his death in which to sell the property and turn the proceeds over to, the Foundation.

"Approximately six years of this 20-year term have already elapsed. The truteess named in the Brown will may, if they see fit, deliver the property itself to the Foundation for sale. In any event, whatever the Foundation gets from the property, land or money, it is willing to use to the extent necessary for the proposition
