# White Deer Land Co. To Be Pioneer Museum

Without people who care, who accomplish, who make an indelible impression on the generations and ideals of the future, history would not exist. And without history, museums such as the White Deer Land Museum would not exist.

The museum, housed in the old White Deer Land Co. building at 116 S. Cuyler, is scheduled to open in mid-June and will display relics depicting area pioneer history.

In fact, one of Gray County's earliest pioneers made the White Deer Land Museum possible.

The late M.K. Brown, who died in 1964, requested the museum in his will.

His long time secretary and curator of the museum, Mrs. Clotile Thompson, said Brown wanted early Gray County recorded for future generations.

"He was an avid student of Texas history and he endowed many historical institutions," she said.

Mrs. Thompson said Brown came to Gray County in 1903 from England. He had returned to England from the Boer War and an uncle interested him in Texas.

Upon his arrival, he took a job with the White Deer Land Co. which owned 631,000 acres of Texas land in four counties.

Through the years Brown became one of the most influential men in the area. His civic and philanthropic activities were many.

Brown's initiative in requesting the establishment of a museum has created much interest — especially among the older families of the area.

"We have many items donated by descendants of pioneer families," Mrs. Thompson said. "We need a lot more, though."

Mrs. Thompson said the museum would accept artifacts either as an outright gift or on a loan basis.

"We especially need furniture and old pictures," she said. "Clothing is also needed, as well as mannequins."

Mrs. Thompson said the museum would feature the arrowhead collection of Rolla Saylor. There are 10,000 arrowheads in the collection worth thousands of dollars.

Another feature of the museum is a room with displays from every early day church and school in the county. Various farm and ranch equipment will also be on display.

Mrs. Thompson said the records of the land company would be available to researchers in the near future. Persons having anything of historical value and wanting to donate or loan it to the museum, may call Mrs. Thompson at 5-5521.

## Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — In terms of popular acclaim, critical praise and salary, George C. Scott is probably at the peak of his career.

In the past, he has appeared on television in series and specials, directed several New York plays, starred in the Broadway comedy "Plaza Suite" and won admiration in such movies as "The Hustler," "Anatomy of a Murder" and "Petulia."

Nothing, however, has matched the consummate success he has achieved in his latest motion picture, "Patton," about the controversial World War II general. It is a monumental performance, and he is already a strong bet to win the Academy Award.

Amid all this, however, it is fascinating to note that one of his key interests at present is television. Despite his position in the more prestigious theatrical arts, and his criticism of video, the home screen appears to figure greatly in his future.

To begin with, on May 14, Saul Levitt's "The Andersonville Trial," directed by Scott, and starring Richard Basahart, Buddy Ebsen, William Shatner, Albert Salmi and Cameron Mitchell will be the Hollywood Television Theatre's first production on the public broadcast network. More than 150 non-commercial stations are expected to air the two-and-a-half-hour work, in color.

Furthermore, he says, "I hope to get back into TV next year as a producer-director rather than an actor." Scott, who once starred in CBS-TV's "East Side-West Side" series as a social worker, says he is planning a series of American history programs — "Theatrical biographies" — for commercial television.

But what is luring him back to video anyway? Says Scott: "Television is the most powerful medium in the world. It is my firm belief commercial TV is going to undergo great changes in the next decade. Networks will diminish in power. Pressures from the money people and the public are too strong. Internationalism will be a factor."

In terms of the future, says Scott, "I'm thinking television can't help being the ultimate theatrical way of presenting things. Among other things, home screens will get bigger."

## Court Steno Fights For Rights To Kopechne Transcript

BOSTON (UPI)—The attorney for a court stenographer who is fighting for distribution rights to the transcript of the Mary Jo Kopechne inquest said Saturday it probably will be six months before the document is released to the public.

Jerome P. Facher of Boston said that while a compromise between his client and the Suffolk Superior Court, where the transcript is impounded, is always possible but that it is very unlikely.

The 764-page transcript of testimony from the four-day secret inquest into the death of the 28-year-old Washington secretary in Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's car was to have been released last Wednesday. However, the court stenographer, Sidney R. Lipman, claimed he had the sole right to reproduce and sell the transcript and he took his case to the federal courts here.

It appeared a compromise solution was reached in the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals which issued a preliminary decision last week. The court said nothing stood in the way of immediate release, and it gave two options to solve the property rights dispute over the transcript.

The Superior Court clerk could either distribute the documents himself and face a damage suit later on, or he could turn the transcript over to Lipman for sale with the proceeds to go into an escrow account until the case finally is settled.

Apparently, the Superior Court did not find the alternatives acceptable, for Friday Judge Wilfred J. Paquet issued a new impounding order which keeps the transcript secret until the distribution fight is settled by the circuit court.

Facher said in an interview, "If you follow the normal appeals course in the federal court, this thing can't be heard until fall. It usually takes six months to get an appeal ready. The mechanics are very cumbersome."

## FOURTEEN KILLED

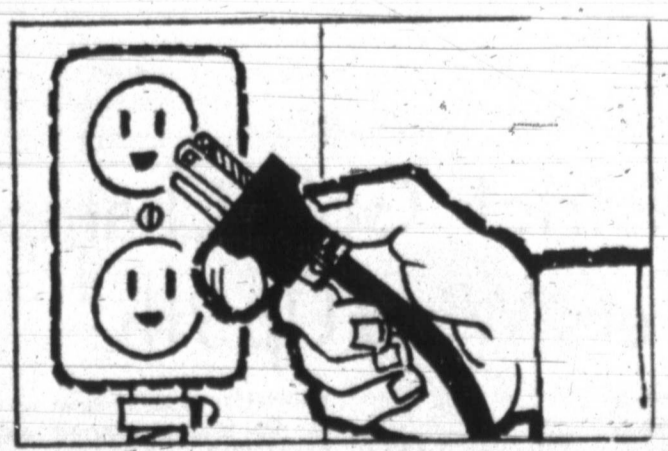

### Students Turn Down Offers Of Assistance

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The student sponsors of "Earth Day" said Wednesday they are having trouble meeting their budget but have turned down offers of \$22,500 in contributions from major oil and automobile companies.

Environmental Action, the student group formed to coordinate the April 21 day of protests around the nation against pollution of the environment, have a budget of \$125,000 to \$150,000. They said they are meeting difficulty raising the money, but are confident they will make it before earth day.

### Radioactive Cask Plunges Into Ocean

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—A cask of radioactive plutonium which would have powered a nuclear scientific station on the moon re-entered the earth's atmosphere and apparently plunged into the Pacific Ocean.

The space agency said today Air Force planes were collecting air samples in the area where the cask is believed to have splashed down, 450 miles southeast of Suva in the Fiji Islands.

"However, if there were damage there is little likelihood that anyone could receive radiation in excess of permissible health standards since the fuel material is chemically inert, essentially insoluble and any concentrations in water would be extremely small."

Had the flight gone as planned, the cask would have remained on the moon.

A spokesman for the association said more than 800 persons will attend the meetings.

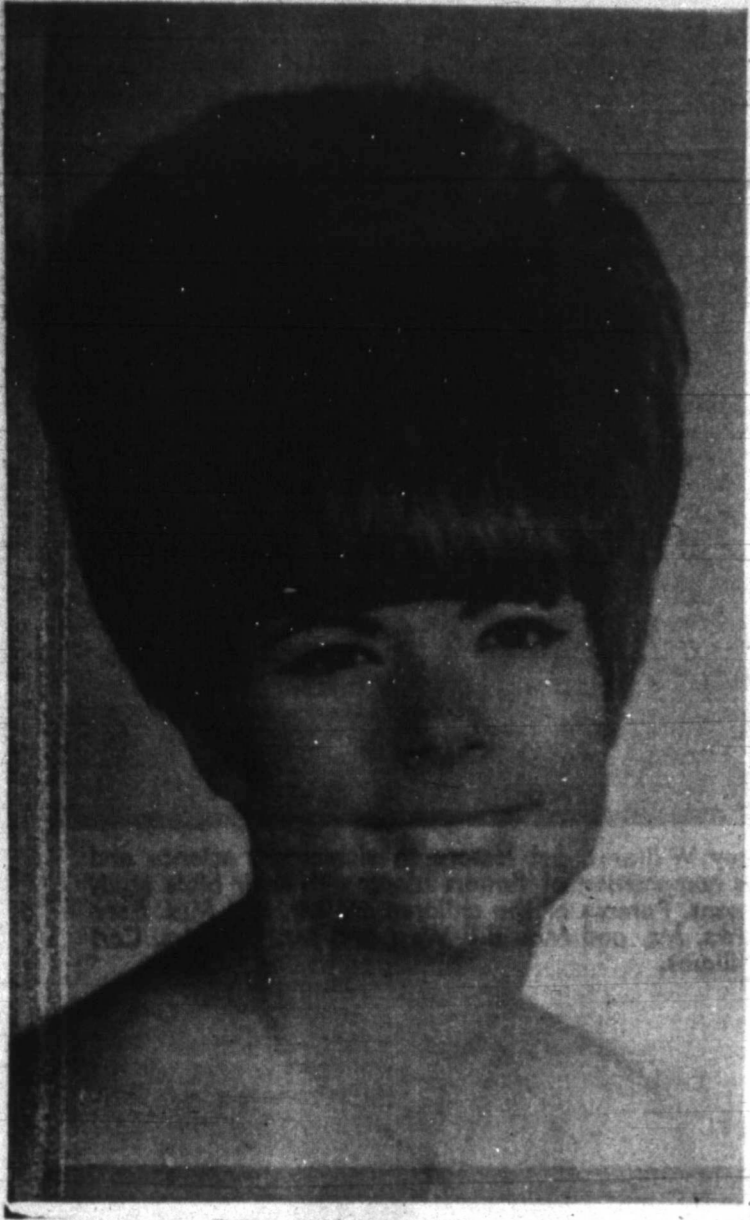

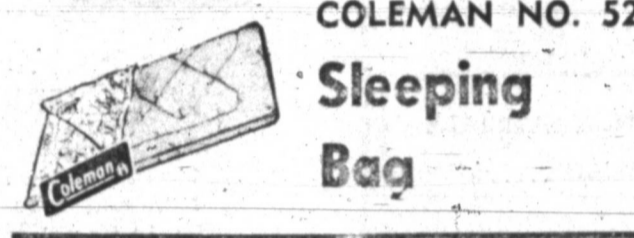

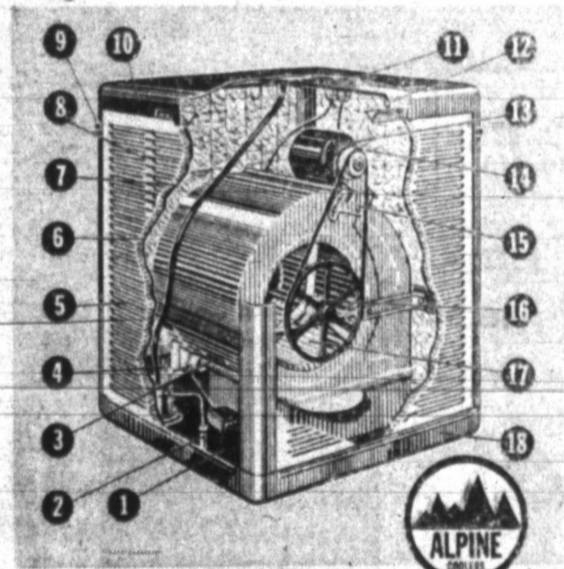
