

Nixon Off For Work Vacation

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI) — President Nixon is scheduled to arrive at the Western White House April 23 or 24 for a 10-day working vacation, it was learned Wednesday.

Preparations were under way at El Toro Marine Corps Air Station for the arrival of the presidential party. After landing at the Marine base the President travels by helicopter to a landing pad at the Coast Guard Station adjoining his

seaside villa.

The Nixon family's last vacation here was during the New Year's holidays.

Pay-As-You-Go Basis For New Plan For Postal Department

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government and postal union negotiators have reached agreement on a plan to reorganize the Post Office Department on a pay-as-you-go basis, it was learned today.

The agreement also would give mailmen an additional 8 per cent pay increase and full collective bargaining rights.

Sources close to the talks that grew out of the recent postal strike said the agreement includes establishment of a postal authority to operate the mail service. The President would appoint the directors of the authority who in turn would select the postmaster general.

The authority would have the power to set postage rates so that the service would pay for itself, without reliance on supplemental appropriations by congress.

The plan also will allow the postal unions to bargain collectively with the Post Office Department in the future on wages, hours, fringe benefits and all other issues that normally are negotiated in union contracts with private industry.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Pat Nixon, who graduated with honors from the University of Southern California, said Wednesday she expects her daughter Julie Eisenhower to graduate with honors from Smith College next month.

The First Lady told newsmen that the young Mrs. David Eisenhower has been on the dean's list most of her college career.

MADRID (UPI) — A Spanish civil court ruled Wednesday the publication of pictures in a magazine of women wearing bikinis is not cause to seize a

magazine.

According to the court the magazine "El Pito" (The Whistle) was ordered seized March 20, 1968, by the Information Ministry because it published several pictures of women wearing bikinis.

The editor of The Whistle was fined \$243.

The court set a precedent in Spanish justice when it said that the bikinis are formal attire of women at beaches and pools and can be seen in films.

Times-Mirror To Buy 'Mag'

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Officials of the Times-Mirror Co., publishers of the Los Angeles Times, announced plans Wednesday to purchase Newsday Inc. of Long Island.

The Times-Mirror said an agreement had been reached to acquire controlling interest in the newspaper from Harry F. Guggenheim, owner of the publication.

Terms of the acquisition were not disclosed, pending preparation of a definitive agreement. The acquisition was subject to action by the board of directors of Times-Mirror.

In making the announcement, Guggenheim said: "I have decided to sell my controlling interest in Newsday to the Times-Mirror Co. By doing this I believe I will assure the complete independence of Newsday and that Long Islanders will continue to have a newspaper of which they can be proud."

DEAR DESPERATE: Compulsive talking is only one of his problems. His obvious insecurity accounts for his need to draw attention to himself by interrupting, contradicting and holding the floor as long as possible. (Many adults never out-grow this.) Perhaps with maturity will come confidence, patience and better judgment. In the meantime, tell him you love him, and before opening his mouth to ask himself:

Is it true?
Is it kind?
Is it necessary?

Gardening Danger Signals Give Homeowners Warnings

CHICAGO (NEA) — Keep an eye out for little signs of trouble and you'll have better gardening results this year.

Ability to identify problems, insects and diseases is your first line of defense. The Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C. has free lists of valuable informative booklets and folders on garden problems and their cure. Garden Centers also offer free gardening guides. When you know the signs, you can better fight the common enemies that attack your plants.

Insects are easier to control if you spot them early. Chewed portions of leaves and stunted flower buds often mean insect attack. Look under leaves and foliage where bugs hide. Choose a multipurpose spray that controls a wide range of pests. A systemic spray is absorbed by foliage. The plant is protected from the inside out. Follow directions exactly and be sure to get under foliage. Stopping small infestations early prevents trouble from thousands of pests that can build up and grow uncontrolled. You also prevent bugs from moving indoors.

Watch for weeds. If you can't dig out or chemically rid lawns of dandelions, plantain and other weeds, they'll go to seed. Next year you'll be fighting hundreds that sprout. As you mow, spot spray with 2-4-D or 2-4-5-T. By Fall you'll be rid of most weeds and they won't come back.
Watch for die-back in shrubs and trees. Summer brings drought periods. Newly painted shrubs quickly show withering. You could lose branches or entire plants.
Antifungal sprays help stop moisture loss. They work well to prevent drying from cold winter winds, too. Be sure to give plants one-inch of water each week, more during drought
