The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Last week I announced the formation of a new organization, friends of Form 1040, which is dedicated to preserving our present system of computing income taxes.

Thus far, however, membership applications have been coming in rather slowly. And what is even more disturbing, contributions have been virtually nil.

There may be good reasons for this outbreak of apathy, but I fear the worst. I fear it means that people are being swayed by the hysterical clamor for a simplified tax form that recently has arisen.

Clearly something must be done to make friends of Form 1040 more viable. So, in an effort to stimulate interest, I am inviting Rep. Louis Frey Jr., R-Fla., to address our next meeting.

Draws Attention

The thing that drew my attention to Frey was the way he defended the space program this week against critics who are suggesting that the exploration of the moon and points north is costing more than it is worth.

Frey said in a statement that the "spinoff benefits" of the space program alone have "more than justified" its expense.

"There is more to this program than just going to the moon, as it helps each and every American whether in the city or the farm, whether in the North or the South, whether a housewife or a cab driver," he said.

Which is exactly the way I feel about Form 1040.

Let us consider for a moment

some of the "spinoff benefits" it has provided.

For one thing, Form 1040 has brought into being and indirectly supports a vast legion of tax accountants and attorneys who help the equally vast legion of confused laymen prepare their returns.

Promotes Prosperity

These accountants and attorneys make a lot of money, which promotes prosperity. But if Form 1040 ever were simplified, they all would be thrown into the welfare rolls, which probably would create a serious recession.

The publishing industry to a large extent also depends on Form 1040. Each year sees the publication of millions of booklets and pamphlets explaining how to cope with the form.

Without that revenue, many publishing houses probably would go into bankruptcy. Possibly including the one that published "Naked Came the Stranger." And what a disaster that would be.

I could go on and on with these examples of "spinoff benefits," but I'm sure you are already convinced that Form 1040 is one of our greatest blessings.

In fact, it may be the only thing that is holding the nation together.



It's That Time Again... To Spring Forward

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Daylight Saving Time arrives Sunday, bringing with it the annual confusion over which way to turn the clock.

The answer—turn it ahead one hour. Just remember the handy formula that goes, "Spring forward, fall back." You move the clock forward in the spring, and turn it back in the fall.

The crazy quilt of time zones that once marked the annual change to DST has all but vanished.

The reason is the Uniform Time Act of 1966. Under the law, Congress made observance of DST automatic unless a state legislature agreed to exempt the entire state from the changeover.

Ends Situations

That put an end to situations where parts of some states would observe DST, while some counties or cities didn't. Cities sometimes observed different time than the counties around them.

Only three states—Arizona, Hawaii and Michigan—will remain on Standard Time when the rest of the nation officially goes on DST at 2 a.m., Sunday.

The "fall back" occurs Sunday, Oct. 25.

The arguments over Daylight Time are long and varied. Transportation interests such as railroads and the airlines are the biggest backers of DST.

LABEL CASE DROPPED

HOUSTON (UPI)—The case against former state Rep. Paul Floyd of Houston, accused of libeling state Rep. Jack Ogg, D-Houston, was dismissed Monday.

Ogg was suing Floyd for allegedly writing a letter accusing Ogg of staring at a woman's legs and later propositioning her.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind.—Sen. Gaylor Nelson, D-Wis., addressing an Earth Day rally at the University of Indiana: "The environmental crisis concerns and involves us all."

First Zones Set Up

The railroads actually set up the first time zones in 1883. Congress made them official in 1918 and then passed mandatory DST laws in both world wars.

Children usually like DST since it means more free time before it gets dark.

For drive-in movie operators, the sooner it gets dark the better for business. And most farmers also would rather have the extra daylight in the morning.

Some places just don't care much—especially Point Barrow, Alaska, the northern most spot in the United States. It has constant daylight from mid-May to mid-July.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Notes to watch television by:
Former President Lyndon B. Johnson will give his own account of events surrounding the assassination of his predecessor, John F. Kennedy, in a one-hour CBS-TV conversation May 2. The program, "LBJ: Tragedy and Transition," is the third in a series of one-hour prime time discussions with Johnson about his life and career, and will also include his recollections of his assumption of the presidency.
CBS-TV's "Summer Semester" series returns the week of May 17, offering one course on the views of the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and another on visual communications. ABC-TV's Philadelphia station has dropped Dick Cavett's ratings-troubled late-night show from Fridays, and switched it to Sundays. Both Cavett and CBS-TV's Merv Griffin have made few inroads on NBC-TV's Johnny Carson.
The show business newspaper "Daily Variety" reports that cigarette companies, whose advertising will be banned from broadcasting after next Jan. 1, are overturning motion picture studios and producers, seeking deals whereby puffs (publicity plugs) for the cigs would be included in pix. The report adds:
"Thus far the picture makers are giving a chilly turnout to the pitches, which consist of offers of \$15,000 for each billboard featuring the product in scenes of a film. One spokesman for a (San Fernando) valley lot confirmed the pitch and said his studio nixed it because it considers it payola."
The debut of ABC-TV's prime time, Monday night weekly series of pro football games will offer Joe Namath and the New York Jets against the Cleveland Browns, Sept. 21.

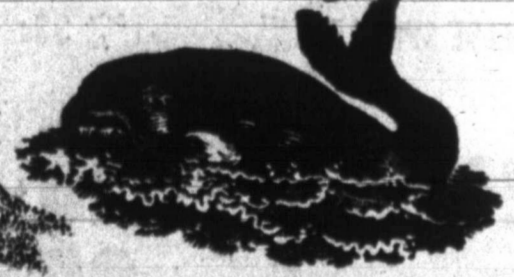
General Telephone & Electronics has failed to renew its exclusive sponsorship of the notable series of dramatic specials called "CBS Playhouse," and there is concern that such programs are increasingly difficult to supply with advertisers who care enough to back them.
Glenn Ford and Shirley MacLaine are the latest to join such movie stars as Tony Curtis, Henry Fonda, James Garner and Stewart Granger in having regular television series of their own in the near future. Ford's series, a half-hour comedy-drama scheduled to arrive in the 1971-72 season, will present him as a detective-sergeant who takes over a center for youngsters that is supervised by the police department. Miss MacLaine's series, to be filmed in England and on the Continent, will also be a weekly half-hour and arrive in 1971.

FILES SUIT
BOSTON (UPI)—A Vietnam War veteran filed a \$110 million damage suit against Harper's magazine Tuesday for references to him in a May cover story on the alleged My Lai massacre.
William F. Doherty of Boston's Hyde Park section charged the magazine, published in New York, portrays him "as a killer and a heartless individual" in an article in its latest issue on the March, 1968, incident.
Doherty seeks \$10 million in compensatory damages and \$100 million in punitive damages. The suit was filed in U.S. District Court here.

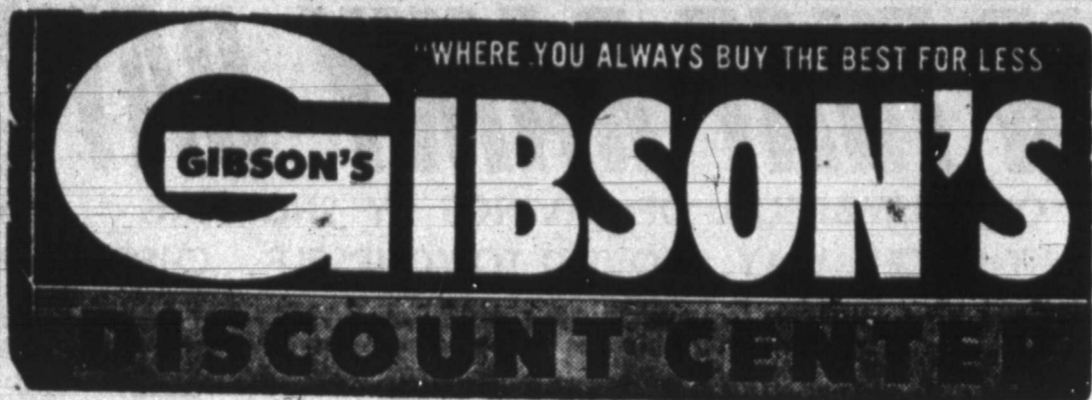

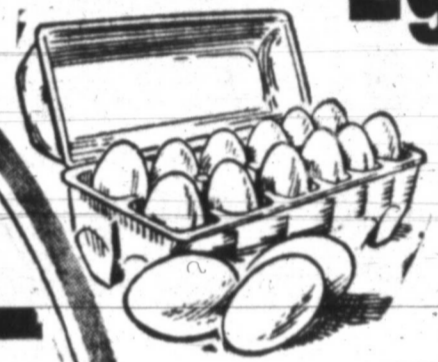

Hollywood In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Bears, as a rule, make risky interviews. They are ill tempered and invariably have nothing to say. Then there is the cookie-begging bear on "The Andy Williams Show" who has become a television star. At the moment his is the heaviest mail bag in Beverly Hills.

Fans not only write the bear, they send him cookies.

Inside the bearskin is a hungarian named Janos Prohaska, a professional stuntman, acrobat and specialist in portraying animals.

At his home, Prohaska has some 25 enormously expensive costumes ranging from lions and bears to monsters and blobs which creep and crawl for horror movies and far-out television shows.

Celebrity By Proxy

But until the bear made it big with Andy Williams, Prohaska was just another hard-working unknown. Now he is a celebrity by proxy.

Outside the bearskin he is a gentle, muscular man of less than average height unrecognized by millions who would immediately know the bear on sight.

"It doesn't bother me at all," Janos said. "I'm glad the bear is becoming famous even if I am not."

"I would like to play more comedy in my animal costumes, but the producers are looking for dangerous animals to work in scenes with actors. So I have to work with an attitude of a wild animal."

So far Prohaska has menaced performers on "Daniel Boone," "Land of the Giants," "Gilligan's Island," "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea," "Star Trek" and many movies.

"My problem is working in the hot costumes," Janos said. "I make them all myself out of synthetic material, because natural pelts are too stiff and difficult to work in. The bear costume cost me \$2,500 to make."

Works Half Hour At A Time

"I can only work for about a half hour at the most, then I take off the head and gloves to keep from melting."

Prohaska is grateful for all the mail but he doesn't know what to do with the thousands of cookies which are sent him.

San Francisco fish stew is a hefty, marvelously seasoned dish that is easy to prepare.

Fish Stew Rates High With Cooks

Hearty stews return to favor after an unexplained hiatus. One that is easy to prepare, high in protein and relatively low in calories is a San Francisco fish stew — you can throw almost anything into the pot. Serve with a salad and toasted bread.

- 1 can (7½ oz.) crab, drained and flaked
- 1 bay leaf
- ¼ teaspoon thyme
- 2 cups water
- 1 lb. firm-fleshed fish (sea bass, rockfish or cod)

SAN FRANCISCO FISH STEW
1 onion, chopped
½ cup chopped green pepper
1 clove garlic, minced
2 tablespoons pure vegetable oil
1 cans (8 oz. each) or 2 cans (15 oz. each) tomato sauce with tomato bits
2 cans (4½ oz. each) shrimp, rinsed and drained
1 can (8 oz.) clams, undrained

In Dutch oven or heavy kettle cook onion, green pepper and garlic in oil until tender. Add remaining ingredients except fish. Simmer, covered, 30 minutes. Add fish; simmer 15 minutes more. Remove bay leaf. Makes 8 servings.
NOTE: Vary this easy fish soup by using other kinds of canned or ready-to-cook frozen or fresh seafood or by using all one kind (such as all crab, shrimp or clams). Just keep the relative weight fairly close to what the recipe specifies (about 6 to 8 cups by measure).

Sirloin Steak Is 'Live-It-Up' Dish

Pan-fried small steaks, home fries, gravy and biscuits are regional American favorites. But the thought of pan-broiling a top prime sirloin steak puts many cooks off.

This method of preparing steak is a European specialty and there is no reason why any cook this side of the Atlantic can not turn out a steak worthy of an international chef. The secrets are quick pan-broiling, selection of a good piece of beef and the proper sauce.

Many chefs swear by pan-broiling a steak in a hot skillet with only a layer of salt. However, Fritz Reiter, executive chef for the Hopkin John Restaurant in Hamilton, Bermuda, first "fries" his steak in butter, then mixes his special sauce and finishes the steak in it.

A pan-fried steak always is made rare but those who like their steaks well-done will never know the difference with the rich, dark sauce hiding the pink-pink middle. Leftover steak prepared in this way is never dried out.

When serving rice with such a steak cut, add a teaspoon of olive oil to the boiling water to prevent the rice from sticking together. It also adds a fresh flavor.

Chef Reiter also shares a salad secret with those who want to have a perfect meal when spending a tidy sum for a top cut of beef. After rinsing and drying salad greens, he suggests mixing two parts olive oil in one part vinegar in a small dish.

To this add salt and freshly ground pepper to taste and stir well. Pour mixture gradually over salad at the table when ready to serve and toss lightly between additions of dressing. This makes the salad crispier than adding ingredients separately to the salad and mixing.

ENTRECOTE DOUBLE CASANOVA

- (Double Sirloin Steak)
2 16-oz. sirloin steaks—(prime cut)
Salt, pepper, paprika, thyme, marjoram
4 tablespoons butter
1½ ozs. pure imported olive oil
8 sliced mushrooms
1 small onion, minced
2 green peppers, diced
2 peeled tomatoes, sliced
1 celery stalk, diced
¼ ounce flour
4 ounces red Burgundy wine or beef bouillon

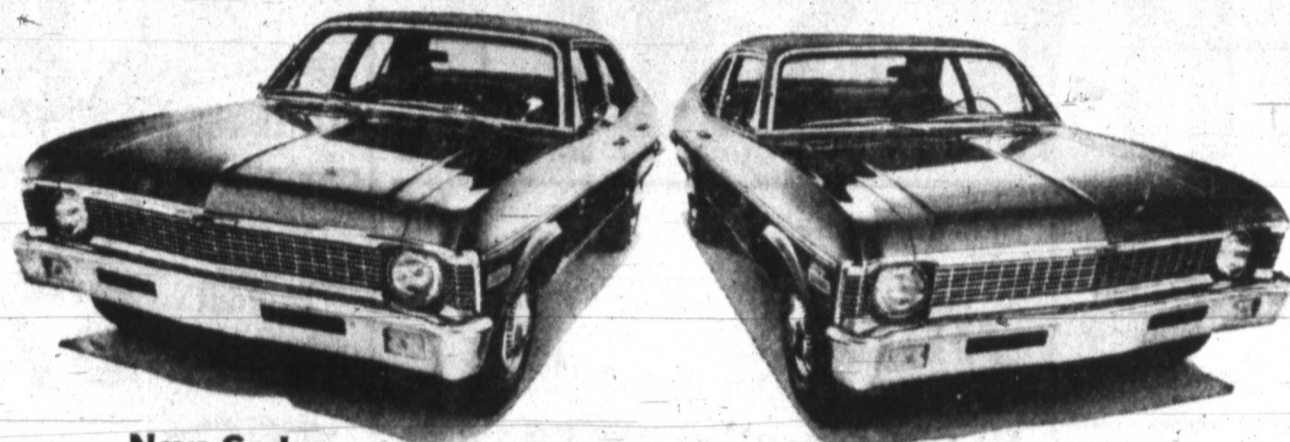
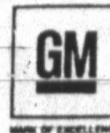
Trim excess fat from steaks. Rub well on both sides with spices. Heat butter carefully. Fry steaks in hot pan for 1½ minutes on each side or until golden brown. Remove steaks and drain. Pour pure imported olive oil into saucepan and heat gently. Add onions, peppers and celery and stir until lightly browned. Then stir in mushrooms and tomatoes. Simmer for 3 minutes. Pour into steak pan and return steaks, cooking them on both sides in the sauce for a minute or two. Remove steaks and slice at an angle. Place on serving tray. To the sauce mixture, slowly add flour, mixing well. Then

add wine, or beef bouillon, on serving tray. Garnish with stirring mixture until it is fresh parsley. Makes 4 servings. smooth. Pour over steak slices
