One of 11 Pampa boys, Calvin West, who has been making his home at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch near Amarillo for nearly five years, will be among those graduating on May 22 from the Ranch's High School.

Calvin is among 22 senior graduates who will receive diplomas and vocational certificates at commencement ceremonies Friday. The Ranch is home for more than 350 boys from 3 to 18 years of age and who remain until they graduate from the Ranch High School or are awarded vocational certificates. Commencement speaker for the Ranch's graduates will be Dr. Joseph P. Allen, scientist-astronaut of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at Houston.

Calvin is a member of the Junior Staff, the highest honor that can come to any of the boys at the Ranch and he has been active in the high school

drama department, chapel choir, varsity football, varsity basketball, and the annual Boys Ranch Rodeo that is held each Labor Day weekend. He was named All-District in football and basketball and has been active in the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America.

Backstairs At The Whitehouse

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ever since the U.S. incursion into Cambodia began, the Pentagon has been providing us with an almost daily "rice count" from the erstwhile sanctuary areas.

The figure probably will have changed by the time you read this, but as of this writing the count stood at 2,390 tons of enemy rice captured or destroyed.

Military statisticians have calculated that this is enough rice to feed 105,160 men for a month, give or take a couple of pilaf cesseroles.

Looking at it another way, the rice count totals 4,780,000 pounds, which by my reckoning adds up to approximately 23,900,000,000 kernels.

Losses are Impressive
 Hawk or dove, you will have to agree that the enemy rice losses are truly impressive. And they become even more so when viewed alongside Ameri-

can rice losses by a comparable period.

Although the exact amount is being withheld for security purposes, I am assured the U.S. rice losses in Cambodia thus far have been on the magnitude of "less than a cupful."

Furthermore, I am informed that the U.S. rice losses did not come about as a result of enemy action. They occurred when an American mess sergeant accidentally knocked over a box of Minute Rice with which he was making a custard for the colonel's dinner.

Any meaningful comparison of rice losses obviously must

also include any rice that the South Vietnamese forces might have spilled, misplaced, let fall into enemy hands or overcooked.

As in the case of the American rice losses, the precise figures are unavailable. However, we may assume the South Vietnamese rice losses have been greater than U.S. rice losses, one reason being that they had more rice to lose.

Far Less Substantial
 Nevertheless, I have it on good authority that the South Vietnamese rice losses have

been far less substantial than the enemy rice losses.

Rice, of course, is not means the only equipment the enemy has lost. Other include 1,286 weapons, rocket and mortar 8,375,925 rounds of ammunition and 1,200 land mines.

In addition, there have been unconfirmed reports the enemy has lost 1,492 gallons of soup, 1,776 barrels of egg rolls, 1,812 crates of Chinese dinners and boxes of fortune cookies.

The Lighter Side

Shindy, otherwise known as "shiny," is, of course, the same game as bandy. Or at least one kind of bandy. That is, it is played like hockey, except that you don't play on ice.

The game is called shindy because the players usually get hit on the shins with sticks. This also is the origin of the word "shindig." But I digress.

Really Is Not Sure
 I get back to Congress, the committee report in question may indeed have used "shandy" where "shindy" was intended. I'm not sure about that, however.

Shandy, as a noun, is short for "shandygoff," which is a beverage made by mixing beer with ginger ale. As an adjective, shandy means "wild and inclined to irresponsible ideas."

Well, anyone who drank beer mixed with ginger ale undoubtedly would be inclined to be wild and to have irresponsible ideas. Just like iceless hockey players.

Therefore, that 1892 statute may have been intended to outlaw shandy, as well as shindy and bandy.

At any rate, if congress legalizes any of them, it will be making a bad mistake.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The movie musical, comatose as it may be, is not altogether dead despite recent calamities at the boxoffice. Economics and reluctant patronage abroad have all but discouraged producers from making musicals. They cost too much and in many cases are old fashioned. One multi-talented movie-maker, however, is applying mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to the ailing patient. He is Leslie Bricusse, an Englishman who has had moderate success with the format. He was involved with "Doctor Dolittle" and "Goodbye, Mr. Chips," both of which cost a fortune and neither of which is calculated to make the world...

and "Chips" a whopping \$9 million. "There's no reason a musical should cost more than any other movie," Bricusse explained. "Just cut down on the salary of the stars by making them accept a percentage of the profits, if any, and holding down other budget items. Simplicity is Keynote" "And there's no need to have huge production numbers with enormous sets, hundreds of dancers and all the rest. The most successful musical number in the history of motion pictures was sung by one little girl by a haystack. Her name was Judy Garland and she sang "Over the Rainbow." Bricusse added that money can be saved up front by producing musicals away from major studios where 25 per cent overhead is charged the production company for use of facilities. Bricusse's formula may or may not revive screen musicals. The success or failure of "Scrooge" should provide a clue.

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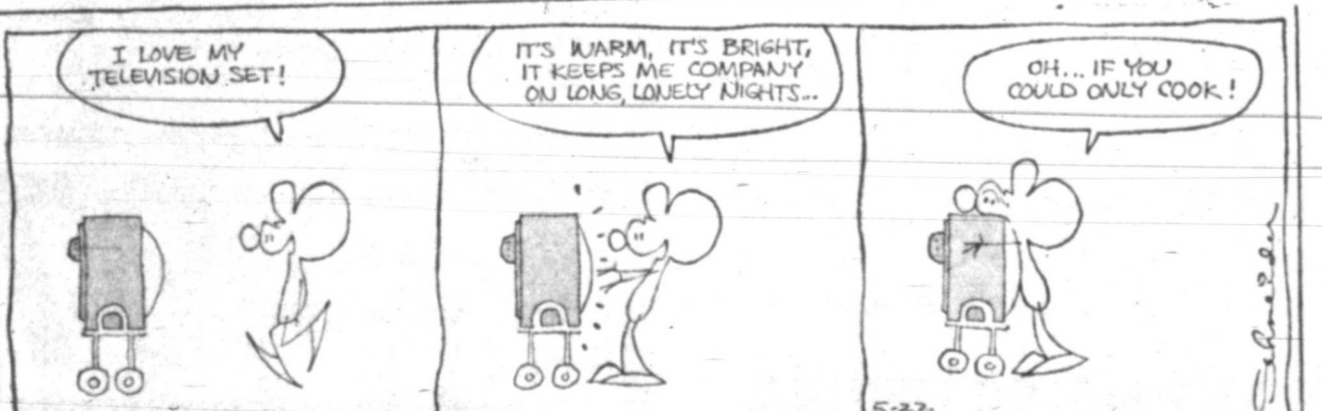
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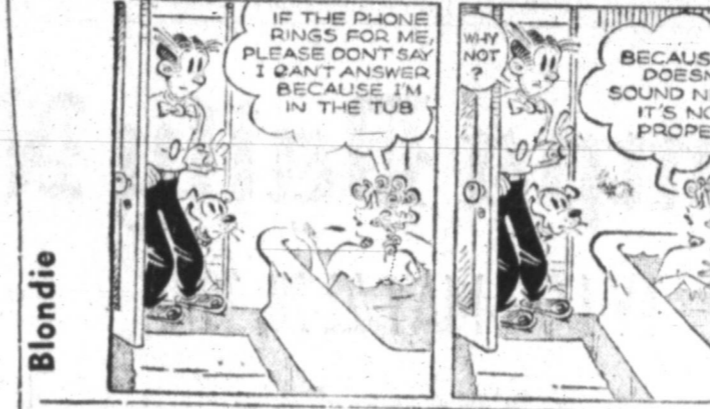

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
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
