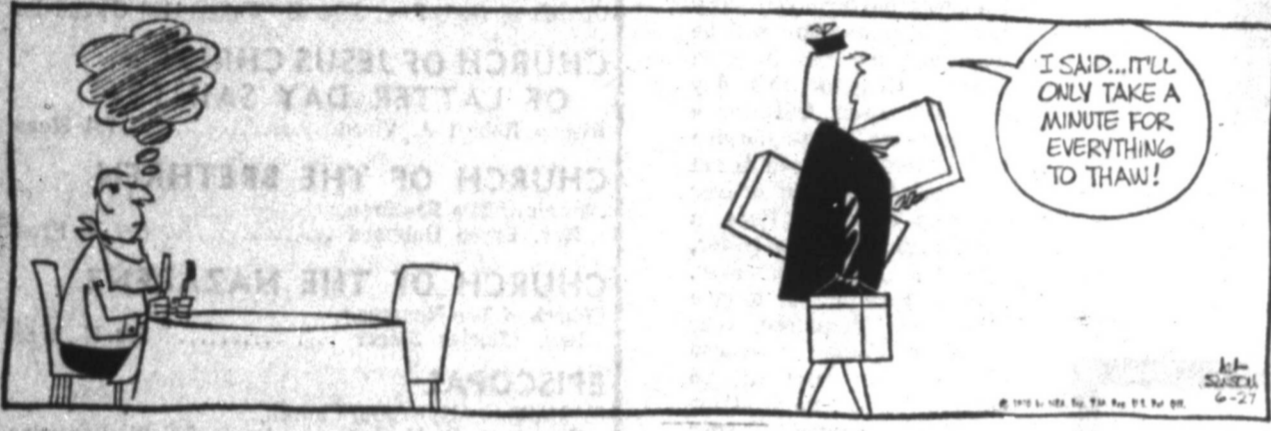

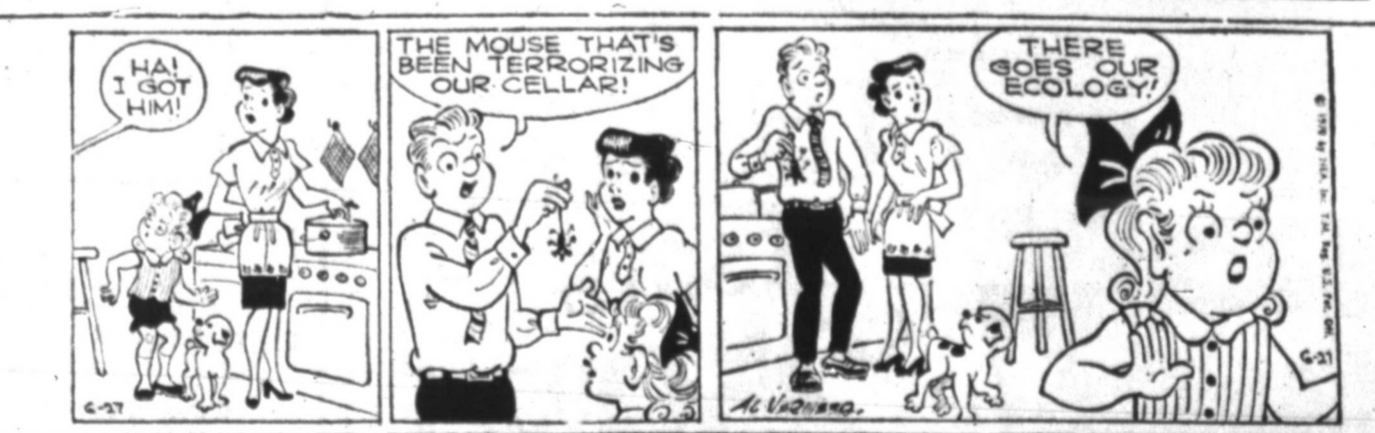

Senate Adopts Amendment Asserting Right To Declare War

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate adopted an amendment Friday asserting that Congress still has the exclusive right to declare war and regulate the armed forces.

The amendment was added to pending legislation to cut off funds for future U.S. operations inside Cambodia. It was offered by Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y. Javits was seeking to balance off language added last Monday, in an amendment by Sen.

Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., asserting that the President had power to take whatever steps are necessary to protect American troops anywhere on the globe. Javits said the Byrd amendment might give the President power to commit an army to battle "if a Marine guard's life was in danger in an embassy in Nepal."

The Javits amendment declared: "Nothing contained in this section shall be deemed to

Chief Negotiator Returns To SALT

VIENNA (UPI) — Gerard C. Smith, the chief U.S. negotiator, returned Friday for the 20th session of the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) after three days of consultation with President Nixon and other U.S. officials in Washington.

The session was scheduled to begin at 6 a.m. EDT.

Official sources said Smith had no new instructions for the talks with the Soviet Union today in the U.S. Embassy.

They said the talks, which opened April 16, were proceeding well.

During his stay in Washington, sources said, Smith briefed President Nixon, Secretary of State William P. Rogers and Henry A. Kissinger, national security adviser, on progress of the talks and what might happen before the summer recess.

This summer, more than 900 Boy Scouts from the Adobe Walls Council of Boy Scouts of America have attended or will attend a week-long camping session at Camp M.K. Brown, east of Mobeetie.

The camp offers scouts from three Oklahoma counties and 12 Texas counties the opportunity to earn merit badges, learn the skills of survival, and meet scouts from the surrounding area.

Instruction ranges from swimming and canoeing to marksmanship and archery to

cooking and survival.

Professional scout leaders instruct the Boy Scouts and test them in various skills required to gain rank within their troop.

Older, higher ranking scouts work as staff members at the camp, aiding in craftsmanship instruction, serving as life guards and setting examples for younger Scouts to follow.

Each Scout unit is required to have an adult leader to assist in camp supervision. The camp maintains 12 large campsites with facilities for 12 large troops per session.

On Wednesday of each camp week, parents and guests are invited to attend Tap Out ceremonies for the Order of the Arrow.

Scouts initiated into this honor society of campers are elected by members of their troop. Scouts elected to the order must be qualified campers, with knowledge and aptitude for survival with a minimum amount of equipment.

with seats and pulpit area being made of rock. The chapel will be on the site near the lakefront, where a wooden cross now stands.

Chapel services are now held at the site, but seating is on the ground or on logs lying adjacent to the cross.

Camp M.K. Brown is rated as one of the top Boy Scout Camps in the country. It received an "A" rating — 99 of a possible 100 points — from an inspection team two weeks ago.

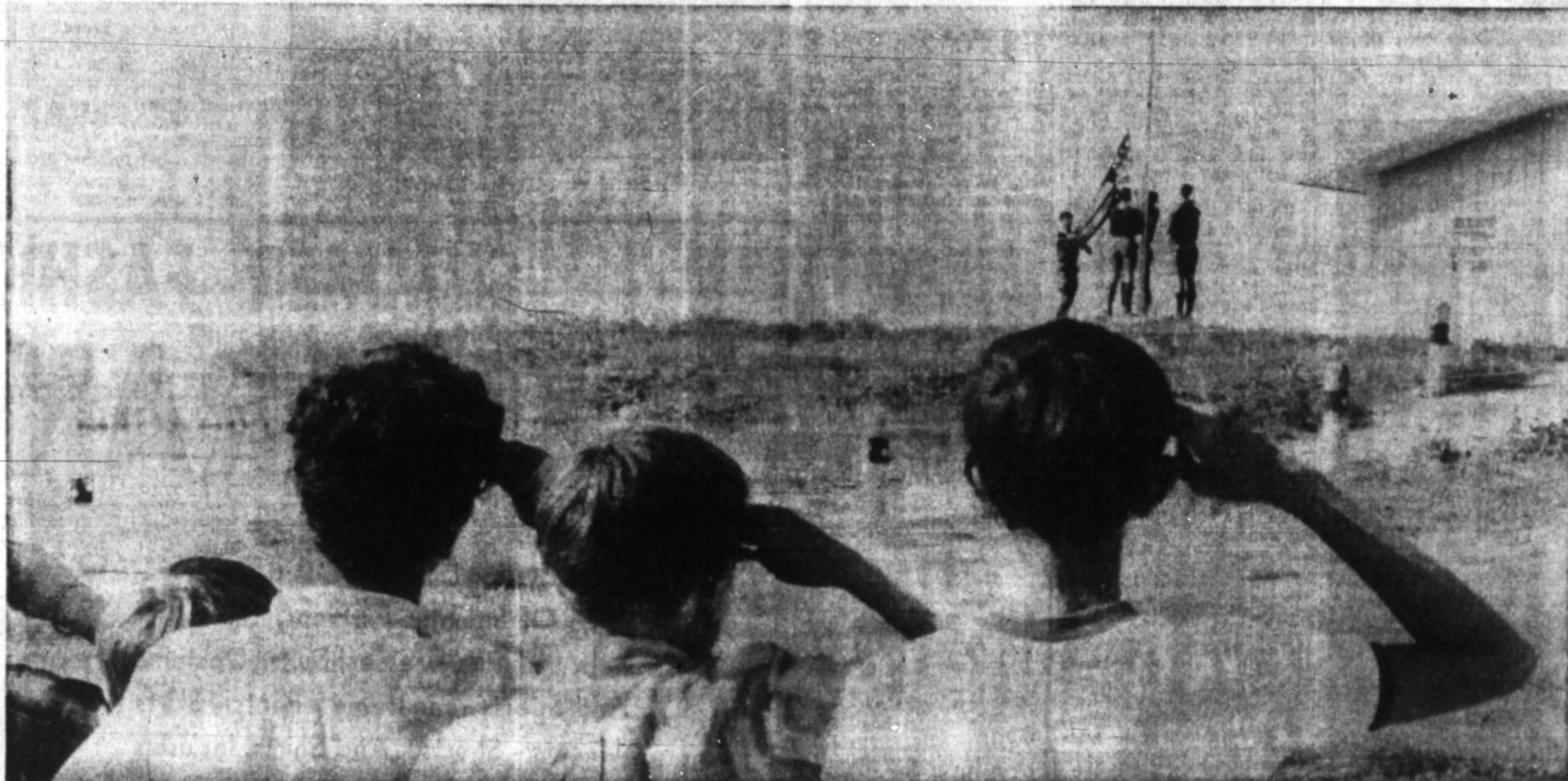

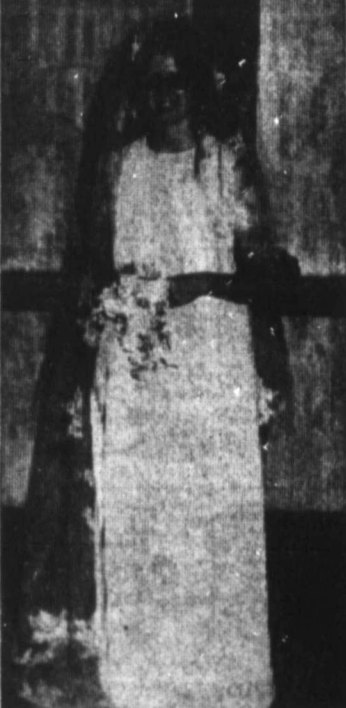

Police Provide Vacation Check To Ease The Vacationer's Mind

The Police Department isn't going to guarantee you won't get your house burgled while you're on vacation, but the department's Vacation Check service serves as a deterrent against burglars and vandals.

Vacation Check is a free service offered Pampa residents by the police. When a resident goes on vacation or takes a weekend to relax out of town, officers, upon request, will check the home daily for signs of breakins or vandalism.

To request the service, a resident must call the police department or go by the station in City Hall.

Certain information must be field out on the check sheet to help officers in making sure the home is secure.

Police Chief Jim Conner said the information is confidential and includes such items as cars, boats, trailers and other vehicles parked in the driveway; whom the keys are left with; if arrangements have been made to have someone mow the grass, water the lawn,

pick up the mail, or feed the dog; if lights have been left on, and who should be notified in case of an emergency.

"All this information helps us to determine if someone, who shouldn't be in the house, has been there," Conner said.

"The resident helps himself if he makes all these arrangements," he said. "Mail, unshown lawns, all the lights out, and many other things are dead give-aways that no one is home."

Conner said the homes are checked once a day. If officers find something suspicious, they will notify headquarters and the persons designated to be contacted in case of emergency.

At the present time, 36 homes are checked each day. Conner said the number of homes checked changes as people leave or return. At one point last year, officers were checking as many as 80 homes per day.

"We can't guarantee there won't be a burglary or vandalism at the home," Conner said, "but a daily check of the residence acts as a deterrent."

Conner said the daily home checks can put officers right on top of a breakin, rather than having it reported three weeks after it happens.

"If we don't know a burglary has occurred, we can't do anything about it," he said. "If we check the home, then we know almost constantly what is going on there. If anything is wrong, we can investigate immediately."

When the vacationer returns home, he notifies the department. The home check sheet is then removed from the book and given to the chief.

Inspecting officers fill in date, time, and remarks each day. The check sheet is signed by Conner and mailed to the resident.

"This is just a service of the department," Conner said. "We are happy to help the people of Pampa enjoy their vacations."

Demos Plan To Make Hospital Bill Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Democrats served notice Friday they plan to make President Nixon's almost certain-to-be overturned veto of the \$2.76 billion Hill-Burton hospital construction bill a major issue in the November elections.

The Senate quickly scheduled a vote Tuesday on overriding the veto after the House Thursday again passed the measure on a 279-10-98 roll call vote—27 more votes than the two-thirds majority required. It was the first time in 10 years the House had voted to override a presidential veto.

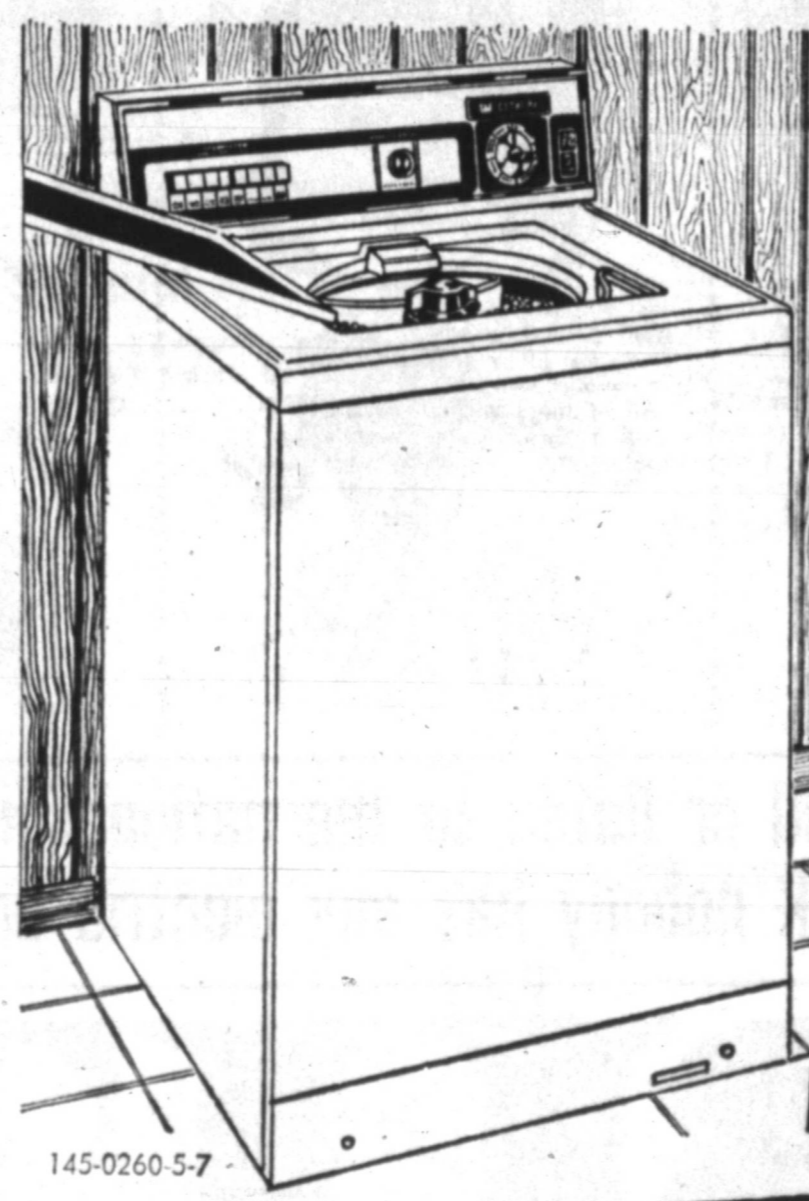
