County To Consider Re-districting Proposal

In an effort to solve the problems of Gray County at a local level, County Judge Sherman Lenning Jr. will present two re-districting proposals to county commissioners Wednesday.

The proposals, calling for redistricting of commissioners' precincts, were drawn up by a five-man committee appointed by Lenning last fall and presented at a public hearing Oct. 29, 1969.

At that time, about 50 farmers and ranchers voiced dissent over the proposals and the issue never came to a vote.

The committee appointed to study the re-districting plan consisted of Harold Comer, Jim Campbell and Ray Thompson, all of Pampa; Fred Blackwell of Lefors and Jim Allison of

Since redistricting is a commissioners choice, in the event the motion to re-district the precincts fails to be passed by commissioners, a petition signed by 10 per cent of the county's qualified voters could force the commissioners' court to call an election on the issue.

Lenning, in a statement prepared Saturday to announce the proposals, said: "In recent months the

Supreme Court of the United States has rendered decisions which, in essence, say that there shall be equal repesentation of the people in all governmental entities that have taxing powers.

"Even though I disagree with many of the Supreme Court decisions, I believe as a matter of fairness the commissioners' precincts should be re-

Lenning said to prevent a lawsuit requiring commissioners" to re-district, the commissioners court should take it upon themselves to re-district the

"I think it is only fair," he said, "that commissioners take this upon themselves. The people of this county have a right to equal representation."

Presently, Gray County is divided into four geographically equal commissioners' precincts. Precinct 2 has the largest population of the foor, with 10,493, or 85.38 per cent, of the county's registered voters.

Precincts 1, 3, and 4 combined have only 14.62 per cent of the voter population. Precinct 1 has 600 registered voters, or 4.88 per cent; Precinct 3,170 voters, or 1.38 per cent; and Precinct 4, 1,028 voters, or 8.36 per cent.

precincts, comprising less than 15 per cent of the county's population, have the ruling majority on the commissioners'

court. The more than 85 per cent of the voters in Precinct 2 are represented by one man.

By the same proportions, precinct spending for road and bridge maintenance is higher, percentage wise, in the lower populated precincts than in the larger precinct.

Precinct 3, for example, with

only 1.38 per cent of the county's voters, spent \$84.718.56 in 1969 and has budgeted \$106,227.60 for 1970. That represents an increase of 25 per

Precinct 2 on the other hand has budgeted \$153,826.28 for 1970, a one per cent increase over the \$152,282.92 spent in

Lenning said the court ruling requires the county to be re-

districted or constitutional ammendments would have to be passed by the state legislature to allow for the election of county commissioners at large; that is commissioners from all precincts would be elected by the entire voter population of

the county. The first proposal would divide the county into four precincts with an 8.24 per cent variation in equal population.

Precinct 1 would include all of voting precincts 1, 2, 9, and that part of precinct 13 north of highway 273 and south of highway 152.

Precinct 2 would include all of voting precincts 6, 8, 10 and that part of precinct 13 north of highway 152.

Precinct 3 would take in

that part of precinct 13 south of highway 152 and west of highway 70.

Precinct 4 would include voting precincts 4, 5, N, 12, and that part of precinct 13 east of highway 70 and south of highway 273, plus that part of precinct 13 north of Loop 171 and east-of highway 70 and west of highway 749.

The second proposal offers only a 3.06 per cent variation in equal population, but Lenning said he does not favor the second proposal because it would place McLean and Lefors in the same commissioners' precinct:

The second proposal would change Precinct 1 to include voting precincts 2 and 9 and that part of precinct 13 which is north of highway 273 and south of highway 152.

voting precincts 6, 8, 10 and that part of precinct, 13 north of highway 70.

Precinct 3 would include voting precincts 3, 7, 14, and that part of precinct 13 south. of highway 152 and west of highway 70.

Precinct 4 would include voting precincts 1, 4, 5, 11, 12, and that part of precinct 13 east of highway 70 and south of highway 273, plus that part of precinct 13 north of Loop 171 and east of highway 70 and west of highway 749.

Lenning was joined in support of the first proposal by Precinct 2 commissioner Vernon

Watkins. "I strongly support re-districting," Watkins said. "I believe we should equalize the representation in this county."



The second version is found in "The Children's New Testament," a new translation published by Word Books of Waco, Tex.

It is the first translation of the New Testament prepared especially for children in the vocabulary of children.

The translator, Gleason Ledyard, worked with a basic English vocabulary of 850 words, which is well within the comprehension range of a normal first or second grade children.

Ledyard spent 15 years in the Canadian arctic, as a missionary to Eskimos. It was for their sake that he first undertook a simple English translation, As he worked on it, he came to realize it also could be of great value to children.

Nine acres of this wheat washe newly-released variety by DeKalb called Palo Duro. Wegot a very accurate weight check. This wheat yielded 65 bushels per acre of wheat that tested 64 pounds per

The entire 37 acre block yielded an over all average of 61 bushels. This included the nin-acre block of Palo Duro. Although we made an accurate measurement of the test block of Sturdy wheat and weighed the wheat, we found that the combining was done too early and much wheat was lost on the one swath that we took. Our figures showed it yielded only 51 bushels. However, since the overall average was 61 bushels per acre, we realized there was an error some place and attributed it to starting the combine too early when the moisture interfered with good harvesting.




