## Winter's coldest reading recorded

| A frigid arctic air mass continued its grip on the Panhandle area today after Panhandle area boday ainds slinging snow and blowing wind throughout Wednesday, creating hazardous driving conditions with a wind chill factor well below zero. <br> Wednesday's high in Pampa had reached 30 degrees by $9: 36$ a.m. With the ground already begun around 8:30 a.m <br> As the front tramped into the area at mid-morning, temperatures slid below 20 degrees before noon and continued to drop throughout the day, falling below 10 degrees before sunset. <br> Gusty northerly winds bet ween 20 and 30 miles an hour dropped below zero during the afternoon. <br> The overnight low plummeted coldest day for Pampa this winter to date. It had originally reported that the index had risen more than twice that amount - 1.3 percent - in November <br> The December decline had not been expected by most analysts. many of whom were predicting an increase of about 0.5 percent Private economists were basing this expectation on a variety of business barometers all pointing to an economy that rebounded sharply late last year from a four-month slump The decline in the index came despite the fact that the estimate of overall boowth increase in the gross national product - the total output of goods and ser vices - was put at a rate of 3.9 percent for the final three months of the year <br> This represented a sharp increase from the original estimate rate of growth during the July-September period, when the economy grew at a sluggish 16 percent <br> The GNP was not the only sharp rebound in the econg to a the final months of the year Factory production registered its sharpest gain in five months in December and Americans. personal income rose a strong 0.5 percent in December <br> But the Commerce Departmeni said that the elements that go into | making up its Leading Economic Index turned in a weak peformance. The index is made up of a dozen measurements selected because of their ability to signal <br> A single month's decline is not taken as significant. But a decline signaled an impending recession. The index did decline in three consecutive months in 1984, dropping in June, July and August. <br> However, after strong gains in September and November, most recession in 1985 were unwarranted. This optimism was showing strong gains in consumer and business spending in the final months of last year <br> The department said that five of the 11 indicators available for decline. The biggest negative factor was contributed by a slump in new contracts and orders for plant and equipment followed by a decline in net business formation.
