## Crazy World Of Washington

WASHINGTON (UPI) —In private business, management is regarded as a three-state process.

First you make plans. Then you put the plans into operation. Finally—and of utmost importance—you check to see whether your plans are working out, whether they're really accomplishing their objective.


It is a well-nigh incredible fact that the U.S. government, largest business enterprise in the world, expends some \$200 billion a year without paying much attention to the third or "review" phase of management.

For years, both Democratic and Republican presidents have been promising to introduce "sound management methods" into government. Lyndon B. Johnson made a great fanfare of ordering all federal agencies to install so-called "planningprogramming-budgeting" procedures, ostensibly designed to insure follow-up and review of federal programs.

But these procedures still exist mainly on paper. Only here and there in the colossal federal bureaucracy are serious, systematic attempts being made to find out whether costly programs actually are accomplishing anything worthwhile, or how they might be improved to achieve better results or reduce costs.

Congress and its appropriations committees rarely question whether an ongoing program is really necessary. It is simply assumed in the congressional appropriation process that the amount spent on a program last year was justified. Scrutiny is limited to "increments"—requests for increases in funding.

Management experts have tried to point out that it would be far more sensible to employ what is known in business as "zero base budgeting." under which nothing is taken for

granted. When a program comes up for renewal, the entire operation is reviewed to determine whether any part of it is still needed.

President Nixon is now taking whack at this task. Whether he'll get any better results than his predecessors remains to be seen. But he seems to be moving in the right direction. He has converted the old Budget Bureau into a White Hotuse Office of Execuive Management, headed by the able George P. Shultz, former secretary of labor. Part of Schultz's job is to flush out redundant, obsolete, ineffective programs.

Even a modest beginning would be welcome. Highly informed career officials estmate that the amount of sheer waste now resulting from unevaluated programs may be in neighborhood of \$30 billion a year.

That's more than the cost of the Vietnam War.

Health Standards Decline

WASHINGTON (UP1) -Organized labor gave unequivocal endorsement today to legislation to set up comprehensive health insurance protection for all Americans to reverse what was described as a "shocking decline" in standards.

One day after the Nixon administration attacked national health insurance as unworkable, too costly and a risky break with the past, George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, gave it top priority among domestic issues - before Congress.

In prepared testimony for the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee, Meany said labor did not realistically expect final action this year but that the need for a national wealth plan was so urgent that delay beyond 1971 should not be tolerated.

"The growing failure of America's health system to meet the needs of the American people, and the consequent shocking decline in America's standards of health, compared to other nations of the world, make that unmistakably clear," Meany said.

He said several pending bills in Congress would serve to "control, the runaway cost inflation of medical care." with each containing particularly worthwhile features that might be combined.
