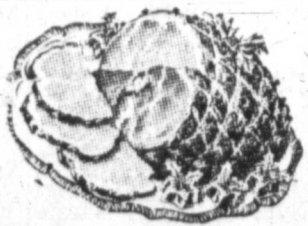

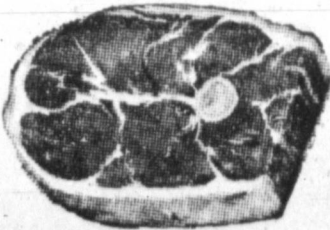

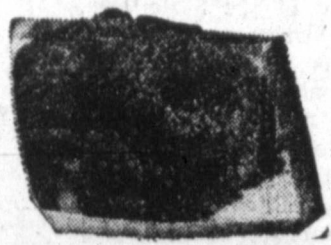

Price Increases Devour Texans' 1970 Progress In Income

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Price increases have eaten up all gains in Texans' income so far this year, according to a report from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"In trying to increase his effective purchasing power the average Texas consumer is on an economic treadmill," said Dr. Francis B. May, professor of business statistics.

During the first nine months of 1970 personal income has averaged 6 per cent above the level for the same period in 1969, May reported. Consumer prices, however, have also risen an average of 6 per cent.

"Texas income is still growing but at a slower rate than at any time during the past several years," May said. And when the rise in consumer prices is considered, "even this slowed increase in the purchasing power of Texas income receivers disappears."

May's report on the business situation also showed that wage-earners average weekly hours and paychecks declined in September.

The business analyst downplayed prospects for a strong revival in business activity.

"The necessity of continuing to fight inflation means that the money supply cannot be expanded as rapidly as would be desirable," he said. "A counterinflationary fiscal policy is needed because of price rises that are uncomfortably persistent."

May also reported that: —Texas industrial production leveled off in September after rising 2 per cent in August. —The index of urban building permits issued in September rose 1 per cent over the August index.

—Total electric-power use in September rose despite a decline in individual power consumption.

—September crude oil production in the state rose 1 per cent over August production to the highest level on record.

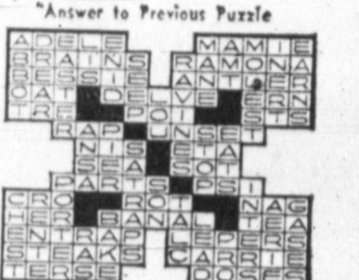

senator in at least 25 other states.

Keep a tally in your head and if you notice a large number of states electing senators other than Muskie, it will be a "bad night for old adages."

Third parties—Watch the early returns to see how well "third party" candidates are doing, particularly in states where no "third party" candidates are on the ballots.

A strong showing by "third party" candidates traditionally means that somebody will demand a recount.

Past-recounts have turned up as many as half a dozen "third party" candidates, which proves that politicians aren't very good at arithmetic. As further demonstrated by President Nixon, who recently referred to Biscayne Bay, Fla., as "one of my second homes."

If you can grasp the concept of an infinite number of "third parties" and "second homes," it will help you understand the election results. Practice before a mirror.

Southern strategy—A substantial swing to Republican candidates in New England, the Midwest and on the West Coast would be a clear indication that Nixon's so-called "southern strategy" is paying off.

It may then be expected that Nixon will apply his southern strategy to Vietnam and the Middle East.

Party lines — Earlier this month Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., in a bold departure from tradition, asserted that "when the President is right I support him, and when he is wrong I oppose him."

Soviet 'Mental Case' Now Senior Scientist

MOSCOW (UPI) — A controversial Soviet scientist, committed to a mental home for examination last spring, has been appointed "senior research scientist" at a major scientific institute, university sources said Saturday.

Zinoviy Medvedev, a distinguished physiologist, incurred the ire of the scientific and political establishment with his unorthodox writings on political factors in Soviet science.

Anniversary Of Attempt On Life Of Harry Truman

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Harry S. Truman was napping after lunch on Nov. 1, 1950, when two Puerto Rican nationalists walked up to Blair House, then his temporary residence.

At precisely 2:20 p.m. on that unreasonably warm day, Oscar Collazo, 36, and Gisello Torresola, 25, pulled out guns and tried to shoot their way into the stately mansion where the first family was living while the White House, across Pennsylvania Avenue, was being renovated.

The shots awakened the President and he darted to a window, clad only in his underwear. "Get back, get back," a guard shouted from the street below. Truman ducked.

Moments later Torresola and a White House police officer lay mortally wounded on Pennsylvania Avenue. Collazo and two other policemen also were shot but recovered.

The assassination attempt was carried out in conjunction with a general uprising that began two days earlier in Puerto Rico by the Nationalist party under leadership of Pedro Albizu Campos.

By the time it ended, 31 persons had been killed in the island revolt, which included an attack on the governor's palace, an unsuccessful attempt to assassinate Gov. Luis Muñoz Marín and a siege of municipal police stations all over Puerto Rico.

At his trial early in 1951, Collazo testified that he had hatched the plan to assassinate Truman on Oct. 31 to draw attention to the nationalist rebellion in Puerto Rico.

Collazo was convicted by the U.S. District Court in Washington on four counts, including the murder of Pvt. Leslie Coffelt, who actually was killed by Torresola and assault, with a deadly weapon in an attempt to assassinate the President and to kill the two wounded guards. He was sentenced to die in the electric chair, but Truman commuted the sentence in 1952 to live in Prison and Collazo now is in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan.

Former Copyboy Named Editor Of Texas Newspaper

FORT WORTH (UPI) — Delbert Willis, who began his newspaper career as a copyboy on the Fort Worth Press during the depression, Saturday was named editor of the newspaper.

The promotion of Willis from managing editor to the top editorial post was announced by Jack R. Howard, president of Scripps-Howard Newspapers.

Willis succeeds the late C. A. "Bob" Sellers, who died of a heart attack Sept. 14.

Willis is a two-time winner of the National Headliner Award for reporting. He also has received two Texas Headliner awards and three writing awards.

from the local chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalism society.

He has covered every major news beat for the Press during his career and has also held the positions of feature writer, state editor and city editor.

Willis' career was interrupted by World War II, during which he was wounded in the Pacific. After World War II, he attended Harvard University as a Nieman Fellow.

He was confined in early May to an institute for the mentally disturbed on alleged suspicion of schizophrenia, at which point he lost his job at a scientific institute in Obninsk.

Mental Rehabilitation
The protests of some of the Soviet Union's most distinguished scientists resulted in Medvedev's release and presumed mental "rehabilitation" June 17.

Unemployed since then, Medvedev has now been appointed to the staff of the All-Union Institute for Physiology and Biochemistry at Borovsk, the sources said.

He is reported to have already resumed his interrupted research on the molecular mechanisms of the development and aging of organisms. Borovsk is a small scientific settlement about 60 miles southwest of Moscow.

The 45-year-old Medvedev had written a book, smuggled out and published abroad, exposing the influence of Trofim Lysenko, who set standards for Soviet biology and genetics for almost a generation as Josef Stalin's science commissar.

Banished to Siberia
Under Lysenko's rule the country's most distinguished geneticists were dismissed from work and some of them were arrested and banished to Siberia.

His most famous victim was Ivan Vavilov, a world famous geneticist who died in Siberian exile.

Lysenko succeeded to Vavilov's post as president of the Academy of Agricultural Sciences, which he almost wrecked. Removed from office after Stalin's death, Lysenko is now discredited.

Government Drag Ship Uncovers Navigational Mystery

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government drag ships have found a mystery; and a previously unknown navigational hazard, on the bottom of Delaware Bay between Lewes, Del., and Cape May, N.J.

It is the wreck of a 19th Century merchant vessel, possibly British, which sank some time after 1876 with a cargo of thousands of pieces of ironstone chinaware made in Staffordshire, England.

Discovery of the wreck was announced Saturday by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. It was made by the Rude and Heck, ships operated by NOAA, while dragging the bay for submerged hazards.

Belfast Struck By New Violence Wave

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI)—British armored cars smashed through makeshift barricades thrown up by rock-hurling Roman Catholic demonstrators Saturday in the third consecutive night of violence to hit the city.

The trouble began shortly after 5 p.m.

The wreck, its superstructure gone, lies in 39 feet of water about 12 miles east northeast of Cape Henlopen, Del., and 7.5 miles south of Cape May. It is about 15 miles from Lewes.

NOAA could find no record of the ship's sinking or any explanation of why it went down. It may have been

destroyed in a storm, a spokesman said. Scuba divers aboard the drag vessels brought up pieces of chinaware which were examined by Jefferson Miller, curator of ceramic history at the Smithsonian Institution.

His study provided NOAA with its clue as to when the ship met disaster. Staffordshire ironstone is a heavy and

fragile earthenware still widely popular. An exception to the all-white ironware was a hand-enamelled cup decorated with many-colored flowers. The wreck rises 8 to 10 feet above the bottom. The rest is embedded in silt. NOAA notified the Coast Guard which will give it a place on nautical charts warning of underwater hazards.
