# Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Had they met for the heavyweight championship of the world, the match would have been a promoter's dream and a sportswriter's heaven.

Ervin vs. Bayh. Four rounds. Senate chamber. Sellout crowd. No closed-circuit television.

In this corner, Sam J. Ervin Jr. of North Carolina, the 74-year old veteran of countless legislative bouts. A crowd pleaser with a Southern style. A spotty record with many wins, many losses. But never stopped.

**Four Vital Issues**

And in this corner, the young challenger, 42 year old Birch Bayh from Indiana. Ambitious, talented, hoping to use the match as a stepping-stone to bigger things.

Within the last two years, these two senators—Bayh and Ervin—have clashed head on four times on four vital issues.

Round one: In the fall of 1969, President Nixon asked the Senate to confirm the nomination of Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr. to the Supreme Court.

Ervin, along with all Southerners, immediately embraced and endorsed Haynsworth, a conservative neighbor from South Carolina. Bayh led the opposition.

**Nomination Rejected**

On the Senate floor, Ervin fought for the confirmation of Haynsworth. Bayh battled for his defeat.

The nomination was rejected. Score the first round for Bayh.

Round two: Rejected on Haynsworth, President Nixon submitted the name of another Southerner—Judge G. Harrold Carswell of Florida—as his choice for the Supreme Court.

Again Ervin placed his legislative skill, influence, and oratory at Carswell's disposal. At first reluctant, Bayh again led the fight to defeat the nomination.

Again the Senate rejected the nomination. Score round two for Bayh.

Round three: After a long delay, the Senate began consideration of a constitutional amendment calling for direct popular elections of presidents.

For the first time, Bayh was on the defensive. As floor manager of the constitutional amendment, the Hoosier senator was forced to pick up a two-thirds majority, not only to pass the amendment but to kill the filibuster.

And right in Bayh's path was Ervin, leading the opposition to the direct popular elections proposal.

**Cloture Petition**

Three times Bayh sought to bring the amendment to a vote with a cloture petition. Three times, Ervin rounded up enough votes to deny him.

Finally, the constitutional amendment was put aside—dead for the year. Score round three for Ervin.

Round four: Defeated on popular elections, Bayh turned to another constitutional amendment—this one designed to prevent discrimination between the sexes.

Using the same tactics which served him so well before, Ervin prevented the Senate from voting. In fact, he added an amendment—specifically exempting women from the draft—which Bayh said would kill everything.

The Senate recessed Wednesday until after the elections with still no vote. Score round four, tentatively, for Ervin.

Round five: In November, after the elections, Bayh plans to make a new effort at passing a constitutional amendment with a revised version designed to eliminate some of the objections. There was no immediate indication whether Ervin would counter-punch.

# Government Takes Over Rail Business

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nation's railroads are getting out of the passenger business, and the government is getting in.

Congress approved sweeping legislation Wednesday to create a government-backed corporation to take over what is left of the nation's inter-city rail passenger business. The corporation would try to make a profit carrying people; but if it can not, then the taxpayer would foot the bill.

The railroads favored the idea, passenger organizations wanted it, and President Nixon is expected to sign it.

The legislation swept through both houses of Congress in a single afternoon, handing the White House one of the most far-reaching transportation reforms in U.S. history.

Beginning March 1, the 15-member corporation would sign contracts with any railroads willing to turn over their passenger operations. In exchange for ridding themselves of the liability, the railroads would pay the corporation an amount equal to half their passenger deficit in 1969. This contribution would be tax deductible and would be in the form of cash, equipment or future service.

The corporation would be a profit-making organization, although many railroads doubt it will make a profit. Eight of its 15 members would be appointed by the President, and the remainder would be elected by stockholders.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Although no precise inventory has been taken, it is my impression that about 281 new anti-pollution products have been introduced thus far this year.

Whatever the figure, there is no doubt that pollution control has become a major industry in America. Which means that it probably won't be long before the amount of pollution created by the production of anti-pollution devices will exceed the amount of pollution they control.

Which, in turn, will generate a demand for more anti-pollution devices. So it may be that the pollution control business is the best of all possible worlds.

Some of the products, I've noticed, aren't really new. It just took a while for someone to recognize their anti-pollutant potential. As in the television commercials for LS4D, the extra ingredient used in gasoline.

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# Nixon Puts Some Teeth Into Tough, New Anticrime Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon signed into law Thursday a tough new anticrime bill, saying it would give the government the tools to "launch a total war against organized crime—and we will win this war."

Under heavy security precautions, Nixon went to the Justice Department, to sign the bill aimed at both organized crime and the recently stepped up increase in terrorist bombings. Key domestic proposals by Nixon and won overwhelming final approval in both the House and Senate. After a signing ceremony putting the new law into force, Nixon turned to Attorney General John N. Mitchell and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and told them: "Gentlemen, I give you the job. You do the job."

The "job" includes a crack-down on organized crime, terrorist bombings and sale and movement of explosives used in bombings.

Nixon told a large group of administration officials, congressional leaders, law enforcement officials and others: "It seems that every day we pick up the paper and see some sporadic incident without reason, without cause—a terrorist activity we have not been able to cope with before."

The new law, he said, "should be a warning to those who engage in these acts that we are not going to tolerate these activities."

Nixon said the law allows "the full force of the FBI" to move in to investigate bombing attacks where previously they had only been allowed to do so "at the invitation of local authorities."

He praised the FBI repeatedly and specifically mentioned the capture in New York City Tuesday of Angela Davis, fugitive black militant sought for more than two months on

California murder charges in connection with a shootout in which a hostage judge was among those killed.

Nixon said the apprehension of Miss Davis "is an indication that once the federal govern-

ment, through the FBI, moves into an area, it should be a warning to those who engaged in these acts that they are going to be apprehended."

## Nixon Lays His Prestige On Line For GOP Candidates

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon's determination to unseat prominent Senate doves has led him to go beyond toss-up races and risk his prestige by campaigning against heavily favored Senate Democrats on their home grounds.

High on the list are Sens. William Proxmire, D-Wis., and Stuart Symington, D-Mo. Both are strongly favored to win reelection but Nixon has scheduled visits to both their states in hopes of engineering upset Republican victories.

The President has not only decided to fight the Wisconsin odds by appearing in Green Bay this Saturday in behalf of Republican Senate candidate John Erickson, but also has given Erickson a well-publicized role in a White House worship service Sunday. The former Wisconsin basketball coach, a board member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, will lead the prayer.

Monday Nixon has scheduled an appearance and overnight stay in Kansas City, Mo., to boost the underdog campaign of Republican John Danforth, the Missouri attorney general who is opposing Symington.

Several published reports have said Republicans plan little aid for the GOP opponent of Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., who has generally backed Nixon's defense policies, and there is no indication the

President plans to campaign against Jackson.

White House officials said Nixon probably would campaign in 16 of 17 states altogether. The other states on his schedule for a 3,000-mile trip Saturday and another swing Monday and Tuesday will put him on ground more congenial for Republican election prospects.

Saturday, Nixon plans to campaign in Vermont for Republican Sen. Winston L. Prouty, who faces a tough race against former Gov. Philip H. Hoff; Pennsylvania, where Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott is heavily favored but a close race for governor is under way; New Jersey, where Republican Nelson G. Gross is rated a good chance of beating Democratic Sen. Harrison J. Williams; and Wisconsin.

Monday, the President will campaign on the Ohio Statehouse steps in Columbus for Republican Rep. Robert Taft Jr., who is running against Democrat Howard Metzenbaum for the Senate seat now held by retiring Sen. Stephen M. Young, a Democrat.

From Columbus, Nixon flies to Grand Forks, N.D., to boost Republican Rep. Thomas S. Kleppe against Sen. Quentin N. Burdick. The race is considered close, as are those in Tennessee and Indiana, the two states scheduled for presidential appearances Tuesday.

In Indiana, Republican Rep. Richard L. Rousebush is opposing Sen. Vance Hartke. In Tennessee, Rep. William E. Brock III is running against Sen. Albert Gore.

## Foreign News

A Canadian government white paper in June listed establishment of diplomatic relations with Red China as a major objective of the 1970s in order to help that country "into a more constructive relationship with the world."

The white paper also declared that Canada would continue to treat the United States as her "closest friend and ally," but with policies distinctly independent.

Both were in line with the announced thinking of Prime Minister Pierre Elliot Trudeau even before he took over his job in April, 1968.

In the United States there was some grumbling that a desire to sell Canadian wheat weighed nearly as much as altruism in Trudeau's decision, but Washington resigned itself and so there was no great surprise Tuesday when simultaneous announcements in Ottawa and Peking disclosed the links actually had been forged.

For a decade Red China has been Canada's best customer for wheat.

Washington's low-keyed reaction was that its concern mostly was for the adverse international effect the Canadian decision might have on Nationalist China.

Washington did not say so, but it was noteworthy that the Peking and Ottawa announcements came only a few weeks from the time when the question of Red Chinese membership again will come before the United Nations. In the past, Canada either has opposed admission for the Communist Chinese or abstained.

This year, it is expected Canada will vote in favor.

Even with Canada's vote, Red China is not expected to win UN membership this year, but that does not speak for next year or the year after that.

And, while the United States disapproves of Trudeau's own policy toward Red China, it also is forced to admit that Red China does exist and is a factor that must be reckoned with.

## Letter Ties In Tate Murder Witness

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The prosecution in the Tate murder trial Wednesday produced a letter Susan Atkins allegedly sent a former cellmate after the woman told police Miss Atkins had confessed to the slayings.

A legal hassle developed over whether the letter was admissible as evidence, since in it Miss Atkins implicates the other defendants as well as herself.

The same legal issue prevented the cellmate, Romi Howard, 39, from telling the jury all the details Miss Atkins told her about the killings.

She was permitted to testify only to what Miss Atkins admitted doing herself, and she said the dark-haired defendant said she personally stabbed the pregnant actress.

Miss Atkins told the grand jury she held Miss Tate while others did the stabbing.

Outside the presence of the jury, Miss Howard was asked if Miss Atkins said she cut the telephone wires to the Tate house.

"No, but she told me who did," she replied.

Miss Howard said at first the stories Miss Atkins told her were too fantastic to believe, but she finally went to police with them "because I didn't think people who did things like that should run around loose."

# Congress Faces Insuperable Hurdles When It Re-Convenes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Options differed, mostly along party lines, as to what the second session of the 91st Congress accomplished before quitting until after the election. But everybody agreed it faces almost insuperable hurdles when it returns.

The House and Senate dragged to a halt Wednesday until Nov. 16. Speaker John W. McCormack said the Democratic Congress had displayed almost unprecedented "innovation and initiative," with little or no help from the Republican administration.

Republicans contended most of what had been done was in response to presidential proposals, and that far too many of these had been allowed to die or had been left for subsequent action.

Among controversial bills left in limbo, passed by one house or the other or in some cases by neither, were measures to

reform welfare, boost Social Security checks, curb imports of textiles and shoes, add an antipollution tax to gasoline sales, and an anti-jack tax to plane tickets, modify Medicare and Medicaid programs, avert a drop in excise taxes on new cars and telephone service; extend the interstate highway program; and provide overdue funds for many government functions.

Before they called it quits, the House and Senate quickly approved and sent to the White House bills that would:

- Create a government-sponsored corporation to take over from such ailing lines as the Penn. Central the financial burden of operating passenger service between major cities.
- Eliminate mandatory sentences for all drug offenses, stiffen penalties for drug pushers and ease them for simple possession of illicit drugs. Strict accounting proce-

dures were provided for potentially harmful drugs, such as tranquilizers and amphetamines. Agents with court warrants were authorized to enter homes without warning if they suspected a threat to their lives or the danger that drug evidence would be destroyed.

The Senate also passed and sent to the White House, a compromise military construction authorization; passed and sent to a House-Senate conference a \$2.1 billion military construction appropriations bill; and passed and sent to the White House legislation to help veterans buy mobile and condominium homes.

# Bentsen Says GOPs Helping Democrats

By United Press International Democratic Senate candidate Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. says the campaign swing by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew on behalf of Republican candidates in Texas helped the Democrats so much he can't wait for the President himself to come to the state.

Bentsen said Agnew's trip, along with those of Republican cabinet officials on behalf of Republican Senate candidate George Bush, have aroused voter interest. Bentsen has said he needs a large voter turnout to defeat Bush.

Bush, meanwhile, said it was "time to get tough" with the persons responsible for the rash

of bombing incidents and also pledged to do everything he could to eradicate "second class citizenship" for Texas minorities.

In a statement released from his Austin headquarters Bush said "the full force of the federal law" should be brought against those who have been responsible for the bombing incidents.

"It's time to get tough with those who have been committing these crimes, thus costing the taxpayer money, and sometimes cause loss of human lives," Bush said Wednesday. "Not only are these incidents resulting in the destruction of federal property and campus buildings, they have frequently resulted in the senseless destruction of irreplaceable documents and records."

Bush, a U.S. representative from Houston, says he has submitted legislation to increase penalties for illegal transportation of explosives in interstate commerce to 10 years in prison and for bomb threats to five years. His bill would also make the use of explosives to damage or destroy any federally owned or leased property a federal crime.

Speaking in Brownsville, Bush promised to work vigorously "to see that there is no such thing as second-class citizenship" for Texas minorities. Bush said he has the "sensitivity that will bring leadership to all Texans."

Bush said he is certain voters are going to "vote for the man who note the label; for the man whose record reflects sensitivity and concern for the way things are, not for the voice and the

record and the machine from the past."

"Machine politics is not good enough for the Valley, for South Texas, or for any of Texas in 1970," Bush said. "The machine uses pressure on jobs to whip people into line for one-party voting. It is imperative that every single Texan review what's happened to him under the domination of a stagnant one-party system, and then vote his convictions for the individual candidate who has the promise, the intent, and the conviction to do something about the condition of our state."

Bentsen said in Austin Agnew's visit this week "has helped me more than it has my opponent. And if they really want to help me more, I hope they send the President to Tex-

as to campaign for my opponent."

Bentsen said the Agnew campaign swing "is the latest move in a Republican power play to gain control of the United States Senate. They have had a steady stream of Republican cabinet members coming to Texas to tell us who to vote for, and now the vice president. What they've really accomplished is that they have aroused voter interest in the election and we're going to see a bigger voter turnout on Nov. 3. And that means I'm going to win by a big margin."

## Oil Allowable Record High

AUSTIN (UPI) — The Texas crude oil allowable set by the Texas Railroad Commission for this month was a record high. But demand will be even higher during November, according to the Bureau of Mines.

The bureau estimated Wednesday the November demand for Texas crude will be 3,450,000 barrels a day, up 60,000 barrels over this month.

Last month the Railroad Commission set the October oil allowable at a record 87 per cent of potential production. The allowable has steadily increased in recent months because of a growing demand for domestic oil.

The Railroad Commission holds its monthly meeting today to set the November allowable.

While the Bureau of Mines forecast an increase in demand for November, nominations by major purchasers of Texas crude for next month are down by 57,970 barrels a day from nominations for this month.
