The Senior Citizens will meet Monday, Nov. 28 at noon at the Heritage Depot. Senior citizens are asked to bring sandwiches, chips and dips.


#### Arts and crafts bazaar to be held

# Bills introduced by Bivins designed to make government more responsive

AUSTIN - State Senator Teel Bivins (R-Amarillo) this past week introduced three bills designed to make government more responsive to Texas, including Senate Bill 67 which would prohibit legislators from representing clients before state agencies.

Bivins also filed bills to end unfunded state mandates to local governments and to limit terms of office for statewide elected officials and members of the Legislature.

"It's common for legislators who are lawyers to represent clients before state agencies, " Bivins said. "Employees of state agencies complain that allowing legislators to argue contested cases can be intimidating and can sway a case in the legislator's favor. That's not fair to the opposing parties who might not have a senator or House member as their law-

Senate Joint resolution 8 would require the state to provide funding for new legislative mandates on local governmental entities, such as cities, counties and school districts.

"The Legislature's habit of ordering local governments to implement programs without sending along the necessary funds is unfair to taxpayers across the state. They in turn, must raise their local taxes to pay the bill for the Legislature's program," Bivins said.

The restriction would apply to mandates passsed after Jan. 1, 1996. The mandate would not be subject to reimbursement if two-thirds of the Legislature voted to waive the re-

Also at the meeting, Rod Ellis of Lubbock was elected president. Officers for 1995 were also elected.







quirement.

Senate Joint Resolution 9 would limit the terms of office for statewide elected officials and legislators to 12 years.

"Allowing politicians to entrench themselves in office is not healthy for the democratic process," Bivins said. "This proposal would guarantee an influx of fresh ideas into state government."

Under the constitutional amendement, officeholders limited to 12 years would be governor, lieutenant governor, senators, House members, treasurer, comptroller, land commissioner, agriculture commissioner, attorney general and railroad commissioners.

In a recent issue of Leadership journal, Chris T. Zwingelberg observes that though everyone is familiar with Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes and his amazingly keen powers of observation, few of us are aware of Holmes' belief that deduction and observation

are even more necessary in faith and religion than they are in detective work.

In Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's The Adventure of the Naval Treaty, Doyle pictures his famous sleuth studying a simple rose. Holmes' famous sidekick Watson observes, "He walked past the couch to an open window and held up the drooping stalk of a moss rose, looking down at the dainty blend of crimson and green. It was a new phase of his character to me, for I had never before seen him show any interest in natural objects.

"'There is nothing in which deduction is so necessary as in religion,' said he, leaning with his back against the shutters....

'Our highest assurance of the goodness of Providence seems to me to rest in the flowers. All other things, our powers, our desires, our food, are really necessary for our existence in the first instance. But this rose is an extra. Its smell and its color are an embellishment of life, not a condition of it. It is only goodness which gives extras, and so I say again that we have much to hope from the flowers."

Think about it. (By the way, the root word from which "thanksgiving" comes is also the root for "think." To really think is to be truly thankful)

God has absolutely showered us with extras. With His brush He has painted a world dripping with color when, for most things, a few shades of gray would do. He has given us the ability to enjoy an astonishing variety of tastes. He has populated our lives with wonderfully interesting people not even the most creative author could have envisioned. (We tend to be the dullards who dislike variety and difference; God absolutely exults in them!)

Thanksgiving was Thursday, but as the "extras" keep right on coming from the hand of God, every day is a good day for gratitude.





Your Better Business Bureau, in answer to the many questions that we receive every day about these types of gimmicks, has Published a brochure called "Tips on avoiding telemarketing fraud" which outlines the most prevalent ypes of telemarketing frauds, including "reloading," "recovery" and "cyber-schemes"

# Texas Cattle Feeders Association meets

Cattle industry history is being made right before our eyes and, with the successful unification of the major beef organizations, cattlemen can look forward to a future where they will not only survive, but prosper.

That's the message Jim Webb gave to around 900 cattle feeders at the 1994 "Bridge to Tomorrow" Annual Convention of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA), Nov 13-15 in San Antonio.

The unification effort arose from a long-range plan developed last year, Webb said. The long-range plan is intended to refocus the driving force of the

beef industry that, despite the efforts of the four organizations, has been unable to respond adequately to consumer signals.

to improve our current situation, because it means having four plans and four ways of managing issues." That, he emphasized, creates industry confusion, lack of cooperation and sometimes even conflict.

"We know that beef has a major problem with quality and consistency, "he said. "Unfortunately, mixed messages coming from the industry have sent confusing signals to the marketplace." There's also the problem of island mentality. "Many subgroups, such as cow-calf producers, stocker operators, feeders and packers, aggressively compete against each other with little regard for the end product or the consumer."

If the beef industry is to remain viable into the 21st century, all segments must focus on consumer demands for quality, consistency and conve-

nience at a competitve price, Webb said. To meet these demands, the industry must focus itself around specific objectives, a mechanism of control to assurs results, coordination among all industry participants and cost effectiveness.

"The organizations that connect industry profitability to consumers must address the forces at work on our industry, such as government regulations, foreign marketing of beef, domestic promotion. competing meats, diet/health issues and food safety,"

Webb told TCFA members. "This plan brings the industry together to solve our common challenges--something we have not been totally successful doing separately. And it does so within the legal constraints imposed by the Beef Promotion and Research Act and Order."


