Pampa will join with other cities in the Panhandle and salary, will be paid by the South Plains to encourage development of sound traffic. safety plans at the local level.

First step in that direction will be taken when City Engineer Jerry Harris and Public Works Director R.B. Cooke go to a District Traffic Workshop called by Gov. Preston Smith in Lubbock Feb. 23-25.

City Manager Mack Wofford said today Pampa's participation in the stepped-up traffic safety program throughout the state also was being urged by Charles B. Smith, district highway engineer, Amarillo.

Smith said hus office will be represented at the Lubbock meeting by Jim Moss Sr., traffic engineer, and Leon Wood, draftsman. All expenses for the

Governor's Traffic Safety Conference, City Manager Wofford said. Registration will be held from 5 to 6:30 Wednesday, Feb. 23 and a reception and dinner is scheduled for 7 p.m.

Thursday. Feb. 23, there will be an all-day session starting with a breakfast at 8:30 a.m. featuring program announcements and a speaker on purpose of the workshop.

Group forums will be held each forenoon and afternoon with noonday luncheons and evening dinner sessions on Wednesday and Thursday. Feb. 23 and 24.

Another forenoon of group forums is set for Friday. Feb. 25. followed by a luncheon and workshop wrap-up at 1:30 p.m. and adjournment at 2 p.m.

State Likely To Seek **Abolition Of Measure**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court blocked temporarily today a plan for redistricting Texas' U.S. House seats.

The court acted at the request of state officials. The plan had been imposed last Saturday by a three-judge federal panel in Dallas to supplant a redistricting arrangement passed by the Texas legislature. The order, granting the re-

quested stay, was issued without any comment on the oneman, one-vote dispute. Texas officials are expected to follow up with an appeal seeking to wipe out the judicial plan.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - A three-judge federal court today declared Texas' 1971 house redistricting plan unconstitutional and ordered a system of singlemember districts this year for Dallas and Bexar (San Antonio) Counties

The court said the legislature has until July 1, 1973 to pass a new statewide redistricting plan.

Moon Coin Sale To Be Prohibited

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - A federal official says he will urge the Federal Trade Commission to issue a nationwide public warning against buying any object purportedly taken to the moon.

Cummings Sanborn said he was prompted to do so after Houston space officials told him of many complaints from throughout the nation about offers to sell coins and stamps that supposedly had been to the moon.

Sanborn, head of the FTC's San Antonio office, said some coins are selling for up to \$700. Astronauts are not allowed

to commercialize anything they take into space. Sanborn pointed out

Space Center officials in Houston confirmed they had received many comp They said that after the Apollo 15 flight, one firm even announced it had obtained souvenirs taken on the mission-even though the spacecraft's gear had not yet been packed.

2 N.Y. Police **Fatally Shot**

NEW YORK (AP) - Two young city policemen, who had been Marine Corps buddies in Vietnam, were fatally shot Thursday night in what officials called an "outand-out assassination."

Deputy Police Commissioner Robert Daley said the two men had walked past their killers on a street in Manhattan's East Village and were shot in the back.

The officers had volunteered for one of the city's new neighborhood police teams and had asked to be partners because of their experiences together in Vietnam.

Sgt. Frederick Reddy, commander of the team, called them "two of the best men we had-young, aggressive, intelligent...tough but fair."

Witnesses told police they saw three men fleeing from the scene, one of them waving a gun aloft and firing into the air as if in glee. The attackers took the service revolvers of both policemen.

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - The U.S. Center for Disease Control has added Tennessee to the list of states reporting widespread outbreaks of influenza. Georgia and Oklahoma

were also added Thursday to those states where regional outbreaks of the disease have been detected. Through the week ending

Jan. 22, the center said, 920 deaths from influenza or pneumonia were reported in the 122 cities which the center uses to measure the rate of mortality from respiratory illnesses Previously listed as states with widespread outbreaks of

flu were Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, Nebraska, Delaware and Colorado. The list of states where re-

gional outbreaks have been reported also includes New York. Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, Minnesota, Kansas, lowa, South Dakota, Maryland, North Carolina, Texas, Louisiana, Idaho, Montana and Oregon.

Pampa and vicinity had a repeat of yesterday's weather today with light snow overnight and the mercury sliding to a low of 9 degrees early today.

Today's forecast by the Amarillo of the U.S. Weather Service called for a high in Amarillo in the mid-50s.

When the temperature read 27 degrees in Amarillo at 11 a.m. today it was only 18 degrees in Pampa.

The forecasters said the warmup would hit Pampa later because it was moving from the west.

Tonight is not expected to be as cold as last night with a predicted low in the 20s by tomorrow morning.

plan it accepted made House districts "Significantly more compact and continuous" than either the legislature's redistricting or the other plan offered by the plaintiffs. Critics noted, however, that the court-approved plan split

16 rural counties. The court also said the plan it approved came closer to earlier Supreme Court rulings providing "one man, one vote" apportionment for districts from cities to states than the legislature's.

The Dallas court's action sent shock waves through political circles.

The court districting would have forced incumbents to run against incumbents in three districts, assuming all sought re-election or did not choose to run in areas outside their residences.

Some present congressmen were undecided about where they would seek re-election. Only Rep. John Dowdy. Athens Democrat, has said he would not seek office again, giving health as the reason. He has been convicted of a bribery conspiracy charge.

In asking for a stay, the Texas officials told Justice Lewis Powell Jr. Monday there was doubt whether elections could be held under the plan. The deadline for filing for political office in Texas is Feb. 7.

Powell, who has jurisdiction over courts in Texas, turned the plea over to the full court. The court's ruling said "The application for a stay

of the judgment of the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, presented to Mr. Justice Powell and by him referred to the court is granted."

The three-judge panel in Dallas had ruled that the legislature's plan violated requirements that legislative districts be equal in population. Variance between the largest and smallest district would have been 4.1 per cent, with a deviation

from the upper limit of 2.4 per

Sanborn said he first learned of the situation after a San Antonio woman complained to his office about a private mint's activities in the moon souvenir field.

He said he expects to receive a formal letter of complaint from the woman and a letter from Donald K. Slayton, chief of the astronauts, which he will forward to FTC officials with a recommendation that a public warning be issued.

Two private mints in the United States and one in Canada apparently are involved in offering phony moon medallions, Sanborn said in an interview Thursday.

He said a stamp company also is advertising stamps supposedly taken to the moon, but this also is a phony offer.

Sanborn said he contacted Houston space officials while investigating a complaint about a private coin collector society that had given Apollo 14 "moon souvenirs" to its subscribers free of charge.

He said the organization gave astronauts Alan Shepard, Edgar Mitchell and Stuart Roosa a total of 200 coins which remained aboard the spacecraft throughtout the flight

After the flight, about 25 of the coins were given to the organization, which operates a private mint, with the understanding that they would be given to selected persons. Sanborn said.

He said the astronauts kept the remainder of the coins to give to friends.

The coin organization. meanwhle, melted an unknown number of its share of the coins, mixed this with other silver, and mailed freshly minted coins as gifts to its members, Sanborn said.

The coins, smaller than a dime, apparently were not offered for sale by this particular organization. Sanborn said, adding that other groups apparently are. counterfeiting them.

They are selling for from \$500 to \$700 and it's being done all over the country."



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

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Catoctin Mountains, serves as an alternate command post. Doctrinal Accord Not Only Merger Barrier

By GEORGE W. CORNELL **AP Religion Writer**

NEW YORK (AP) - Scholars of the churches get together, dig into the old doctrinal quarrels and misunderstandings, and arrive at new harmonious accords. But it doesn't remove the institutional barriers.

This has happened repeatedly lately, producing some unprecedented agreements between Roman Catholic theologians and those of the Lutheran and Anglican (Episcopal) churches.

But the effect so far remains largely in the intellectual realm-with no dent in the divided operational modes of the churches.

"The bosses do not want to give up any power," the Rev. Gregory Baum, a Canadian Roman Catholic theologian, once observed, in noting that the growing doctrinal concurrence hadn't budged the power structures.

The most recent instances came last week when a new consensus on the meaning of the Eucharist, the Lord's Supper, reached by Anglican and Roman Catholic theologians, was made public.

Inside Washington GOA Probing Mishandling Of Kennedy Center Funds By ROBERTS. ALLEN

WASHINGTON, - An exhaustive investigation is underway of the muddled management and steeply-in-the-red finances of the widely-glamorized Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts - the \$70 million marble behemoth on the Potomac.

The unpublicized probe is being made by the General Accounting Office, watchdog agency of Congress, at the instigation of Sen. Jennings Randolph, D.-W. Va., chairman of the Public Works Committee. He asked for the sweeping inquiry in preparation for public airing of the Center's chaotic affairs by his committee next month.

Behind Sen. Randolph's backstage action are admissions by Center officials of heavy indebtedness, and numerous reports of mismanagement, high salaries, nepotism and favoritism, and waste and extravagance. Illustrative of the latter is a

claim that a production of Leonard Bernstein's "Mass," which opened the Center four months ago, cost \$300,000 more than planned.

Information also has reached Congress that a number of contractors are claiming \$3 million to \$5 million in damages and other costs due to blunders, 'unreasonable and excessive" delays and other difficulties. Arthur Sampson, public buildings commissioner of the General Services Administration, has been quoted as castigating the dealings with the building companies as "one of the most mismanaged contracts I have ever seen in my life."

Charges have also been made to Sen. Randolph that Roger Stevens, board chairman of the Center, has been using funds to pay for day-to-day operating expenses that should be spent for construction costs. He is also accused of high-handed and autocratic meddling in activities outside his immediate authority.

Other serious complaints lodged against both Stevens and Center Director William McCormick Blair, Jr., involve nepotism, favoritism, excessive payments to state hands and other employees and feuding among officials. The 30-member Center board is dominated by Kennedys and their partisans. Board members include Sen. Edward Kennedy, D.-Mass.; Arthur Schlesinger, White House adviser of the late President Kennedy; Mrs. Steven Smith, one of the Kennedy sisters; and LeMoyne Billings, another White House assistant under Kennedy

numerous costly delays, due to changes in design and specifications, which stalled completion of the Center for 2½ years. Cost of this dawdling and blundering is put at \$3 million to \$5 million.

To meet this big overrun, Stevens has let it be known he proposes to ask Congress for a multi-million dollar loan-despite repeated previous assurances the Center would not ask for more public funds.

Approximately \$46 million of Federal money has gone into the still-unfinished huge marble edifice. That's about two-thirds of the \$70 million total-so far. In the closing days of the

last session of Congress, board chairman Stevens suddenly popped up with a request for \$1.5 million to take care of alleged damages to Center furnishings and facilities by swarms of tourists visiting the giant structure daily. A rash of publicity was put out about this unanticipated serious development.

Unless the money was immediately forthcoming. Stevens announced, the Center would have to be closed to sightseers.

A House Public Works subcommittee, headed by Rep. Kenneth Gray, D.-Ill., an ardent Kennedyite, quickly approved a bill for the \$1.5 million. But Rep. Julia Hansen, D.-Wash., chairman of the Appropriation subcommittee in charge of such legislation, blocked the funds on the ground Congress had not officially authorized them.

It is now generally believed in Congress that the real purpose of the \$1.5 million was to help Stevens meet the financial crisis that was verging the Center on insolvency.

That's why Sen. Randolph decided to hold hearings in February to air the Center's affairs, and in preparation for that directed the General Accounting Office to compile a detailed accounting of operations and difficulties. Randolph wrote Comptroller General Elmer Staats:



exciting" new find has been announced as the latest acquisition by developers of the Ranch Headquarters, an autdoor living museum of ranching history growing up on a site adjacent to The Museum of Texas Tech University.

To be designated according to its form of construction as the "Picket and Sotol House," the newly acquired structure combines two of the earliest methods of construction used by pioneer cattlemen during the fledgling days of the ranching industry.

Jerry, Rogers, associate director of The Museum in charge of the Ranch Headquarters project, said the structure could well be one of the very last of its kind still in good enough condition and near enough its original state to allow historically accurate restoration.

LUBBOCK-A "rare and Rogers. "Thus, after having served their purpose for a number of years, most simply were abandoned and allowed to collapse and deteriorate." For this reason, he

explained, and because the structure combines the two very primitive forms of frontier construction, the Picket and Sotol House is indeed a "rare and exciting" acquisition for the Ranch Headquarters.


