

Charging that Soviet of ficials and their Communist allies are lying and know they're lying in a "brazen and contemptuous" propaganda barrage against his European Recovery Program, Marshall declared "it is time to call a halt."

We do not propose to stand by and watch the disintegration of the international community to which we belong," the cabinet officer asserted on the eve of his departure for a face to face me with Russian Foreign ister Molotov.

The gir! said her mother then got down on her knees to help Bostic, and that then her mother was shot. She testified three shots were fired, that the first time Craw ford had missed Bostick

Under questioning by the defense, the fourth-grade Sam Houston School student said that she knew Jess Crawford and Bostick had had a fight previously, but she didn't know much about it, that she had never heard Bostick say anything he might do to Crawford.
