

Today's Twilight Wedding Rehearsal Climaxes Preparations for Royal Marriage Tomorrow

LONDON—(AP)—Wedding excitement pervaded the British air of London today as Princess Elizabeth engaged to be married tomorrow to Lieut. Philip Mountbatten.

Even the wedding ring, fashioned of nugget of white gold, will be at the Westminster Abbey rehearsal in the custody of the young Marquess of Milford Haven, who will be Mountbatten's best man.

High on the list of today's events, too, was the expected bestowal of a high title on 26-year-old Philip, who gave up his position as a Prince of Greece and Denmark to become a British citizen and thus clear the path for royal romance.

Persistent unofficial reports said he would receive a dukedom as the King's personal wedding gift, and there was speculation that the title would be either Duke of Clarence or Duke of Edinburgh, positions in the peerage that have long been open.

The announcement was expected

in tonight's official London Gazette. Elizabeth left the morning free of official engagements so she could concentrate on the myriad last minute details.

Picked agents of Scotland Yard meanwhile finished their net of security precautions.

The weather turned warmer and spitting snow changed to a chilly drizzle with a prediction of milder temperatures, clouds and rain for the big day.

The London Daily Mail reported that offers of up to fifty pounds (\$200) had been made by unnamed "rich Americans" attempting to get tickets to Thursday's ceremony in the Abbey.

Most of the offers have come to members of the Abbey staff—or their wives, who got most of the staff tickets—and everyone has been refused, the paper said.

So the would-be ticket buyers apparently will have to take the wedding in the same fashion as packed thousands of Londoners and provincial Britons who will line the curbs for the mile-long

procession and stand in patient ranks before Buckingham Palace.

Many were expected to begin "camping" on the streets by dark tonight to assure themselves of front rank behind the line of bobbies.

The King and Queen, the Princess and her fiance, and all the high clergy and attendants who will participate in the ceremony were included in the rehearsal plan scheduled for 11 a. m. (CST).

Police precautions extended to the honeymoon mansion of Broadlands, near Romsey, Hampshire.

London grew jaunty with window boxes of bright autumn flowers and draped bunting along Whitehall.

Crowds of gay wedding celebrants milled through the streets. Vendors, peddling brilliantly colored wedding programs, did a rush business as visitors and Londoners alike quickened to one of the biggest public shows of joy since Elizabeth's father was crowned in the Abbey more than ten years ago.

Foreign Chief Heads for Big Four Meeting

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall injected a new element of toughness today in this country's patient—but firm policy toward Russia.

Charging that Soviet officials and their Communist allies are lying and know they're lying in a "brazen and contemptuous" propaganda barrage against his European Recovery Program, Marshall declared "it is time to call a halt."

"We do not propose to stand by and watch the disintegration of the international community to which we belong," the cabinet officer asserted on the eve of his departure for a face-to-face meeting with Russian Foreign Minister Molotov.

Leon Blum to Form French Government

PARIS—(AP)—A spokesman for the Socialist Party announced today that former Premier Leon Blum had agreed to try to form a new government.

A rising wave of Communist-led strikes provided the background.

The announcement was made by Guy Mollet, secretary general of the Anglo-American Correspondents' Association.

Mollet, considered a member of the left wing of the Socialists, said he believed a new cabinet would be formed within a few days to succeed that of Socialist Premier Paul Ramadier.

Mollet said France had permitted herself to be divided into two groups and that, if civil war should result, it would be "as bad as it was in Spain."

Military trucks rushed flour into Paris to assure the French capital of its daily bread.

Government sources said the new shipments of flour, with reserve stocks already in bakers' warehouses, would keep the bread ration stable in spite of the walk-out of 4,500 Parisian millers.

The Communist-led General Confederation of Labor (CGT), seeking a 3,600 franc (about \$31) increase in the minimum monthly wage and 25 percent salary advance pending negotiations, already has tied up France's coal mines, most of the auto industry, and her Mediterranean ports.

This was the labor situation: Northern France—114,000 coal miners on strike and main pits closed.

Marseille—between 60,000 and 70,000 dockers, sailors, transport and other workers on strike. Troops unloaded perishable food.

American seamen on the freighter *Beverly O'Leary* Costed in the harbor voted a resolution supporting the strikers, but did not strike themselves.

Paris—majority of workers in six main automobile and truck manufacturing plants struck. The General Confederation of all metalurgical workers in Paris unions issued a statement urging to strike.

Motion for Mistrial Is Overruled

A motion for mistrial was overruled this morning in the case of Jesse Lee Crawford, charged in the pistol death of his former wife, Bertha Lee Bostick, in her home here July 4.

The motion, which was based on the remarks of presiding Judge Lewis M. Goodrich, came during the testimony of the state's second witness, Jeff Guthrie, who was a deputy sheriff arrested Crawford shortly after the shooting.

During the direct examination of the former chief deputy sheriff, Aaron Sturges, defense counsel, objected to Guthrie's elaborations of questions put to him by the prosecuting attorney, Tom Braly, and asked the Court to instruct the witness to answer only the questions and not go any further.

The Court added:

"I think he's doing a fairly good job."

The motion for mistrial followed immediately, and was overruled by the Court who instructed the jury not to consider the remark or the laughter raised in the large court room audience.

Under examination, Guthrie related that an unidentified man had called him at his home and told him there had been a shooting at Five Points. He added that when he, his nephew, Roy Guthrie and former Deputy Sheriff C. M. Tucker got there they were approached a few minutes later by Fay Crawford, brother to Jesse, and followed him to the scene of the shooting. Arriving there, they saw Crawford.

Christensen, driver of the 1947 Frazier, received a cut on his right hand and a head bruise; Mrs. Christensen, a broken right leg and bruises; Weber, cut over left eye; Mrs. Weber, broken collar bone and bruised all over body.

The ladies, who are sisters, were pinned in the car from which it required a winch truck to remove them. The group was en route to Joplin, Mo., to attend funeral of the ladies' father.

30 Persons Killed As Swedish Plane Crashes in Italy

ROME—(AP)—A chartered Swedish freighter plane carrying 30 persons, including 20 Swedish military airmen, crashed today in the mountains near Salerno and Swedish diplomatic sources said 20 persons were killed.

The plane was en route home from Addis Ababa, where the 20 military men and four others had delivered a group of 17 planes sold by Sweden to Ethiopia.

The Swedish Foreign Office in Stockholm announced the death toll, adding that 10 were injured. The military airmen on board were four captains, nine lieutenants, three noncommissioned officers, two mechanics and an electrician and a maintenance engineer.

An official of the plane's owner, the Traffic-Tourist-Transport Company of Stockholm, said the plane also carried six other persons and a crew of four.

"As far as we know," he said, "all were Swedes."

Col. Ingvar Berg, leader of the Swedish Ferry Squadron, was not aboard.

Carabinieri officials at Salerno said a party had been dispatched to the scene of the crash, believed to be on 3,214-foot Mt. Scala.

First reports of the accident said the plane was a U. S. Army transport but Col. John M. Williams, American military attaché, said he had learned definitely the craft was not an American craft.

Flight operations officers at Ciampino Airfield in Rome, where the wrecked plane was due at 4 a. m. GMT today (10 p. m. CST Wednesday), said the craft was a Bristol and that she carried Swedish military personnel.

Five of the injured were reported in serious condition and to be receiving first aid in a rude hut on the mountainside.

Water Survey Bid Accepted by City

The water survey bid of the Roberts-Merriman, Engineering firm, with representatives in Pampa, was accepted this morning by the City Commission to develop a future water supply for the city within a radius of 10 to 11 miles.

Included in the service will be the locating of water wells, tests, plans for piping, boosting and approximate cost of piping the water from the wells to the city.

Roberts, the senior partner of the firm, has done previous work for the city in laying out the distribution system when the water system here was rebuilt several years ago.

City Manager Steve Matthews said this morning, the water supply inside the city limits is diminishing as the years go by and a future water supply will soon be imperative because present water demands are overloading the supply in the summer time.

Story Told of British Princess Who Once Proposed to a Man—And Got Turned Down

NEW YORK—(AP)—Too ill to attend the wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Philip Mountbatten tomorrow is another British princess who once proposed to a man—and got turned down.

She is Elizabeth's aunt, Victoria Alexandra Alice Mary, and, so far as I know, the only British princess royal who ever got jilted.

The tale requires a little background:

An ironbound convention among those born to the purple is that women of royal birth, if they want to marry a man beneath their rank, must do the asking themselves.

This, of course, is to protect the royal maids from being besieged by empty-pocketed gentry. If no such rule existed, every commoner with a hole in his stocking might go around proposing to princesses on the odd chance he'd find one willing to share her castle and well-stocked larder.

When Elizabeth decided on Philip, therefore, it was up to her to pop the \$64 question. It is a pretty safe bet, however, that she didn't ask him over to Buckingham Palace for a home-cooked meal, and then melt him down to butter with a direct:

"Will you, Phil?"

In royal circles they are more subtle and work it on a "Finkert-Ever-to-Chance basis. The royal lady calls in a court intermediary and says, in effect: "That guy reek! I send me. Go see if he won't let me buy him a wedding ring."

Stennis Is Given Seat in Senate

WASHINGTON—(AP)—John C. Stennis, (D-Miss.) was given the Senate seat vacated by the late Senator Theodore G. Bilbo.

Stennis was elected successor to Bilbo last November 4. He will serve the remaining five years of the unexpired term. Bilbo died last Aug. 21.

Accompanied to the dias by Mississippi's senior senator, James Eastland, Stennis was administered the oath of office by President F. M. Temple Vandenberg (R-Mich.) yesterday.

Stennis was seated after the Senate adopted a resolution of regret at the death of Bilbo. The resolution, presented by Eastland, specified that when the Senate adjourned yesterday, it adjourn out of respect to Bilbo.

There was no discussion of the resolution.

Receiving friends with Stennis his first day were his wife and their two children, John, Hampton, 12, and Margaret Jane, 10. On hand to see Stennis inducted into office were a brother, Sam Stennis of Pampa, Texas, and two sisters, Miss Janie Stennis and Miss Bessie Stennis of DeKalb.

Knudson Blasts Tariff Slashes

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. Knudson (R-Minn.) said today the State Department in its "free trade" tariff cuts has sought to tie the hands of Congress against protecting American agriculture and industry from foreign imports.

The statement by Knudson, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, indicated a bitter battle in Congress when the reciprocal trade law comes up for renewal next spring.

In his attack upon the new trade accord, Knudson said in a formal statement:

"The President and the State Department have announced the most sweeping tariff cuts in the history of the country. Over 70 percent of our dutiable imports will be affected and almost 2,000 rates of duty covering upward of 4,000 items have been either reduced or bound.

"When the full meaning of these tariff cuts becomes apparent to the American public, the reaction is likely to prove interesting, if not disconcerting to the dog-collars who have traded us off for very dubious and nebulous trade concessions that may never be realized."



Nikolai, Joanna Graudan to Appear In Pampa in Cello-Piano Concert

Nikolai and Joanna Graudan, who will appear here Monday, Nov. 24, comprise a unique concert ensemble. Having first established reputations as soloists, Joanna as pianist and Nikolai as cellist, these artists combined their talents to become "an ideal duo."

Though they were born in the same town, they did not meet until each had first gone his own way for several years. Nikolai left his home to study cello at the St. Petersburg Conservatory, to the staff of which he was appointed upon his graduation in spite of his youth. Joanna studied first at Kharkov and then went to Berlin to work under the guidance of Kreutzer and Schnabel.

At the same time, Nikolai was in Berlin filling his various engagements there, and although their paths must have crossed many times, Nikolai and Joanna met for the first time that summer when they both returned to their native town to spend their vacations. The following season they started concertizing together and two years from their musical merger they joined in marriage as well. After their marriage the couple was called upon to give many more joint recitals and for several years they toured Europe as a cello-piano ensemble. In the meantime, each artist continued to achieve recognition in a solo capacity: each was engaged as guest artist with the leading symphony orchestras in Germany, France, Holland and England.

In 1938 they came to America only to leave its shores after a short while for a round the world trip and a tour of the Dutch East Indies. Upon their return to this country, the Graudans continued concertizing together as a cello-piano team with growing success. They gave several recitals in Town Hall, New York, which won praise from the press, according to Mrs. Carl J. Wright, secretary of Pampa Community Concert Association.

Pampa is indeed fortunate in being able to have this cello-piano duo among the artists to be heard this season.





Royal Jewels Are Given Elizabeth

LONDON—The King and Queen gave Princess Elizabeth a necklace of pea-sized diamonds and rubies yesterday for her royal marriage Thursday to Lt. Philip Mountbatten.

The glittering jewels were from the personal collection of the royal family. The necklace, an inch wide, was the most dazzling present shown to reporters in a display of more than 1,200 gifts which already have arrived at St. James' Palace.

King George VI and Queen Elizabeth also gave their heir-apparent two strings of pearls the size of small grapes.

Dowager Queen Mary presented diamond ear rings, a diamond tiara, a stomacher and a diamond brooch. She had inherited some of the gems from Queen Victoria. The glass bowl sent by President and Mrs. Truman also was displayed at St. James'.

Four visiting Kings and six visiting Queens were among the 27 royal personages already assembled for the nuptials of the handsome couple at Westminster Abbey. It was the largest assembly of European royalty in the ten years since the King was crowned in succession to Edward VIII, who received no invitation to his niece's wedding. Edward, who became the Duke of Windsor after abdicating, was believed snubbed because he married the twice-divorced Wallis Warfield Simpson.

The "pepperbox" was the first revolver. It had a series of six to eight barrels that revolved in one piece, turned by hand.

Astronomer Sees End of Universe But Not Soon

WASHINGTON—The end of the universe through a gradual scattering of all matter through cold space was seen as a possibility yesterday by Harvard's famed astronomer, Dr. Harlow Shapley.

But don't get excited. "Our own system of planets hasn't even started to go into this cosmic spread-formation and Shapley is thinking in terms of millions of years."

His view is that creation may be slowly dying of "negative gravitation"—a cosmic force which already has caused many distant galaxies (star systems) to fly apart.

"At the same time," Shapley said in the annual report of the Smithsonian Institution, "through the operation of the laws of thermodynamics, the heat of the stars is going out into the coldness of space."

"The universe is steadily approaching the heat-death—a coldness near absolute zero in an empty world."

Absolute zero is 273 degrees below zero Centigrade. But the astronomer offered this comforting thought: "Although the stars—like our own sun—radiate plenty of free heat into space, they have built-in subatomic energy 'stoves' which will



MACKENZIE'S Column

By DEWITT MACKENZIE
 AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

As this is written there lies beside me on my desk two piles of current news reports—one dealing with the Communist efforts to gain control of the French and Italian governments by force and intimidation, and the other recording President Truman's message calling on Congress not only to put our own economic house in order but to provide economic aid for the stricken countries of Western Europe.

There we have sharply defined the contrast of methods and aims in the conflict between American

democracy and bolshevism. The first is premised on the belief that we should so conduct ourselves—to take a phrase from the President's message—"that men and women of all the world can move out of the shadow of fear and war into the light of freedom and peace." The second is based on communism's cardinal tenet that it must be inaugurated by revolution and a reign of terror so to impress itself upon the populace.

That contrast is bound to register heavily with the hard hit countries of Western Europe. It will give them courage to carry on the fight to rehabilitate themselves so that they can withstand the assaults of communism against their way of life. And courage is what Europe needs most at this precise moment—courage to hang on until "blood, toil, tears and sweat" have turned the tide

of battle. Of course the U.S.A. isn't solely "trusting in its efforts to help the outside world, although we like to believe that we should offer our aid in any event. Our politico-economic way of life is evenly interlocked with that of Europe. Moreover, as the President warned, there is an "ominous threat" of inflation in the United States, and at another point he summed up the position thus: "The future of the free nations of Europe hangs in the balance. The future of our own economy is in jeopardy." The immediate future would seem to be the most critical period for Western Europe. The French and Italian governments are fighting for their very lives against the powerful Communist parties which are trying to wreck them by strong-arm methods. If these two key nations should

succumb to this assault, the rest of the continent probably would fall under Moscow's domination. The question of the moment, therefore, is whether France and Italy can stand up under the present onslaught. The position is especially grave in Italy where the reds are openly talking revolution while creating widespread disorders. It would be rash to predict that the two countries would come through without civil strife. However, the consensus of observers is that both can weather the storm, providing they get outside economic help and the rest

of Western Europe is able to stand firm. Without help, the situation will be grave, indeed.

 Thomas E. Readmore, LaMarre's brother-in-law who was listed as secretary-treasurer at an actual salary of \$100 a month. LaMarre said his own "legitimate" pay was about \$3,000 a year.

The committee has heard testimony that aviation electric operated in the red until Meyers' late in 1940, interceded to obtain \$1,000,000 worth of subcontract business from the Bell Aircraft Corp.

The committee trotted out a parade of witnesses yesterday to establish that Aviation Electric paid bills for Meyers on entirely personal matters.

Meyers told the newsmen that the only transaction he ever had with Aviation Electric was to lend the company money. LaMarre on the other hand, testified that the general owned nearly all the stock and hired him "to protect his (Meyers') financial interest" in the company.

The President, noting that rents are rising currently at the rate of about one percent a month, said in his message to Congress Monday that "the rent control law should be extended and the weaknesses in the present law should be corrected." He did not elaborate.

Taft said he is inclined to continue with possibly minor changes the present authority which expires Feb. 29.

Both Senate and House Foreign Affairs Committees continued to work, meanwhile, on a stopgap aid authorization bill suggested by the State Department.

Senator Connally (D-Texas), ranking Democrat on the Senate group, told a reporter Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich) hoped to be able to complete a bill today, but that he questioned whether this would be possible.

Connally said the committee spent much of yesterday discussing technical amendments to the bill.

Senator Lodge (D-Mass) said the State Department has accepted an amendment he proposed, which would require that the petroleum purchased under the program come as far as possible from sources outside the United States.

 standing in the doorway with a pistol in his hand.

Guthrie asked Crawford what the trouble was and Crawford answered, "I shot them." (Leonard Bostick was also killed.)

Guthrie then said: "Jesus, I tried to keep you out of trouble."

"I told 'em so," Guthrie quoted Crawford as saying.

Crawford, Guthrie said, then gave his automatic pistol to Tucker.

Testimony by Guthrie further revealed that Crawford had sided in leading the two people on the ambulance and was then taken to the County Jail.

Guthrie told the jury both Mr. and Mrs. Bostick were still living when he got there and were "gasping for breath."

A short cross examination by Sturgeon of Guthrie ended at 11:45 and court was adjourned until 1:30.

Scared and tearful, the state's first witness in the Jess Crawford trial, nine-year-old Mattie Lee Wright, daughter of Bertha Lee Bostick, took the stand early this morning shortly after the jury had filed in and the District Attorney had read the indictment of murder with malice aforethought in the shooting of Bertha Lee Bostick on July 4.

The defense counsel entered a plea of not guilty.

Mattie Lee at first insisted on the presence of her grandmother in the witness box with her, but she later became calm and answered questions freely.

The defense brought a question as to her qualifications, which was overruled after examination in absence of the jury.

Mattie Lee said she was at home at 1313 S. Barnes washing dishes in the kitchen, when she heard a car honk out front. She said she then went through the bedroom where her mother, Bertha Lee Bostick and her stepfather, Leonard C. "Kelley" Bostick, were lying on the bed talking.

She said Jess Crawford was in the car, along with Jimmy Fry Crawford and seven-year-old William Glenn Crawford. She stated Jess Crawford wanted her mother to come out, but when she went in the house her mother said she would not.

The witness said she was standing in a doorway to the bedroom where she could see everything when Crawford came in. Someone said something then, she said, although she did not understand what it was or who said it.

Kelley Bostick, who was said to have been lying on the side of the bed next to the wall, had started to get off the bed when he was shot through the top of the head, she stated. The girl said her mother then got down on her knees to help Bostick, and that then her mother was shot.

She testified three shots were fired, that the first time Crawford had missed Bostick.

Under questioning by the defense, the fourth-grade Sam Houston School student said that she knew Jess Crawford and Bostick had a fight previously, but she didn't know much about it, that she had never heard Bostick say anything he might do to Crawford. She said her mother had wanted a divorce from Crawford while he was in the service, and that Bostick had met her mother a little before Crawford came back, and that Bostick had spent one night at their home during that time.

She said that Jess Crawford had brought seven-year-old William Glenn Crawford to see his mother on previous occasions.

The Court recessed at 10:40 for ten minutes.

The courtroom was nearly full of spectators this morning, with about 50 percent women in the audience.

By 5:11 yesterday the two-day process of drawing the jury came to an end when Joe Carlton, Pampa, an independent trucker was sworn to duty as the twelfth juror.

John H. Biggers, the eleventh and last juror to be accepted on the 57-man panel was sworn at 2:15. One hour later after the remaining three on the panel were examined, the panel was ad the Sheriff's Department to exhausted. Judge Goodrich order-pick up 10 additional talismans so the twelfth man could be drawn, then recessed court until 4 p. m.

The deputies returned with only seven men at 4:10. Four minutes later the first talisman was questioned and challenged by the state. Defense challenges and one disqualification consumed the next four. The seventh man was never called for interrogation.

Still dressed in his double-breasted blue suit, gray shirt without tie, Crawford calmly watched the jury selection. Most of the day he sat inside the rail.

Several spectators at first thought the court was closed when they saw the main doors closed. This action was not to keep the public out, but was in order that prospective jurors waiting in the hall could not hear what the jurors being examined were being asked and what their answers would be. The side doors were open at all times for benefit of spectators. This morning, the jury complete, the doors were opened on all sides.

Yesterday afternoon the audience in the general court room grew steadily larger until half of the center section was filled. Many came in and left in a few minutes, apparently bored with the slow process of the jury drawing.
