MANILA-(AP)-A savage typhoon swept the Philippines today, leaving at least 56 persons dead or uncounted for-46 of them from the Danish motorship Kina. which sank

Five other ships were damaged, 70 percent of the historic city of Tacloban was reported wiped out storm-whipped fire, and portions of Manila were hard hit. The latest official death toll in Manila and nearby Quezon City was five, and the Red Cross re-

## Common Ground

By R. C. HOILES

The Laws of Distribution I want to quote the statements made on the laws of distribution y a wise old man, John Rustgard. he statements were made in a chapter on "Economics in Our chools" in a revised forthcoming edition of "The Bankruptcy of Liberalism."

I will quote from this great book for the next two or three

"It is now well established by scientists that the conception, rowth, decay, and death of naions and cultures are governed by laws of Nature as implicit and ever active as are the natural forces which govern the concepion, growth, decay, and death of ndividuals. Sociology is, thereiore, a science.

"Likewise do immutable cosmic forces govern the creation and the distribution of wealth. This fact makes economics a science.

"We study these laws in order that we may take advantage of them and use them. To the extent these laws are obstructed, man becomes afflicted.

"But in our public schools this

would sound as a new and irrational doctrine. In those institutions sociology as well as economics are not treated as sciences but as religions. They have become matters of faith, hope and wishful think-ing. All we have to do is to de-"they cide what we want, it is contended, and the government can give it to us. On that theory a large variety of utopian schemes for social wellbeing have been evolved, but all of these which have been down it was discovered that the

When this is done the money goes into the pockets of some laborer somewhere, Even the money deposited in a bank goes to some workmen, because the bank must lend the money to somebody who needs it for the purpose of buying labor or ser-

"5. If the profits in the form of money are not used to buy labor or its products, but is destroyed or otherwise withdrawn from circulation, such disposal of it increases the value of the rest of the money in the country, because the value of the money is determined by the law of supply and demand; that is to say, a decrease in the quantity of money in proportion to the quantity of commodities on the market raises the value of the rest of the money in the country. It will thus be seen it is impossible for the industrialist to prevent the public

from sharing his profits.

"6. It is therefore certain that the profits of the farmers as well as those of the industrialists became distributed to benefit people who have something to sell-

such as labor.
"7. It is decidely not true that the increase of the productivity of some, whether by improved improved methods, longer hours of labor, or greater efficiency otherwise decreases the demand for laborers and thereby makes it more difficult for others to find employment. "8. The reverse is true: The

more one produces of what people want the more does he sell, and the more he sells the more can he and does he buy, and the more he buys the more can others sell. The prosperity of each produces prosperity for others. "9. There can never be general

overproduction. Man is by Nature insatiable. As soon as you supply one of his wants you create in him one or more wants. The luxuries of today are the necessities of tomorrow. A men's needs are limited only by his purchasing power, and the latter is increased in proportion to the increase of his productivity. "10. From the foregoing it must

be obvious that the national standard of living ebbs and flows with the ebb and flow of the per capita production. When the standard of living in Russia is lower than onesixth of what it is in the United States, it is because the per capita production in Russia is less than cne-sixth of what it is here.

"11. The earnings of labor as class can be increased only by increasing the per capita production of the country.

"12. Any increase of the earnings of some laborers except as a result of the demand for more labor is taken from other laborers in the form of higher prices. "13. Where the wages of all labor are forced up equally, it simply serves to increase commod-

ity prices, which is the same as

to decrease the purchasing power

'14. One effect of lowering the purchasing power of our money is to lower the purchases of those people who are either too old or otherwise too decrepit to be able to profit by the increase in wages, and must depend upon their savings, their friends, or relatives for existence. The number of these people in this country is probably about 35 millions. Their average income is probably






