## Ice Hits Sections Of State

Bv THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Winter miseries spread throughout Texas today and snow, rain and ice brought travel almost to a standstill in

many areas: As much as four inches of snow coated the countryside across a big part of Southwest Texas, including sections around Junction and Del Rio.

Snow reached all the way south to the Upper Texas Coast and the white stuff, frequently mixed with freezing rain or sleet, generally covered the southern two-thirds of the state, stayed bitter cold but skies were starting to clear in part of the Texas Panhandle

While state police reported all major routes open, motorists were cautioned to attempt only emergency trips in many. areas. At one point during the night, an icy hill on Interstate 10 west of Ozona stalled nearly 50

Travel conditions filled public lodgings in a number of places. County courthouse quarters for jurors took care of some motorists minus a place to stay at Junction, and empty jail cells were made available to others at Ozona-

Even San Antonio, normally sunny and warm, measured about two inches of rare snow.

And in the semitropical Low-

er Rio Grande Valley, one to two inches of rain around McAllen and Brownsville coated a wide area with ice. First reports indicated temperatures stayed a degree or two above the danger point for citrus groves, but growers were concerned over prospects for even colder weather tonight.

In Austin, where snow likewise is an unusual sight, the state capital was described as a "white winter wonderland."

A military helicopter transporting an injured soldier from field maneuvers was forced to land near Gatesville, and a civilian ambulance took him on to a hospital.

## Congress **Puts End** To Strike

PHILADELPHIA (AP) -Penn Central passenger and freight trains were rolling today after President Nixon signed a quickly enacted congressional resolution that halted a trainmen's strike for at least 90 days.

The walkout by 28,000 conductors and brakemen, called to protest the bankrupt railroad's phase-out of 5,700 jobs, began at 12:01 a m. Thursday. It lasted a little more than 24 hours, with the first train back in operation at 12:37 a.m. today. System-wide everything is

running smoothly at this point. a spokesman for Penn Central, the nation's largest railroad. said shortly after daybreak. He said morning commuter

trains in major metropolitan centers of the East and Midwest were on schedule and freight service was being restored as fast as crews reported for work. Commuters, who make up the

majority of the line's 300,000 daily riders, took the brunt of the walkout's impact. They were forced to use hastily arranged bus service or carpools to get to and from work. Nixon signed the resolution,





## Planned Supervised Play



## **Mistreated Speculator**

Of all businessmen, the type known as the professional speculator who deals in speculative values is probably subjected to the most rabid and, might we add, most uninformed, criticism. And of this category, the speculator who specializes at buying and selling land, is, in the eyes of his critics, the worst of the lot.

He is greedy and grasping. utterly without any redeeming feature. He buys up badly needed land cheap, holds it off the market until the opportune moment, and then sells it at an enormous profit. He is anti-human and anti-social and ought to be eliminated. Confiscate his ill-gotten holdings; tax and regulate this monster out of existence.

So goes the socialist refrain; parroted, more often than not, by individuals who pride themselves on being private enterprisers and believers in the concept of private property. Forgotten or unrealized in the

emotionalism and perhaps. envy, of the moment, are these simple facts:

-The land speculator acts no differently than his critic. We are all profit-motivated speculators in the true sense of the term, ("Human action is always speculation." -Ludwig von Mises). We all want to buy cheap and sell dear.

-Land, if it is truly "badly needed." could never be 'cheap;" since that would constitute a contradiction of

-"Cheap" land, if it is on the market and available to the professional speculator, is also available to the carping critic. So, what the critic is really incensed about, is the speculator's courage and foresight and his own lack of

-The land speculator, when he invests scarce capital in land, is taking the chance that his investment will never be well as rise. Why is it we always hear about the speculator who "Made a killing;" seldom, if

-For every seller (for profit), there must also be a buyer (for profit). And, since no one relinquishes anything unless they value that which they GET more than that which they GAVE, what is so horrible about land speculation in a free market.

So much for the usual barbs hurled at the speculator in land values. We still have not touched upon an extremely valuable social function performed by this unjustly maligned individual.

Man lives and prospers by trade. When trade falls off into the doldrums, so does man's standard of living and sense of well-being. In common parlance, this is referred to as a recession" or "depression;" if allowed to continue long enough, a panic develops. And this is where the speculator

By his willingness to take a chance, to invest his scarce capital where those with less courage do not dare, he stimulates the marts of trade and gets them moving again. Where, before, there was fear, hesitancy, lack of risk capital, and market stagnation; now, due to the venturesome spirit of the speculator, there is courage. action, trade and the market moving again.

'Cheap" land means land not in demand. And land not in demand means land not being used economically. Capital tied up in such unused land is capital not benefitting its owner. The land speculator, breaks this economic log jam. Land. formerly unwanted, is wanted

Harry Browne, author of 'How To Profit By The Coming Inflation," best capsulized the services performed by the land speculator. Browne said, "He buys land when few want it, and sells when many want it." As an returned. #### Question Box

QUESTION: Some Republicans burglarized the Democratic headquarters in Washington last summer: politicians continue to approve 'bugging' of some persons' telephones; they also continue to draft servicemen and send them throughout the world; further they approve the use of eminent domain to take private property for public and private use. Then they speak of freedom! Is there a common denominator behind all these acts of politicians? ANSWER: We believe this

nation still has considerably more freedom than many other nations. It is true that all nations do not adopt all of the freedom-inhibiting practices that have been forced on the people here. But many of them have restrictions which the U.S. politicos have not yet dared to adopt-yet. The United States still is working on the Fabian Socialist program of gradualism. One type of freedom still enjoyed here is the ability to travel virtually at will. There are no iron curtains or bamboo walls to prevent Americans from leaving their native land. As to a 'common

enominator' in freedom-inhibiting acts of politicians, we believe that is ecause of the loss of respect for private property. When one accepts the Andrew Galambos definition of property as an individual's life and all non-procreative products of that life, then the political acts enumerated and many other acts in both public and private life stem from refusal to honor and respect the property rights of others.

When the people connected with the Republican Party broke into the Watergate Hotel headquarters of the Democrats, they violated the Democrats property rights. When a politician places a listening device on a private telephone to overhear a personal conversation it is a violation of the owner's property rights. When a serviceman's life is impressed into service, his property rights are violated. It is a form of taxation; just as when the politician requires a certain percentage of one's earnings to be taken from him to support the politician; the two or four years of the serviceman's life are taken from him in order to support the

politicians war programs.

The power of eminent domain, which politicians at all levels exercise is one of the oldest practices in the infringement of one's property rights. That the government agency is required to pay "just compensation" does nothing to protect the rights of the individual who wants to live out his last days in his own home but is ordered out because of such activities as urban renewal, highway building or erection of structures to house bureaucrats.

And government land control through land-use regulations and zoning are additional steps in the infringement of property rights, since to own property means to have control of it. The real owner thus becomes the city or county or state, and the nominal owner is merely allowed to pay taxes on it and to use it as the politicians dictate.

RED CHINA'S HEROIN TRAFFIC Despite continued denials by the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs that any proof exists of active involvement of Red China in the heroin traffic, proof continues to accumulate. The latest evidence comes from Holland.

Dutch authorities estimate that the flow of hard drugs into Holland has tripled in just six months. This has been accompanied by a sharp rise in drug addiction among U.S. troops stationed in Europe. most of them in Germany which borders Holland. The addiction rate has jumped from one to nearly four per cent in a single

The Amsterdam police have noted a sharp increase in the number of Chinese seamen found to be drug smugglers. It is a little known but very important fact that an increasing proportion of the world's merchant seamen are Chinese. They are actually in the majority among deck hands in the large Dutch merchant fleet: Most of these Chinese sailors belong to the Chinese Seamen's Union in Hong Kong. which has close ties with

Asked by a Human Events reporter to identify the source of the smuggled heroin, a Dutch official responded: "It is my belief that much of it comes through Communist China, or through its control." He said he found it hard to believe that the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs denies this, since anyone with "powers of reason" and "knowledge of the Oreint"as well as the current facts about heroin smuggling could, only conclude that much of the heroin was in fact coming from Red China. Concerned citizens should demand thorough Congressional investigation of Red Chinese

#### CIGARETTE, ANYONE?

Cigarette advertising is taboo on the boob tube. and several agencies of the -federal government have declared war on cigarette smoking as a health hazard. At the same time, the U.S. Department of Agriculture is spending \$67.4 million a. year to promote and subsidize smoking. The Department spends \$31.1 million to send tobacco abroad in the Food for Peace program, \$28.4 million to subsidize tobacco expost payments, \$240,000 to advertise and promote the sale of American cigarettes abroad; \$1.8 million in bookkeeping for warehouse tobacco, \$3.6 million in Tobacco inspection and \$300,000 for market news programs; also the Department spends \$5 million in tobacco-research, including a program aimed at making cigarettes taste and smell better. The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare is spending \$4.4 million to combat smoking and its effects.

And people, it will be the toughest viewing of your existence, except for the 12 years of reports from Southeast Asia.

Some TV producer picked out the Loud family as the first choice for his series on "An American Family." So here is the prestige home, the winding driveway to a four-car garage, plus outdoor pool plus indoor fun and games. Great shots of bored teen-agers, yawning at life, the parents, the culture, the world. More scenes from the joys of green grass suburban lawn parties, with couples smiling and kidding, and phoning their attorneys to see if the divorce papers are worked up. It is a hard, selfish, cynical experience and if this is the typical American family, we are in big trouble.

What is lacking, absent, invisible, is any sense of a moral goal, an ethical pursuit, a sensitivity to the aches and injuries of our day - or any day, for that matter. Southeast Asia is in flames, California choking on smog. ghetto kids losing their teeth, and this household wonders if the Jaguar will be tuned by Saturday.

Oldest boy calls from New York. Twenty, no, 40-minute phone call to family, describing sore throat and pressing demand that sisters send scarves by return mail (to further pursue his idolatry of Andy Warhol - a seven-yearrage for this 21-year-old lad).

We know that the home, everywhere, is under enormous pressure and this series only magnifies the heartaches and decay that has set in Yet this need not be the norm. the standard, the final result of family life. There are shining alternatives and most of them have a religious, spiritual foundation.

It surely is exciting to learn that every Monday night some 500,000 Mormon families have canceled all other engagements to pursue the Family Home Evening. There are many strong projects within the Church of the Latter Day Saints but few compare to the family program that

embraces their entire denomination — here and overseas: Church authorities prepared a manual some nine years ago and continue to update the material annually. It contains resources for games, songs, stories, plays and discussions. The aim is to build family solidarity, remembering the words of the church's late President David Lawrence McKay, "No other success can compensate for

failure in the home. The outreach of the family program sponsored by the Mormons is equally impressive. They are reaching into the Utah State Prison with this concept, seeking to aid the families of those in jail. When no family is present, volunteer couples "adopt" a prisoner. Here are the classic ingredients for enduring family life: concern for the household, concern for others, especially those in trouble. Perhaps someone in Santa Barbara could adopt the Louds. They announced their divorce at the end of

## **Morality of Abortions** Still Religious Conflict By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS but doctors and all those in-

Despite the U.S. Supreme. Court decision removing legal restrictions on early abortions, the question of their morality still remains dynamite in American religious convictions.

It is not simply a difference between religious groups, but. runs explosively through all of them. Protestant, Jewish and Roman Catholic The official position of many

Protestant denominations. along with that of the Roman Catholic Church, is strongly antiabortion, despite exceptions of some theologians in both groups and some Protestant bodies.

Eastern Orthodox churches and orthodox Judaism also sharply oppose abortion, while reform and conservative Judiasm have favored easing laws against it.

So sharp and sensitive are the differences over the matter that a cooperative organization of most major Protestant and Orthodox bodies, the National Council of Churches, has been unable - in four years of trying - to formulate a modern stand on it.

"The new permissiveness of the law confronts the churches with a greater, more urgent re-sponsibility than before," Dr. R. H. Edwin Espy, general secretary of the council, said of the high court rulin;

With the legal restraints removed, it is more essential that the religious dimensions be brought to bear to help people make a responsible decision, not only the pregnant woman,

While the matter now is left to individual choice, the conflict over it rolls on in religious circles, and among ethicists in biological sciences

'Changing of laws does not change people's convictions about a practice." says Methodist theologian J. Ros. elson, of Boston University.

The question has produced one of the kenest moral battles of the century. In numerous Protestant and Jewish bodies, it has brought about revisions of their former antiabortion

At the heart of the struggle has been question of just when a human life begins.





## High Withholding Could Bring Refund

EDITORS: Following is the last in a series of five articles entitled "Coping With Your In-come Tax." They were written to help taxpayers prepare their 1972 tax returns.

WASHINGTON (AP) After you have slogged your way through your income tax return, there may be a pleasant surprise at the end.

You may qualify for a bigger refund than you expected, or at least have to come up with less additional tax than you anticipated. The reason lies in the withholding system which, ideally, would provide pay-asyou-go collection of income tax.

The difficulty is that individuals' incomes, sources of in-come and deductions vary so widely that withholding tables can be only generalized approximations.

For 1971 incomes, withholding was set too low, so that a year ago thousands of taxpayers got a shock; they had to into their pockets to pay part of their tax bills.

To avoid a recurrence, withholding rates on 1972 incomes were set higher. It turned out they were set too high, on the average. The Treasury realized this early in the year and urged taxpayers who had reason to think too much was being taken out of their paychecks to file new withholding forms, listing all their exemptions and, if they had unusually high deductions, applying for additional exemptions. But it is now apparent that not nearly enough people took this advice and that as much as \$10 billion too much may have been taken out of paychecks. Taxpayers get this back, either in bigger refunds or smaller balances to pay. A share of this jackpot could

well be yours. ne other changes may affect you, but only if you are in a high income bracket.

There is a ceiling rate on the tax on salaries, as distinguished from other kinds of income. It was 60 per cent on 1971 earnings, but dropped to 50 per cent

#### **US May Impose** Import Surcharge

WASHINGTON (AP) There is a real possibility that the United States will impose an import surcharge to stem the flow of dollars out of the country and to cut the U.S. trade deficit knowledgeable sources said

The possibility was mentioned guardedly Tuesday by Herbert Stein, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, when he was questioned by the Senate-House

Economic committee.

But the sources, who would not be quoted by name, said the administration is giving more than casual thought to such a move, hoping at the same time that it may be made unnecessary if U.S. trading partners go along with this country's wishes for a general conference that would take up monetary and capital outflow stions as well as trade.

Some of the other countries involved reportedly want to separate these issues and spread out the negotiations.

If you are single or an un-married head of household and

had earned income of more than \$38,000, or if you are married and file a joint return, or a widow or widower with a dependent child, and in either case you earned more than \$52,000, you should look into this. Ask the Revenue Service for Form 4726.

Taxpayers with large incomes from capital gains may have to pay more than in the past. Capital gains — the profit from assets held at least six months before sale - ordinarily are taxed, in effect, at half the rate the owner would pay on ordinary income. But a taxpayer may choose an alternative, which formerly was 25



per cent of the gain. Obviously, this favored persons in tax brackets above 50 per cent.

Beginning with 1971 incomes, the 25 per cent rate was made applicable only to capital gains up to \$50,000. Above that figure, the alternative rate was set at a maximum of 32.5 per cent. On 1972 income, the figure goes up to a maximum of 35 per cent.

There are questions about your place of residence, to provide information the government needs for the complex formula by which federal funds are distributed to states and local governments under the new revenue-sharing program. The questions are on the second page of both long and short forms.


