Extended To 14 More States

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government has decided to make permanent and expand to 14 more states a free aerial ambulance service using military helicopters to aid accident victims in rural

The project is an outgrowth of an experiment set up in five western states in 1970. Army and Air Force helicopters taking part in it had flown 915 patients on 704 mercy flights as of last October. About half of those assisted were injured in traffic accidents.

Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird said Thursday the experiment proved successful and that within a few weeks the departments of Transportation, Defense and Health, Education and Welfare will announce "a very much expanded program."

Pentagon sources said 29 Army and Air Force installations in 19 states-including the five states where the project is already underway-have been designated as operating centers for the aerial ambulance service

Nation's Unemployment Drops To 5.9 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP) - The figures represented nation's unemployment rate essentially no change. edged down from 6 to 5.9 per cent last month, the govern-

ment reported today.

Although the actual number of jobless increased 752,000 to 5,447,000, it usually increases much more in January and the Labor Department figured it as a decline of 56,000 on a seasonally adjusted basis.

The nation's total employment rose 240,000 to 80,636,000 on a seasonal basis, although the unadjusted figures showed a drop of more than one mil-

The report, by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said nonfarm payroll employment on a seasonal basis reached an alltime high of 71.4 million.

"Employment has advanced strongly since last summer," the bureau said.

Ship Tie-Up Threatened

Worldwide

WASHINGTON (AP) -Harry Bridges, boss of the striking West Coast dock workers, today threatened a worldwide shipping tie-up if Congress forces an end to the strike by compulsory arbitration.

Bridges, testifying before a House Labor subcommittee, said any law Congress U.S. House Okays Plan passes to end the strike will affect ships only when they

touch at U.S. docks. "These ships go overseas." he said, "and we've got a few friends in other countries, and they will respond to our call for help. It may reach the point where the ships won't

come back here. President Nixon has asked Congress to pass emergency legislation that would create a three-member board with the power to settle the strike by

compulsory arbitration. Emund J. Flynn, president of the Pacific Maritime Association (PMA), which represents the shippers, endorsed the bill, saying he saw little prospect of settling the dispute by negotiation.

But Bridges emphatically rejected it and indicated his longshoremen might ignore the law if it were enacted.

Peking Backs 7-Point Plan Of Viet Cong

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China backed the Viet Cong's seven-point peace proposal for Vietnam today and declared it resolutely supports the Viet-namese and other Indochinese people in their war against "U.S. aggression."

Peking said it supports the statement of the Provisional **Revolutionary Government of** South Vietnam, exposing the "deceptive nature" of President Nixon's eight-point peace offer and elaborating on the two key points in its peace

The Viet Cong's statement, issued in Hanoi Wednesday and presented at the Paris eace talks Thursday, calls on he United States to name a date for the withdrawal of U.S. and allied troops from South Vietnam and demands that resident Nguyen Van Thieu

Pampa's Entry Nixon's Peace Plan Receives **Good Reactions In Red Bloc**

WASHINGTON (AP) -Positive reactions from some Communist nations to President Nixon's peace plan have given the administration added hope for a negotiated settlement, State Department

sources say.

Secretary of State William Rogers made two references to this in an unscheduled news conference Thursday and other department officials elaborated later in response to

The secretary at one point said, "I think that the American people and people generally throughout the world-and this applies to Communist countries as well in some instances-feel that the President of the United States has gone as far as he

possibly could." At a later point he told reporters:

"The enemy indicates some interest in the proposals. And we have diplomatic conversations with others that indicate they think the President's proposal might be a way out.'

Department sources said the secretary was referring to some Communist nations, among others, in that statement, although they declined to give any identification. They gave as an example a report in which an official of

one European Communist nation, described as having good relations with China, said it is difficult now to refute that Nixon is trying to end the war. Rogers previously said on behalf of the administration the fact North Vietnam had not rejected the Nixon's

He repeated this Thursday and underlined it with his statement that world response could mean "the other side may feel that it would be the best course to follow to enter into meaningful negotiations "

proposal was a hopeful sign.

And, Rogers said, even though the Thursday statement by North Vietnamese envoys in Paris was largely repeats of past positions, "in some instances they could be considered clarification"

One departmental source said this was encouraging at least to the point of indicating a sort of dialogue keeping the possibility of negotiations

The Vietnamese presentation was given another interpretation by Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, who said it was another indication that President Nixon's proposals had indeed been rejected.

Muskie's latest stand on the Vietnam peace talks occupied much of Rogers' attention during his news conference and injected a strong political element into the situation.

The secretary, apparently the vanguard for other administration forces, said he was dismayed by the Maine Democrat's attack this week

on the President's position. "I am dismayed," Rogers said, "because what has happened is we have a rejection. here in our country, by a

prominent political official,

before the enemy has rejected our proposals. Muskie, the leading contender for the Democratic presidential nomination, had called for a set date for U.S. troop withdrawals contingent only on release of American prisoners and the safety of the

withdrawing forces. Under the Muskie proposal there would be no ceasefire, a key part of the Nixon plan, nor a demand for free

"I believe they (the North Vietnamese) would respond seriously to the terms I have suggested. That means the killing of American boys in Vietnam can come to an end sooner. I do not think it is against the national interest to try to promote this goal."

Arms Talks Make Headway

VIENNA, Austria (AP) -U.S. and Soviet negotiators have come closer to agreement on curbing the nuclear arms race but there was no clear indication on when a treaty limiting istic missiles may be Protestant majority in Northern Ireland chose to be under British rule.

The province's Catholics, claiming discrimination by Protestants, also demand improvements in their job opportunities, housing and governmental representation.

Recent developments: In August 1969, Catholics rebelled against what they regarded as 50 years of repression beginning in 1921 when Britain gave independence to the southern republic after a civil war. Britain sent thousands of troops to put down communal warfare between the Catholics and Protestants. Then the IRA launched a guerrilla campaign to drive out the British and reunite Ireland.

Rogers **Assures** Hillary

WASHINGTON (AP) -Secretary of State William P. Rogers says the United States will not intervene in the Northern Ireland dispute and "is not in a position to

condemn anybody. Rogers said after meeting with Ireland's Foreign Minister Patrick J. Hillary Thursday that he had made it clear to Hillary and in an earlier meeting with the British Ambassador, the Earl of Cromer, that the United States believes it would be inappropriate and counterproductive to

intervene in the situation. Rogers said the United Sates would be willing to play a useful role in settling the violence between Catholics and Protestants in the six counties of Northern Ireland, but added: "Personally, I don't think we can.

Rogers said neither Hillary nor the British ambassador asked the United States to take any role in the situation, but that both sides asked to meet with him to explain the situation as their respective governments saw it.

Hillary, however, told reporters earlier he had asked Rogers to consider the United States using "its good offices" to bring about a solution.

An officer of the Irish Republican Army said today that the anti-British guerrillas would steer clear of the British troops ordered to disperse a Roman Catholic mourning march Sunday in

"We plan to keep well away," an officer of the IRA's militant Provisional wing told local newspapers. "It would be distinctly unwise for us to go into a situation like this where we would run the risk of arrest or shooting by the soldiers.

Up to 30,000 demonstrators are expected to join the march. The Civil Rights Association is organizing it as a tribute to the 13 Catholic civilians killed when British paratroopers broke up another banned procession in Londonderry last Sunday.

All public processions are banned in Northern Ireland. and the British army warned that its soldiers would break up the Newry march by force if necessary. The army brought in 550 more infantrymen, boosting its strength in the province to 15,000 troops.

The Civil Rights Association appealed to IRA gunmen to stay away.

'We do not want any troublemakers in our ranks, a spokesman said. "If there is any violence it must be made clear that it comes only from the British army. Meanwhile, Catholies rioted

for four hours in the Lower Falls district of Belfast, and army patrols were the target of stopes, bottles and bullets. A military spokesman said

the soldiers shot four snipers, but it was not known if any were killed. In Lurgan, 20 miles

southwest of Belfast, troops dispersed rival mobs of Protestants and Catholics who were threatening a street battle. One man was shot and was reported in serious

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Ships And Planes Continue Search For Missing Tanker

Ships and planes searched the choppy Gulf of Mexico waters south-southeast of here again today for a missing tanker with 40 persons aboard.

The 572-foot vessel, V. A. Fogg, with a crew of 35 and five maintenance men aboard, became the object of a search Wednesday when she did not arrive here as expected after sailing from Freeport.

The U.S. Coast Guard reported Thursday night a life jacket was found floating about 60 miles south of here where a pilot had seen smoke Tuesday. A Coast guard spokesman said the preserver contained no markings and could not be identified as belonging to the tanker.

The tanker was to clean 18 empty tanks of highly explosive benzene residue,

tanks of xylene, not considered highly explosive. There has been no radio contact with the vessel since it

left port. The cleaning location was to be about 50 miles offshore, as required by federal regulations

However, a Coast Guard spokesman said the search area had been widened to include areas as far as 150 miles off the Galveston coast.

Winds in excess of 30 miles per hour and waves up to 14 feet high hampered search ef-

Barnes Formally Kicks Off His Campaign For Governor

BROWNWOOD, Tex. (AP) Supporters whom Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes calls homefolk heard him formally kick off his campaign for governor Thursday night.

And Barnes, bidding for the Democratic nomination, told them bluntly to look for sharp personal attacks on him before they go to the polls.

The lieutenant governor is from De Leon, 43 miles northeast of here in Central Texas. He first won election to the legislature from this area in 1960 while just 21 years old. Barnes has complained that

many efforts have been made to link him to the Texas insurance stock scandal. He declared, "Over the past

months, many of you have been distressed by personal attacks against me, "but I'm afraid that you might as well expect a great deal more of smear and slander in the weeks and months ahead...

"So much so that you may wonder if they're talking about the Ben Barnes you've known for so long.

"I'm proud that since you gave me your hand, and your support, I have never done anything to betray the trust you placed in me... and I can stand here and look every one of you in the eve and say that I

have kept the faith."

Barnes did not mention either of his opponents in the Democratic primary-Gov. Preston Smith or rancher Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde-by

He told his audience, however, that "If the people of Texas really want a standpat governor, then I'm not



Rural Development Bill **Endorsed By House Unit**

'We cannot separate the problem between rural and urban America-there is no dividing line.' Backers said the

committee's final version would improve the living standard of millions of American families on farms and in small communities. The developments climaxed

environmental aspects of small watershed, and resource and conservation programs of the Agriculture Department.

For the first time, authorization would be given to help finance pollution abatement programs in rural areas.

N. Viet May Lose One-Fifth Of Its 50,000 Men In Attack

SAIGON (AP) -North Vietnam is ready to lose one-fifth of 50,000 men it has poised to attack in the central highlands, and many of its troops "have already resigned themselves to death," the region's top U.S. advisor said Thursday.

The enemy feels it still in this war," said John Paul Vann, senior American allyisor in the 2nd Military Region that covers 47 per cent South Vietnam.

'He's getting rather desperate that the United States will pull out of here without negotiating an

agreement," Vann added. Vann told a news conference the central highlands city of fleiku, that one enemy body five is found with a chest tattoo: "Born in the North to de in the South."

The veteran advisor said the offensive expected around the mid-February Tet New Year elebration would probably hit is region hardest in ountainous Kontum Province. Other heavy attacks ave been predicted in the rthern tip of South Vietnam.

Vann estimated the North Vietnamese have committed 15,000 men to the Kontum campaign. Main targets are expected to be fire bases in the Ben Het-Dak To area, east of reported buildups of troops and tanks. This is where the borders of Laos, Cambodia and South Vietnam meet.

The North Vietnamese probably will harass the highlands province capitals of Kontum and Pleiku, Vann said, but he does not expect any serious attempt to capture

Although the two South Vietnamese army divisions guarding the two cities are reputed to be the country's worst, Vann declared: "I

don't expect to lose anything. "In this offensive the enemy will be killed by overwhelming artillery and air support," he said. "I'm enough of a realist that I'm not going to ask the ARVN-Army of the Republic of Vietnam-to do what they won't do."

Vann's statement that he did not expect an attempt to seize a province capital differed somewhat from a radio interview six days ago.

FCC Issues New Rules Concerning Cable TV The rules follow basically

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Communications Commission issued Thursday its longawaited rules charting the future of cable television, an event which FCC Chairman Dean Burch called historic

Under the new rules, cable television in the top 50 markets would be authorized to carry the signals of three full network stations and three independent stations.

In television markets from 50 to 100, the standard would be three network signals and two independent. In markets below 100, systems could carry three full network signals and one independent. If the signals are not available within a 35-mile radius, the systems would be able to import distant signals to reach required levels of service.

Cable television brings television programs into the home on a coaxial cable which, in theory, can offer an almost unlimited number of channels Less than 10 per cent of the nation's 60 million television homes now have cable.

The new rules represent the most comprehensive compilation of regulations for the infant industry and are designed to bring a new revolution in broadcasting to America's living rooms.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States said today there seem to be some hopeful elements in a new Viet Cong proposal which called for the immediate collapse of the Thieu government in Saigon.

There appear to be some elements of interest in it." said William H. Sullivan, deputy assistant secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific affairs.

Besides calling on the United States to pull out its support of the government of South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu, the Viet Cong also said a date for the beginning of U.S. troop withdrawals is subject to negotiation.

Testifying before a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee, Sullivan said the enemy for the first time appears to be separating

military problems in the negotiations from political problems by addressing the subject of troop withdrawals to the United States and the problem of the Thieu

government to Saigon. In addition, Sullivan said the other side for the first time is no longer speaking of a potential U.S. withdrawal date, now already past.

While noting that much of the Viet Cong statement was full of rhetoric heard previously. Sullivan added, We will certainly have to explore it in great detail.

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Singing Star Baptizes 250 "Pat Bland" and "Goody

(AP) — In the swimming pool behind his magnificent home in posh Beverly Hills, Pat Boone baptizes the repentant.

In the last year and a half, the singer-actor estimates he has immersed 250 persons who have newly committed themselves to Christianity.

"Entertainers' wives and kids, young ex-drug addicts, older ex-alcoholics, business people-just about every kind of people," says the boyish Boone, 37, "I'm just the midwife at a spiritual birth."

He says the candidates are not baptized into any particular denomination but into the "body of Christ." This, incidentally, is also the general concept of baptism in most major churches.

If the setting for Boone's ministrations seems incongruous-the \$350,000 to \$400,000 estates on palmshaded streets near the swank Beverly Hills Hotel-so does his own role in the ritual. In the brassy world of show

business, he admits, "Let's face it—I'm an oddity. Insult comic Don Rickles has called him "Mr. Clean,"

began to backslide. 'I'm one of the Jesus people, a street Christian," he

Ironically, Boone and his family recently were "dis-fellowshiped" by the Inglewood Church of Christ they had attended for 10 years because of that church's disapproval of glossolalia—"speaking in un-known tongues" through power of the Holy Spirit-an experience Boone affirms.

The elders broke fellowship with the family-politely asked us to leave over the supernatural," he said. "We parted over whether miracles are still

possible. I believe they are." His book describes a few miracles, including the apparent healing of Shirley's iust-broken wrist by prayer.

On Sundays the family of "footloose young Christians" visits various churches including, occasionally, the Inglewood church. Mormons. Methodists and the Assembly of God have besought the disfellowshiped Boones'

membership, Pat said, but "I've been trying to make them see, in a friendly, loving way, that I don't want to join a church with a rigid set of rules because I don't read about that in the New Testament...

"I see the lives of hundreds of thousands, in fact maybe millions of young people all over the country, being changed very dramatically by a personal encounter with Jesus. This to me is what the church is supposed to have been about, all along, for the

last 2,000 years. "So I like to encourage it, get out where young people are, hear them talk, talk with them and be like Andrew was in the New Testament. Wherever you read about him he was introducing somebody to Jesus. I like to do that.

"Kids turned off by organized religion, who went the whole trip with drugs and group sex, are suddenly becoming very fundamental Christians. I think more and more the organized church will recognize the validity of the free-form Jesus

New Control Threats

If readers have had any doubts about the fact that politicians resort to fabrication and deception to perpetuate themselves in positions of power, let the latest comment by the Administration's newest "star," John Connally, stand the test.

The Secretary of the Treasury threatened America's businessmen at a recent seminar sponsored by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce with tougher controls if the present political program, for control over the economy doesn't work.

Now, the purpose of this was to suggest to the American public that the politicians have instituted the machinery to control inflation, but that the businessmen and industrialists have not cooperated, therefore the failure is laid at the doorstep of the free enterprisers.

The news warned its readers some time ago that the politicians would resort to strict, permanent controls over the economy when the first step-the 90-day temporary freeze-was put into effect. We said at the time that the 90-day freeze was simply a ploy to condition the American public for permanent control over the

Now comes the arrogant threat from the pompous Texas political hack who's been living off the tax payers much of his adult life. His 'talents' became apparent to high ranking politicians when he served as president and general manager of a radio

station in Austin at age 29-guess whose radio station? In 1949, he became administrative assistant to Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson. He was named Secretary of the Navy in 1961 and with Vice President Johnson's backing was elected Governor of Texas in 1962.

Now he's secretary of the Treasury and is the hatchet man for the Nixon administration's war against private economy

The audacity of the politicians is amazing

In his speech to the nation's largest companies. represented by 1,200 persons at the st .al price control seminar, Connally claimed the government has defended the profit system, helped forge an international monetary settlement and pushed a pro business investment tax bill through congress, but the private businesses had done nothing. So he and Price Commission chairman C. Jackson Grayson Jr. threatened them with the "possibility" of prolonged, stricter and even permanent controls if the present program does not appear to be meeting Nixon's goal of cutting inflation in half by the end of the year

The fact is that the increased amount of money spent for wages during the month of December was mostly the result of government spending...military pay raises, increases for government workers, federal state and local

ANSWER: The figure of \$3 billion per day money float in

banks was obtained from the Federal Reserve Board and several commercial bankers. This is the amount per day, every day of the year. Therefore it represents \$3 billion a year of loanable funds. The \$150 million in interest from the funds is on a yearly basis at five per cent. The 12th district is the first district to do this district-wide. 

Migraines are

Tough to Treat Dear Dr. Lamb-My daughter suffers from migraine headaches. She has had X-rays, nerve block and even went to a clinic, but nobody seems to come up with an answer. Do you know of any way she can get relief?

Dear Reader-Migraine headaches can be particularly troublesome to diagnose and to treat. Classically, migraine headaches cause periodic headaches on one or both sides of the head and they are often associated with indigestion, nausea or even vomiting. During the episode, the victim may be unable to tolerate bright lights. The attacks are often preceded by spots before the eyes or other problems in

Actually, the migraine headaches involve the entire body. We think of it as being associated with construction and dilatation of the arteries of the brain. But preceding the attacks there may be an accumulation of body fluid and other indications that the

whole body chemistry is When the headache is mild, it can sometimes be controlled with simple aspirin. In other

instances, stronger medicines, including codeine, are necessary. A combination of aspirin and a small dose of codeine is often a very effective pain reliever and will help in some individuals. Perhaps the most common successful medicine used in treating migraine headache is ergotamine tartrate, obtained through a physician.

There are some programs for preventing migraine headaches. One of the most important considerations is the patient's personality. Almost all people with migraine headaches are perfectionists. They usually need approval of other people and they make the mistake of attempting to obtain approval by high levels of performance. Then they learn that superperformance does not endear one to others nor produce the desired love. As a result, the individual often feels more resentful and frustrated than ever. Basically, psychotherapy for such individuals is directed to enabling them to understand themselves and to establish more realistic goals.

There are some medicines that have been used on a long-term basis in the hopes of preventing migraine headaches. One of these is phenelzine sulfate.

Another problem in treating migraine headacha is identifying it as the real cause of headaches.

Debate Thieu Visit to U.S. By ROBERTS. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - President Nguyen Van Thieu wants to come to the United States.

Such a visit, the South Vietnamese leader feels, would considerably enhance his standing both at home and abroad--particularly the former.

This desire reportedly was conveyed to President Nixon personally in a letter from Thieu. He is said to have "suggested" he be officially invited to make the trip.

The letter is understood to have been sent soon after Thieu agreed to cooperate with the President on his dramatic secret peace offer to the Communists. A major feature of this plan calls for Thieu and his vice president to resign so new internationally supervised elections could be

According to one inside account. White House advisers are of the view such a trip would be "inexpedient" for two reasons:

(1) The distinct likelihood that in both the U.S. and Vietnam the public generally would be apt to consider the visit as evidence of close ties between the Nixon administration and Thieu; also as an indirect endorsement of the latter's reelection. (2) The Communists and their partisans would seize on the trip as a crafty attempt by the U.S. to influence the outcome of the election.

Also said to be deemed a major obstacle is the virtual certainty that radical, dove and other dissident elements would use the visit to stage turbulent demonstrations and violence-wracked disturbances of various kinds. President Thieu has never

been to the U.S. Former Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky has been here several times, the last in 1971 as part of his campaign to unseat Thieu.

On one occasion, President Johnson conferred with Thieu at a "mini-summit" in the Philippines. That is the closest the South Vietnamese executive has come to the U.S. and the only time he has personally met with a U.S. President.

On The Griddle

Binartisan leaders of the House Foreign Affairs Committee are mulling over an idea that could prove quite embarrassing to certain of their ultra-dovish colleagues in both the House and Senate.

Under this backstage plan, these Senators and Congressmen would be "invited" to come before the committee and, in open hearings, relate how and why they went to Paris to negotiate privately with the North Vietnamese and Vietcong delegations on possible peace terms.

One basis for such proceedings is the contention that these legislators operated in direct violation of the century-old Logan Act. This law expressly prohibits unofficial meddling in foreign relations.

In the private committee discussions, foremost among the lawmakers mentioned as

targets of such hearings are: Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., leading anti-Vietnam war opponent who is making that his main issue in seeking the Presidential nomination Sen. Vance Hartke, D-Ind. another dove-tootling White House aspirant; Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho; and Reps. Benjamin Rosenthal and Lester Wolff, D-N.Y.

While the hearing plan is still in the talk stage, there is considerable bipartisan support for the committee.

A determining factor will be the attitude of Chairman Thomas Morgan, D-Pa. The veteran legislator has been a steadfast backer of the Vietnam policies of both Presidents Johnson and Nixon. He wields powerful influence in the committee due to his role as chairman and because of the high personal esteem in which he is held by the 38 members-21 21 Democrats, 17 Republicans.

So far, Chairman Morgan has given no hint of what he thinks of the proposal to put the would-be Congressional negotiators of peace terms with the Vietnam Communists on the griddle.



U.S. To Support Bangladesh Relief Program

WASHINGTON (AP) - The continuing refugee and relief Nixon administration is making contingency plans to help the United Nations feed or resettle 2.5 million people who want to leave Bangladesh, and millions waiting to return there.

Administration aides say U.S. government and private humanitarian aid to the Asian subcontinent has topped \$250 million, most of it channeled through the United Nations. India estimates another \$122 million is necessary to pay the cost of returning three million

Bangladesh. Congress is considering an administration request for additional funds for the

to four million refugees from

India to their homes in

program, which the United Nations is now assessing.

President Nixon has requested \$250 million for emergency relief in South Asia during the present year but the House of Representatives has appropriated only \$175 million.

Administration aides testifying before the Senate subcommittee on refugees Tuesday said deliveries of U.S. supplies and food have continued since before the Indian-Pakistan war.

Frank L. Kellogg, special assistant to the Secretary of State William P. Rogers for refugee and migration affairs, says there will be a question of additional refugee problems generated as the current political situation settles down in the subcontinent.

Kellogg estimates two million to 2.5 million non-Bengalis are still in Bangladesh. These people, foreigners hated by Bengali residents, have not yet been declared refugees. They include Muslims from Bihar in India and other minority

There are 30,000 West Pakistanis stranded in Bangladesh, formerly East Pakistan. In addition, 400,000 Bengalis in West Pakistan want to return to Bangladesh.

In India, the latest figure is that more than six million of the estimated 10 million refugees from Bangladesh have crossed the border to reestablish themselves in their

hometowns The United States has approved a U.N. request to make food and other supplies for refugees in India available for these persons inside Bangla-

The U.S. government has contributed \$90.9 million in food and cash for assistance to refugees. U.S. voluntary agencies have added \$10.7 million in cash and supplies such as clothing, medicine and shelter materials.

In addition, the United States provided a total of \$158.3 million worth of humanitarian assistance to help Bangladesh recover from flood, cyclone and civil strife.

Couple Working On Way To Convert Boundless Energy Of Sun Into Heat

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Two Arizona scientists say they believe they have solved a problem whose answer has long eluded man, an efficient way of tapping the boundless

cost-free energy of the sun. With a \$25,000 grant from interested utility companies, Dr. Aden B. Meinel of the University of Arizona and his wife Marjorie are building a device which will focus and trap sunlight.

The sunlight would be coverted into heat which would be used to run conventional electrical generating stations. Such stations now get their heat from nuclear fission of fossil fuels such as coal. The heat converts water to steam. which turns turbines connected to generators.

"This isn't a new electricity generating system. It's a new fuel source for generators that already exist," Mrs. Meinel told newsmen Wednesday after she and her husband outlined details of their new solar energy converter for American Physical Society members.

The first device, which the Meinels call a "credibility model," is expected to be ready in about three months.

The heart of the Meinels' converter is a stainless steel pipe on which microscopically thin films of molybedenum, cesium and magnesium compounds are deposited. They allow sunlight to pass through, but prevent much of the energy it contains from radiating back out.

Special lenses concentrate the sunlight before it strikes the pipe, generating temperatures to 1,000 degrees.

A gas or liquid flowing through the pipe carries off the heat for use at the power plant.

The failure of earlier co.. verters to achieve such high temperatures has delayed past plans to convert sunlight into electricity, scientists

Russians Victorious In First Day Of Olympics

SAPPORO, Japan (AP) -Russia and The Netherlands claimed the first gold medals at the Winter Olympic Games and the determined United States hockey team battled its way into the Class "A" competition in the first full day of

Ard Schenk the fleet Dutch speedskater, and Vvacheslav Vedenin, one of the Soviet Union's corps of powerful Nordic skiers, took the golds in Friday's only two medal events.

Schenk, half blinded by snow, raced to the 5,000-meter speed skating crown in 7 minutes, 23.61 seconds, slow by his standards but no easy effort in the blizzard-like conditions at the Maomanai open air rink. Heavy snow ringed the track as Schenk zipped around the rink, little more than one second off the Olympic record of 7:22:40 set by Fred Anton Maier of Norway in the 1968 Games, but well off his own world record

of 7:12.00. Norway captured both the silver and bronze medals in the event, Roar Gronvold taking the second spot in 7:28 18 and Sten Stensen third in 7:33.39.

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Hughes, 66, Living Behind Elaborate Cloak Of Secrecy Since '53

EDITOR'S NOTE-Controversy and mystery have been constant con billionaire industrialist Howard Hughes. But few things in his life have matched the bizarre events surrounding a book which purports to be his autobiography. Following is the last of four articles on The World of Howard Hughes.

By JAMES NORMAN **Associated Press Writer** NEW YORK (AP) -For a man who probably has been more serious than any other in his steadfast pursuit of seclusion, billionaire Howard Hughes has a remarkable career as the center of controversies.

Living behind an elaborate cloak of secrecy that only a fortune of some \$2 billion could buy. Hughes became a watched-for and hunted man.

Nothing, it seemed, could bring him out of his hiding places-the Beverly Hills mansion where he spent his time with his former wife Jean Peters, the carefully guarded penthouse in the Desert Inn in Las Vegas and finally the ninth floor of the Britannia Beach Hotel in the Bahamas.

Even in his more visible days as a Hollywood figure, Hughes generated controversy, tilting with censors, flouting movie conventions with the production of such films as Scarface," and "The

The same was true with his career as a plane maker.

In 1953, Hughes, now 66. dropped from sight and hasn't been seen in public since-yet he remained at the center of intrigue.

Hughes refused to show up in court when Trans World Airlines charged him with mismanagement while he was the firm's majority stockholder. The result: TWA won a judgment of at least \$137 million. But Hughes kept his privacy.

And wrapped in that secrecy, Hughes, in 1966 descended on Nevada and within four years— at which time he left in secrecy-had become the state's largest landowner and employer, around whom swirled a statewide debate.

But last Dec. 7, McGraw-Hill Book Co. announced it planned to publish the autobiography of the elusive billionaire. It was a publishing sensation. But once again, the Hughes penchant for privacy was to assert itself.

First, the Hughes Tool Co., led by its general counsel Chester Davis, denied such a book could be possible. It set up a long-distance telephone call said to be from Hughes in the Bahamas to seven Los Angeles newsmen. The man on the phone told the newsman he had never heard of Clifford Irving, the 41-year-old writer who claimed to have met Hughes for secret interviews as he collaborated on the work. The reporters agreed they had spoken with Hughes.

Irving, in New York, to give the galley proofs of the book a final once-over, said he was prepared to show numerous documents with Hughes' handwriting, authenticated by experts. There were two checks, endorsed by an "H.R. Hughes" and deposited in a Swiss bank account. Additionally, there were handwritten letters to Irving, allegedly from Hughes, and a nine-page letter to Harold McGraw, president of the publishing house. The experts also vouched for the many handwritten notations in the margins of the transcript Irving said he had typed from tape-recorded interviews with

Hughes. McGraw-Hill announced it intended to hold up publication until certain questions pertaining to the Swiss bank account were answered.

plicitly detailed, 23-page affidavit, that he personally had handed two checks totaling \$325,000 to Hughes and had given another check for \$325,000 to a Hughes aide. Then the writer took off for his home on the Mediterranean island of Ibiza, saying he did not plan to return to the United States until there was a valid

reason for him to do so. -Word came from Switzerland that the H.R. Hughes who opened the Swiss Credit Bank account was not a gaunt, 6foot3 Texan but a blonde in her 30s carrying a forged Swiss passport in the name of Helga R. Hughes. Later reports said the woman was a brunette.

Hoping to return to the quietude of his 300-year-old peasant house, Irving instead found himself besieged by newsmen. Angered by suggestions that his lovely wife Edith, a Swiss painter, was the mysterious Helga, the writer threatened to sue

anyone who implied that. While bands of newsmen

camped in the Irving living room for nearly a week and Swiss authorities asked the Irvings to come to Zurich for an investigation of fraud, Hughes maintained his splendid isolation on an island in the Bahamas.

Irving returned to New York less than a week after he left, and with him came his wife and their two young sons, Barnaby and Ned and there were these further developments:

—Irving disclosed through

his lawyer that his wife had opened the Swiss account in the name of H.R. Hughes and had withdrawn the \$650,000, placing it "substantially intact" in another Swiss account.

-Irving's friend and attorney, Martin S. Ackerman, announced that in the "best interest" of his client he was withdrawing from the case because he felt Irving at that

stage needed a competent criminal lawyer.

-Irving's new attorney, Maurice Nessen, hustled the couple and their children out of their previous place of seclusion north of New York and into a new hideout.

If the events following that Dec. 7 announcement by McGraw-Hill appear confusing, the proliferating theories on what led up to it are positively James Bondian.

One scenario would have it exactly as Irving now says the whole thing happened: that he met with Howard Hughes at the times and locations specified in his affidavit, that he handed the checks to Hughes or an aide, but that because of some whim on the part of the billionaire, he agreed to take them back and have his wife deposit them and they withdrew the money, putting it into another

account. On the other extreme is the scenario that makes Irving the hoaxer who invented the details of his meetings with

autobiographical material from him. Irving has rejected this theory and has steadfastedly maintained that the book is authentic.

Another proposed theory is that Irving was given a packet of material stolen from Hughes by a disgruntled former aide and that he ingeniously wove the documents into an autobiography in an interview

format. Life magazine, which had contracted to publish excerpts of the book in three installments, speculated that authentic material might have been stolen and given to Irving by "a disloyal or greedy emCanno Moule on fee

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Yet another theory is that Irving traveled through the United States and Mexico as he claims to have, meeting with and interviewing a man he believes was Hughes-in short, that he was duped by a band of impostors who would have had to include masterful actors with intimate knowledge of Hughes' life as well as a master forger.

Veep Denounces Amateur Ecologists

President Spiro Agnew denounced Thursday "amateur ecologists" who resort to nonviolent sabotage-or 'ecotage" -in a campaign to improve the nation's environment

He deplored, he said, activities of "environmentalists who believe that sabotage and horseplay are the answers to what ails us ecologically."

Agnew said he was referring to a newspaper account of "an organization of 25 teachers, students and other amateur ecologists known as the MiamiEco-Commandos.' The vice president spoke to

1,200 community leaders. Agnew defended the Nixon administration's record on environment and said the President's forthcoming

will provide a sharp focus on how all of us con help in making this a cleaner and healthier nation in a cleaner and healthier world.

'And despite the mournful cries of the doomsayers, as faithfully reported in the press and over the airways day after day after day, we are succeeding in our efforts," he said.

"In its first year," Agnew said, the environmental' protection agency created by President Nixon "did more to improve the environment of this nation than has any other agency in any other administration, without exception."

Turning to the Miami-Eco-Commandos, Agnew said he was using an account in the Washington Post as his source of information that the group has cemented shut the sewage outlet of a bottling company. hurled packets of yellow dye into the machinery of six sewage treatment plants, tossed 700 bottles into the seas off Miami and has "suggested publicly that everyone send bundles of garbage to persons they suspect-suspect, mind you-of being polluters."

'Now aren't these dandy contributions to our country's environmental cleanup campaign?" Agnew said. Dye in the sewage plants

Bottles in the ocean garbage in the mails, just what we need," Agnew said. 'Compare the exploits of

the Miami-Eco-Commandos with the constructive, productive, efforts of the Boy Scouts of America and other

'I wouldn't trade you one level-headed, serious-minded, service-oriented Boy Scout for all the publicity-seeking environmental dilletantes the news media can dig up between now and Halloween.
