Jones said the report "has 10 chapters, but made the suggestion to Mr. Martin, they should have added another chapter, because Chapter 11 is The report "fails to offer an action plan for solving the problems facing America's energy indusry," said Philip Burguieres, president of the roleum Equipment Suppliers Association. Shelby D. Pitts, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, said the solutions proposed in the report could help the industry in the long run, but that "nothing short of the immediate, direct boost of a variable import the

WASHINGTON (AP) - Several of the Energy
Department's nuclear tacilities have discharged Department's nuclear facilities have discharged

ont ly contaminated, the General Accounting office said. Keith O. Fultz, a GAO associate director, told a
Senate Committee on Tuusday that after two years
of investigation "we still don't know the extent" of of investigation "we still don't know the extent" of the pollution generated by the government-owned
plants for producing nuclear weapons and fuel. But "some of DOE's sites may be irreversibly contaminated," he said.
Fultz said the cost to institute proper waste man agement and bring the Energy Department int
