Open market could neutralize Soviets
During former national security adviser Robert
McFarlane's appearance at the Iran-Contra hearings, Rep. James Courter followed a line of questioning designed to place the contra issue in a strategic context his questions to government policy as it was, not as it

The more interesting question would have been,
"Why does the U. government continue to insist on playinges a game at which the Soviets inherently Courter noted that since the Sandinista revolution
Nicaragua has more than quadrupled the size of its army, making it far and away the largest army in Central America. Managua has accepted massive aid
from Cuba and the Soviet Union, and welcomed many East-bloc advisers.
The Sandinistas will say they've done this to counter the U.S. backed contra threat, but the claim is suspect before the United States started financing the contras To date, the U.S. response to this situation has con tral America and other threatened regions. But there's an alternative we haven'tyet tried. The Soviets have evolved an efficient set of techni-
ques for extending their dominance over farflung countries. They hardly ever use Soviet troops Afghanistan being the exception that almost proves the rule. Instead they rely on proxies cooperating with governments - Cuban troops in Angola, Cuban and glo advisers in Nicaragua, North Vietnamese troops In South Vietnam
The technique can be done in secret, without having
to worry about opposition from a legislature, a free press, or the Soviet people.
The administration eflort to aid the contras could be method, but with the goal of neutralizing or rolling back Soviet influence. It hasn't worked well, in part because it is opposed to American traditions and in
stitutions. We have, by design, a vocal opposition par stitutions. We have, by design, a vocal opposition par-

"Innocent until proven guilty" is one of those ought to be done away with. Under a system of argument contains an even deeper flaw. As Jus xio basic overy school child. So when the Supreme Court does violence to the concept, by ruling that judges may deny bail to defendants
who they believe are a danger to the community, the damage ought to evoke alarm. It isn't merely the rights of criminals that are osee it. We may have all made up our minds that Anthony Salerno, the New York mobster who challenged the federal "preventive deten tion" law, is guilty as sin.
But not all the people denied bail because of
heir presumed dangerousness are guilty of their presumed dangerousness are guilty of
anything. They are nonetheless forced to spend time in jail. The problem with dispensing with
the presumption of innocence is that the innocent as well as the guilty suffer.
Of course the whole subject of bail is tainted
oy by hypocrisy. Everyone knows that the current
system - in which judges have to grant bail system - in which judges have to grant bail
unless no amount of money will guarantee the unless no amount of money will guarantee the
defendant's appearance at his trial -is subject to all the abuses that go with wide judicial dis-
cretion.
For most defendants, a high bail can serve just as effectively as no bail to ensure pretrial
detention. Whether they admit it or not, a lot of judges consider the danger a defendant poses in
deciding whether to grant bail and at what deciding whethe amount to set it.
But to concede that judges sometimes ignore
the presumption of innocence is not to say that it as the very modinitel of excess. But the court's
grant bail to guard against a perceived danger
ought to be done away with. Under a system
preventive detention, judges are under heavy preventive detention, Judges are ander heavy
pressure to keep defendants in jai, even it the
risk they pose is slight. They will be blamed for any crimes committed by a defendant released on bond, but they won't get any credit for

In a 2 -to-1 decision Thursday, the 2 nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld a May 1986 rulin
citing the United States Catholic Conference an the National Conference of Catholic Bishops with civil contempt.
A spokesman for the Conference of Bishops ex-
pressed disappointment, saying that at stake was "the right of all churches and religious groups to express their views on public issues without
harassment by groups which disagree with them harassment by groups which disagree with them
or punitive action on the part of the government." "We are hopeful that we will be vindicated by the Supreme Court in this important case involving
free speech and religious liberty," the spokesman, obert Wonderly, said in Washington.
Last year, U.S. District Judge Robert L. Carter
imposed $\$ 100,000-\mathrm{a}$-day fines on the bishops groups after they balked at submitting documents
on their political activities and relationship with The fines, which were stayed during the appeal,
