red shed out on U.S. 96 just on the edge of town. He charges \$5 for either a regular haircut or a flat top, and the hand-marked sign on the wall next to a little plaque
reading "The Management of This Establishment is Not Responsible will tell you so.
Wendel calls himself a rut barber. He's downright content with the little shop where he sets his own hours and lets the hair-
cuts that leave his place do the advertising for him.
Curt Stimits, on the other hand, is a city barber. His shop sits
right smack in the center of town on Main Street, just past the railroad tracks and right next to the
appliance store. appiante store.
Curt uses only one barber chair, but there's a spare in the corner just in case all the hustle
and bustle of downtown Buna wears one out. And Curt, with the overhead of the big city being what it is and all, charges 25 cents

through a maze of culinary delights, steering people clear of ever-lurking cholesterol and alluring

said Eileen Stellefson, a registered dietition at St. Francis Xavier Hospital who will conduct what's

"The more information that's coming out about The tours are designed to help consumers sort out what's nutritious from what's available.
