on April 16 The survey showed that 40. items - or 46 per cent - were unchanged in price over the two-week period; 21 - or about 25 per cent - decreased in price: 17 - or about 20 per cent - cost more; and 10 were unavailable either the first or second survey date. Price cuts ranged from a fraction of one per cent to more than 30 per

The survey also compared the April 16 prices with the ceilings items - almost half - were selling at the ceiling price: 39 items were selling below the office today

Some of the most severe weather broke out near daylight in the so-called Golden Triangle which embraces Port Arthur, Beaumont and Orange in Southeast Texas. There also were raging thunderstorms from West Texas into the cen-

tral and south parts of the state. and widespread showers in still other sections. Port Arthur police said they

spotted a twister funnel on the ground near the city's operations building 5 miles south of the Jefferson County Airport and spinning eastward at 6:05 a.m. This report caused a tornado warning for the entire county, but there was no word of damage

In addition flood warnings were up and some roads and streets were filled with water from about 6 inches of rain which poured down at the airport between Beaumont and Port Arthur in the three hours after 3 a.m. The special warning against flooding in low places covered Jefferson and Orange counties and the south parts of Newton and Hardin

Rough weather also menaced areas from around San Angelo and Del Rio eastward into Central and South Texas, causing a series of severe thunderstorm warnings to be placed in forcepast daylight in a number of Still another threat of flood





### **Court Allows Increase** In Natural Gas Prices

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The Federal Power Commission has won a major court victory here, boosting the price of natural gas to encourage further ex-

ploration for new gas supplies. "If the area is to continue to supply its share of the national gas production," the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Monday, "it must have incentives to encourage development of its resources.

The finding permits increased

gas prices for Southern Loui-

siana, which produces onethird of America's natural gas. Although the court made little mention of the consumer in its 68-page opinion, the Federal Power Commission's request for higher gas prices estimated the average New York City consumer would pay about 60 cents per monen more heating costs as a result.

Prices will be increased in three ways under the ruling: -Ceiling prices will be raised

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### Pontius Pilate Consolidates His Power

ond instalment of a five-part Easter series about Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor who judged Jesus and sentenced him to death. It is drawn from biblical and other historical sources, with secondary descriptive detail added to round it out.

Music of flutes, timbrels and lyres emanated from Jerusalem and Pontius Pilate, having a backrub in his rooftop solarium, glanced up, squinting into the sun. Another flock of rural peasants, he assumed, invading this already overpacked city for their religious frolic.

These affairs, particularly the big one called Passover, Roman occupation government and Pilate regularly brought extra troops from Caesarea to the city's garrison at the Fortress of Antonia to keep down any threatening disorder.

For the moment, however, he was at ease. He had discovered how to control these obstinately intractable Jews and the system worked, even though he had to lop off some rash heads

. The hillside melodies faded and Pilate relaxed again, his skin tingling as his manslave drew the bone strigilis to and fro. Pilate had been here about three years now, and except for one jolting reprimand from Tiberius, he had shrewdly consolidated his power, especially in firming up his working alliance with the Temple chieftains.

MINE'S EYE

MORGANTOWN, W. Va.

(AP) - To detect perilous conditions and prevent mine disaster, West Virginia University has installed what is believed to be the world's first electronic monitor system for a coal mine.

The experimental system is designed to summon miners from their work places before dangerous conditions produce noticeable signs of crisis.

Technicians have installed sensors at strategic locations in a mine operated by Eastern Associated Coal Corp. near Morgantown. The sensors are connected through data relay stations to the university's engineering sciences building. where a computer analyzes the sensors' findings and signals

Their tie was obvious, however, to any thoughtful observer, since the chief religious post was subject to the governor's appointment. Indeed. Rome had ousted four successive high priests before finding the eastern hill overlooking a sufficiently cooperative one in Caiaphas.

Moreover, so closely did the foreign Rome overlord and the Temple aristocracy collaborate that funds from the Temple's sacred corban were secretly relayed to Pilate for a building project. He frowned-slightly, remembering the bloody riot

word of it got out

It had gone smoothly at first, though. The Temple overseers supplied the funds and Pilate had his architects and engineers begin constructing a flumed aqueduct 54 furlongs in length (seven miles) from springs at Bethlehem to Jerusalem's huge underground reservoirs beneath the Temple

Pilate had calculated that it would boost his status with the emperor to expand the city's inadequate water system while, at the same time, keeping imperial tax tribute flowing unabated into Rome. A shrewd move. But then, knowledge of the transfer from the Temple treasury somehow had slipped out, and a storm broke loose.

Popular indignation swept the city, relates Josephus, a pro-Roman historian of that era: Jews were outraged that the heathen Roman oppressor vould get hands on the shekel tithes given for their Temple in worship of God. They had vented their fury on Pilate.

'Many tens of thousands of people came together, and made a clamor against him, Josephus writes Some of them also used reproaches and abused the man, as such people

'Infidel plunderer!' they cried, shaking their fists outside the governor's praetorium. "Thieving tyrant!

Even the normally heavy Roman levies, in land tax, grain and livestock tax, head tax and custom duties, were bitterly resented by the subjugated peoples, even though paid in Roman commercial coins and not ed at the Temple. To divert poses was seen as utter profa-

Pilate, however, had the highest inside cooperation, up to the Temple's Rome-picked Their collaboration was not Caiaphas himself. With that upper-class backing, the governor had been emboldened to deal

When the crowd had refused sorted to force and also to some of his typically deceptive tactics. He had directed four centuries of 400 soldiers, disguised as Jewish civilians but armed with swords and clubs hidden under their cloaks, to mingle with the demonstrators. At his

Pilate dismissed the masseur and swung off the cushioned table. A dresser brought his tunic and toga, slipped the sandals on his feet, and the governor went downstairs for his noon meal

He was an ambitious, crafty man, a strict pragmatist. trained to the disciplines of the Roman legions, determined to exploit every opportunity for advancement. He had a taste for devious methods, as shown by his use of disguised soldiers in crushing the Jerusalem protest, by his surreptitious nighttime erection of the imperial standards in Jerusalem, by his later bloody ambush of a group of Samaritans - methods paralleling his collusion with Temple officialdom.

An Alexandrian philosopher of the times, Philo, says Pilate was a "naturally inflexible and stubbornly relentless' man who committed "acts of corruption, insults, rapine, outrages on the people, arrogance, repeated murders of innocent victims, and constant and most galling savagery

Jesus himself, in Luke 13:1 mentions "the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices." Although details of the episode are lacking. the implication is that a number of Galileans had come to Jerusalem to make their festival offerings and while they were at worship, Pilate's troops fell on them and massacred

them on the spot. They may have included Zealots, a faction of Jewish patriots which flourished in Galilee and which advocated armed revolt against Roman domination. "No ruler but God," was their motto.

One of Jesus' apostles was a Zealot. The Romans called them the Sicarii, so named for the short, concealed daggers many of them carried. They had fomented resistance Rome installed Herod the Great as king, with thousands of them crucified in Jesus' boyhood

The outbreaks continued under the Roman procurators. eventually mounting into an allout but unavailing war against the occupation regime.

Pilate, following the massacre of Jerusalem protesters against his use of Temple funds had again inflamed local feeling by having gilded shields dedicated by him to the emperor hung in Jerusalem's Herodian

When he spurned pleas to remove them. Herodian princes complained to the emperor Tiberius in Rome. Tiberius sent a message sharply rebuking Pilate for his "rash innovationand uncompromising manner, ordering him to remove the shields. The memory made Pilate wince.

Dining now in the shade of a terrace awning. Pilate had finished his mushrooms and pig's liver and was sipping a goblet of wine when again his ears caught the noise of a procession on the slope entering the city's eastern gate:

This time, it was a real bellringer. Pilate stepped to the balustrade, watching uneasily.

A huge, ecstatic river of people lined the road into the Sheep gate, waving leafy branches, spreading fronds and their own garments along the way, shouting, "Hosanna!" It meant, "Save us!" In the midst of the adulation, a bearded man rode astride a burro, a knot of men following him.

'Hosanna! Son of David! Blessed be he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel! Hosanna in the high-

They seemed beside themselves, enraptured at the approach of some longed-for moment, shouting those phrases implying restoration of the old Judean monarchy. Pilate tapped his "vitus" stick nervously

on the bannister. The demonstration obviously had been organized in Jerusalem in advance to produce such an enormous turnout. This was not just a welcome of relatives

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to rural pilgrims. It was an extensively planned, widely supported display of Jewish yearning for a new order. Pilate sent agents into the

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

Should you encounter a rattler, the safest thing to do is to remain perfectly still or edge slowly away. The worst thing you could do is run, or shout, or make a quick motion. You only excite the snake, making it

The snake is not really the vicious and cunning creature with a deep seated hatred of man that many people think. It is really a rather timid and retiring creature that only wants to be left alone. But the snake will react to man as it would to any big and threatening creature.

card major suit opening. Her statement is, "Whenever possible I open the bidding with whether the suit has four or

five cards. Then she gives an example of a very successful use of an opening spade bid with a

weak four-card suit. The hand was supposedly playing in a pairs event. Her opening effectively stole the spade suit from her opponents and after South's three no-trump - bid · West couldn't lead a spade and led his long suit to collect six tricks in it right off the bat.

At all other tables South played in spades and made 12 tricks. Most were in game; a couple of pairs just got to a part score while some hardy souls actually bid the slam.

This hand certainly shows merit to the random fourcard major suit opening. Five-card majors can produce just as devastating examples of bad results due to this type of opening.

We will continue to stand by our own theory which is to avoid four-card major openings as much as possible, but not to leave them entirely out of our bidding

### Knit Yourself A Casual Cover-Up

#### By JUDY LOVE

The warm lazy days of ummer are on their way Whether you're relaxing at some resort or right in your own backyard, a casual knit is always a perfect cover-up.

A pretty picture you can make yourself is this sleeveless, shorty dress bedecked with see-through patterned crochet circles. Properly pretty, yet utterly feminine you'll barely cover-up that healthy glow of your summer suntan.

This A-lined little dress looks lovely for sizes 10 all the way up to 16, worked in a fresh crisp white or any summer pastel. Work your cool and casual knit with a pair of No. 3 needles and a' No. 1 crechet hook. You'll make a test piece first, of course, to be sure you obtain the proper gauge before you begin your dress.

working in simple stockinette stitch and finish off the armholes, neck and shoulders before going on to the front. If you'd like your dress a bit longer, simply work more rows along the bottom. The front is easy stockinette too, except for the lacy circles, crocheted in different size rounds.

Block the pieces to measurements and press the cro-chet circles. Now join the front and back and baste in the circles before you machine stitch them.

Now the final neck border is crocheted in a chain stitch. You have the option of lining your dress, if you wish. For a breezier, peek-a-boo look, leave out the lining and simply hem the armholes and

KNIT KNACKS Dear J. L.: Last winter I knitted a lovely, long which I wore all spring. Now I feel that it's too long, and would like to shorten it, but am afraid to cut it off. Can you advise me of the best method to follow? Thank you. L. B., NYC, N.Y.

Dear L.B.: With the changing world of fashion it hard to keep up with the lat-est trends, and it's especially trying to knit something you like and then have to worry about "modifying" it to keep pace with fashion. But it's easier than you may think.

Begin by stitching (with a sewing machine) several

half inch above the line you plan to cut along. You may then cut with no worries or fears of unraveling or dropping stitches. Allow yourself enough excess to turn the hem under, but not too much, or you'll end up with a too thick hem.

Then simply turn up to the desired length and stitch up. You can also use this method "add" buttonholes to a garment if you forget to do so when you are going along, or if you want additional buttons. It's wonderfully simple and much easier than tearing out rows of stitches. Just be sure to top stitch the opening where you've cut your buttonhole to have a finished look

It can come from adherence to God-given law -

How do you expect to reverse as opposed to man-made law

Mr. Mathias went on to say that "when a democratic government is imperiled by loss of confidence, it follows that the people must feel some lack of confidence in themselves. Corrosion attacks throughout the whole system. The challenge to leadership is then the restoration of trust in government and the renewal of faith in the nation." Incredible Waste In Welfare

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) - For

sheer horror stories in waste. inefficiency and the unequal treatment of the poor in this nation's welfare programs, I recommend the reading of a dry but fascinating "Paper No. 6. Studies in Public Welfare" - a staff study by the Subcommittee on Fiscal Policy of the Joint Economic Committee of Congress.

The report was based on a General Accounting Office sampling of six selected sites in the poverty areas from east to

Pertinent conclusions from that study help to explain why President Nixon and a growing number of senators and representatives are determined

how this country distributes assistance -Some families on welfare

may end up with twice and sometimes three times as much income and benefits as otherfamilies in apparently similar circumstances.

Households receiving five or more benefits - about a fifth of the samples - are generally well off, if aid in kind is included. In fact, in eastern and western cities the average total income figures exceeded the \$6.500-a-year adequate income level advocated by the National Welfare Rights Organization. Yet there are large pockets of extreme poverty. With the proportion being as high as 14 per cent at two sites:

In a great number of cases perhaps in most, the poor are severely handicapped for working, certainly at working more than a limited number of hours a week. The more a beneficiary works, the higher the rate of reduction in benefits. usually, under current programs.

Combined cash, food, housing and other benefits for urban households with children (but having no private income ran from \$368 to \$767 per month. These tax-free benefits exceed the median wage levels for fulltime working women, which range from \$303 to \$512 monthly in the five urban areas studied. and either exceed or approximate after tax wages' for men, which vary from \$387

to \$564. Thus the sheer dollar nagnitude of the benefit packages would encourage

work by recipients -Increases in Social Security benefits make some of the neediest beneficiaries worse off than before because they may lose entitlement to medical and

-Penalizing some aid recipients for refusing valid job offers may be partially offset by a public housing authority lowering the family rents to reflect the income decreases

caused by the penalties imposed. for not being willing to work. +Contrary to prevailing opinion about the characteristics of welfare recipients, many households benefiting from need-based ben'efits are headed by employable males, or have no

children or consist of single.

non-age individuals. The inequities noted above result in some measure from he incredible tangle in administration of these programs as outlined in the General Accounting Office studies. GAO found that reach agency or program administrator typically keeps separate records on its clientele. This means that a given family may turn up in the records of four, five, six or more

programs. With so many programs, the GAO staff had to visit at least 20 agencies at every site. frequently having to search several beneficiary files within an agency. Filing systems differ by geographic area and by methods for identification of

beneficiaries.

### H. L. Hunt Writes LAW BILL OF

RIGHTS OFFICERS

The Supreme Court has recently shown flashes of common sense in dealing with the "rights" of criminals, but a long road must still be traveled before balance is restored in the courts. Meanwhile law enforcement officers continue to suffer from the special privileges accorded to lawbreakers.

In an attempt to alleviate this problem, a group of constructive Congressmen has introduced-H R 4599 guaranteeing civil rights to all state and local law enforcement officers. The bill, an amendment to the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, is entitled "Law Enforcement Officers Bill of Rights." This legislation would provide a system for handling the grievances of law enforcement officers as well as statutory protection for their constitutional rights.

Congressman Lawrence Hogan of Maryland, a co-sponsor of the bill, points out the need for this legislation

The Courts are being ever more generous and meticulous in granting to accused criminals every right. protection, safeguard and benefit that can possibley be imagined ... our courts have hamstrung our law enforcement officers with reel upon reel of red tape. They find themselves targets for every conceivable kind of abuse, physical as well as verbal, and yet in most cases. they have been denied any

protection or recourse. If something is not done to help our law enforcement officers, said Congressman Hogan, respect for the law "will continue to deteriorate until we are living in a jungle of unchecked predators." Law enforcement officers protect the innocent against those who would harm them. These dedicated public servants deserve our gratitude and our

Under adequate medical supervision this is no prob-

Your friend is partially correct in saying that one of the features of untreated severe pernicious anemia is a psychotic response. However, discontinuing B-12 under medical supervisión is not likely to cause such a problem for you. If you begin to get significantly anemic, the doctor will know it. He will then be able to test you and find out by the response of your blood count whether or not you really have pernicious anemia. In other words. I think that you are worrying needlessly about your doctor's sugges-

Fonda-Type Propaganda WASHINGTON — Actress "Hanoi Jane" Fonda is being hoisted with her own bitchy petard.

sources, the voluminous material consists of detailed transcripts of her anti-U.S. harangues and tirades. It is being widely circulated among members of Congress most of whom were unaware of the virulently hostile character of her vituperations.

Illustrative are the following highlights:

Transcript of a July 17, 1972. broadcast over Hanoi radio: "This is Jane Fonda, and I am speaking particularly to the U.S. servicemen stationed on the aircraft carriers in the Gulf of Tonkin. One thing you should know is the these bombs you are dropping on this country are illegal. They were outlawed by several conventions of which the United States was a signatory. Use of these bombs or condoning the use of these bombs make one a war criminal

"The men who are ordering you to use these weapons are war criminals according to international law. The women and mothers in the United States are weeping for the damage and death and destruction which is being caused to the mothers of Vietnam. Very soon even the people in the United States who have not yet spoken out will be admitting that this war is the most terrible crime that has ever been created against humanity.

"I visited a hospital today, the Bach Mai hospital. I saw a huge bomb crater in the center of the hospital. It was obviously dropped there on purpose. Why do you do this? Why do you, follow orders telling destroy a hospital or to bomb a school?

On Dec. 24, 1972. Fonda was guoted in Vietnamese over the Hanoi Domestic Service as saying: "I am Jane Fonda. I am in Hanoi. All of us know that you? Vietnamese friends, are fighting for a just cause and the truth. Why is Nixon, while speaking of peace and ending the war, sending more U.S. planes to Vietnam and bombing on a scale unprecedentedly massive in the history of war Because Nixon is trying to check the people's war of the Vietnamese people, 90 per cent of whom are peasants intent on regaining power, determining their own destiny and acquiring land and plowing and planting for themselves.
