Plane Crash Kills Family

DRIPPING SPRINGS, Tex. (AP) - Investigators examined the wreckage today of an airplane, littered with Easter eggs and baskets, which crashed Sunday, killing six members of an Austin dentist's family.

The victims were identified by Cook-Walden Funeral Home at Austin as Dr. Jack Lyon, 38; his wife Georgann, 34; their daughters Allison, 11, and Mindy, 8, and sons Jack, 6, and Mike 3

Their Beechcraft Bonanza slammed into an open pasture on the Crisp Ranch, eight miles from here, scattering parts over a half-mile area. The plane was en route to Austin from McAllen when it crashed during a period of heavy cloudiness and rain squalls around 4:30 p.m.

One wing was found 100 yards from the fuselage. The engine was 60 to 75 yards distant Bodies were strewn about the area along with gaily-colored Easter eggs and baskets. The two boys remained strapped in the fuselage



Top Italian Moviemakers Trying To Film 'Inferno'

Italian moviemakers are trying to involve the Soviet Union in what they call the most ambitious and gigantic project ever filmed-Dante's "Infer-

Director Franco Zeffirelli, who filmed "Romeo and Juliet." and Producer Alfredo Bini say cultural officials in Moscow have expressed interest but have given no firm commitments

The two said they hope to involve as many major actors and countries as possible in an epic screening of the 14th-century Florentine poet's phantasmagorical view of hell. The film is expected to cost \$8 million to \$10 million and to

show masses of people-many

of them naked-as well as land-

scapes of the desert, forest, and

caverns, ballet choruses and a lot of special effects. Zeffirelli and Bini noted that varied landscapes and outstanding dance companies are abundant in the Soviet Union. They said they hoped to do some shooting in Moscow, using such

troupes as the Bolshoi and loiseyev They also indicated the Soviet Union might like to get a piece of the action, and prestige, on what they feel will be a big money maker promoted and distributed around the world.

OEO are questions and assessments. The OEO may have been symbol and command post of the poverty war, but it never controlled all of its programs. lost many of them to other agencies and never directed more than a fraction of the war's budget. In eight years, it spent \$12 billion while all federal aid to the poor in the same period totaled \$132 billion. And, as to the questions, precise figures are hard to come

The federal bureaucracy never came up with a yardstick. acceptable to both critics and backers, that could measure the cost effectiveness of various programs, but some key circumstances may be cited:

-The General Accounting Office, the congressional watchdog agency, reported this month that \$207.9 million out of \$5.4 billion in OEO grants from 1966-72 had been inadequately documented or spent in unauthorized ways. At the end of 19u2, the GAO said, \$113.4 million of the questioned costs had been determined to be allowable. \$25.7 million were disallowed and \$68.8 million remained un-

that the accounting and financial management of its projects were no worse than some other agencies

-Within a year of its inception. OEO said it was spending \$785 million to help, directly and indirectly, 4.9 million poor By 1971, the agency had been stripped of many of its programs, but through its Community Action Agencies said it was serving eight million persons at a cost of \$1 18 billion.

-Between 1964-69 the Census Bureau's estimate of the nation's poor dropped from 36 million to 22.5 million. The total started to climb again in this decade and reached 25 million

To the late President Johnson, the five-year drop was a measure of success in the war on poverty. But no one is prepared to say how much of the decline resulted from OEO and other federal programs and how much from general economic trends in the nation.

-Welfare roles didn't dwindle. On the contrary, by June 30, 1971, about 14.3 million Americans were on welfare at a cost of \$10 billion annually. That was twice the people at three times the outlay as in 1960.

It seemed a startling and, to many, a wholly contradictory development. But OEO-initiated Community Action Agencies, which Nixon wants killed and Legal Services offices took it as a responsibility to inform the needy of what they could receive under welfare programs. As a result, OEO programs had a far greater initial effect at getting people on relief rather than off it.

-The war on poverty coincided with rioting and looting that seared many poor, black neighborhoods in cities across the nation in the mid-to late 60s. FBI statistics showed the rate of serious crime doubled between 1964 and 1971, another the public, says the first Cansocial indicator related to pov-

-Some of the poor appeared to be using OEO in a push for political power as much as economic improvement. Community Action Agencies led that fight, and in some cases friction between the newly organized poor and public and elected officials produced a flood of complaints to Washington.

OTTAWA (AP) - Interpol, the International Criminal Police Organization, has been tracking down international smugglers, counterfeiters and killers for nearly half a century

Investigative work, and a lot of it, is done for Interpol but it is carried out by police forces in member countries, none working under the label of Interpol.

The agency exists to help countries hunt down international lawbreakers and to advance law enforcement within participating countries, particularly smaller and less-developed nations.



'A Splendid Little War' (1)



On Feb. 15, 1898, the battleship U.S.S. Maine blew up in Havana Harbor, the United States declared war on Spain, Admiral Dewey sank the Spanish fleet at Manila, Teddy Roosevelt charged up San Juan Hill and that was that.

Three-quarters of a century after the Spanish-American War, to many Americans this brief summary remains the extent of their knowledge about the conflict which launched the United States on the world stage as a power to be reckoned with.

And in some ways, that was that. In terms of campaigns and battles, it was, in the phrase of later Secretary of State John Hay, "a splendid

Far more men were to die from yellow fever contracted in Cuba and in the ensuing "pacification" of the Philippines, whose existence was hardly known to Americans before the war, whose revolt against Spain had nothing to do with the war and whose annexation came almost as an accident of the war.

It was also a war with comic opera aspects. It was a war in which newspaper reporters, who did so much to inflame popular feeling against Spain, performed espionage missions, led charges and accepted surrenders and whose own "navy" shadowed and sometimes got in the way of warships of the fleet.

It was a war with just enough fighting and

just enough deaths to make it a real war, with just enough heroes and just enough glory .-

Nevertheless, the Spanish-American War had effects on history far out of proportion to its size or duration. As a consequence of it, the United States acquired Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Guam, the Philippines and a virtual protectorate

America's shortest war was also the cause o a national self-examination similar to that occasioned by its recently concluded longest war. Indeed, the war in Vietnam can itself be called a distant sequel to the events of 1898.

Thus the neglected, little-understood Spanish-American War has great relevance for Americans



Trevino, who actually took a two stroke lead at one time. couldn't hang on. His 67 was the best round of the warm, sunny day but his 277 total was one stroke too much to record the victory he needed to become pro golf's fourth \$1 million winner.

"Well, there's next year." Trevino said. "I've always said Nicklaus is the greatest golfer. in the world. Any time I can beat him, I'm lucky.

But the challenge seemed to serve only as a spur to the 33year-old Golden Bear who now is the season's first three-time

Will Hanoi **Take Over** The South?

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) - An analysis of the data indicates that at this time and in the near future it is unlikely North Vietnam could successfully achieve a military takeover in the South - however flagrantly Hanoi flouts the truce

This conclusion assumes North Vietnam is indeed mounting a large-scale build-up both within and along the principal borders of South Vietnam

Likewise, barring some unforeseen domestic disruption in the South, the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese are too weak and divided for a political takeover in the near future

Hanoi's top strategists are aware of these facts. This is clear from a careful analysis of reports out of North Vietnam Hong Kong and Tokyo.

With a situation as hopeless as this one, and with opinion as divided as in Hanoi at present. Asian Communist theory as developed by Mao Tse-tung and Ho Chi Minh calls for a slow building of a base for victory at results when overwhelming some future time.

To accomplish this building. North Vietnam requires three

1. A. safe supply line. preferably by sea. 2. A stockpile of weapons at ___ strategic spots.

3. An assortment of small bases for equipping and training underground

REMEMBER THE MISSING INACTION

With the release of the last U.S. prisoners of war, at least those officially admitted by Hanoi, many people assume that the whole issue of our prisoners of war and missing in action can be forgotten. The fact remains that over 1,300 of our men who fought in the long Vietnam conflict are still unaccounted for, listed as MIA. missing in action.

Some of these men, of course. have never been and will never be found by anyone. They lie beneath the sea or in the jungle, having given the supreme sacrifice for the cause of freedom, but others are reported still alive and hidden deep in the jungle.

Years after the Korean War it was learned that significant numbers of our men listed as missing in action there had actually been captured and held by the enemy. This is even more likely in the case of the Vietnam war, since Hanoi has maintained the pretense that it has nothing to do with the communist forces in Laos and Cambodia which have captured some prisoners

I am 69 years old, run two miles every morning (which I have done for years -recently cut down from five miles, weigh 145 pounds stripped, am 5-foot. 10-inches tall. What should I do?

Dear Reader - Congratulations on maintaining such good health all these years. am sure that there are many individuals much younger than you who couldn't run two miles any morning and their level of wouldn't be safe for them to do so. Regular physical activity and keeping your weight down are great aids in maintaining good health.

You probably have the common type of inguinal hernia that results from protrusion of a loop of small intestine through a weak spot in the abdominal-wall where the cord to the testicle passes through. These are fairly common. For an individual who is in good health, as I assume that you are, probably the best thing to do is have corrective sur-

Sanford's McGovern' Tactic Rebuked by Strauss Regulars By ROBERT S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - Former Gov. Terry Sanford's yearning presidential hopes will need a lot more stoking than they got at the meeting of the Democratic Charter Commission to make real headway by 1976.

The North Carolinian, now head of prestigious Duke University, was repeatedly and firmly clipped.

That's the significant untold backstage story of this gathering.

Apparently Sanford's aim was to get control of the commission's 22-member executive committee as a power base to further his White House ambitions .. which are not generally known but very active.

Masterminding this wily plan was Rick Stearns, a top McGovern lieutenant throughout the South Dakota radical's primary and election battles, now ghostwriting his book about them. Sanford, whose 1972 presidential ballon never got off the ground, was one of the few Southern leaders to actively support McGovern.

But the Sanford -Stearns strategy, modeled after McGovern's which enabled him to grab the 1972 nomination, didn't-come off.

It was decisively torpedoed by a potent coalition of party regulars and anit-McGovern laborites headed by National Chairman Robert Strauss. They made it forcefully clear they are securely in the saddle and didn't intend to be mapeuvered out of it.

The coalition put up a 22-member slate for the 22-member executive committee and elected it.

As chairman of the Charter Commission, Sanford is also head of the executive committee. But control of that key panel is now firmly in the hands of Strauss and his anti-McGovern bloc.

Clearly there is to be no repetition of the guidelines, quotas and other tricky procedural manipulations which made McGovern's coup possible

More Of Same Another significant score by the regulars was adoption of a resolution that opens the way for, in effect, ditching that 1974

mini-convention. Pupo e of that scheme ammed through by McGovernite activists at the 1972 convention, was to insure their continued control of party machinery from top to bo

It is now headed for discard. Instead of a turbulent and disruptive "mini-convention" in July or August of 1974, Strauss's plan is to hold a "conference" next February or March-and thus get the potentially trouble-breeding affair safely out of the way before the start of the state and congressional

elections. That's what the Texan will propose to the National Committee when it meets later this year-confident it will be approved.

Also quietly scheduled is a meeting this June or July of the Charter Commission's newly-elected executive committee where more weighty housecleaning is contemplated Definitely slated to be junked




physicians But this sexual stampede is toward Alice not a new malady that is attacking youth

Unions No Longer 'Voluntary'

A trade union, according to my dictionary, is "a voluntary association of wage earners. organized to further or maintain their rights and interests through collective bargaining with the employer. especially for improving wages.

hours, and conditions of all? employment." Now, my dictionary is 13 years old-perhaps old enough to be retired. But if more recent editions have not dropped the word "voluntary" from their definitions of trade unions, I

suggest that it is time to do so. What is voluntary about a union shop that requires a worker to join the union if he works at certain jobs or for certain employers? What is voluntary about a union that gives workers no choice and allows no elections as to whether they want any union to

represent them? What is voluntary about a union that has acted to withdraw products from the market and to deny the housewife the opportunity of a choice of the products she wishes to buy?

What is voluntary about aunion that, through economic coercion, has forced hundreds of small businessmen either out of business, or out of the particular line which the union

controls-and as a result. reduced the supply of available .jobs, reduced the supply of certain foods on the grocer's shelves, and contributed to the rising food costs?

Are these things characteristic of a volunteer movement seeking justice for

The United Farm Workers, led by Cesar Chavez, is an outstanding example of a union that has reached its position of power through tyranny-through tyranny over the grape and lettuce growers; tyranny over the food chains and grocery stores that bring the food to the housewife and consumer; tyranny over the housewife herself; and, perhaps worst of all, through tyranny over the very workers that it professes to represent.

The union refuses to allow free elections by farm workers to decide whether they want a union to represent them Experience showed that they will not voluntarily join. So Chavez turned to a secondary boycott of California table

Thanks largely to eastern churches and limousine liberals who jumped onto the grape wagon, the impact of the boycott was felt, and grape growers began to fall in line and sign the contract. The workers

had no choice.

The grower did have a choice. He could sign the contract, or, if he hired no labor, pay tribute to Chavez for the privilege of using the union label on his produce so he could sell his crops; he could switch to other crops that can be picked by mechanical equipment and that do not need field labor crews; or he could simply quit farming

Many took the latter course 'Hundreds on hundreds" of growers didn't survive the grape boycott, according to Jack Angell, of the American Farm Bureau Federation. As a result, fewer than 700 carlots of table grapes moved to the eastern markets during the peak season of 1970, as compared with 1200 carlots in

In 1970, little more than half as many California table grapes were produced as in 1969.

according to Angell. Now Chavez has turned to the growers of iceberg lettuce. Where I live, the union's attention is centered on Safeway stores, where pickets parade and hand out propaganda that the Company has labeled as libelous "Frivolous" lawsuits against Safeway have been filed.

'If successful, the results of the lettuce boycott will be the same as the results of the grape

go out of business; some farmers will switch to other crops where fewer or no workers at all are needed; the number of jobs will be reduced; the amount of lettuce available to the housewife will be reduced, therefore contributing to the already sky-rocketing prices of food products.


