Public hearing for the city budget for the fiscal year is set for Tuesday evening at the city hall, and unless the trend is changed, probably the commissioners and a few other officials will be all on hand to hear the proposed document discussed.

New "Continental Divide"

FORT WAYNE, Ind.—Army engineers at Bear Field, new air base in Fort Wayne, have found a miniature "continental divide"—right down the middle of the field. Water draining from the west side of the field eventually flows into the Gulf of Mexico; water from the east side, into the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

The Mistake, Boys, Was Letting The General Catch You At It

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 7 (AP)—Boisterous greetings to short-circuited girl golfers brought some 1,500 soldiers back along a hot, 150-mile trail to Memphis today to make amends to their general. Several units of the 85th division passed through Memphis yesterday on route back to Camp Robinson, Ark., after participating in Tennessee war games. Lieutenant General Ben Lear, second army commander, was getting on a Memphis course as the troops rolled by. Several girls died in shorts also were playing and many of the soldiers whistled and called to them, setting off a noisy demonstration. General Lear, army sources said, considered the troops conduct a "severe breach of discipline" and immediately stopped the column, remonstrated with the officers and directed that the convey be allowed to continue to Camp Robinson and then be sent back here at once. The soldiers had no sooner reached camp last night than they were ordered to re-fuel and about-face to Memphis. It was understood that the column and its officers would face General Lear here this afternoon for possible further disciplinary action.

US Shipments Stepped Up

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Although Germany has marked part of their route verboten, United States ships bearing lease-lend cargoes were reported today to be reaching the British Middle East command at the rate of almost one a day. Deliveries of munitions from tanks to bombers have been accelerated to this schedule in less than two months, for it was on May 9 that the maritime commission disclosed that arrangements were being made to start the first shipments. Authoritative officials with knowledge of the lease-lend program's progress revealed yesterday that between 20 and 25 American ships were now sailing each month for Egyptian ports via either the Atlantic or Pacific routes to the Red sea. This was the first specific information on the subject. It tended to bear out the guarded testimony given to a senate committee recently that a "huge amount" of lease-lend material had been shipped to the Middle East, to China and to India. The shipments going to Egypt must pass through a zone in the Red Sea which the Germans have declared an area of active operations in their counter-blockade of British arms. The United States has not recognized the Nazi proclamation of the area, and the American-flag ship apparently have been negotiating it without loss.

Lawes Retiring As Sing Sing Warden

OSSING, N. Y., July 7 (AP)—On a bleak winter day 21 years ago an automobile bearing a grimacing passenger drove through the grounds of a great cluster of gray buildings on the Hudson river. It was the Christmas season and although New Year's Eve was near, the man in the car was far from gay. He was Lewis E. Lawes and the scene was Sing Sing prison, where he was about to become the new warden.

Wool Market

BOSTON, July 7 (AP)—(US Dept. Agr.)—Wool was very quiet today in the Boston market. Asking prices, however, were very firm despite the quiet trade. Graded territory wools were quoted, on a scored basis, at \$1.05 for French combing, length fine and \$1.01-1.03 for staple combing one half blood, at 90-94 cents for combing three-eighths blood, and at 84-87 cents for combing one-fourth blood. Combing bright three-eighths and one-fourth blood fleeces were quoted at 45-48 cents, in the grease.

City Soaked By Downpour

Big Spring came near a "flash flood" Sunday as an intense and wind-driven thunderstorm poured out more than an inch of water in a short space of time. However, the U. S. weather bureau at the airport reported only .29 of moisture. Southeast of town neither of the city lakes caught any more water. Northeast showers were light. In town it was a different story. Running streets turned into a river that bounded over the curb and sidewalk at E. 3rd, coming within a few inches of getting into the La More shop. Detention dams, which were still giving off streams of water past noon Monday, were credited with having prevented heavy damage. Immediately south of the city drains in the park area went on a rampage and fed such a volume into the T. & P. lake that it shot over the spillway until past midnight. Elbow creek was reported to have been out of bank at points in the territory southwest and Lomax community had heavy showers. Northwest of town, particularly in the old Hilway community, the fall was estimated up to two inches. In other sections, the fall was either light or spotted. George Neal suffered slight injury when a bolt of lightning struck among a group of golfers at the Muny golf course. George Choate, who had been brought to the ball park in his wheel chair, had to wait several hours before he could be removed when the storm struck heavily and inundated that area.
