

'He resigned from the Navy and with royalties from his first book and pharmaceutical and surgical equipment donated by manufactures, he organized his own independent medical unit and returned to Indo-China.

Tom's plan for a medical mission on an organized working basis with medical teams operating throughout the world became a reality with theestablishment of Medico (International Medical Cooperation). Dr. Albert Schweitzer became honorary chairman and many people believe Medico was the forerunner of the Peace Corps. In August of 1959, Dooley was

operated on for cancer. The last year of his life seemed incredible. He published a third book, opened new medical stations in Laos, made multiple fund-raising speeches, lectures and TV appearances.

Recent Changes Concern Adopted Child Benefits

One of the recent changes in social security resulting from the 1972 amendments concerns adopted children.

According to Howard L. Weatherly, manager of the Pampa Social Security Office. adoption of a surviving child beneficiary by someone other than a close relative no longer results in the child's benefits

being terminated. Prior to this change a child receiving benefits based on a deceased parent's work would have his benefits ended if he was adopted by someone other than a brother, sister, aunt, uncle, stepparent, or

One other important feature of the change is that children whose benefits were previously terminated as a result of their adoption may now be



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

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# Inflation Spurred By Shortage

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) - A worldwide shortage of grain, meat and assorted other foodstuffs will make it exceedingly difficult for President Nixon to bring inflation under steady control in

the year just ahead. Mounting worldwide price inflation in some key raw materials this country must import in increasing amounts -such as petroleum-adds to Mr. Nixon's problems.

These are pressures, it will be noted, which no president can bring under control.

Supply and demand have their ups and downs, making some temporary price slowdowns; or even dips. possible Isome experts say quite likely). But the long-range trend is up, and much more sharply than in the historic past, though perhaps no so rapidly as in the last two years.

Last year's worldwide grain failures virtually exhausted reserve stocks. The international crop outlook at this time appears better for this year. But without reserve supplies, the grain-shortage countries are not likely to take chances. This caution, if nothing else, will likely serve to hold prices at high levels.

The world hunger for meat exemplified by the rapid increases in demand in Japan, the Soviet Union and elsewhere. plus the growing appetite for beef in this country, keeps the heat on the prices for beef, pork, mutton and all protein foods generally. (Thus the increased demand for soy beans, for example

The Middle East countries have learned that by banding together they can get more-and more-for their oil. Add the growing energyscarcities in the United States and it becomes crystal clear that the driving force in oil and gas prices will be steadily upward through this decade.

Then there is the worldwide pressure among workmen for higher pay. In a growing number of nations wage rates have been moving up with unprecedented speed for the last five to eight years. These increased payments to workmen, however much deserved, will certainly force higher prices for the raw materials this country buys

This American vulnerability results, of course, from the overseas sources for a long list of materials. Today, this country imports almost 30 per cent of its oil and gas, a third of its iron ore. 87 per cent of its bauxite and alumina, all of its chromium, two thirds of its mercury, almost all of its manganese, plus majoramounts of a range of other raw social thought of Pope John

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# Question Box

QUESTION: Politicians in the state and national government are always talking about tax reform. They say they want to get the wealthy people who have large incomes and pay little or no tax, and to ease the burden on the "working people." How is this possible when in the long run the working people pay all the taxes

ANSWER: We are afraid the politicans are engaged in the age-old practice of trying to fool the people. They cannot be so ignorant that they believe the rhetoric that they are uttering.

Politicians of all types for as long as can be remembered have been promising to "give" people more and to reduce taxes. And some people have voted for these promising: politicans, only to find that when these people are elected they are no more magicians

than their predecessors. Currently, those in political office are hipped on the idea of reducing real estate taxes, and replacing them with some other form of taxation. These shifts in taxes always are just shifts, and the people continue to pay,

usually more than they did before

Once in awhile a political figure proposes that the way to reduce taxes is to reduce government spending However, when any specific spending cut is proposed, the people who have a vested interest in that particular program raise a howl and usually the program is either continued or expanded Some half-hearted suggestions have been made in Washington and Sacramento, but little or nothing has been done.

Until the people are willing to demand cuts on government spending, even at the cost of their own favorite project, we are afraid there will be no tax reform that has any meaning.

Dear Reader-I am happy to hear that you're doing better but I'm not convinced hat you have heart disease. Many digestive problems can cause chest discomfort. Only a competent medical examination can separate these problems. Recent scientific investiga

tion of vitamin E has failed to establish that it has any role in treating acute heart attacks or preventing coronary artery disease. Some individuals, of course, get much better while they're taking vitamin E but they may have gotten better taking empty gelatin capsules. Lyndon Johnson had a heart attack when he was Senate majority leader at age 46 and recovered to engage in years of active living thereafter, without vitamin E. President Eisenhower is another outstanding example. Many individuals who have good recoveries are even physical activity. This has been well known long before the recent surge of public in-

terest in vitamin E. Nitroglycerin can cause a headache when you first start taking it. As one adjusts to the dose this reponse disappears. Nitroglycerin can also relieve spasm of the esophagus which causes chest discom fort resembling heart attack), so relief does not confirm a diagnosis of heart dis-

The real danger in adopting the attitude you have is that if you really had a heart attack the most critical period is within the few hours after pain starts. Getting competent medical attention immediately often makes the difference between life and death. By resorting to selfmedication one eliminates the best chance for a good

# **BRUCE BIOSSAT** Watergate Feared As General Taint

WASHINGTON (NEA) -Great concern is developing in political circles that Watergate may touch off an epidemic of fault-finding which could mar in some degree even the cleanest

My recent conversations here and in New York with political specialist and with some of the evidently cleanest governors I know (Republican, it happens, in this instance) brought out this heightened worry. None wants to sweep

Watergate under the rug or pretend that there is not deep popular distrust of politics and government, not to mention most other U.S. institutions. Neverlthless, these men fear that, carried to its ultimate, this contagion of distrust could

prove grossly self-destructive in American society. Indeed, there is some feeling that the momentum in this direction is already almost irresistible. What, for example, are. Americans going to do about choosing a president in 1976? Go

"outside the system" and find

some magic Mr. Clean to

occupy the White House? Where? In the business community where so many leaders are bing faulted for transgressions ranging from financial shenanigans to polluting the atmosphere? In the medical profession, where some prestigious doctors get nailed for income tax evasion and overcharging is considered common? In the academic world, where professors steal each others' research and fight like alley cats for status and

advancement? The politicans currently troubled by the contagion of distrust are doubtful, then, that any quest for outsiders will turn up a spotless hero. And the 'clean' governors I spoke to think that neither they nor any other visibly shiny politican could escape at least faint smudging from the sort of scrutiny to be expected in a 1976 presidential race.

The view is growing. therefore, that any quick switch to some magically pure realm. separated sharply from the ugliness which Watergate symi olizes in extreme form, is the sheerest illusion.

The pragmatic expectation of these men is that the 1976 presidential nominees of both major parties will be drawn from the catalogue of

For seasoned campaigners are willing to say, for instance, that Watergate has crucially crippled the hopes of either Vice President Agnew or presidential confident John-B. Connally - or that the remembered wounds of Chappaquiddick incapacitate Sen. Edward Kennedy decisively for the coming race.

Maybe men like Republican Gov. Nelson Rockefeller (so conspicuously wheathly as to be above financial suspicion) or clean-looking Democratic Sen. Walter Mondale of Minnesota are advantaged - but maybe
