

Fusion Surgery Helping To Relieve Back Pains

CHICAGO (AP) — About a quarter of all Americans have bad enough backaches to go to a doctor about them.

For a fraction, surgery is required, sometimes involving fusion of a portion of the spine.

Over the past few decades, the time in bed required has dropped for some patients to a day or so, compared with the two or three weeks or even months they formerly were kept down.

The time still varies, however. Those who require more extensive fusion — involving several vertebrae — have, of course, to stay in bed longer.

There are indications that a recently developed enzyme which can be injected in the spine for certain problems with the disks may further reduce the need for spinal surgery.

This enzyme, called chymopapain, is derived from papaya. It is being used in only a few medical centers, pending further approval by the Food and Drug Administration before it is generally available.

Dr. Leon L. Wittse, a faculty member at the University of California Medical School at Irvine and staff member at Long Beach Hospital, said in an interview that orthopedic surgeons try to treat backaches conservatively, trying to relieve the pain without turning to surgery.

"We're not fusing nearly as

many spines as formerly," Wittse said, although he added that some orthopedic surgeons might disagree.

Fusion involves transplanting part of the ilium found in the hip bone, or of the tibia, the calf bone, to the spine to stabilize a diseased or injured portion. Artificial devices, such as metal rods or plates and springs, also may be used.

Dr. Paul R. Meyer Jr. a member of the Northwestern University Medical School faculty and director of the spinal cord injury unit at

Northwestern Memorial Hospital, said spinal fusion today is most commonly used to correct idiopathic scoliosis — curvature of the spine from an unknown cause.

Meyer outlined several other conditions for which fusion is sometimes required. Among them is degenerative arthritis. This occurs in everybody, starting in middle age, and does not cause any problem in most people.

Carrol Ray, providing transportation for any guest.

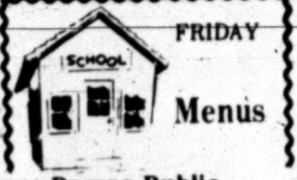

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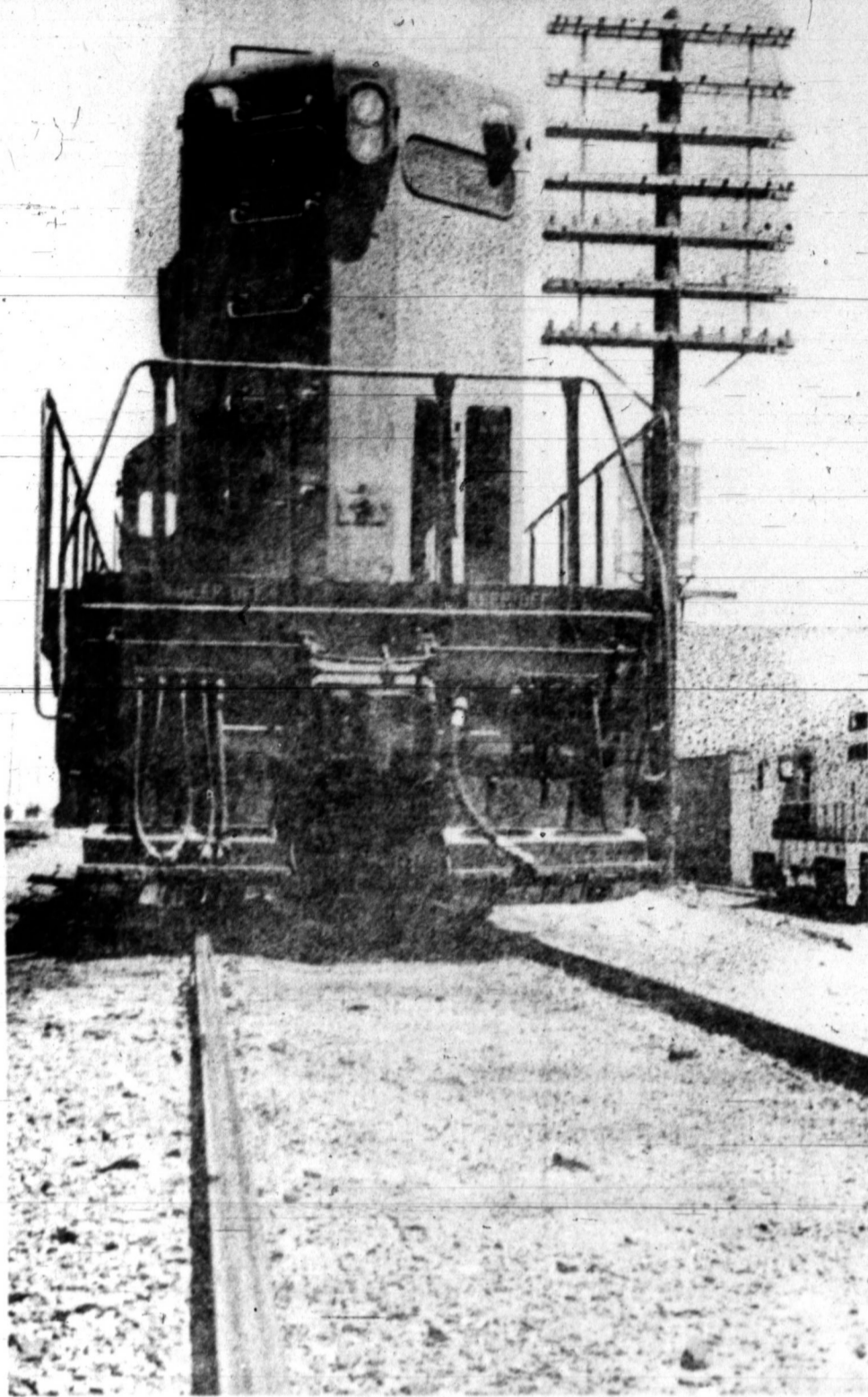
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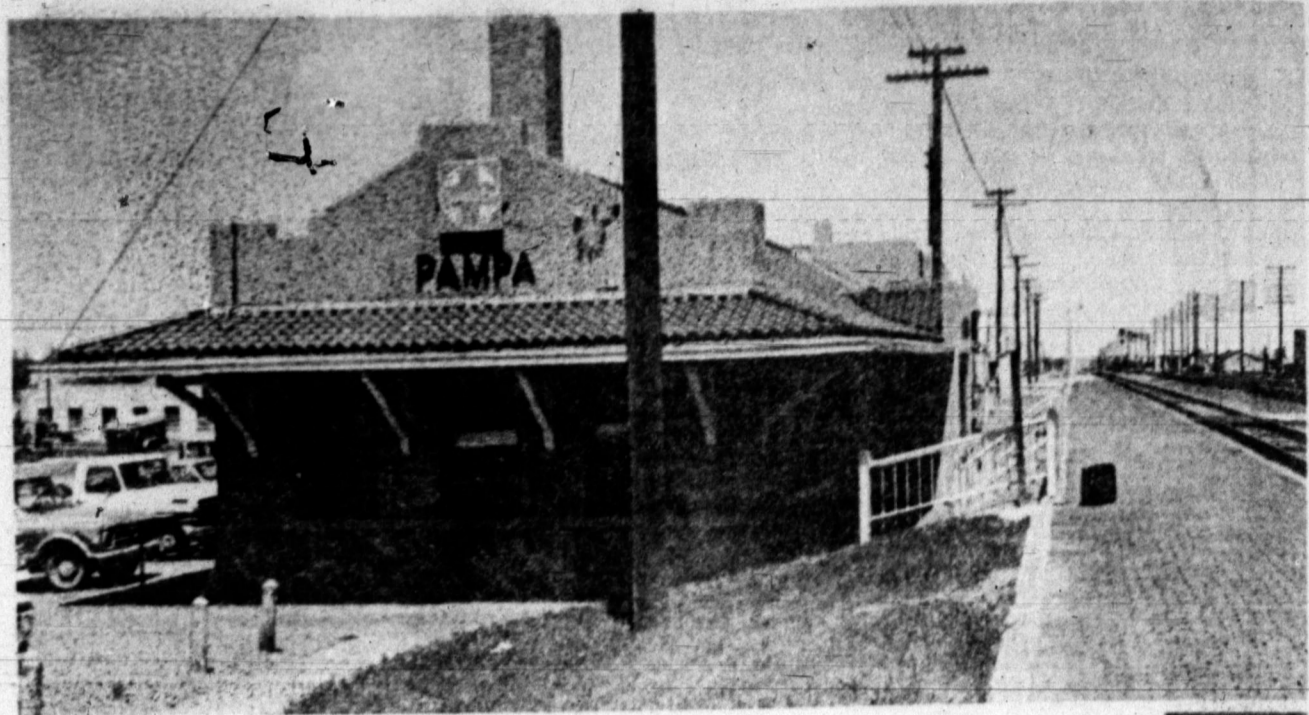

Santa Fe laid track to Pampa in the early 1900's as the railroads of America helped pioneers to settle the frontier. As other means of transportation grew through the century and economy became foremost, passenger service to Pampa was stopped in May of 1970.

The station is quiet now -- except for the switch engine crew which plies local industries and the crew which operates the rail welding yard.

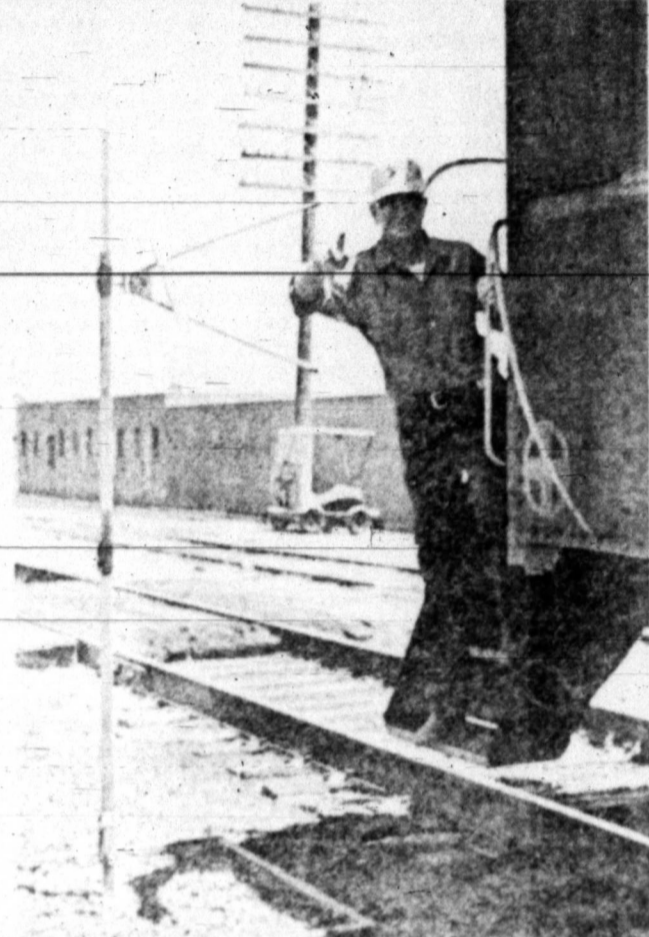
Two tracks run through Pampa, the east and west main. The freight trains which run on these tracks don't even slow down going through the town anymore, quite a contrast to the hustle of earlier days.

But even with the decrease in activity at the station, safety has become the watchword in and around the engines and trains. Automatic alerters in the engines of the train automatically lock on the brake in case the engineer falls asleep or has a heart attack or suffers other similar circumstances.

Safety is also exercised when a switch engine gets on one of the main lines. Before the engineer can proceed on the main line, the controller in Amarillo is notified and he instructs the engineer how long he has until the next train comes through.

In case, however, a train slips the controller's attention and gets on the track, automatic signals at the Price Road crossing on the west and the Danziger crossing on the east trigger to stop any train coming through.

Safety devices also indicate breaks in the track and other irregularities which would cause a wreck. At Santa Fe safety is still first.

ENGINE NUMBER 2922 rests in between switching. The 2922 weighs 210,000 pounds and originally cost \$250,000, 15 years ago when it was new.

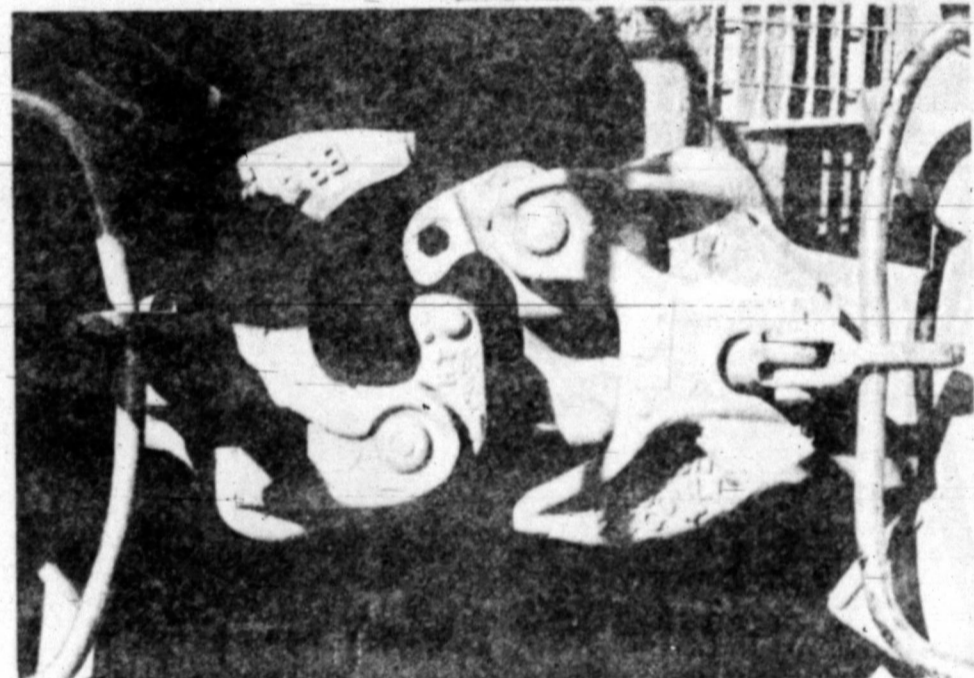
PAMPA RAILROAD station watches the trains go by as a solitary suitcase reminds us of its past passenger days.

Soviet Bloc Prices 'Stable'

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — While consumers in the West were suffering from inflation last year, prices in most of the Soviet bloc remained stable or dropped, the United Nations reported Wednesday.

Very little success, if any, can be claimed for anti-inflationary policies in Western Europe, the Economic and Social Council declared in its 1972 Economic Survey of Europe.

It reported a 6.9 per cent average rise in consumer prices in Western Europe, compared with 6.4 per cent in 1971. It said it was "highly disturbing" that the biggest increase came in the second half of the year.

Higher production in late 1972 should have caused the rate of

inflation to drop. Instead, it was pushed up by a sharp rise in food prices and relaxation of price controls in several countries, the report said.

The Communist countries of Eastern Europe recorded unchanged or lower prices, the report said, except for Hungary, where controlled prices were boosted by three per cent.

Retail indices in Bulgaria, East Germany and Poland remained unchanged, while official price changes brought drops of 1.2 per cent in the Soviet Union, four-tenths of one per cent in Czechoslovakia and one-tenth of a per cent in Romania.

The figures also showed that living standards improved in

Eastern Europe. Although crop failures reduced the Soviet economic growth rate from 6.4 per cent in 1971 to 4.9 per cent in 1972, national income increased nine to ten per cent in Poland and Romania, seven per cent in Bulgaria and five to six per cent in East Germany and Hungary.

MORE FOR DEFENSE
CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — South Africa has earmarked Rands 477 million (\$630 million) for defense in its latest budget compared with Rands 335 million (\$472 million) for the previous year.

The largest single segment of the new budget is Rands 177 million (\$249.5 million) for arms procurement.

Fraternity Censured

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — A fraternity that reportedly raffled off a topless dancer at a wild party has been censured and placed on a year's probation by Stanford University officials.

Phi Delta Theta's rush party last April, which featured five topless dancers from a nearby nightclub, "went beyond the bounds of acceptable behavior," Associate Dean Larry W. Horton said in a letter of censure.

Top GOP Leaders Back President

WASHINGTON (AP) — The two top Republicans in Congress emerged from a meeting with President Nixon Wednesday to declare he has popular support and has reassured the nation he had no involvement in the Watergate scandal.

Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott said Nixon's Tuesday disclaimer of involvement was "forthright, categorical and strong" and that "he has clearly reassured the country."

House GOP Leader Gerald Ford said, "in my judgment the American people are behind the President."

The leaders were asked if at any point they had advised Nixon on congressional sentiment

regarding possible impeachment or the wisdom of a Nixon resignation.

"We don't deal in the incredible and the unbelievable," Scott replied.

The leaders reported that Nixon wound up a two-hour meeting with 22 Senate and House Republicans by restating his Tuesday argument that vital national security interests dictated presidential moves that the chief executive said have led to "grossly misleading impressions."

The GOP legislators gave Nixon a standing ovation as he left the Cabinet Room meeting.

Asked about continuing reports of paralysis in government because of preoccupation

with the Watergate scandal, Scott said, "I believe it has not affected legislation." He said congressional Democrats have acted very responsibly in the legislative arena.

Taking a somewhat different tack, Ford said "if there is any slowdown in the government right now, I think it is in the Congress."

Blaming the Democrats who control Congress, Ford expressed dismay that the House has passed but a single appropriations bill—the one financing legislative activities—with the end of the 1973 fiscal year barely a month away.

Scott said five ambassadors from other countries expressed satisfaction to him Tuesday

night that, in their view, Watergate was not adversely affecting the nation's position in world affairs.

The Pennsylvania senator described Nixon as "strong and of good heart and of high purpose" and argued that the country is stronger today than yesterday and will be stronger next month than now.

Scott and Ford said the agenda for the meeting was pending agricultural legislation and bills to clear the way for early construction of the Alaska pipeline. Scott quoted Nixon as telling the group:

"We need the oil. We need it now...it's not a choice between Alaska and Canada. We need Alaska now."

Home-Cooked Meals 'Twice As Good'

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — Even with meat prices still up, a home-cooked meal costs half as much and tastes twice as good as a meal prepared from packaged food.

That's what I found out when I cooked the same meal twice—once from convenience foods and once from scratch.

What surprised me, though, was how difficult it was to get all those little tins unwrapped, into the oven and onto the table all at the same time while preparing the packaged meal. In a way, it was more work than mixing my own salad dressing, appetizers and soup.

To provide the four people to eat the four servings for which most recipes are written my

husband, and I invited another couple to join us.

The menu: cheese puff appetizers, potato soup, lettuce salad with Thousand Island dressing, beef stroganoff, mashed potatoes, broccoli with cheese sauce, biscuits, brownies and coffee.

The cost for the packaged meal was \$9.22. Most of it was discarded as waste cardboard and tin foil. From scratch, using butter and fresh vegetables and meat, the meal cost \$5.81.

The project was inspired by a local newspaper item written during this spring's meat boycott. It noted that a check of neighborhood grocery stores showed that sales of TV dinners and other heat-and-eat foods

swung upward as meat sales fell off.

What happened, the article asked plaintively, "to home-made chicken soup swimming with noodles?"

The menu included more starch than nutritionists might advise, but packaged food tends to be starchy and I based the menu on what could be found packaged.

All the food was bought at the local Jewel Tea Co. supermarket where I ordinarily shop and, to my knowledge, none of the food was on sale that day.

The frozen beef stroganoff, \$1.09 for an individual 8-ounce serving, probably contained no more than four ounces of beef, according to a butcher in the

meat department. Actually, it looked like even less on the plate and contained quite a bit of gristle.

Twelve frozen cheese puff pastry appetizers, which I approximated with 15 cents worth of processed cheese, butter and flour from a "Joy of Cooking" recipe, cost 99 cents.

"I don't know where they found cheese that heavy," my husband said, lobbing the lump from one hand to the other.

The broccoli in the little plastic pouches wasn't bad. But the cost, 46 cents each for two packages, compared with 35 cents for a pound of fresh broccoli covered with 19 cents worth of cheese sauce.

Unlike the home-cooked

meal, which left us all full nearly to discomfort, the packaged meal seemed to be mainly filler. The mashed potatoes had the consistency of wallpaper paste and sat like a rock in my stomach.

A consumer advocate's nightmare, they were little more than a powder which still had to be mixed with milk and butter.

After the second meal, we all agreed the difference in flavor was well worth the three hours spent in preparation.

But I'm a working woman, and the savings, which worked out to about \$1.50 per hour, would not justify the time were it not for the quality.

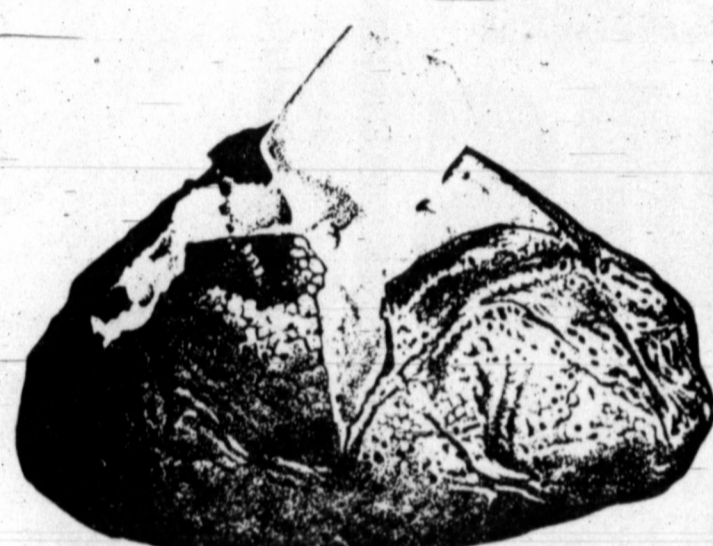

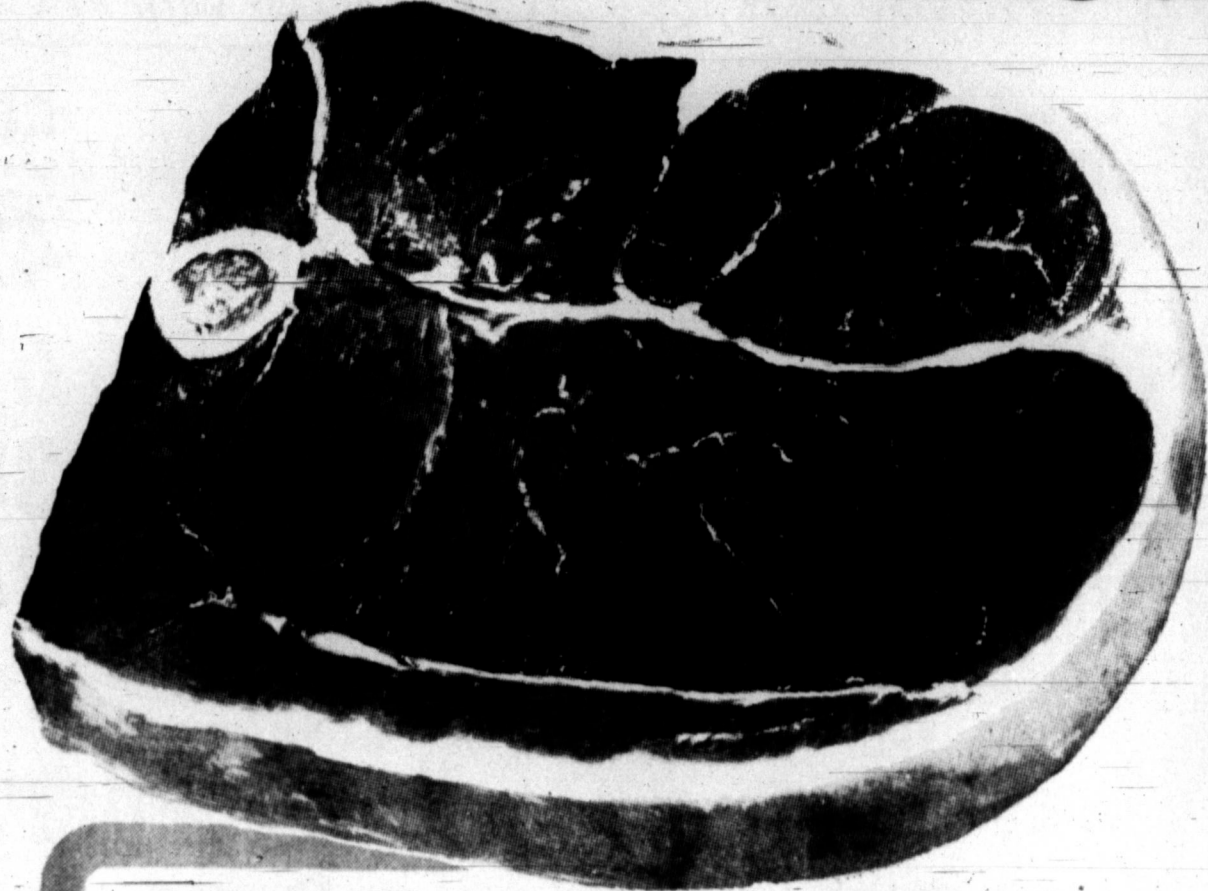
