**Higher Gas Tax Studied**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz said Tuesday the Nixon administration is considering a proposal to raise gasoline taxes.  
Shultz, speaking at a news conference for economic reporters, also indicated that the administration has under study other tax-increase proposals to help cool the rapidly expanding economy.  
As for the gasoline tax, Shultz said it is "one of the many things we are reviewing all the time."  
He said there are pluses and minuses connected with the proposal and stressed that no decision has been made. The federal tax now is four cents a gallon.  
Asked later if the administration is leaving the door open to general tax increases as a tool to help cool the economy, Shultz said only that there is a debate going on.  
Shultz said the administration has to manage carefully the problem of cutting in half the present fast rate of economic expansion. Raising taxes is one method.  
President Nixon, during last year's campaign for re-election, committed the administration against boosting taxes.

**Atlantic Richfield Urges Public Ecology Concern**

LOS ANGELES — Atlantic Richfield Company today announced that the thrust of the company's national advertising would be directed entirely toward urging the public to help overcome problems of air pollution, traffic congestion and energy conservation.  
The announcement said that "for the foreseeable future" Atlantic Richfield would sponsor a series of television messages aimed at developing "genuine concern and prudent action among the nation's motorists to meet environmental and energy crises."  
The new series began showing in the East last month and made its debut before Western audiences just last week, a spokesman said.

As originally planned, the messages, concerned with "quality of life," were introduced in a mix with promotional advertisements. However, said the spokesman, the company has responded to current fuel supply shortages and elected to devote its

national advertising to the new messages.

"It doesn't make sense to promote more gasoline consumption at a time when both government and industry are talking about the necessity of fuel allocations to insure supplies to priority users," the spokesman commented.  
The tone is set in the key televised message by Thornton F. Bradshaw, president of Atlantic Richfield. Viewed against a background of heavy highway traffic, he notes that the company is in the business of selling gasoline and comments: "We also want to sell you on getting rid of this kind of traffic mess. There are simply better ways of moving people in and out of our cities — even at the expense of the automobile."

Bradshaw adds the company's messages are "statements of our concern — about pollution, the energy crisis, the big gap in mass transportation, and the limitations of the automobile — each requiring solutions to make our earth more livable."

The spokesman noted Atlantic Richfield has for a "considerable period of time" been bringing issues of public concern to the attention of opinion leaders in printed advertisements.

In other segments of the television series, Atlantic Richfield encourages motorists to help reduce air pollution by "not stomping on the gas, and by keeping our engines in proper tune," and urges conservative use of electricity to avoid depletion of natural stores of energy.

Additional messages are still under development. One will portray what life could be like in the future if air pollution should drive city dwellers underground. Another will cite the benefits of walking instead of relying solely on the automobile as a means of transportation. In this message, an announcer will urge viewers to "See the world at 3 miles an hour."

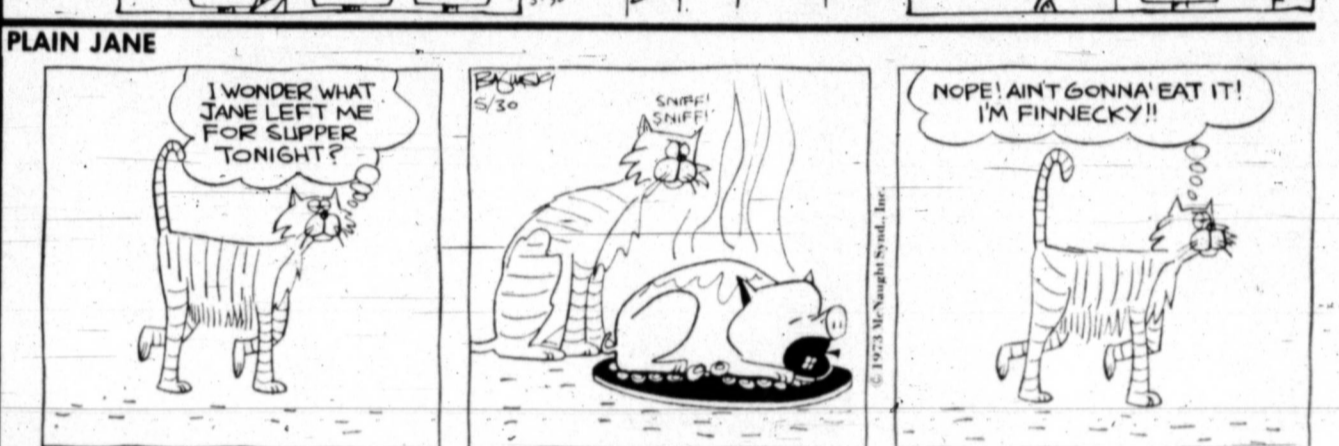
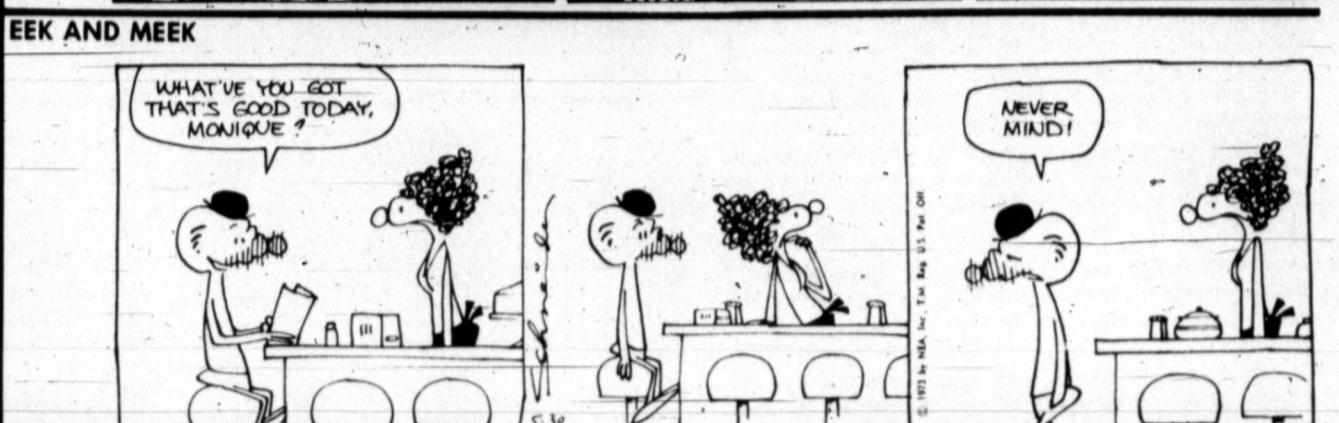
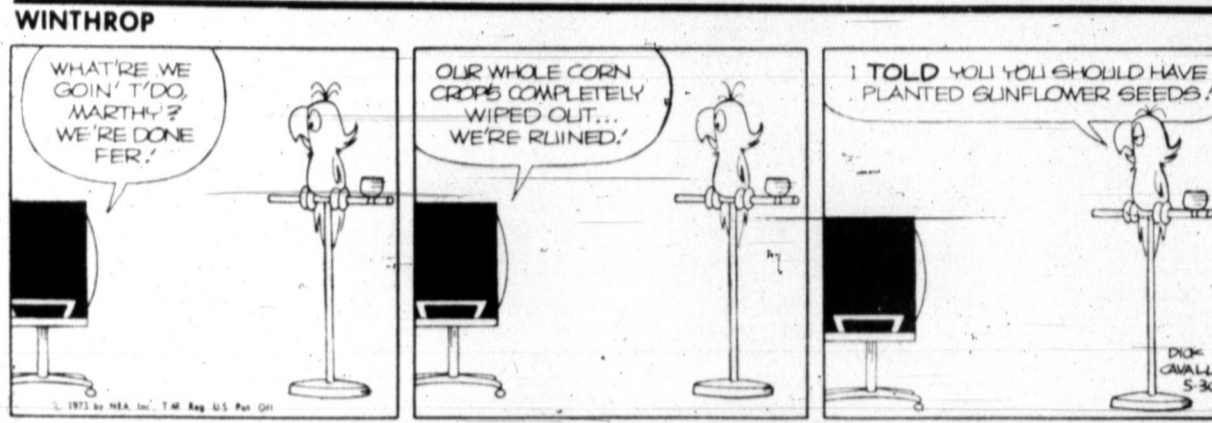

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## Traffic Signs Are Plentiful in Vienna

VIENNA (AP) — Do Austrians or Germans really need more traffic signs than people of other countries? Vienna officials obviously think motorists here do. Some 60,000 traffic signs are up in this city of 1.7 million people, and a number of motorists complain they confuse rather than help regulate traffic.

Rudolf Koller, head of the City's Public Works Department (Stadtbaudirektor) — told reporters at a recent news conference it was his impression people in Anglican and Roman countries thought "more natural and less complicated."

In Austria and even in Germany, officials want to leave nothing to chance and want to have a sign for every possible situation. "This fascination with accuracy leads occasionally to a number of paradoxical situations," he said.

One such situation is a 100-yard stretch of street in Vienna which has five signs.

After an intersection, the first sign says "no parking." Then there is a bus stop with a sign indicating that the "no parking" zone has ended. The next sign indicates the bus stop. A few yards later, a new sign says the "no parking" zone is resumed and a fifth and last sign at the next intersection says the "no parking" zone has come to an end.

Koller said that as far as he was concerned, two signs — one for the start of the "no parking" zone and the other indicating the bus stop — would be enough.

While Koller allowed that some traffic signs may be unnecessary, a Vienna councillor, Maria Schäumayer, was not so sure.

She said last year some 5,000 new traffic signs went up. She blamed increased motorization and large-scale construction work on Vienna's subway system for it.

The subway construction has led to a great number of detours, she said, adding that detours have to be clearly marked, thus requiring additional traffic signs.

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## Television And Radio

NEW YORK (AP) — This month's televised Watergate hearings posed two problems for the world of daytime TV. One was a small but growing backlog of game shows and soap operas taped in advance of their actual appearance on the tube.

That problem was two-thirds solved Friday when the three networks agreed on a trial arrangement in which only NBC will carry start-to-finish live coverage of next Tuesday's hearings. CBS will take over the next day and ABC Thursday.

The second problem still exists and is far more serious. Network staffs remain on red alert to keep in correct sequence the daily soap operas pre-empted by live TV coverage of the hearings.

It would never do for a soap opera couple to end the day's saga with pledges of eternal love, only to reappear after three days of Watergate hearings embroiled in a fistfight over child custody.

When the hearings aren't on, the CBS, NBC and ABC networks are broadcasting a total of 31 soap operas and game shows each weekday — 15 soap operas and 16 games per day.

All but two are taped in advance — one day to two weeks for the game shows — and network officials late last week said production of them still is proceeding apace.

It means that with a few exceptions, each day the Watergate show is televised live, another batch of daytime shows is backing up in the vaults.

With only five televised hear-

ings so far, the videotape backlog situation is far from acute, according to network officials. It's the future number of televised Watergate sessions that worries them.

The hearings, which began May 17, forced the only two live soap operas on TV — CBS' "As the World Turns" and "Edge of Night" — to switch to videotape. There was no sense having their casts just hanging around, waiting for Watergate to let out.

"Edge" is the more vulnerable of the two to Watergate pre-emptions because it normally starts at 2:30 p.m. EDT, a half-hour before the customary start of the afternoon Watergate sessions.

As of last Thursday, it was taping its episodes a full week in advance. A CBS spokeswoman said it wasn't known yet when the show would go back to live broadcast status.

"As the World Turns," seen at 1:30 p.m. EDT, was in better backlog shape. It only was being taped two days in advance and is scheduled to go back on live duty next Monday, the spokeswoman said.

Like the unwelcome thump of a flat tire, the reality of the gas shortage now begins to prey on the minds of motorists accustomed to driving as though there were always more fuel to-morrow.

Warnings went out early that drivers who took to the highways for the Memorial Day weekend might have to shop around for gas to get home.

Most of them made it because there are still huge quantities of gasoline available. But

## Gas Shortage Preying On Motorists

The locked service stations and gas rationing encountered by many underscore that the supply is not quite enough.

Demand for gas has been increasing seven per cent a year, and traffic counts continue to grow. At the same time, many major oil companies say they do not have enough crude oil and have begun allocations to dealers based on 1972 sales.

"Not many months ago we were hounded by salesmen wanting to sell fuel. Now you have to scrounge all over the place," says Ray Alderson of Yellow Freightways in Kansas City.

Transit officials seek bids for fuel and get no replies. State troopers in Florida have been ordered to cut back mileage. Taxi drivers in a Des Moines, Iowa, fleet have been told not to turn on their air conditioners.

The effects of the shortage have been felt or feared for weeks by many whose livelihood depends directly or indirectly on motor fuel. But there is little evidence that car owners have curbed personal driving.

Most drivers contacted in a pre-weekend Associated Press

survey said they did not plan any changes in driving habits or vacation plans. The question is whether they will have to.

A handful of stations were limiting customers to five gallons over the weekend. Many independent and major stations have cut back hours or closed Sundays.

The Office of Emergency Preparedness last week reported 882 of the estimated 220,000 stations in the country were closed for lack of gas. Another 1,863 were threatened with shutdowns, the OEP said.

Generally, the independents are most affected. They captured a quarter of the market over the past decade by buying surplus gas from major oil companies and selling it at 2 to 10 cents a gallon less than the standards.

One federal official calls them "a very helpful competitive spur." Under a voluntary allocation plan that the administration announced three weeks ago, the major oil companies were urged to "share the shortage" among their stations and the independents.

Industry sources say the shortage is essentially the re-

result of limited supplies of crude oil and limited refinery capacity.

An opposite view is voiced by California Assembly Speaker Bob Moretti, a Democrat. He notes that U.S. refineries operated "at less than 75 per cent capacity last year" and listed record first quarter profits this year.

Is it coincidence that the shortage occurred "during a period when the oil industry is pressing for the Alaska pipeline, relaxation of other environmental safeguards, resumption of offshore drilling... and preferential tax loopholes?" he asks.

While the debate goes on, Illinois officials have set up a hot line for farmers needing fuel. An Iowa gas tank company is selling more storage tanks to farmers than ever before.

The diplomatic phrase "laissez-faire" means hands off, no intervention.
