WASHINGTON (AP) - Presdent Nixon flew to Iceland today for talks with French President Georges Pompidou, hoping to dispel any fear of Uncle Sam's playing a bully-boy role in Western Europe.

While Pompidou will be pressing for quick action on monetary problems. Nixon will emphasize a quest for a new Atlantic charter '-a set of broad principles and goals for the Atlantic community as it moves toward detailed negotiations in areas of economic defense and foreign policy.

The two presidents, after arriving in the Icelandic capital of Reykjavik, plan separate meetings with leaders of the. host-country. Their own two days of talks are to begin-

Senate Wants Bombing Halt

WASHINGTON (AP) - An overwhelming margin on a test vote indicates the Senate is ready to pass a sweeping amendment to bar all funds for continued U.S. bombing of Cambodia

Sen. John G. Tower, R.Tex. said the President's backers wouldn't filibuster against the measure. But a GOP source said he doubted final action would come today, though both Republican Leader Hugh Scott and Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield have expressed hopes that would be possible

Republican supporters of President Nixon, defeated 55 to 21 on Tuesday's test vote, sought to draft amendments to weaken Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton's antibombing amendment which was attached to a \$3.2 billion supplemental money bill.

The test came on a procedural matter and was approved de pite arguments the Eagleton amendment could jeopardize renewed U.S. North Vietnamese peace efforts. The action was the strongest sign vet that Congress, and especially the Senate, wants a halt to U.S. military activity in Southeast Asia.

For the first time a majority of Republicans, including some conservatives who had been loyal to Nixon, joined with an overwhelming number of Democrats to vote against administration policy.

Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan, the assistant Republican leader, said adoptionof the Eagleton amendment approved unanimously by the Appropriations Committee two weeks ago, would be "a futile exercise that can damage the negotiations in Paris and do great damage to the rules of the Snate as well

Thomas Bradley, a black whose Texas sharecropper parents came to Los Angeles 48 years ago seeking "a better life," has

unseated Mayor Sam Yorty. The soft-spoken Bradley, 55, will take office in July for a four-year term and in the process, will become the first Negro mayor of the nation's third largest city

Los Angeles will become the largest U.S. city ever to have a Negro as chief executive. About 16 per cent of Los Angeles' three million residents are black.

HOUSTON (AP) - Two major oil companies said Tuesday they are cutting back the gasoline they sell their service station retailers to a level about roughly that of last year.

Exxon Co. U.S.A. and Gulf Oil Co. both said they were taking the step because of fuel shortages.

"Current assessments indicate the company's supplies of gasoline this year will enable it to provide volumes to each group of customers as a whole equal to the 1972 sales plus some allowance for growth in 1973." the Exxon announcement said.

Gulf said allocations of its premium and regular grades of gasoline in June and July will be limited to the amounts sold in the corresponding months of




THEY'RE GROWING SHRIMP IN TUCSON

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - To get the most shrimp for the money, marine biologists are hard at work at high-and-dry Tucson International Airport.

The University of Arizona has at the airport an environmental research laboratory where scientists are trying to determine the proper water conditions to maximize the growth of captured shrimp.

Carl N. Hodges, director of the university's Environmental Research Laboratory, said scientists hope to find ways to control the marine environment and food supply to grow the most shrimp as fast as possible for food purposes.

"One goal of scientists is to raise female shrimp to the stage at which they'll be able to reproduce. As yet, no one has been able to do this to shrimp in captivity. Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cook of



Bring a Big Check

The franchisers will set you up in business in a doughnut sho'p for around \$12,000-make you the operator of a big-name motel for \$250,000 - or hand you the key to a steak house-andcocktails restaurant for a cool half million.

Those are some of the required investments listed in this year's edition of an annual franchise directory. Inflation alone doesn't seem to be responsible for the rising fees. The trend in franchising appears to be away from inexpensive mom-andpop operations of several years ago. Much of it, today, is obviously big business.

True, the coin-op laundry is still available for \$7,000from one franchiser, although a more elaborate operation with a patented-process drycleaning plant requires a \$26,000 investment, and around \$15,000 is more typical.

Car-wash operations run from \$7,000 to more than \$85,000. Wide ranges like this in several categories indicate the trend toward bigticket investments.

The franchise field is different today in other ways, too. The sizzling franchise boom that started in the '60s has cooled off a lot in the last couple of years, and the excesses that accompanied the great boom left franchising with a slightly tarnished image. Possibly all for the

'A marked trend toward reform," says the publisher of the directory, has resulted in federal and state safeguard legislation that now makes franchise opportuni ties "far more realistic and

Still, the "1973 Directory of Franchising Organiza-

list of investigation and pre vestor, suggesting that caveat emptor is still the watchword in the franchise business.

The publisher (Pilot Books, 347 Fifth Ave., New York City) emphasizes that it is not connected with any franchising organization. The \$2 directory, listing some 700 franchise firms, points out that new companies relatively untested, need especially thorough investigation. And "risks are increasing, as companies crowd each other for the more desirable locations.

Otherwise, things haven't changed much in the last year or two. The fast-food operations - hamburgers. fried chicken, pizzas and the like - still dominate, with more than 125 franchisers listed

As little as \$7,200 gets you a burger and frozen custard stand - or you can go as high as \$102,000 for a burger drive-in restaurant.

For the more cultured, art galleries run \$10,000 to \$30,-000, and \$24,000 puts you in the business of selling simulated 16th-century stained

You can get into the planerental business for \$125,000, or rent water bikes and sailboats (you supply the water) for \$1,000. Car-rental operations run as high as a quarter of a million - though one franchiser offers to start you off with \$3,000.







By BRUCE BIOSSAT WASHINGTON (NEA) Whatever some national poll may freshly discover in a sweep of the country, the growing mood of influential people in this city is that Watergate is thrusting the nation toward a

deep crisis. There may never be universal acceptance of the stock market as an accurate barometer either of the condition of the economy or the national mood generally. But right now its plunge downward is frightening men in both government and

business One businessman told me that just before President Nixon's latest Watergate statement a scanning of the stock market list showed that some 860 stocks most representing major companies - hit new low readings for 1973

He found this stunning when set beside the high economic indicators - a record year so far for automobile production high steel output, high employment and an unemployment rate encouragingly stable at moderate levels (if not dropping dramatically

The conditions unmistakably add up to boom. The one acknowledged great peril is a seemingly ungovernable inflation. Even without Watergate, it is scaring and annoying from the leadership level on down.

But here in the capital, the reading is that the uncertainties posed by Watergate are causing a crisis of confidence of colossal proportions. The plummeting stock market is seen as reflecting fears of governmental chaos more than the dangers of unbridled inflation-In some minds, the two things are closely related.

rumblings of trouble have been growing louder. Washington often is judged to be too self-focused, insulated from the country. But it seems meaningless to argue, if it can be argued, that people across the nation today are less disturbed over Watergate than are concerned leaders and observers here



HHH PREFERS TO BUY FROM RUSSIA

In 1971 constructive Senators and Congressmen, led by Senator Harry F. 

plete medical examination. In some instances, the blockage is localized and vascular surgeons can put an arterial graft of synthetic material around the localized block or replace the blocked artery. By detouring blood around the diseased arteries, normal circulation to the leg can sometimes be restored This operation is not appli cable to all people. If a person has extensive disease in the-arteries of the legs, ex tending all the way down to the foot, it may be impossible to detour the blocked area.

In recognizing some of the things that vitamin E does not do, I think that it is equally important to note what some of these applications are. Its use in leg cramps caused by inade quate circulation appears to have some merit.

Dear Dr. Lamb-We have had discussions with various friends about smoking in one's bedroom before retiring. Most of my friends agree that it is a bad habit. ate some who dis-ee, usually in a heated manner. Would you kindly write one of your articles on this subject? I would very much appreciate it.

Dear Reader - You probably know from reading my column that I wouldn't recommend smoking anywhere, in or out of the bedroom. Smoking in any closed room tends to build up the carbon monoxide level. If there's only one smoker and the room is fairly large the level might not be too high but if you're talking about a small room with poor ventilation and a large number of smokers then it can exceed the levels normally accepted as safe

Blitz to Extend Legal Services Runs into House Roadblock By ROBERT S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - An astounding blitz is underway in Congress to perpetuate the widely denounced, scandal. blackened Legal Services program of the bedraggled Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO)

Legislation to do that is slated to be rammed through the House and Senate this week after the most cursory consideration

It's a crass grease job if there

The backstage record of this high-handed operation. masterminded by Democratic leaders of the House Education and Labor Committee and the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee, is without parallel in recent history. Following are the shocking

details on this bill - to set up a so-called independent corporation to provide legal services for the indigent poor. It would be supervised by an 11-member board appointed by the President, and financed by the government at a cost of more than \$70 million annually -No hearings have been held

on the measure. All efforts to present views were brushed off by chairman Carl Perkins. D-Ky., of the House Education and Labor Committee, and chairman Augustus Hawkins. D-Cal., of the Subcommittee on Equal Opportunity.

Without a word of testimony, Hawkins's liberal packed subcommittee extensively revised the bill to. strip it of virtually all safeguards - such as. prohibition of political activity. specific eligibility standards. participation by local bar associations, etc.

-This watered-down version which leaves unchanged the existing conditions and factors that have so widely besmirched the Legal Services program and subjected it to scathing denunciation was set to be rushed to the full Education and Labor Committee for immediate approval and submission to the House for action the same day. The secret intent was to pull off this coup last Wednesday.

Up to this point, it was a slick and smoothly manipulated scheme that appeared certain to succeed - but it didn't come

Tripped Up Reason was the determined and shrewd opposition of Rep-Earl Landgrebe, R-Ind.

Seizing on the Committee's rule requiring a three-day delay for the submission of a minority report, he effectively blocked the liberals' plan to blitz their doctored bill to the House and then rush it to the Senate for similar speedy approval there. Invoking this Committee rule. andgrebe forced

legislation to go over to this week -- thus adroitly upsetting the Hawkins - Perkins blitz strategy, while he and several other Republican committeemen prepared a forceful minority report... The Committee is heavily Democratic - 22 to 16 a \$600,000 grant Legal Services

Republicans. Also more blacks are on the Committee than any other - Reps. Hawkins. William Clay, D-Mo., and and soaring complaints and Shirley Chisholm, D.N.Y .. Another committeeman is Herman Badillo, a Democratic candidate for mayor of New

Unless the legislation is drastically tightened up. it's headed for veto.

That's the warning by Rep. andgrebe and other Republican committeemen They are serving it flatly and unequivocally.

We know what we're talking about." they are telling Democratic leaders. 'You apparently have the votes to ram this unacceptable bill through, but it won't do you any

good. It will be vetoed by President Nixon and that will be the end of it. You haven't been able to override a single one of his vetos so far, and after being thoroughly licked three times. you ought to know by now you

can't win on this issue. "In the end, we will win hands down. So if you want a, Legal Services program, the only way you can get it is to pass the kind of bill agreeable to the President This version emphatically is not. So take your choice - either legislation with proper safeguards and limitations, or none at all.

The next few days may tell the story in the House. What happens after that in the

Senate is anyone's guess. If as is secretly contemplated the House bill is blitzed through that chamber without, or with only perfunctory, committee consideration, then a

presidential veto would appear

to be definitely in the cards And that would be the end of the smelly Legal Services program - unless Congress backs down and comes to terms with the President.

Good Riddance Discarding of this OEO program would be no loss despite the clamorous agitation of leftists and various other

Howard Phillips, dynamic young acting director of OEO, favors junking Legal Services as completely as he is getting rid of the malodorous Community Action program on which more than \$4 billion has been expended while it compiled one of the mo odorous records in federal history of corruption waste, mismanagement and numerous other abuses and scandals.

In Phillips's forthright opinion, Legal Services is even more discreditable and undestrable than Community Action. That view is emphatically supported by Rep. John Hunt. R-N.J., influential member of the Armed Services 'Legal Services employees

have defended convicted criminals who created riots and demonstrations, and not in poor, who rely for help on this program says Hunt adding indignantly. It is time these so-called do gooders redirect their energies and concern themselves with what they are really supposed to be doing

To divert money from programs for the poor to group political activities is essentially stealing from the poor That sort of chass maladministration must stop. The entire-system that allows it must be sweepingly reevaluated. Legal Services was started by

OEO in 1965, when it was candidate last year, for the officially avowed purpose of-'providing representation which will benefit the poor and help alleviate their problems through legal process:





trians or Germans really need more traffic signs than people of other countries? Vienna officials obviously think motorists here do. Some 60,000 traffic signs are up in this city of 1.7 million people, and a number of motorists complain

they confuse rather than help regulate traffic. Rudolf Koller, head of the City's Public Works Department (Stadtbaudirektor) -told reporters at a recent news conference it was his impression people in Anglican and Roman countries thought "more natu-

ral and less complicated. In Austria and even in Germany, officials want to leave nothing to chance and want to have a sign for every possible situation. "This fascination with accuracy leads occasionally to a number of paradoxical situations." he said.

One such situation is a 100yard stretch of street in Vienna which has five signs.

After an intersection, the first sign says "no parking." Then there is a bus stop with a sign indicating that the "no

month's televised Watergate hearings posed two problems for the world of daytime TV. One was a small but growing backlog of game shows and soap operas taped in advance of their actual appearance on the

That problem was two-thirds solved Friday when the three networks agreed on a trial ar rangement in which only NBC will carry start-to-finish live coverage of next Tuesday's hearings: CBS will take over the next day and ABC Thurs-

The second problem still exists and is far more serious. Network staffs remain on red alert to keep in correct sequence the daily soap operas pre-empted by live TV coverage of the hearings.

It would never do for a soap opera couple to end the day's saga with pledges of eternal love, only to reappear after three days of Watergate hearings embroiled in a fistfight over child custody:

When the hearings aren't on. the CBS. NBC and ABC networks are broadcasting a total of 31 soap operas and game shows each weekday - 15 soap operas and 16 games per day."

All but two are taped in advance - one day to two weeks for the soap operas, a week to a month for the game shows - and network officials late last week said production of them still is proceeding apace.

It means that with a few exceptions, each day the Watergate show is televised live, another batch of daytime shows is backing up in the

With only five televised hear-

log situation is far from acute. according to network officials. It's the future number of televised Watergate sessions that worries them

The hearings, which began May 17, forced the only two live soap operas on TV — CBS As the World Turns" and "Edge of Night' - to switch to videotape. There was no sense having their casts just hanging around, waiting for Watergate to let out

'Edge'' is the more vulnerable of the two to Watergate pre-emptions because it normally starts at 2:30 p.m. EDT, a half-hour before the customary start of the afternoon Water-

As of last Thursday, it was taping its episodes a full week in advance. A CBS spokeswoman said it wasn't known yet when the show would go back to live broadcast status.
