The other day a man who visited me in my office said that if inflation was slow enough, it did not do so much damage. He had not given that statement much thought. Whether those people who are really interested in the welfare of America should make an effort to retard price increases coming from inflation is indeed very doubtful. To do so is probably only to delay the correction. On this subject Mr. Palyi remarks: The reality behind the facade

'disinflations' is that monetary expansion is permitted to continue. but its symptoms are suppressed by multi-fangled controls. It might be sounder, if inflation there must be, to let it run its course, to let 'nature' take care of the cure. bad as that cure is. Outright inflation, if the markets operate freely (which is not the case in Europe, of course), bursts into runaway prices and exchange rates. 






INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT TEXAS
