

# First World Jamboree In England, 1920

was held in England in July 1920. It attracted Scouts from 37 countries including 301 Scouts and 55 adult leaders from the United States. Since then the Boy Scouts of America had a prominent part in furthering world-wide aspects of Scouting.

Scouts served as aides and guides at the Limitation of Arms Conference in 1921. Outstanding civic service included forest conservation and assistance at the Knickerbocker Theatre disaster at Washington, D.C., and floods at Pueblo, Colo., and San Antonio.

In 1923 the Lone Scouts of America, comprising mostly rural boys, merged with the Boy Scouts of America. Where there are insufficient boys in rural areas to form a Scout Unit, a boy may become a Lone Scout, carrying on his program with the aid of an adult Friend and Counselor, There are several thousand such memhers today.

In 1922 the Boy Scouts International Bureau was established in London, Today there are 56 Boy Scout Associations registered by the Boy Scouts International Bureau with a total membership in Mobectic Personals





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## Hidden Factor

Things which go up must come down. This truism, based as it is solely on the law of gravity,

could be applied to the American economy The one thing that has puzzled pundits since the Roosevelt plunder-squander-bund got started in the thirties, is just how high is up. How far can the economy inflate before the deflation or the downward drop be-

A number of otherwise influential economists have come close to wrecking their own futures by predicting, erroneously, just where the invisible apex of that trajectory lies. We all know it must be up there somewhere. But just where it is, is mighty hard to discover.

Without wishing to venture ourselves into this realm of speculation it might be wise to point to a factor in the equation which has thus far apparently escaped attention. This factor is the seeming good that can be done, economically speaking, by a use of stolen funds.

For the moment we are ruling out of the discussion the obvious and oft repeated morality, that in the end honesty is the best policy.

Omitting for the moment any comment with respect to morality, we must point to the inescapable fact that while the government has operated on the basis of legalized banditry, it has, to the detriment of free enterprise and the American system of life, nonetheless accomplished a few economic gains by skillful investing the products of its pilfering.

A million dollars of stolen money invested gainfully in some wealth-producing activity will not cause an immediate sag in the economy, morals to the contrary notwithstanding. The thief who robs us of our hard-earned substance, and who then invests the swag, can create jobs and materials which will benefit the economy, and thus delay the inevitable day of retribution.

We see this as the principal reason why the whole phony stack of cards hasn't already crashed in upon our

The Federal Government with no more moral compunctions than that which motivates a wild onager, has not only robbed us, but has added insult to injury by putting the loot out at interest in flagrant and open competition to us who are still struggling to make up the amount required by the bandit when he pulls his

Having wailed that free enterprise is incapable of handling truly big and extensive projects, the governent burequiret ones to free enterprise and by use of force, displayed or hidden, extracts the necessary mazuma so that the government can do it.

It must be apparent to even the most obtuse that the government can accomplish only as much as the free enterprisers permit it to accomplish by a use of their

So the fallacy that free enterprise can't do it, is revealed as a fairy tale, since it is only the money from free enterprise that does do it.

Then, to flaunt its power in our faces the Government buys a TVA, or an airline, or a gold mine, hires men to work and pays them with more money it loots from us, and competes with free enterprise by providing goods or services which are tax exempt.

But the inescapable conclusion is that a gold mine in operation is still a gold mine. An airline whether government owned or privately owned is a useful adjunct

Thus it is that the Government, in the role of robber baron, has shored up its evil by more than eighty relatively sound economic endeavors. The fact that they all lose money is unimportant, from the standpoint of our exploration here

None of them is a total loss. And out of the gains they do make, enough is salvaged to keep the nation's economy from concerted collapse.

It is obviously time for us to assay the economy on the basis of morality. If we want a nation in which some people (Government) have the right to plunder other people (the rest of us) then we are heading in the proper direction. If we want a nation in which nobody plunders anybody, then we had best get back to the Golden Rule, the Ten Commandments, the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence just as fast as we know how.

## Coalition Is Only Hope For Conservatives In U. S.

It is now becoming quite clear that those who believe in conservative government, in such principles and practices as a balanced budget, states rights, and the right of the individual to carve out his own destiny and choose his own future rather than have these things planned for him, have no way to turn so far as the presently constituted leadership of either of our political parties is concerned. Their only hope is in a coalition between conservative members of Congress from whatever region of the country they represent.

For 20 years prior to the present administration, there was a definite effort on the part of previous administrations to lead us into national socialism. This in face of the fact that the Democratic platform of 1932 was one of the soundest and most conservative ever presented to the people of this

The President also ignores any mention of a balanced budget or a \* redeemable currency. Instead he endorses flexible monetary and debt management to help the economy. Federal public works, particularly highway construction, are presented on a grand scale.

Evidently, this Administration has also been converted to the belief that prosperity is created by the Government and not by the people. That is the philosophy of socialism. It has never succeeded




