
Dulles Affirms

Pineau's Choices Back Out US Will Defend

Still Incomplete

PARIS, Feb. 17 - UP-Two members of the Gaullist party backed out of Socialist Christian Pineau's newly formed cabinet Thursday. but he said he still planned to seek national assembly approval Friday

The two Gaullists were Gen, Edouard Corniglion-Molinier, slated as minister of justice, and Pierre Ferri, named as minister of posts and telegraphs.

The Gaullists party balked the Pineau coalition but said the two men could go ahead on a personal basis. Thursday they decided to go along with their own party after conferring with party leaders.

Pineau had formed his cabinet early Thursday after many hours of conferences with political leaders. Withdrawal of the Gaullists threw last minute snags in his efforts to end the 13-day-old crisis, but he said he would try anyway

Blunt Statement Warning To Reds

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 -- UP -- Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' blunt warning that Red China shall not shoot its way toward Formosa was equally a warning to the Western European allies of the United States.

Beyond that, it was a reassurance to the American people that the military might and diplomatic efforts of this country would not again be hog-tied, handcuffed and sewed in a sack, as in the recent Korean war.

Dulles spoke Wednesday night in New York before the Foreign Policy Association. He strongly implied that the United States would fight if Red China sought to make the near-shore islands of Quemoy the seizure of Formosa. 
NEA Food and Markets Editor Now that eggs are so low in price, recipes using eggs are important. We select these two that use monosodium glutamate, a powdered agent for bringing out the flavor of the ingredients used in the recipe. It does not add flavor of its own, it brings out flavors already in the recipe. Both the French and Chinese have been using it for centuries.

Souffle Topped Cauliflower (Serves 4-6)

Trim and wash large head of cauliflower; separate into flowerets. Cook in boiling salted water just until barely tender, drain, reserving liquid. Arrange flowerets in single layer in greased 8x8x2inch baking dish. Make sauce with 3 tablespoons each butter or margarine and flour, 1/2 cup reserved auliflower liquid, and 16 cu cream. Add 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheesee, salt and pepper to aste, and teaspoon monosodium glutamate.

Cool, then blend in 2 slightly beaten egg yolks; fold in 2 stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread evenly over cauliflower; dust with paprika. Bake at 425 degrees F. about 20 minutes, until lightly browned. Corned Beef Hash Casserole (Serves 6-8) Mix 2 (1-pound) cans corned

beef hash, 2 cups (firmly packed) grated soft bread crumbs, 2 slightly beaten eggs, 1/2 cup milk and 1/4 cup chopped onion. Season with salt and pepper to taste, and 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate. Pack into greased 8x8x2-inch baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 hour. Remove from oven. cess American cheese. 



STUFFED LAMB SHANKS 6 lamb shanks

2 tablespoons lard or drippings 1 teaspoon salt

14 teaspoon pepper 2 cups water

14 cup barley Brown the lamb shanks in lard or drippings. Season with salt and pepper. Add water, cover and simmer until tender, about 11/2 to 2 hours. Remove meat from broth. Cool and remove bones. Cook barley in lamb broth adding water if necessary. Stuff lamb shanks with cooked barley. Thicken remaining lamb broth with flour for gravy. Pour gravy over stuffed shanks, cover and cook on top of range or in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until heated through.

Better Grades With Better Breakfasts



This young gentleman smiles over his breakfast of orange juice, whole wheat flakes with prunes and milk, buttered French toast and honey, and hot milk beverage. A month of breakfasts like this and his report card will be better. A new scientific study of boys 12 to 14 years of age, made at a distinguished medical school of a leading mid-west university, has shown that boys get better grades, do better work, and have better attitudes from better breakfasts. Of special interest to mothers who are re-establishing eating habits

and regular meals after the vacation period are these conclusions from the experiments:

1. Maximum work rate and maximum work output were significantly less in the late morning hours during the period when breakfast was omitted.

2. It was the consensus of the school authorities that the omission of breakfast exerted a significant detrimental effect both on the attitudes and scholastic attainment of the boys who followed this practice during the time they were in

3. The subjects showed no significant change in body weight whether they ate no breakfast or a basic cereal breakfast, so long as their total caloric intake per day was not changed.

The conclusions drawn from the study of boys 12 to 14 years of age not only confirmed many of the findings which applied to young women and young and old men, but demonstrated that, for the most part, the good breakfast habit is a sound nutritional principle that applies to teen-agers and the young and old alike.

A basic breakfast pattern, readily adapted to individual and family needs, provides 1/4 to 1/5 of the day's total food requirements and makes a good contribution of most essential nutrients. It includes the basic foods—fruit, breakfast cereal, milk, bread and butter, These foods form a nutritional basis for an adequate breakfast.



"If you had any real choice in the matter, maybe you would prefer to emulate the Good Samaritan and do your charity as an individual and for an individual. The law doesn't yet forbid you to follow the individualistic examples of Christ, but through its tax policy your government is doing as much as it can to discourage such 'primitive' Christian actions. That's why the tax laws on charity force you, in effect, to pay double when you decide to help the individual instead of the government-approved group.

"Governments have little faith in individuals; deny it as they will, those who govern us prefer to deal with groups, masses, blocs, majorities, organizations and so on. They are well aware that groups are easier to control than individuals. Group action is slow and cumbersome and predictable; in boxing terminology, the punch of the crowd is usually telegraphed well in advance of its arrival, and those who govern us can lay their plans accordingly. But they can seldom anticipate the actions of just one individual. That's why they design the tax laws to submerge the individual and elevate the group.

"The government no longer looks with favor upon 'rugged individualists' like Edison, Ford, Steinmetz, Carnegie and others who reaped huge fortunes because of their ability to make life easier for the rest of us. In an effort to put a stop to that sort of thing, those who enjoy the job of governing us have written tax laws to deprive the successful individual of about 90 per cent of his income. This pulls the unpredictable individual back down into the crowd which government knows how to handle.

"During the so - called 'dark ages' of American history, when individuals were conquering a wilderness and laying the foundations which have resulted in a nation with the highest standard of living the world has ever known, the successful individual could leave his money to his children turned to the inheritance and gift taxes in an effort to draw all of us back toward a common or signed its tax laws in a fashion to encourage successful individuals to give or will their property and money to groups, crowds, foundations and various other organizations approved by govern-

"It used to be that our tax laws were designed for the purpose of raising revenue needed for the legitimate expenses of a government limited to protecting equally the life, liberty and property of each individual citizen. Our government still performs these functions to some extent, but they are now purely secondary. Modern tax laws are designed primarily to penalize the successful, to equalize the unequal, and to appeal to the baser instincts of the crowds who have the masses of

"Those who govern us haven't yet stopped the individual and his instinctive determination to excel. I doubt that the government ever can stop the individual for long. But it won't be from lack of try-

"SLAVERY AND TAXES" Here is another editorial from The Freeman magazine showing how taxes are regarded as worse than slavery by some people. From here you are reading from The Freeman.

"Human slavery is still practiced against the pigmies in the Belgian Congo - under government supervision and permission, of course, since the institution of slavery cannot exist unless it is enforced by the prevailing government. But in all fairness to the government of Belgium, it must be stated that the pigmies were already enslaved by the normalsized Africans when the colonizers first arrived from Europe, and that the present government has abolished some of the most inhumane features of the slavery they


found there. "The pigmies are hunters, and they must supply their masters with meat. Since the government won't permit the slaves to possess firearms, this duty is sometimes





This club had only two major-college members before the start of this season, but Wilkinson is now the eighth. His total is 2.010 not including a 45point performance Tuesday night. Other active major-college play-ers in the 2,000 club are Dick Hemric of Wake Forest, Tom Gola of LaSalle, George Dalton of John Carroll, Don Schlundt of Indiana, and Cleo Littleton of Wichita.




