

Ex-Gl Killer Questioned

TACOMA Wash - UP- A ma rine veteran of Iwo Jima fighting, who has already confessed to two murders, was questioned Wednesday about a 1953 slaying in Kentucky.

Harvey J. Collins, a former Army captain who once attempted suicide while stationed at Fort Sill, Okla., has admitted he fatally stabbed Andrew Stolen, 74, operator of Eleanor's motel a few miles north of here Monday night, Collins, 29, is from Puyallup, Wash. Collins made headlines in Oklahoma more than a year ago, when he stole an Army observation plane at Fort Sill and crash-landed it on a railroad track near Temple,

The captain took the plane at night after scribbling a note, "I want to die in the air." He surrendered to Dallas, Tex., police three days later, was place in"an Army mental hospital and given a dishonorable discharge.

Police said Stolen was murdered with a Samurai sword Collins said he took from the body of his superior officer who was killed in the bitter Iwo Jima fighting in World War II.

Stolen's wife, Anna, 67, was critically slashed in the same attack and was hospitalized here.

Police sall Collins also has admitted the robbery - slaying of Edward Morley Feb. 7 at a service station a few miles from the motel, Collins was also to be questioned in connection with the death of Mrs. Edna Iona Hall, 37, Louisville, Ky., whose body was found in a shallow grave at Fort Knox, Ky., in January of 1954.

Collins, in his first confession, asserted he "picked up a girl named Hall" and did away with her during a drinking bout. Later he said he had been questioned twice before by the FBI in Oklahoma and Texas about the Hall

The State of Texas plied a total of 8,300,000 men and may not be sued without its condisbursed \$172,000,000,000.

The Legislature by a proper action may permit certain general the state, under certain conditions and restrictions. Then, if a specific situation arises which is not legislators are authorized to pass a special measure to permit suit

to be brought. Therefore, any person seeking to enforce a claim against the state through the courts must petition the egislature for the necessary permission, unless his claim falls within some general category or type previously rec-

ognized by our lawmakers. In its preceding session, the Leg-Islature passed legislation allowing suits to be brought against the state in a variety of cases, ranging from an action for damages for personal injuries suffered in a collision with a State Highway Department truck to a suit for monetary damages alleged to have been incurred in connection with the securing of a right-of-way for a farm-to-market highway.

Sometimes, however, suits may be brought against individuals holding office under the State of Texas and acting as agents of the state, but where the state itself is not the principal party to the suit, without first gaining consent to sue. There are numerous situations in which an individual officer may be sued with regard to the duties and functions of his office, and in which the state is not directly or substantially a party in interest.

Suppose you do obtain legislalive permission to sue the state. What happens then?

If suit is brought against the State of Texas, and the action is successfully prosecuted, you will be awarded a judgment against the state. Then, it's back to the Legislature for more legislation to appropriate the necessary money with which the state may pay off the judgment.







this other woman who will probably tell lots of lies about me. Please give me some advice and I'd just as soon lose the money than become involved in a lot of trouble

I'm not quite of age anyway and since my folks are responsible for the acts I do I don't want them to be drug into anything. Without any evidence I probably wouldn't stand a chance anyway.

Your advice will be appreciated. Please answer immediately.

Dear Upset:

You may write a card to the department where you filed your original claim and state that lacking evidence, you will not appear on the dase set for the hearing. Or you can just not appear without any word at all in which case the claim will be dismissed.

Youth

In order to rule the world, Hitler and Marx agreed on one important point. The future belongs to the kiddies. The most vital necessity, then, is the control of the minds of the youngsters to the end that they will think and do as you want them to do long after you are dead.

So Hitler organized his youth groups, his summer camps, his "Joy in Life" activities, and marshalled the resources of the nursery into a sort of kinderbund.

Marx, who lacked Hitler's organizational ability, put it down this way in his Communist Manifesto: "Free education for all children in public schools; abolition of children's factory labor in its present form; combination of education with industrial production.

As an enemy of individualism, Marx was opposed to private schools. He believed that education for the 'masses" could only be provided by the state. Therefore, he demanded "free" education, which, of course, meant that the state must furnish the money by the ancient and dishonorable device of taxing everyone to

The fact that the state was to enter the educational field moved instruction out of the realm of education and put it in the realm of political indoctrination.

It is interesting to observe that Marx went on to call for the abolition of child labor in its present form. Marx had no compunction about children working. He merely wanted to make certain that the child labored for the state and not for himself and his own wellbeing. The combination of education with industrial production is of course nothing in the world except pragmatic education with emphasis placed on learning a trade rather than learning to think.

This has been the key to the modern trend called "progressive education" which follows Marx and parallels Hitler without observable variances.

Current trends which tend to eliminate the rules for math and grammar, to belittle the classics, to underplay the necessity of learning the alphabet and how to sell merely follow the dictum of Marx.

Emphasis on "adjustment" rather than education, tends to cement the student into a rut of mediocrity and conformity and to make him "comfortable" there. Despite his ignorance and stupidity he is expected to remain poised. This is the cum laude of current "edu-

As though he obeyed the behests of Marx, President Eisenhower, aided and egged on by Oveta Culp Hobby, has proclaimed a vast program of Federal Aid to Education. This "aid" is to be extracted from all taxpayers in the country, a percentage retained by the extractors for services rendered, and the balance channeled into the separate states where it is expected to gradually seep down into the school district for purposes of building

more school rooms and paying more teachers. We are indebted to Facts Forum News of Feb. 1955 for bringing us excerpts of a speech made on September 29, 1875, before the Texas Constitutional Convention by a Mr. Samson. This speech was made only 27 years after the Manifesto of Marx had been issued. But it is noteworthy that the poison of Marx's prolification had already found advocates in this country.

Mr. Samson said in part: "How dare a free government professing to be free ruthlessly invade the sacred domain of private duty and private right? What right has government to lay violent hands upon American citizens who have not attained their majority to force them to attend particular schools, study particular books under a particular teacher? By assuming control of the children for educational purposes the state deprives the father of the sacred rights of parentage . . . If the state may upon the plea of 'necessary to the general welfare' take under its control the education of the people, it may, upon the same plea . . . take charge of their religion, for if education be necessary to the maintenance of good government . . . religion is more so."

The education of children is the responsibility of their

parents. The government cannot assume that responsibility without resorting to tyranny. This nation is dedicated to the concept that free men, under God, will arrive at their own destiny. It is time we erected a large sign and hung it over the doorways of state schools: ernment, keep out!"




