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





Americans believe what they hear and give a hearty approval with their votes.

McCarthy, in control of the Senate Committee on Un-American Affairs, goes to work and before long, lo and behold, all sorts of Reds and pinks are turned up in government - some of them truly criminal, despising the United States and determined to do anything possible to injure our nation and help Russia and the Communications cause; some are just confused; and some are just b

keep turning up in one category or another and providing additional fuel for the coming Congressional elections.

Under such conditions, the first and obvious loing to do is stop McCarthy as quickly and effectively as possible - never mind how, just so you stop him.

But it will take a lot of something to stop McCarthy, now that he is really rolling. More and more volunteers of information are coming in and whatever it is that will stop McCarthy has to be pretty good.

There can be no reason unless there is some point from which to start to reason, and the authors' who's philosophy is that they, as the heads of the church, determine right from wrong; but they will set down no standards of moral or physical values, so of necessity they must write an irrational book based on emotion rather than reason.

This book is bound to promote depressions, because it advocat s the very things that bring on depressions. It advocates controlling credit, special privileges for union labor, and the right to organize to take away from an individual his right to make an individual contract. In other words, it advocates collectivism rather than individualism - and collectivism is entirely foreign to Christian ethics. Real Christianity emphasizes the wroth of the individual - his importance, his right to develor, corns of any other person.

The book advocates the government having the right to use aggression to take from one to give to another, and that is the essence of war. It denies the moral philosophy that all men are entitled to all they produce. It denies this when it sanctions the state having the power to take from one to give to another.



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
