

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Fantasy Background

Sometime after the turn of the century a particular type of literature became increasingly evident. It was not altogether new. Occasionally in nearly every century since literature began, stories of this type had put in an

But the twentieth century has seen their multiplication until they have become a dominant factor in much. of current reading. We are talking about science fiction. The tales of Janathan Swift, Daniel Defoe and Jules Verne have been multiplied by the efforts of H. G. Wells, A. Merritt, Edgar Rice Burroughs, Philip Wylie, and a host of others. There is apparently to be no end to the product.

Fantastic adventures in unbelievable lands at the center of the earth, on strange forgotten plateaus or on other planets, are now on every magazine rack. Time machines, space ships, computers and death rays are crowding out yesterday's adventure equipment, the horse and the six-gun.

With this fictional approach to the future, it is no wonder that many of today's bureaucrats are caught up in the wave of science-worship which has swept the minds of much of our youth.

This is becoming an age of vivid imaginings.

Fervently, a host of otherwise sane and sensible people believe that "anything that science wants to do, is possible." There is so much conjecturing in this direction plus so many startling things that science HAS discovered that it is becoming difficult for many to draw the line between fictional guess work, and logical

Early science fiction stories dealt with atom bombs and space ships. The atom bomb is now a reality. And the space ship, slow in coming, arrived first in the public mind as the flying saucer.

So much credence is now being given to these speculative discs that new religious cults have sprung up, piloted by quacks who claim to have visited with the occupants of the saucers, little men from strange planets who have a happy faculty of understanding English.

But rocket experimentation continues. And there is sober talk of a platform which would circle the earth on its own orbit to serve as a booster station for daring inter-lunar travelers who now gaze hungrily at the moon. With space ships hurtling through their brains it is

small wonder that men like Val Peterson, Federal Defense Administrator, stump the country urging private citizens to dig bomb shelters in their back yards because the day of atomic warfare is at hand. H. G. Wells' "War of the Worlds" is about to be

enacted by our politicians, who are no better in their judgment than those gullible cultists who envisage the deity arriving by means of a "strange oblong cigarshaped space ship which gives off colored lights.

Before this entire country reacts as did the citizens of the Bronx when Orson Welles landed the Martians in a radio drama, we'd better take a good look at reality and get our feet firmly planted right down here on the

Here are eight points to think upon:

1. Science has done many strange and astounding things. Space travel is probably not far away. Certainly possibilities of "Destination Moon" are improving. 2. The atom bomb and the hydrogen bomb are real-

3. The world is filled with strange and wonderful things, many of which we do not fully understand. 4. The world is also filled with political, military and

economic tensions. 5. But on the other hand, science is not at all certain of many of the things people believe it to be certain of. Science is still a puny infant, toddling on wobbly legs. It is not infallible. There is nothing so passe as vesterday's panacea.

6. The atom bomb and the hydrogen bomb may be realities, but quite conceivably they are not good weapons for combat. The whole purpose of aggressive war is to make some economic or political gain. The use of the atom bomb in warfare makes about as much sense as would the bandit, who, while seeking to rob a bank, dynamites it so effectively that it ends up as a heap

of rubble. There have been other "world destroying" weapons invented before. But they were not used extensively and were ultimately abandoned. Why? Because of any sense of kindness for humanity? Not at all. Merely because they are bad war weapons.

Greek Fire is one illustration. It was predicted that it would burn up the oceans of the world. It conceivably might have been used more effectively and extensively than it was used, except that when the fire swept over the seas it had the distressing lack of foresight of being unable to distinguish between enemy and friendly

The same story is true of poison gas. Why was it not widely used in World War 11? Simply because it is a poor weapon. Gassed-out areas which are enemy territory become booby traps for friendly troops.

One of the unspoken truths about warfare is that any effective weapon must be directional in nature. A small atomic warhead fired directionally may be effective. But bombs that can shatter the earth's crust on contact are as great a menace to the bomber as they are to the bombed.

This is the reason why swords had points at only one end and a handle at the other end. And why guns can be pointed in only one direction. Greek fire, poison gas and vast atomic explosions fall into the category of expensive, dangerous and impractical weapons of war. 7. From the standpoint of business and industry there

is a bright future for men and women in all nations who will concentrate along free enterprise lines. The people of the world need and want many many things. The providing of those things is profitable and satisfying to all parties involved.

8. The tensions admittedly present in this world are, without exception, caused by governments. The politicians' hands are on the throttle and with their minds geared to inter-planetary travel, hyper-psychosomatic ensions and astronomical budgets, it is small wonder that there's a mild form of atom-phobia.

In the end it will be God, not gadgets, that brings us

"This definitely and completely forbids men in government to interfere with the freedom of the peaceful individual citizen.

etc. . ." Then Dr. Watts goes on

"The American Constitutions are the political realizations of the fact that the individual person is by nature, and of right ought to be, sovereign, because he is by nature - and of right he ought to be - self-governing, and therefore he is responsible for his acts.

"The limited function of government is to exercise only such authority and force as sovereign citizens delegate to the men in government office.

"And, since the individual citizen has no right to interfere with or coerce his fellows, he cannot delegate any such rights of interference or coercion to government officials.

"The individual's rights, from which flow government's functions, are rights only within the realm of moral law: and the nature of this moral law is indicated in the Judeo-Christian tradition by the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule. The essential and distinctive purpose of the American political Constitutions (federal and state) was to set up a political system in harmony with this moral law that is written into the very nature of man and the universe.

"This American system was to subject every government official and every government agency to moral law as individuals are subject to it. Therefore at restricted governmental action as it provided means for defending individuals against aggression, both legal and illegal political and private.

"In other words, protection of the individual's human rights requires restraints on government as it requires restraints on private persons. It means freedom from government coercion and freedom from private aggression.

"Granted that the rights of Americans have lately been infringed by legislative acts declared constitutional by interpretations which endanger the whole edifice of freedom in these United States. Granted that the Sixteenth Amendment to the federal Constitution, establishing the federal income tax, gave the federal government legal authority and opportunity to make every citizen its subject and slave.

"Nevertheless, the original meaning of freedom and human rights which made this country so different from every other still blazes forth, unmistakably, from every one of the constitutional ocuments of these United States. This meaning is that freedom is the right to be free from interference, and that the function of government, the only justification for its existence and acts, is to protect the right of peaceful persons to be let alone.

"The United Nations is the expression of the very opposite idea: the idea that government is, and of right ought to be, sovereign, because it cares for the greater good, the good of the whole. In this ancient view, government can supply wisdom and power in the management of all human actions because of its broader view and its coercive might. This it can increase the flow of goods and from this flow it can give its people more 'rights' in the form higher wages, shorter hours, better working conditions, more schooling and more 'social securi-

"With this Od World view of government as a source of superior wisdom and power, the Founders of the UN made it a means for expanding government everywhere-broadening its scope, enlarging its powers, and centralizing its administration. Under this growth of government power. worldwide, they promised that the people of all the world would enjoy increasing prosperity an'd peace. And as their prosperity grew, people might also enjoy more of the luxury of freedom as government decided they could aford it and deserved it.

The UN Goal: More Government "That this expansion of government is the primary purpose of the UN appears from every one of its documents. They are covenants, proposals, plans and arguments for compelling individuals to accept government's solution of every human problem from bear ing children to burying the dead, from organizing labor unions to going to school, from enjoying a vacation to having a tooth pulled. Conventions for abolishing private employment agencies for stopping criticism of foreign governments for preventing 'mental harm.' for controlling agricultural production, allocating raw materials, fixing exchange rates, redistributing the world's wealth - these are a few samples of the UN agencies' proposals for coercive regulation and control of the minutest detail of individual conduct everywhere in the world.

These are not proposals for establishing legal civil rights to protect the individual person's God-given human rights. They are not proposals to curb tyrannical uses of police force in human affairs; they are proposals to expand police power.

"They would reduce the whole life of every person on earth his beliefs, his words, his work and play and livershood - to abject dependence upon the 'benefits'
