# **West OKs** Security Program

Big 3 Plan Will Counter Red Move

VIENNA - UP - The western foreign ministers reached full agreement on a broad European security plan to counter Russia's bid to neutralize Germany, informed diplomatic sources said Monday.

The western ministers were on their way home after signing an Austrian state treaty with Soviet Russia that rolls back the Iron Curtain for the first time and promises the long-awaited break in the cold war.

Diplomatic sources said western experts will begin shortly preparing a joint allied plan for the unification of Germany within a broad European security system based on phased East-West disarmament.





#### World Government

David Sarnoff recently finished a very brilliant article entitled "A Preview of the next 25 Years" with a contradictory statement to the effect that world government is inevitable and that our supreme commitment is to win a genuine peace rooted in liberty.

"We cannot know what form the coming one world' will take," he says, "but world law enforced by world peace seems inherent in the age of science and technology.

We can tell him what form world government will take, when and if it comes-terrorism. We certainly cannot have world government and "genuine peace rooted in liberty." The two are incompatible.

The bigger the government the greater the power needed to support it and the liberties of its citizens decrease in exact proportation to the increase in the powers of a government.

The form of world government has already been drawn by the artful architects of UN and there can be little doubt that if we surrender our sovereignty to become a part of a world state it will fit the pattern they have devised.

The plans call for an army of "policemen" to be drawn from each member nation to be used in other countries to enforce the dictates of the superstate. In other words, we will have foreigners policing us and our sons will be drafted to police other nations. This certainly doesn't sound to us like "genuine peace rooted in liberty.

Whatever form the world government takes it can mean nothing to us but tyranny under foreigners. If it should be run on a "democratic" basis, we will be continually outvoted 100 to 1 and forever ruled by foreign dicators.

Who is in a better position to judge the ill effects of big government than we Americans who have watched our own federal government grow from merely a token government with scarcely no power against the individual citizens to the dreadful juggernaut we all stand in awe of today?

The path to "peace rooted in liberty" lies not in more government but in less government. Some day man will awaken to the fact that all governments are harmful to peace and liberty—then we will be getting back to the truths our forefathers knew when they founded this republic-and the idea of world government will

## The Reds' Game

Adlai Stevenson, the funny man who failed to win the presidency in 1952, recently addressed the nation about Formosa and Chiang Kai-Shek's outpost islands of Quemoy and Matsu. The would-be humorist's advice to Eisenhower, who

still has asked for it, was to let Quemoy and Matsu go down the drain to the Chinese Reds and persuade our allies "to stand with us in the defense of Formosa against any aggression, pending some final settlement of its status - by independence, neutralization, trusteeship, plebiscite or whatever is wisest."

Some notice was taken of the speech in the press - particularly the Communist press organ the Daily Worker in New York City. The Worker just loved the speech and squealed with joy over Stevenson's call to abandon Quemoy and Matsu and was most happy over the fact that Stevenson had joined with Senators Wayne Morse and Herbert Lehman, a fine pair of New Dealers, in an effort to split the Democratic party on foreign policy. The Daily Worker even swallowed its pride sufficiently to say that it went along with his recommendation that we flatly refuse for the time being to get off Formosa. On this point, the Worker said that Stevenson was "slightly more flexible" than Eisenhower.

We are not attempting to say that Stevenson was consciously playing the Red's game for them in the United States. Unconsciously, however, that is exactly what he did in this speech. It is exactly what appeasers of the Morse-Lehman tribe are doing — and we don't know whether they are doing it consciously or unconsciously.

This whole gang ought to be given full consideration by the voters any time they run for office or reelection, as the case may be. And the consideration ought to be a flat repudiation of their viewpoints.

Academic Freedom

Since a better understanding of who is entitled to academic freedom is much needed and since it is of the utmost importance that more the difference between education and training, I want to quote and comment further on Russell Kirk's book "Academic Freedom."

Professor Kirk admits that there are some teachers and professors who are not entitled to academic freedom. He believes that colleges supported on a voluntary basis are superior to those supported by taxation. He quotes a friend of John Dewey by the name of Dr. Meiklejohn as saving:

'Faith in the divine author and authority in which Western civilization confided, inherited ideas of the soul and its destiny, of fixed revelation . . . have been made impossible for the cultivated mind of the Western world."

Then Professor Kirk continues: "If it were true that Pragmatism had indeed made such beliefs impossible, then we might do very well to forget the example of Socrates, and abandon our foolish talk about human dignity and freedom and the high ordination of the teacher, and go over to the cult of Demos and the adulation of mediocrity and creature-comforts.\*\*\*

"I think we need no longer be afraid to say, with Calhoun, 'De-mocracy, as I understand and accept it, requires me to sacrifice myself for the masses, not to them. Who knows not that if you would save the people, you must often oppose them?'

He explains that the real seeker after-truth is not subject to any man-made authority. He is not its agent. He observes that the best way to explain what academic freedom really means is to quote the statement made by Socrates when he was on trial for his life. Those who have read Socrates' Apology will recognize it, but it is worth repeating:

"Men of Athens, I honor and love you; but I shall obey God rather than you and while I have life and strength I shall never cease from the practice and teaching of philosophy, exhorting anyone whom I meet after my manner, and convincing him, saying: O my friend, why do you who are a citizen of the great and mighty and wise city of Athens care so much about laying up the greatest amount of money and honor and reputation, and so little about wisiom and truth and the greatest im says that he has, I reproach him Presidents. with undervaluing the greater and but go about persuading you all, tional rather than state issues. dent. old and young alike, not to take properties, but first and chiefly to take care about the greatest improvement of the soul."




