

# Hoover Suggests U.S. **Close Insuring Firms**

(10 PAGES TODAY)



#### By HARRY VANDERNOOT

The Hoover Commission recommended Monday that many of the government's 104 lending and insuring agencies be abolished or forced to support themselves under the free enterprise system.

These and other proposed actions the commission said would result eventually in return to the Treasury of capital funos totalling \$6-217,943,000 And, it added, they would forestall possible future Treasury investments totalling \$1,. 114.000.000.

In addition to such "reductions in the national debt." its overall recommendations ultimately, the commission said would mean an annual saving of some \$200 million.

The 12-man commission, headed oy former President Herbert Hoover, made its recommendation m another of a series of reports to congress on government reorganization. This one covered all federal agencies making or guaranteeing loans.

#### **Return to Private Enterprise**

It said lending or guaranteeing loans "is a function which the government should undertake only when private enterprise cannot or will not perform the function, and then only in furtherance of a justifiable governmental purpose."

# Subtle Propagandists

In the field of propaganda there is nothing more devastating than the almost-truth or the half-truth that has the appearance of truth but actually results in total misconception

And no one has better exploited this facet of the business of propaganda than those who would destroy the country by destroying the principles upon which it was built.

As witness that such is the case, we have the ceaseless propaganda campaign being conducted on many re fronts in favor of what might be called internationalism or one-worldism. From whatever point the propa-

ganda stems, it all has as the objective the elimination "of the United States as a nation in which the people believe that government is the servant of the people and

"not the master. And the unfortunate part of the whole thing is that it makes not the slightest difference

,, whether the propagandist does his evil job knowingly no, or unknowingly. The result is the same.

While it is not the only front being advanced, certainmy ly one of the principal ones is that of the United Namitions. There have been millions and millions of words written and spoken about the United Nations and, of course, many of them are true — so far as they go. "And the propaganda for this organization and the purpose behind the organization reaches into every corner of the nation, touching all of us intimately in a personal way. Some of it is accomplished through the public schools. Some of it is done through written material in --- newspapers and magazines and some of it is done through 

And the basic pattern in all of the propaganda is ""pretty much the same theme: take an almost truth or "a half truth to give credibility to what you are going to say and from this basis a successful presentation can be made for the propaganda. Well meaning persons and organizations are propagandized into having the kind of speakers who will present such propaganda and the captive audience is given a sugar-coated indoctrination. Most of the audiences are made up of people unable or unwilling to press questions to these professional speakers. The people are amateurs attempting to challenge a professional and more often than not are made to look foolish or the object of scorn if an attempt is made to question the motives and beliefs of the speaker who holds control of the meeting. Those who entered the

meeting with skepticism come away half convinced and need only a more indoctrination to be of goods. No speaker of today in America can come out flatfootedly in favor of a Communist program and hope to receive any sort of backing. He probably would be lucky son if he wasn't bopped on the nose. But there seems to be a special category set aside for intellectuals and dilet-\* tantes who can preach the same sort of gospel as the fiery Red speaker and he or she gets a fine and attentive to audience and full credence to her statements. To our are way of thinking, it is this later type that presents a grave danger, for they are in effect sneaking up on our blind side to apply the dagger rather than the frontal \_\_\_\_\_attack of the club-swinging Reds. And in either case we are the loser if we listen to such propagandists.


