Anarchy-Good Or Bad? I attended the Congress of Freedom meeting at San Francisco. At this meeting was a former professor of philosophy from Vanderbilt college. He was a typical professor. No one knew anything but him. If one tried to explain the benefits resulting from a definite limited government with the consent of the governed and did not believe in taxation but believed that defense should be on a voluntary basis, this "professor" called the man an anarchist.

If one goes by Webster's definition, an anarchist is about as bad a name as a man can be called. The first definition in Webster of anarchy is "Absence of government; the state of society where there is no law or supreme power: hence, a state of lawlessness or political disorder; specif., the social state advocated by modern anarchists." Synonyms of chaos and lawlessness are given.

Standard Dictionary says: absence of government based on government coercion. A condition of society regulated by voluntary agreement instead of government. This definition is more in harmony with its original mean-

Origin Of The Word If we go back to the origin of the word, it comes from "az", a Greek word meaning not, and archy which comes from the Greek word "archia" which is defined as "a suffix meaning a rule, a ruling, as in monarchy, a rule of one; heptarchy, a rule of seven."

So if we have no ruler, no chief, then no one has the right to rule another. The word has been changed from its original meaning, like many other words, so now it popularly means chaos and that a man would have a right to kill and murder and rob and everything

But if anarchy, as the word implies, means no ruler over anyone. then it could not mean that one man had a right to interfere with or rule over or rob any other man.

Probably one of the reasons why anarchy has come to mean chaos from a popular standpoint is that many of the men who professed to be anarchists believed in some form of socialism or communism. But that was not really a rule, but an attempt to give certain men or groups power to exploit others.

I once read a book on American anarchists, among which was Benjamin R. Tucker. According to the Encyclopedia Britannica, Tuck-




