## Students Riot In France

PARIS (UPI) - Riot police battled thousands of crashhelmeted leftist students Thursday night in the 93rd and most violent mass demonstration in Paris this year. Authorities said at least 76 policemen were

Students armed with iron bars and tossing molotov cocktails fought for hours in the Latin Quarter with police who ~ retaliated with tear gas volleys and club-swinging charges.

· Officials said sixteen of the injured police were hospitalized, nine of them suffering burns, and 15 youths were arrested Scores of demostrators were injured. police said, but the exact number was not known.

Two police vans, a police bulldozer and six automobiles were set afire or damaged in the

melee, witnesses said. The main clash came on the Rue Monge where hundreds of vouths-wearing crash helmets and armed with axe handles. iron bars and bottles filled with gasoline-tossed firebombs at police from the street and from rooftops in a vain attempt to prevent a rally held by an extreme rightwing group.

Ordre Nouveau (New Order). The demonstrators, dispersed by thousands of police called to the riot area in scores of vans. failed to stop the New Order meeting and some 500 of their rightwing counterparts cheered speakers inside the police-

ringed Mutualite Hall. Interior Minister Raymond Marcellin said it was the 93rd mass demonstration of the year and police said it was by far the most violent.

## Court Lessens Obscenity Rules

sharply divided Supreme Court. which split 5 to 4 on a series of obscenity cases, established a new set of guidelines Thursday that will allow states and communities to ban books. magazines, plays and films that may be allowed elsewhere.

The court eliminated "redeeming social importance" as a defense in obscenity cases.

The majority opinion was written by Chief Justice Warren F. Burger. It declared that juries can apply their local moral standards rather than a 'national standard' in state obscenity cases.

In a busy day of decision making, the court also ruled that intentional racial discrimination in part of a Northern city chool operation would subject the entire system to "all-out desegretation.

The 7-1 decision, written by Justice William J Brennan Jr. came in a Denver, Colo. case.

## Gas Refinery Hits **Production Rumor**

The Pampa area's only refinery producing gasoline is selling its entire production locally. That is the word from B.O. Bentley of Dorchester Gas Producing Co.

While the firm bears a Skellytown address, gasoline production is sold to Pampa distributors. Bentley said. The company has been operating for a number of years the facility known in the early days of Pampa petroleum as the Cargray Refinerly.

Bentley was interviewed after a local station operator called The News and said there was a Pampa gasoline producing refinery from which he received gasoline. He also stated that he was out of regular grade at the time of his telephone call.

The call was prompted by an article in Wednesday's paper which reported rumors had been circulating that a local refinery was selling its production to South Texas.

Bentley told The News his company makes no sales or deliveries directly to retail stations; that the operator's complaint is with his distributor. Bentley added that Dorchester was allocating gasoline supplies monthly to each distributor which, in turn, made allocations to service

His opinion was that the operator had used up his allocation of regular and was simply required to wait for next stated.

Regarding the local shortage and practice of allocating fuel Bentley said the same amount of gasoline was being sold to distributors that they were receiving from the Dorchester refinery a year ago. Further, he said he anticipated no worsening of the situation

Bentley concluded the interview with assurance that his firm had no intention of selling production out of the immediate area which it has served since going into operation.



## **Strauss Denies Castro Government Gave Funds**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Robert S. Strauss, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, has given sworn testimony in which he termed 'ridiculous" the notion that the Castro government in Cuba gave money to the Democratic presidential campaign.

Strauss thus denied one of the premises of the Watergate bugging. Some of the convicted conspirators, including Bernard L. Barker, have said they were looking for evidence to back up reports of such Cuban pay-"I thought it was the most

ridiculous suggestion that I believe I have ever heard and I know of no money like that that came in," Strauss said in a pretrial deposition in connection with his committee's \$6.4 million civil suit against the Republicans for damages resulting from the bugging.

Meanwhile, a furor was growing on Capitol Hill over the latest round of news leaks in the Watergate case, many of them involving testimony secretly given by former presidential counsel John W. Dean III, who testifies in public next week.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield urged the Watergate committee to adopt "stricter procedures" to prevent leaks of preliminary testimony. Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott charged that 'a great many people' were waging "separate campaigns" to their own ends through manipulation of leaks."

**Conspiracy Afoot** A Watergate committee member, Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., said in a television interview (with Martin Agronsky) that a conspiracy was afoot to discredit Dean's testimony in advance. One set of documents recent-

ly leaked involved a White House summary making Dean appear as the prime person covering up the scandal. Other leaked information concerned reported testimony by Dean that he borrowed Republican campaign money to finance his honeymoon.

-Thomas F. McBride, one of the Watergate special prosecutors, said consideration is being given to convening a separate grand jury to probe campaign financing. He and his staff are, among other things, looking into allegations that Republican officials drew up a list of corporations which had problems with the government and then went after them for campaign contributions.

Sen. Barry M. Goldwater. R-Ariz., elder statesman of conservative Republicans, said in Indianapolis that if Democrats had done the burglary and bugging, the press would have called it "cute" rather than criminal. He also said Republicans should stick by

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WASHINGTON - (NEA) -There are perhaps heroes in the Watergate scandal who will remain forever mysteri-

They range from men like James McCord whose motives are questionable, to men in the Federal Bureau of Investigation who may always beanonymous, though important, footnotes in history.

FBI men leaked information including that about the close political and unethical ties between the White House and former Acting Director L. Patrick Gray, a relationship which reached its nadir when Gray admitted burning important files upon urging of frightened White House aides.

Some FBI men, brought up on the axioms of fidelity, bravery and keeping one's trap shut, were shaken by this butchering of separation of powers. Some, probably in the domestic intelligence division. were also appalled by the illegal bugging and espionage going on under White House auspices. An underground network was formed between. these men and some members of the media, including and especially the Washington Post and Jack Anderson.

These informants did risk their careers and their reputations in getting this information out. Yet their motives are not entirely clear. Perhaps they were torn within themselves and finally responded to a "higher law," one in which they put their principles above the letter of the law. These men did, in fact, break both a federal regulation and a bureau regulation against

leaking information. Perhaps, though, they did not appreciate Gray, who, besides his buckling to White House dictates, also fired or demoted old-time FBI stalwarts, radically began reshaping the FBI image by approving the wearing of colored shirts and long hair and hiring

women as field agents. The motives of James Mc-Cord, also an informer in Watergate but a much more visible one than the FBI men, are in question. Did he give lengthy testimony solely in hopes of receiving a lighter sentence for his part in the espionage and burglary of Watergate? Or was he a man of conscience who saw a new light?



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Nobel Prize-winning chemist Dr. Harold Urey sees his career nearing an end, the problems of nuclear energy and formation

of the universe still drive him. "I think the only thing to do when you get to be my age is retire gracefully and pleasantly and not worry too much about it," the University of California at San Diego professor emeritus said after celebrating his 80th birthday earlier this year.

But his actions belie the words. He still makes numerous speaking engagements to urge a moratorium on construction of nuclear power plants and has developed a new theory of formation of the universe.

Nobel Prize Awarded Urey was awarded the Nobel Prize in 1934 for the discovery of deuterium or heavy hydrogen. It subsequently became an integral part of the hydrogen

"I'm sorry for this," Urey said. "I wish they (hydrogen bombs) didn't exist. We are in more danger from this growing buildup of bigger and bigger bombs than we would be if the. Russians took over our govern-

'If we shot all the bombs we have it would make the entire continent of Asia uninhabitable. No one knows the maximum effect on the world of all that radiation

Urey is one of 31 scientists to the annual meeting of the who last year issued a American Chemical Society last statement urging a moratorium

NEW YORK (UPI) - The administration's freeze and upcoming Phase IV represent 'an ad hoc response to the popular outcry for doing something about prices" rather than a coherent plan to fight the burst of world-wide inflation, says Argus Weekly Staff Report. The public now has gotten what it wanted, the latter says, but the long-term reaction to more intense controls will depend on whether the benefits of the new program in the form of reduced inflation outweight the distortions that inevitably arise once controls are

The schizophrenic behavior of the market in recent sessions is the result of its psychological unreadiness to sustain an advance, says E. F. Hutton. The firm says the market's "only course of action is to vacillate until a change occurs in the psychological, technical or fundamental factors which can alter this balance." It adds the market has absorbed a sharp decline, apparently exhausting its downside momentum.

"The U.S. business system is not out of control, perhaps, but it is plainly feverish and incoherent," says Albert T. Sommers, chief economist for The Conference Board. The ordinary rules of the business cycle, Sommers says, no longer apply, but the immediate crisis represents a genuine test of American economic policy to respond constructively "after a year of ideological persistence and four months of deeply regrettable paralysis.

#### On Not Being Number One

By REV. DAVID POLING

You and your friends may have become weary with the crowd chant, "We're Number One," that follows every major athletic event. And with it comes the attitude that the opposition must not only be defeated, but destroyed, humiliated, wiped out. Pro football is the leading culprit but Little League has its moments, especially when the parents are worked up to a performance peak

This entire theme of being Number One is handled in a thoughtful article in the April issue of "U.S. Catholic. The insistence that "winning is the only thing" has taken the fun out of our games, according to a noted sports writer. And most of the magazine's readers who saw advance copies and responded to a survey agreed with author Jack Griffin that the preoccupation with victory spills over into other areas of life . . . often with tragic

Griffin puts it right on the line: "In demanding victory, we are unable to live with defeat, and it can be crushing. It can leave a long and terrible scar." Winning and being an eternal winner has:

• Made it difficult for the "star" athlete to mature fully as a person.

· Caused us to look down on life's "losers" - the poor,

The latest example of this syndrome is a book entitled 'Clement of Alexandria and a Secret Gospel of Mark", by Morton Smith, a history professor at Columbia

"Secret" Gospel In a Greek Orthodox monastery near Jerusalem, Smith found a fragment of manuscript which he has identified, to his own satisfaction, as a letter written in the latter part of the Second Century by Bishop Clement of Alexandria, one of the most respected of the early church fathers. The note refers to a "secret" version of the Gospel according to Mark.

Piling inference upon presumption. Smith has persuaded himself that this "secret gospel" shows there were two kinds of members in the early Christian church-the great mass, who were kept in the dark about "real secrets," and a few inner-circle types who were initiated into more recondite mysteries.

One of these mysteries, says Smith, on the basis of conjecture, was that Jesus was neither a Messiah, nor even a courageous teacher who laid down his life to tell men the truth, but a slick "miracleworking magician.

The amazing thing about all these debunk-Jesus books is that they accept as much of the recorded gospels as they find convenient to sustain their thesis, and then blandly ignore or repudiate other parts of the very same documents which are directly contradictory to their pet notion.

The same technique was used a few years ago in a widely sold book called "The Passover Plot" (also by a "scholar") which despicted Jesus' crucifixion as the miscarriage of a tricky political maneuver by Jesus and his disciples.

The ultimate depths of absurdity were reached in a more recent book by a British "scholar" who sought to establish (by heavily editing the gospels) that Jesus really wasn't a person: He was a mushroom, used by a hallucino-



#### Cronkite On Liberty

ability to fight for liberty. possibly because they understand it less.

That advise was given to graduates at Michigan State University.

The speaker was television newscaster Walter Conkite. His message is heartening. It indicates Cronkite himself loves

liberty and would fight for it harder if he understood it better. In general, Cronkite equated liberty with activities that the

government ought not to engage in. His phrasing was: "If the dissenters get obstreperous, jail them. If you suspect conspiracy, tap their phones. If you suspect narcotics, don't knock, but break in the door. If the press gets too inquisitive. cut off their sources."

For the most part, we can agree with him on these points. too, only pointing out that some persons who call themselves dissenters' or

'demonstrators' have been known to use those labels as a license for rioting. We would make no defense of rioting. It is a trespass upon the rights of others.

With athat reservation, we would go on to suggest to Mr. Cronkite that the government's invasion of liberty is not always in the role of a villain. It's more benign activities are more dangerous to freedom because they are less suspect.

By way of example, we would single out the Social Security Act of 1935, the consequence of which was to tag every person with an idenfitying number. We

would cite the compulsory schooling system that makes almost every child a physical prisoner of the state for approximately five hours on 178 days of the year. Another example is the military draft which is a form of involuntary servitude. What does Mr. Cronkite say on the television regarding these momentous infringements upon individual

May we suggest that a better understanding of liberty would be to recognize that when we look to government for the solution to old-age distress. when we look to government to school our offspring, when we tolerate peacetime conscription, we are placing our own lives and our children's lives at the mercy of government. We have fewer means thereafter to keep the political power from levying progressive requirements upon us. Seduced by supposed benefits, we are subjected to

#### Hoover's FBI Influence To Be Felt A Long Time

J. Edgar Hoover was a giant of 20th century America, a man whose influence for law and order will be felt for decades to come. His principles were totally unswerving and his devotion to duty was legendary.

From the time I met Mr. Hoover in 1940 until I attended funeral services for him in Washington in May, 1972, one fact stood out; everything he did was based upon the teachings of God . . . he remained close to his religion throughout life . . . he referred constantly to the Bible.

Mr. Hoover was a keen student of the law, being an attorney, and- one with a tremendous grasp of both national and international affairs. He was a young attorney, in the United States Department of Justice, just 28 years of age, when he was asked to take on the directorship of the F.B.I. in 1924; by then Attorney-General Harlan Fisk Stone, who was later to become Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

The Bureau at the time was riddled with political hacks and hangers-on, even being utilized by private detective agencies as a place to "farm out" their men temporarily when the

#### H. L. Hunt Writes THE REAL CAUSE

Most citizens today, when hit by rapidly rising prices. especially for goods they must buy, such as food, think first of government action to stop the increases by force, through price controls. This is equal to putting a tight lid on a pan of boiling water. It won't stay on.

Rising prices are an effect and a symptom of inflation, not its real cause, which is deficit spending by the federal government. When government spends more money than it takes in, as is done every year in Washington to the tune of billions of dollars, the extra money has to come from somewhere. Government is credited with the money to meet the deficit by Federal Reserve banks, which in turn get interest

So money and credit are created, without any foundation of real value or increased productivity, simply by a bookkeeping entry in a bank. Putting so much of this kind of money into circulation dilutes the value of all the money in the hands of working people and taxpayers.

Federal spending shot up from \$188.5 billion to \$246.2 billion in eight years from 1965. No less than \$110 billion has been handed out as deficit spending over this 8-year period. Currency in circulation since 1965 has leaped from \$36.3 billion to \$54.7 billion, demand bank deposits have risen by \$50 billion, and time deposits have more than doubled.

The total money supply has grown 47 percent, far in excess of real productivity increases. This cannot continue. Inflation must be cut off at the roots, not merely by combatting symptoms of this disease.

private investigative business was bad!

Mr. Hoover accepted the directorship on one condition: that the F.B.I. would be totally free from political interference.

Soon after he began as Director, an important and powerful United States Senator came to see him and made certain demands. Mr. Hoover refused them, and ushered the Senator out. When he told his superior - Attorney General Harlan Fisk Stone of the occurrence, Mr.

Hoover expressed the hope that General Stone was not displeased with his action. General Stone commented that he was displeased, saying, "Why didn't you kick him out instead of merely showing him the door?"

Thus was laid the foundation for an impartial, judicious, investigative agency that touches directly or indirectly on the lives of all of us. And it was the same throughout my 24 years with the Bureau . . . never once any sway permitted from the efforts of any individual or entity, political or not. The objective was to ascertain facts, and to get at the truth of the matter at hand, and then to present those findings to the appropriate prosecutive or administrative agency.

J. Edgar Hoover was a most interesting man, a delightful conversationalist with a broad grasp of understanding in many fields. He was courageous, highly principled, very intelligent. He was an interesting raconteur. He laid down a strict discipline

but a necessary one for those who are given a gun and the right to interrogate people, and to exercise the broad authority of special agents of the United States Department of Justice. And . . . his own self-discipline was even stricter!

Mr. Hoover was also a man of compassion and understanding. He was most interested in the welfare of his personnel. Quick to criticize in his drive for perfection, he was equally quick to commend. He was no armchair official or executive every day, seven days a week, for 48 years, he did run the affairs of the F.B.I., with total dedication to the welfare and protection of the American, people which was within the jurisdiction of the F.B.I.

We can think of no better description of John Edgar Hoover than a paraphrasing of the words of Rudyard Kipling's immortal poem "If" ... "He was indeed a MAN!"

#### Question Box

QUESTION: Herb Klein, the President's director of communications, is leaving the White House, and Ron Ziegler. Mr. Nixon's press spokesman. is under fire for having made several misstatements of fact in the Watergate affair. My question is: Why do we have to have a press spokesman and directors of communications in the White House?

ANSWER: We do not believe there is any necessity for either of those two positions in government, any more than there is a reason for county or city government or school districts to have publicity representatives, provided at tax payer expense.

It is rather ironic that an individual like Herb Klein, who had a reputation as a "conservative" when he was editor of the San Diego Union, seems to have been touched with what some folks call Potomac Fever. He seems to have been fairly closely associated with the politicians now in the White House for a number of years, and several assist in Nixon's campaigns. It was only natural that when Nixon finally achieved his political dream that he would take his buddy along with him. Ziegler is much younger and apparently was picked up as a rather respectable young fellow who was well liked, until he got caught up in his attempts to defend the "boss.

The trend toward appointment of publicists by politicians has been increasing rather rapidly of late. And it is notable that some of the newspapers which did not object to the trend have been most critical of the present White House staff. Were it not for newspaper support, it is doubtful there would be as many publicity promoters in government job.

Originally, as politicians became busier and busier with activities, the trend was to employ a newsman to try to take some of the load off the official. Newspaper reporters. being naturally willing to let others do their jobs for them. began to rely more and more on handouts from the publicists, who naturally were prone to build their bureaus.

Now, the politicians too seldom are available to answer questions from the reporters. They leave it to the bureaucrats in the publicity office. And the reporters who were most willing to rely on the handouts from the bureaucrats now are making the loudest complaints about being unable to see the

The same trend is evident in city, county, state and special district offices, to a greater or lesser degree.

WASHINGTON — John Scali, one-time network newsman, has been an ambassador only a short time, but he has already chalked up one unusual distinction - after a fashion.

He has been roundly rebuked on the floor of the U.S. Senate

for "talking nonsense."
Reason the UN ambassador's knuckles were sharply rapped was a speech in which he berated Congress for junking the UN sanctions against Rhodesian chrome. Scali loftily proclaimed this as an "open violation of international law.

Taking Scali caustically to task for this exceptional condemnation of Congress, Sen. Harry Byrd. Ind. - Va., author of the bill scrapping the UN embargo, tartly remarked that apparently the envoy "has been affected by the rarefied atmosphere of that magnificent penthouse apartment that the U.S. government furnishes him in the Waldorf Towers in New York City.

Rental of that lavish residence. Byrd noted pointedly, costs U.S. taxpayers \$33,000 a year.

Of course, we want the American ambassador to the United Nations to have good quarters," said Byrd. "But we do not want him to be affected by the rarefied atmosphere which he finds himself in while residing in these sumptuous uarters.

Basis of Scali's attack on the ongressional revocation of the UN-imposed boycott of Rhodesian metallurgical chrome, essential for key weapons production, was that it was "legally binding on the United States.

In other words, Scali took the extraordinary position of maintaining that UN edicts supersede acts of the U.S. ongress.

This remarkable contention was flatly repudiated by Byrd. 'Ambassador Scali holds that Security Council decision is legally binding on the United

States," declared Byrd. "What that gets down to is that the U.S. ·Congress must subordinate itself to acts taken by the Security Council of the United Nations. Surely he must know that is not correct, and if he doesn't know it is not correct. then he should read the laws and understand the Constitution




