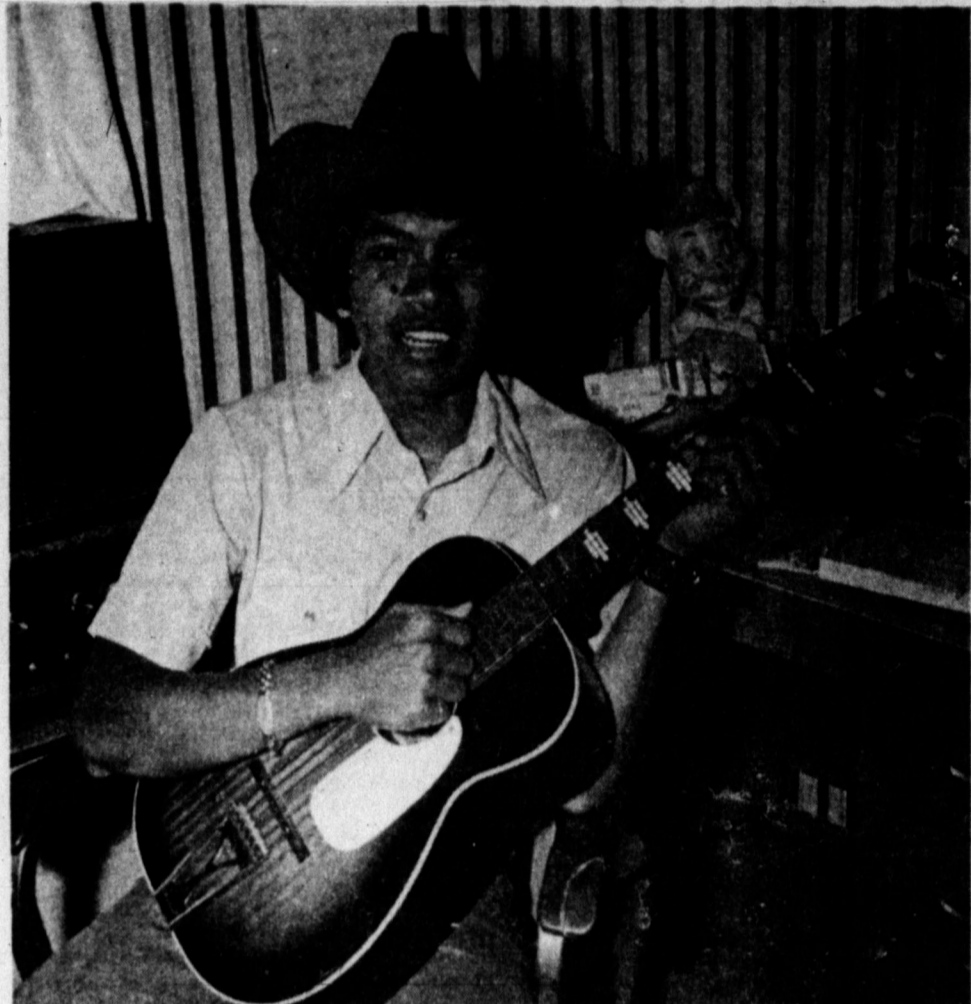


Another Quiet Day At Fink 'Festivity'

Investment Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) — The administration's freeze and upcoming Phase IV represent "an ad hoc response to the popular outcry for doing something about prices" rather than a coherent plan to fight the burst of world-wide inflation, says Argus Weekly Staff Report. The public now has gotten what it wanted, the latter says, but the long-term reaction to more intense controls will depend on whether the benefits of the new program in the form of reduced inflation outweigh the distortions that inevitably arise once controls are imposed.

The schizophrenic behavior of the market in recent sessions is the result of its psychological unreadiness to sustain an advance, says E. F. Hutton. The firm says the market's "only course of action is to vacillate until a change occurs in the psychological, technical or fundamental factors which can alter this balance." It adds the market has absorbed a sharp decline, apparently exhausting its downside momentum.

"The U.S. business system is not out of control, perhaps, but it is plainly feverish and incoherent," says Albert T. Sommers, chief economist for The Conference Board. The ordinary rules of the business cycle, Sommers says, no longer apply, but the immediate crisis represents a genuine test of American economic policy to respond constructively "after a year of ideological persistence and four months of deeply regrettable paralysis."

What will happen to pensions?

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — A part of any reform debates in 1973 will be what to do about the tax benefits for pension plans. The big issues will be whether pension promises will be made more secure and whether coverage will be widened. Of the two issues, the security issues will be the most important.

WILL THERE BE EFFORTS TO MAKE PENSIONS SECURE?

The answer has to be yes. Both the administration and members of Congress are pushing their plans. All are mild but if the size of pension promises is to be unchecked, making these promises secure will be very expensive. This is why the politicians don't want to change vesting and funding very much. Whether these small changes now will lead to still tougher rules in the future, we can't tell.

WHAT IS PORTABILITY?

Some pension visionaries have a dream that someday all employer pensions could be "portable" like the system most college professors are under now. Professors' pensions are generally funded completely and currently with one fund. When a professor goes to a new school he still

has his pension reserve — the new school just takes over adding to it. This ideal is called portability. With universal portability, all workers could take their pension entitlements with them from job to job (just as they take Social Security).

Consumer advocate Ralph Nader has proposed that the present system of pension plans sponsored by corporations, industries or labor unions be replaced by a system of competing fully-funded retirement benefit funds. Each employer would notify his employee which of these funds to send the employer contributions to. If the employee became dissatisfied with the investment performance of the retirement benefit fund, he could switch his share to another fund.

The visionaries think that portability would lead to a more efficient economy where workers could freely move to jobs where they could be more productive without the anchor of losing pension benefits in the old job. We are a long way from this.

WILL PRIVATE PENSION COVERAGE INCREASE?

I think the answer to this is not very much. The Canadian

experience suggests that the deduction for employees will not change things significantly. In fact, the Treasury's own revenue estimates suggest that most of this effect will be on government employees who are already in pension plans but who have to contribute half the cost out of their own salary with no tax deduction. Giving them a deduction for this other half will be nice for them but it doesn't get more people into pension plans.

Part of the reason that I don't look for much in the way of expansion is that the other policy issue of providing more security will make pen-

to improve security are bad. The social goal should be more pensions, not more pension plans, and providing vesting and funding within present plans will mean more pensions.

The other reason that I don't expect much success in efforts to expand coverage is that this is a little like caviar; somewhat of a luxury. Pensions are far more attractive to high-income workers than to low-income workers. As we have said before, most low-income workers don't want it when they can buy their own.

If you think a little about that last paragraph it may occur to you to ask: "Since the available tax benefit (postponement) is more attractive to high-income people and these high-income people will be saving part of their income anyway why does the law persist in providing very generous 'incentives' for high-income people to get very high pensions?"

That is a hard question which may be the reason why neither Congress nor the administration has faced it.

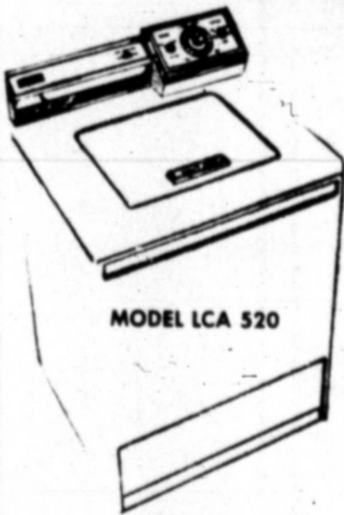

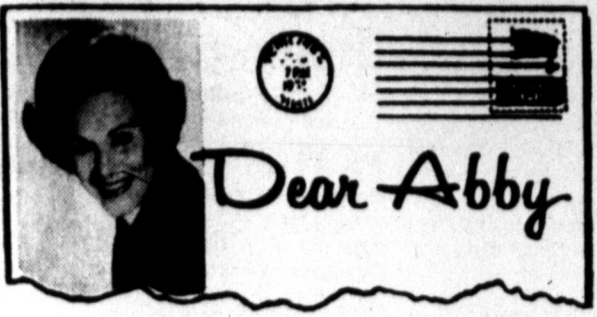

Fred Karpin gives this hand played by British expert Victor Mollo to show card reading at its best. The twist to this hand is that John Q. Ordinary bridge player would make four spades just as surely as Victor did. Victor ruffed the third heart and played out three rounds of trumps. At this point in the proceedings a good player not quite in the expert class would reason, "West has shown six hearts and three spades. He must be short in clubs." Then the good player would take his ace of clubs; lead a club to dummy's king, finesse the 10 of clubs on the way back and lose to West's jack. Victor decided to try to get some more information by playing diamonds. Should West show up with two diamonds he could not have more than two clubs so Victor played ace-and-another-diamond. When West showed out on the second diamond lead Victor had obtained a complete count of his hand as three spades, six hearts, one diamond and three clubs. There were no problems left. He ruffed the diamond East led with his last trump; played out his top clubs to drop the jack and made the 10th trick with his last club.

70 Top Men Stars Out Of Wimbledon

LONDON (UPI) — Nearly 70 top male tennis stars pulled out of Wimbledon today, virtually turning over next week's tournament to the girls.

Sixty-seven members of the Association of Tennis professionals (ATP) handed withdrawal forms to Wimbledon Referee Capt. Mike Gibson Friday morning, formalizing their boycott of the world's premier tennis championship over Yugoslavia's suspension of its top star, Nikki Pilic.

The game's top women players said they will appear on schedule, despite the formation Thursday night of a 65-member professional association similar to the men's ATP.

The tournament itself was not in danger. The strawberries and

cream traditional at the All-England Lawn Tennis club's Wimbledon grounds were ordered and ready. The famed center court had a newly laid turf.

But withdrawal of the 67 men—including 14 of the 16 original seeds in the men's singles championship—certainly lessened the quality of the tournament's men's competition.

Wimbledon officials immediately prepared a new seeding list for the men's portion of the tournament with those players still competing.

They included last year's runnerup, Ilie Nastase of Romania, Jan Kodes of Czechoslovakia, Alex Metreveli of Russia and the American Jimmy Connors of Belleville, Ill.

But reigning champion Stan Smith of Sea Pines, S.C., Italy's Adriano Panatta and Manuel Orantes of Spain were among those submitting withdrawal forms.

The war of Wimbledon began when Pilic was suspended by the Yugoslav tennis federation for not showing up to play in the Davis Cup competition against New Zealand. ATP members said if Pilic could not play at Wimbledon they would not.

Efforts to call an armistice went into the early hours of Friday morning. The British government's minister for sport, Eldon Griffiths, intervened twice in meetings with ATP and the opposing side, the International Lawn Tennis Federation (ILTF).

The ATP's executive committee met for five hours until 3 a.m. today. Then ATP President Cliff Drysdale said all hopes of a solution were gone.

"But of course, Mr. President. As you know, my schedule calls for my departure today."

"Gee whiz, Mr. General Secretary, it seems like you just got here. I feel as if we are just getting to know one another."

"I share that sentiment, Mr. President. My visit to your great country has been all too short."

"Then why don't you stay on

for another week or so? Pat would love to have you use the guest bedroom."

"I appreciate your asking me, Mr. President, but, alas, I cannot avail myself of your hospitality any longer."

What's the Rush?
"What's the big rush? Haven't you been having a good time?"

"Believe me, Mr. President, I couldn't have been more beautifully entertained. However, I have an appointment to confer with President Pompidou in Paris tomorrow."

"Tell me what. Suppose I get Pompidou on the phone and say you've been detained. We could explain that you've had an attack of gout or something. I'm sure he would understand. The French practically invented gout."

"Mr. President, what you are proposing is quite impossible. An official state visit cannot be extended on the spur of the moment."

"Not even if I say please?"

"Mr. President, I must ask you to give me back my luggage."

"Pretty please with sugar on it?"

"Mr. President, you simply must stop blocking the doorway."

"Very well. If you insist on going, how about if I go home with you for a while?"

Court Decides Against 'Sex' Discrimination In Advertising

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court ruled Thursday newspapers can be prohibited from carrying help-wanted ads in a way that indicates one sex is preferred over the other.

The 5-4 decision rejected an appeal of the Pittsburgh Press, which had been challenged on the practice by the National Organization for Women (NOW).

The help-wanted columns in the Press are captioned "jobs-male interest," "jobs-female interest," and "jobs-male-female."

A Pittsburgh ordinance bars job advertising that discriminates on the basis of sex or assists anyone in such discriminatory activity.

NOW complained to the Pittsburgh Human Relations Commission citing the second part of the law.

The commission and state courts found against the paper on the ground that commercial

advertising is not protected by the first amendment on freedom of the press.

In the Supreme Court's majority opinion, Justice Lewis F. Powell agreed, citing a 1942 decision in a New York City case where an ordinance forbidding distribution in streets of printed handbills bearing commercial advertising matter was upheld.

At the same time, Powell emphasized that the Court is doing nothing to allow government at any level to forbid the press from publishing and distributing advertisements commenting on the ordinance, or the propriety of sex preferences in employment. "Nor does our decision authorize any restriction whatever, whether of

content or layout, on stories or commentary originated by Pittsburgh Press, its columnists or its contributors," he wrote. "On the contrary, we reaffirm unequivocally the protection afforded to editorial judgment and to the free expression of views on these and other issues, however controversial."

The dissenters were Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justices William O. Douglas, Potter Stewart and Harry A. Blackmun.

Burger called the majority opinion "a serious encroachment on the freedom of press guaranteed by the First Amendment."

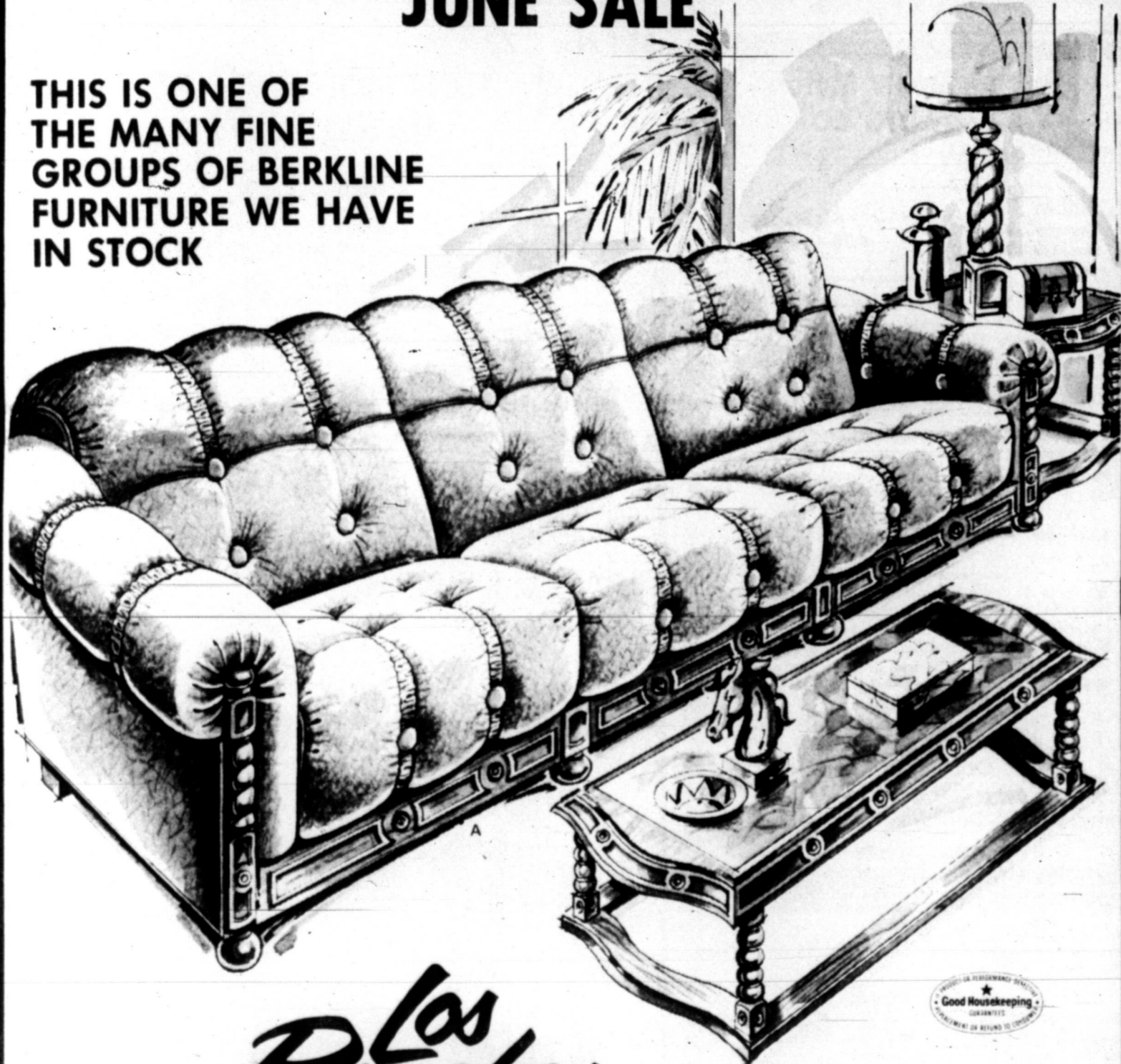

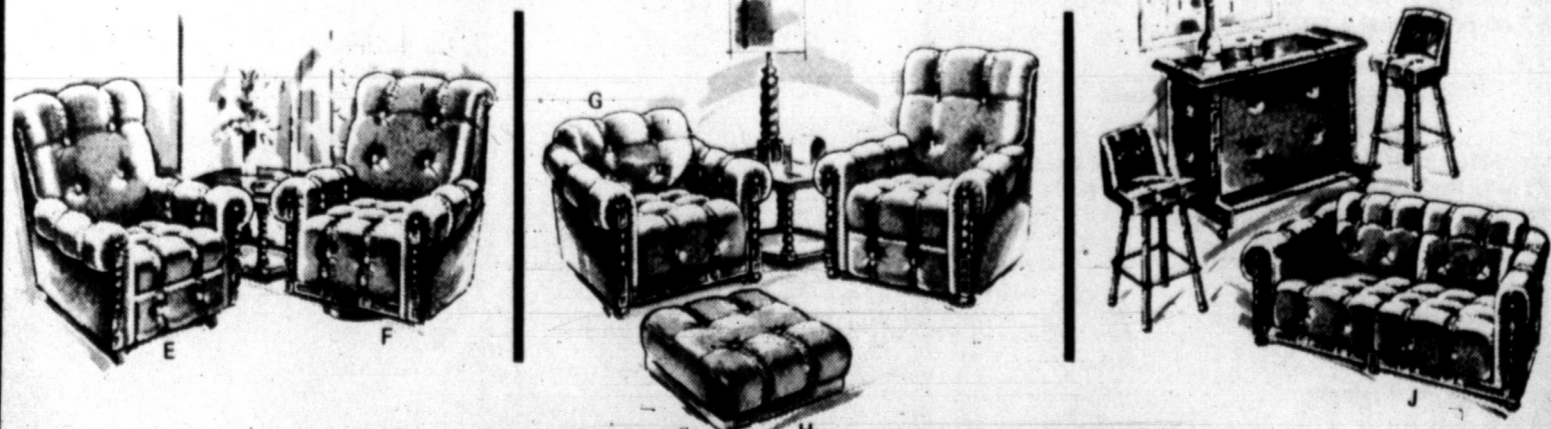
