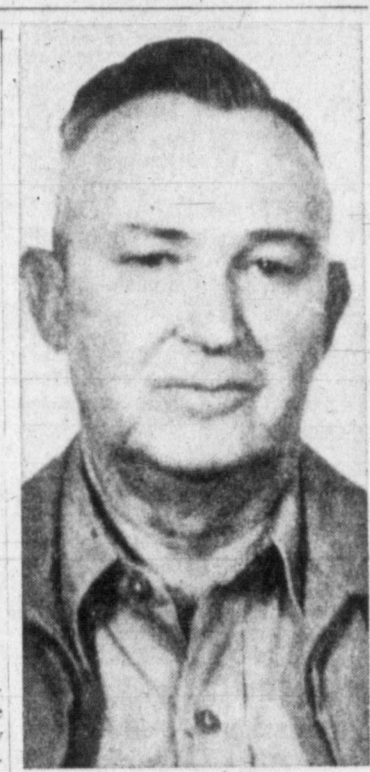

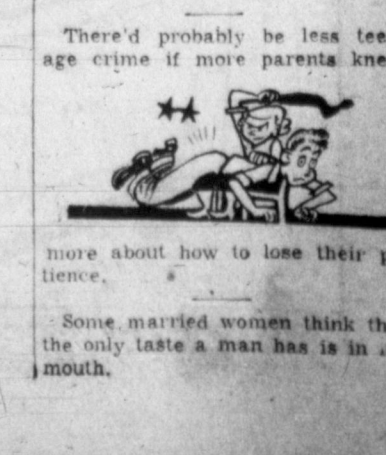

HOLLYWOOD—UP—Workers are hammering 10 hours a day on the biggest "set" for a television program—but it's a race to get it finished on time.

The park to be built near Anaheim, where many of Disney's regular TV shows will be filmed, originally was a flat farm of 12,000 orange trees.

ABC-TV is rolling out 22 cameras for the initial telecast—a record for a live TV program.

Marine Jet Pilots Fly Near Formosa

TAIPEI, Formosa—UP—U.S. Marine jet pilots have begun operating from airfields in the potentially explosive Formosa Straits area, it was revealed Wednesday.

A small group of crack Marine-Navy pilots are undergoing "familiarization" training in the area, an authoritative American source said.

This Air Force keeps one squadron, usually about 25 planes, on Formosa at all times. It rotates the units at short intervals to familiarize the maximum possible number of U. S. fighter pilots in Asia with the Formosa area.

Shivers Lauds Legislature

AUSTIN—UP—Gov. Allan Shivers commended the 54th Legislature that adjourned late Tuesday for "a job well done," but he expressed regret that a \$100 million statewide water conservation program failed to pass.

Shivers said he was disappointed that the constitutional amendment to finance the water program, under which state aid would have been given local-level projects, was not submitted to the people for their decision.

"Water will continue to be our most important statewide problem until it is solved," the governor said.

Adenauer's Statesmanship Has Boosted West Germany

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, the "old fox" of the German Federal Republic, is sitting on top of the world.

Due largely to Adenauer's own statesmanship, West Germany has become a sovereign nation and has been made a full partner in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

And now Soviet Russia, in an attempt to head off West German rearmament, is trying to curry favor with him.

To what extent the Russians may succeed is something for the Western Allies to worry about during the next few weeks.

No Lost Sleep But it seems safe to predict that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and other allied diplomatic leaders will not lose any sleep over the situation.

The Kremlin's invitation to Adenauer to go to Moscow and negotiate a full diplomatic and trade relations quite naturally caused a diplomatic sensation.

It was, however, a logical move and one that Western leaders had foreseen.

Dispatches from Bonn, the West German capital, say that Adenauer is practically certain to accept the Kremlin's bid.

"His position is so strong, however, that it seems possible he may tell the Russians he will see them in Berlin instead of Moscow."

Russia has two things to offer Adenauer. First is the prospect of uniting the 18 million people of Communist-ruled East Germany with the 50 million people of Adenauer's free West Germany.

Second is the prospect of restoring to Germany the rich territory, extending eastward of the Oder and Neisse Rivers, which is now occupied by Red Poland.

That is the tempting bait. But Adenauer's price would be a pledge by West Germany to stop rearmament, drop all its ties with the Western democracies, and accept the status of a neutral nation.

That is a neutral nation, of course, which the Red armies would be free to overrun at will.

Not Like Him Adenauer is not the man, on his record, to pay that price.

Ramrod straight, with a sharp-featured poker face, West Germany's leader is as strong an anti-Communist as is any Western leader.

Further, he knows Germany's strength, he knows Russia is afraid of a rearmaged Germany and he knows Germany will become a world power again.

Winston Churchill, a tired old

man of 80, has just retired from active politics.

Adenauer, who was 79 on Jan. 5, is at the peak of his career and is the strongest figure in West Germany.

Adenauer has devoted his entire adult life to politics except during the Nazi regime. He was unknown internationally until he was made chancellor on the formation of the West German Republic in 1949.

Since then he has won the respect of the free world and the enmity of the Communists.

Adenauer knows that Russia will have to recognize his West German Republic sooner or later whatever may happen right now.

New Union To Be Agent For Miners

CARLSBAD, N. M.—UP—The AFL operating engineers union is the new bargaining agent for maintenance workers at the Duval Sulphur and Potash Co. here.

In an NLRB election Wednesday, the AFL union got 26 votes and the Mine-Mill union got 23.

The Mine-Mill union, increasingly embroiled in legal difficulties since the CIO expelled in 1950 on the ground that it was dominated by Communists, has been fighting raids by CIO unions in several western states, particularly in Montana.

It recently was denied access to NLRB services in labor disputes because the NLRB said the secretary-treasurer, Maurice E. Travis, was obviously a Communist sympathizer.

Clinton Jencks, a Mine-Mill union local president in New Mexico, was last year convicted in federal district court at El Paso of filing a false Taft-Hartley anti-Communist affidavit.

Two more NLRB elections are scheduled for the Carlsbad area soon, and the AFL victory Wednesday, although narrow, was expected to have a strong influence with present Mine-Mill members in the other plants.

Drunk Drivers Get Rough Treatment From Juries

OKLAHOMA CITY—UP— Is the Oklahoma finally coming up with the answer to the plea of sober motorists, "when are they going to stop drunk drivers?"

Highway patrol figures show nearly 150 persons were injured in state crashes last year in which drivers had been drinking. That's about one of every three traffic deaths.

Reports from the patrol and the courts indicate the drunk driver is having the roughest fight with the law in a long time.

A recent verdict of a Bartlesville, Okla., jury is indicative of the stepped-up prosecution.

A jury found 42-year-old driver guilty of causing the death of a woman in a head-on auto crash. It recommended two years in prison.

At Hugo, Okla., Tuesday, a motorist became angry when forced off the road by a drunk. He chased the drunk and caught him. The wobbly driver was fined \$375 and sentenced to 10 days in jail.

Convictions Much Higher

In Pottawatomie county, Judge John L. Green says convictions are now running about 80 per cent in drunk driving cases, compared with about 10 per cent a few years ago.

"The attitude of juries is responsible," said Green, a former county attorney. "Eight years ago, it was practically impossible to convict a man on a highway patrolman's testimony, and private citizens wouldn't testify."

Green credits education, the drunkometer and a new jury wheel system for the change.

Most of Pottawatomie county's tipsy drivers are getting a \$100 fine and often a jail sentence.

Enforcement in nearby Seminole county took a peculiar twist recently where County Judge David Cook has established a reputation for heavy fines of drunk drivers. The judge himself was charged with the offense. He has not been tried.

The patrol says it is still too early to evaluate the effect of the new law requiring a minimum 10-day jail sentence for all drunk drivers. There has been some decline in guilty pleas.

Light Drinker Worse

Safety Commissioner Jim Lookabaugh points out the patrol is just as concerned with the light drinker on the highway even though he may not be legally drunk.

"The man who has two drinks under his belt is sometimes more dangerous than a man who is sozzled," he said. "He thinks he is in control of his faculties, but he isn't. He feels exhilarated. He passes when he shouldn't. He's more apt to drive too fast."

Slate law provides a driver's license must be taken away for one year if a motorist is convicted of drunk driving. But this doesn't always keep him off the road.

Lookabaugh said an accident involving a drunk driver is often worse than others because of excessive speed.

Second A-Sub To Be Launched

GROTON, Conn.—UP— The atomic-powered submarine Sea Wolf, the second nuclear undersea warship of the Navy, will be christened and launched here July 21, it was announced Wednesday.

The Sea Wolf, larger and more powerful than the USS Nautilus, will slip down the ways at the electric boat division of General Dynamics Corp., where the Nautilus was commissioned last September.

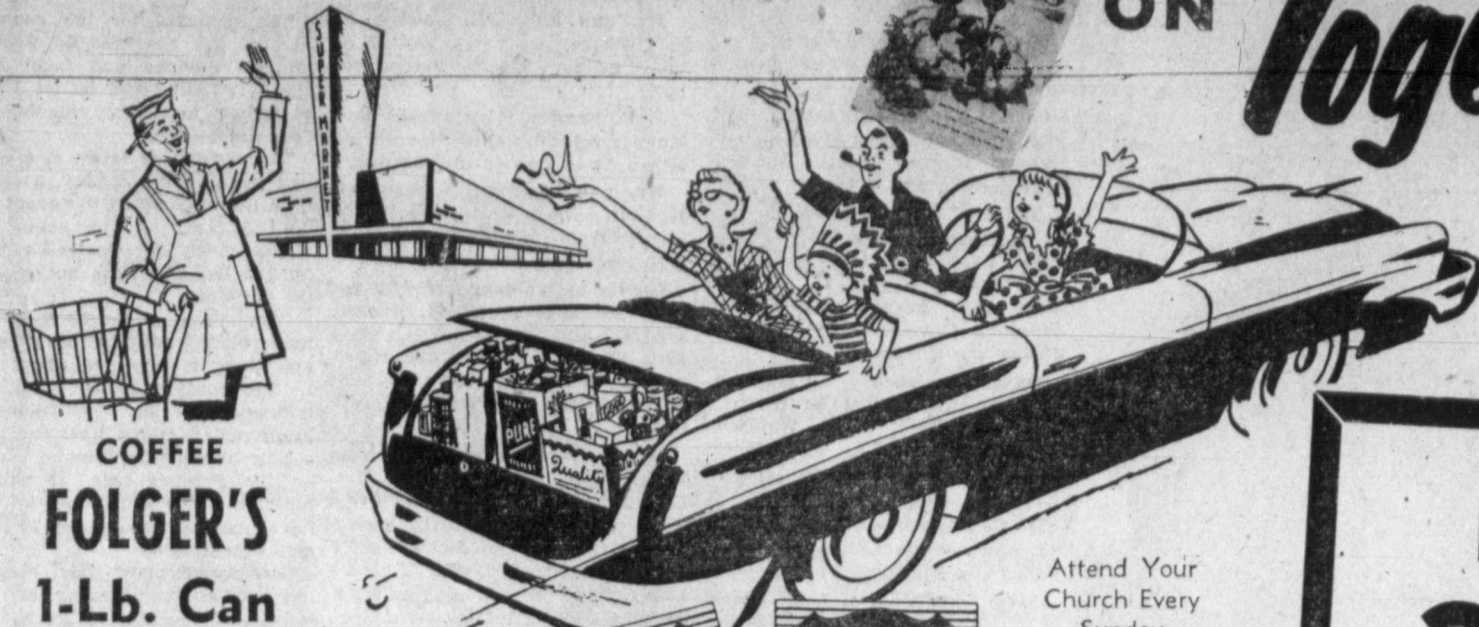

SOVIET GOAL

Goal of current Soviet diplomacy is a belt of neutral nations from the Baltic Sea to the Adriatic that would separate European members of NATO from the Soviet Union and its satellites. At present only Austria and Switzerland are neutral in Central Europe. Playing on all Germans' deep desire for unification, Moscow holds out neutrality as bait for West Germany. So far, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has rejected the bait. Southern link in the neutral belt would be Yugoslavia.

Grasshoppers Replace Drouth As Texas Plague

AUSTIN —UP— Except for the southern counties, surface moisture is ample over virtually all of Texas, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said Wednesday. However, grasshoppers were threatening crops, particularly in the blacklands and eastern counties, the USDA said in its weekly crop and weather bulletin. Light to flooding rains in central and eastern counties stopped field work, but in South Texas much more rain was needed for cotton and pastures. Most early feed crops in that area were too far along to be materially helped by rain. The past week was one of the peak weeks of farm activity for the year, as farmers rushed plantings, replanting, cultivating, hay baling and combining, the USDA said. Wheat harvest was in progress in North Texas and active in cross-timbers and low rolling plains counties, while combining of oats was progressing rapidly in commercial areas of North Texas. Corn made good development and prospects were "very promising," except for early corn in dry southern counties, the USDA reported. Current cotton prospects for the state were reported promising, but the USDA said nights had been too cool for development and non-irrigated acreage in south Texas had been hard hit by dry weather. Conditions continued favorable in most commercial vegetable areas. Movement of Rio Grande Valley cantaloupes held at a higher level than usual for this period, mainly because the season started late. Tomatoes were moving in heavy volume from the lower Valley, while watermelon harvest was extending into early non-irrigated areas. A good supply of range and pasture feed was reported available over much of the eastern half of the state and a number of farmers were mowing surplus grass for hay. Cattle and calves were making excellent gains on lush feed in the eastern half of the state and were picking up green feed was coming in in the northwest. PARIS—UP—American evangelist Billy Graham inspired by the response to his Paris crusade, Wednesday scheduled a whirlwind tour of 15 major continental cities.

The tour will take Graham to Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Norway, Denmark and back to London before he returns to the United States late next month.

A spokesman for the evangelist said Graham is "very happy about the results of his crusade in France."

"Some skeptics told him the Parisians would not come to big evangelistic meetings," the spokesman said. "Yet, he has drawn crowds from 7,000 to 9,000 persons and each night 300 to 400 persons respond to his invitation and make a decision for Christ."

Graham held a prayer meeting with his team members before noon Wednesday. Then he rested in his hotel room for the fourth meeting of his crusade in the huge Palais des Sports Wednesday night. Graham will leave Paris late Sunday for a short rest at some still undisclosed place, probably in France, to prepare for his continental tour and to work on his book.

Far East Narcotics Decreased
WASHINGTON—UPU—The Defense Department's top health officer said Wednesday that narcotics addiction among American troops in the Far East is being reduced to "relatively minor proportions." Dr. Frank S. Berry, assistant defense secretary for health and medical affairs, told a Senate Judiciary subcommittee the narcotics problem among American troops is being increasingly well handled.

increased American labor and wages also accounted for the success of the "wetback" operation. The attorney general's comments about subversion in unions was in reply to a proposal made by Rep. Francis Walter (D-Pa.), chairman of the House Un-American Activities committee. Walter requested that the Mexican and Canadian borders be closed to dues-paying aliens who belong to the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers and the United Electrical Workers unions.

Fifty per cent of the Mine-Mill union members working in the El Paso smelter live in Juarez, Mex., across the border from El Paso. The issue raised by Walter has become a key factor in a union election struggle among 850 employees at the smelter operated in El Paso by the American Smelting and Refining Co. It involves the Mine-Mill union and CIO steelworkers. The steelworkers are seeking to displace the Mine-Mill union as the bargaining agency for the workers.

But Sen. Dennis Chavez (D-N.M.) asked Brownell in a letter to give serious consideration to Walter's proposal. "To follow the suggestion (close the borders) would interfere in a strictly union election matter..." Chavez said, besides denying a living to the families of many innocent workmen. Brownell, however, said he hadn't seen Chavez's letter.

Brownell said if the Justice Department uncovers subversive activities against alien union members, it will prosecute the unions and individuals involved and deportation will be recommended for the individuals.

Mine-Mill is the union of international representative Clinton E. Jenks, who was convicted of falsifying a non-Communist affidavit under the Taft-Hartley law and sentenced to five years in prison. However, Jenks has appealed and is free on bond.



Haymes To Seek U.S. Citizenship

HOLLYWOOD —UP— Crooner Dick Haymes, encouraged by last week's federal court decision that he was not deportable, said he would fly to Reno, Nev., Wednesday to file for U. S. citizenship "to correct the mistakes of the past and erase the 'stalker' stigma against my name."

Haymes said he and his attorney, Welburn Mayock, would file in Nevada's Washoe county where the singer established legal residence last year when he and his actress wife, Rita Hayworth, lived in seclusion at Lake Tahoe. "I want to be an American citizen more than anyone ever wanted anything," the crooner said. "As long as the deportation thing was

hanging over my head I thought it would be presumptuous for to apply."

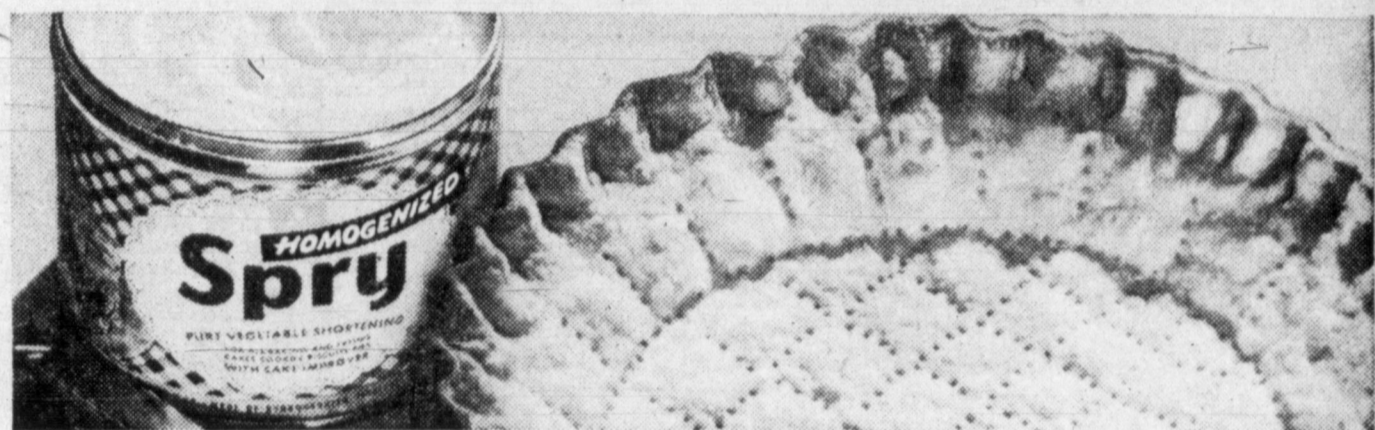

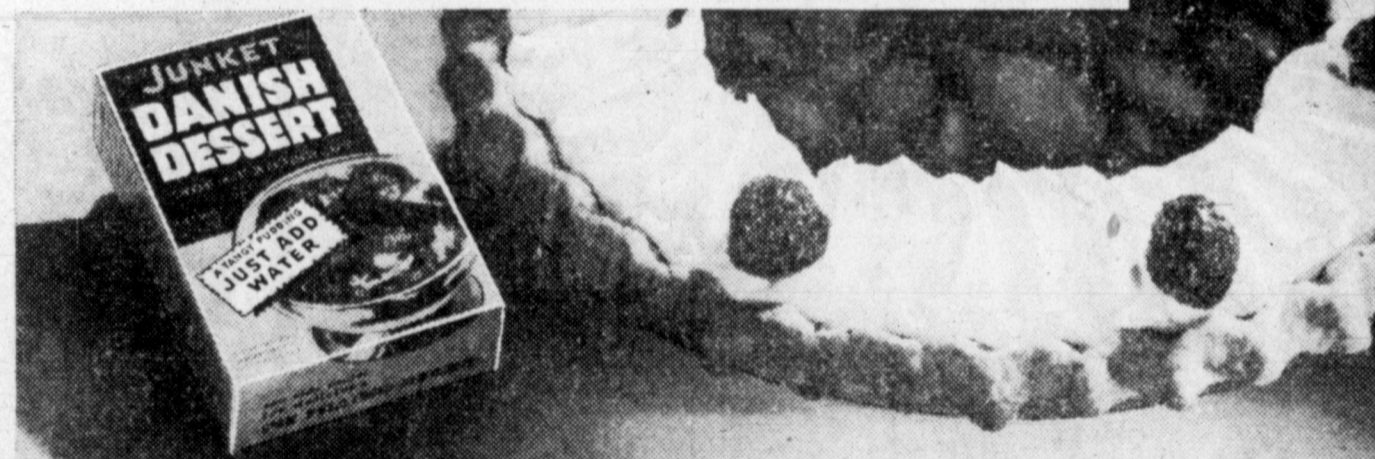

Shackles Of Kitchen Routine Are Cut With Open Room, Modern Accessories

Like many another housewife, I've been spending a lot of time in the kitchen. And it sharpens our appreciation for some equipment we already have.

Until now I hadn't, for example, fully appreciated a couple of new saucepans I have. These are stainless steel with a copper core. Food cooks quickly, with little risk of scorching. The real boon is that they clean up, time after time, to the original shine with only a soapy dunk in the dishwasher. I also like the way the cool handles are shaped so that left or right hand can get a firm grasp.

An automatic dishwasher is better than an extra arm. A new, mobile dishwasher has talking points for home owners as well as home renters. This one hooks up by roll-up hoses to the kitchen sink, and a built-in heater brings water to high heat for the best cleaning action.

And the dishwasher can be rolled around to pick up dirty dishes or store clean ones. Although compact in size, the fact that it holds a service for eight attests to a roomy interior. Women who do have dishwashers tell me this roominess is important because the machine needn't be turned on as often, and it can double as storage space for the clean, dry, everyday

dishes you use at each meal. When you're held to kitchen routine for several hours at a stretch, the value of modern planning asserts itself. Our old-fashioned kitchen has five doors. This encourages traffic underfoot I could do without, particularly when I'm transporting a steaming kettle from stove to sink.

Modern, open-kitchen plans which keep appliances in a compact radius, but separate from eating and serving counters, make sense to me.

So do the neutral color schemes which keep the kitchen in key with the rest of the house. One of the recent steps in this direction is a ready-made cabinet line which features a black pattern over sandalwood finish, baked on steel. Trying to remove stains and minimize knife cuts on the old inoleum-topped counters reinforces my determination to splurge some day on the hard-plastic laminated tops. These can be installed on existing counter tops if you have built-in cabinets, as we do, which are old but serviceable. A tip to remember is that prices vary with the pattern and color so that it pays to scan the samples carefully. I find, for example, that I can get the effect I'd like for a third less cost if I pick a beige linen pattern rather than a similar shade in a wood-grain pattern.

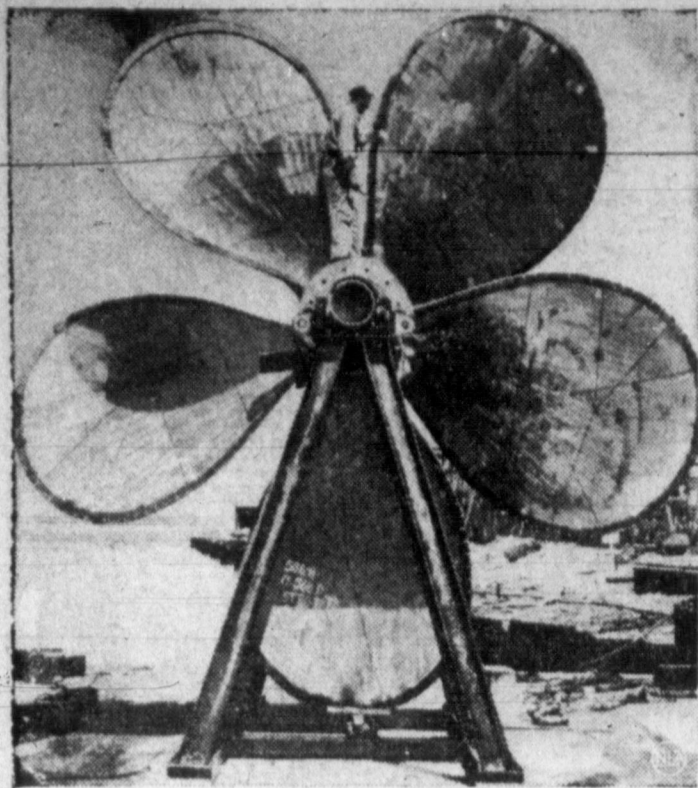
