

concerned. We have never yet seen anything exactly like Kerwin. He is really slower (readapting), by far, than any that we have seen.

Kerwin was not able to finish his medical tests Friday because of his cardiovascular system weakness. The lack of gravity lets the heart grow lazy, often causing readjustment problems for spacmen.

Weitz, 40, also was nauseous and dizzy following his medical tests but was fine after a five minute rest. Hawkins said.

picture of the wheat harvest in the Texas Panhandle can be drawn from the fact that even dry land production has not fallen below 20 bushels anywhere, while average production has been crowding Babcock's unofficial mark.

The rumored fuel shortage of a few days ago was cause for considerable concern but not for any delay in the local harvest. The "scare" started in Wichita Falls, where it was rumored just 15 days ago there would not be enough fuel to finish the day of harvesting.

The News made several contacts in that area and found the tightest squeeze was in the Burkburnett area and had to do with gasoline more than diesel. One distributor in the area told The News diesel had been obtained from other distrubutors but gasoline was still needed to fuel the trucks carrying the grain to the

elevators. A ray of hope came with the

in the dates. The Wichita Falls area harvested in May last year. Allocation of fuel was made this year on the basis of consumption for the same month last year

So, not enough care was taken in husbanding May fuel allotments and a June harvest this year had to be done with fuel rations not geared to harvesting needs, officials reported.

Pampa and Gray County are better off. First, the harvest last year was in June so allotments matched. Secondly, all distributors and a number of the persons related to the fuel field took an extra concern for local harvesting operations and the only tight squeeze was for diesel

In fact, the local fuel picture was so rosy that at least three combine crews stated they just came on to Gray County, where fuel was plentiful, when they encountered shortages in other parts of the state. Thus, the consensus is that

Gray County producers will harvest a bumper crop this year, dimmed neither by the shadow of fuel shortage or the low prices of a huge surplus

"I don't know why, but maybe it's because he had so much faith in Nixon, even after all

this," she said. Mrs. Mitchell declined to say from where she was calling. Thursday, she was seen leaving her New York City apartment house with travel luggage. Mitchell apparently stayed be-

As to how her husband is bearing up after being implicated in the Watergate scandal, Mrs. Mitchell said, "He's a hurt person. My husband had more integrity on Wall Street than anyone else. He feels everybody's got their tail between their legs and is

running now. She said her husband had lost a "helluva lot of weight" in the past few months, and had been preparing for his defense.

She once again said she would be "perfectly willing" to testify before the Watergate investigating committee, but

added "they don't want me. She also disclosed that Mitchell "still takes up" for H. R. Haldeman, the dismissed White House chief of staff. John D. Ehrlichman, Nixon's former domestic adviser, she said. however "was so nasty to John,

it was un believable. Because of Ehrlichman, Mrs. Mitchell said, her husband wanted to quit as head of the Justice Department two years after he was in office.

## Test Your Job Has time run out on 40-hour week?

NEW YORK - (NEA) you're tired of the old 9-to-Monday through Friday How does the old 6:27-to-

grind sound to you? That may be the shape of the working day to come if a group of proposed changes in the work pattern catches on. Three of the suggested

plans: The three- or four-day work week - This system compresses the work week into four 9- or 10-hour days or three 12-hour days.

Flexible working hours - A plan that allows workers to choose their own hours within certain limits as long as the hours worked per month add up to an agreed total.

The eight-day week - A proposal made by a New York marketing company president, John Ward Pearson, in a recent book. "The Eight-Day Week," this would abolish the Monday-Sunday week. It would substitute eight identical days - with nothing comparable to the weekend -Employes would work four days out of every eight

The impetus for these suggestions comes from a general feeling that most people are not happy with their work

As a report on "Work in America" prepared last year for the Department of Health. Education and Welfare by a special task force said: "Dull, repetitive, seemingly meaningless tasks, offering little challenge or autonomy, are causing discontent among workers at all occupational

Revising the traditional working-hour pattern is one way of attacking that malaise. Workers can avoid rush-hour traffic, make better use of leisure time, and, theoretically anyway, exert more control over their daily lives.

Employers benefit indirectly from improved employe morale and in some cases more efficient use of equipment.

No substantial experiment evidence exists at this point to back up the theories. As La bor Department economist Janice Hedges points out, any successes so far may be only

tem is popular enough in Europe that about 15 per cent of all Swiss industrial firms use it. But it is still relatively unheard of in the United States.

The Flextime Corporation which provides equipment and counseling on the system and is flourishing in Europe, has rounded up about 20 American clients since it began business here earlier this year. They include the Industrial National Bank of Rhode Island, Sun Oil of Philadelphia and some city departments in Baltimore and Washington, D.C. (The Flextime hardware, which costs \$55 per employe, is basically a time clock that allows workers to keep a running total of hours worked.)

Employes come to work and. leave whenever they want as long as they are present during a "core" period, usually from around 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and reach a fixed total of hours worked per week or

By 'the Society," Hutchinson meant the Fabian Society, a Marxist - inspired group that aimed to remold civilization is its own image. Fabian leaders used the beguest to found the London School of Economics

The Fabian Society contained unusually perceptive individuals. Unlike classic Marxists, they discerned that Socialism was not necessarily the product of revolution. It already was inherent in government ventures of the past. It need only be nurtured. and it would come to pass. The London School Of Economics (LSE) was to serve as a hotbed that would safeguard the seedling students until they were strong enough to be transplanted into positions of influence and power from which they would foster the world socialist order To better prepare these

stud ats. LSE sometimes employed a few non-socialist economists among its many doctrinaire faculty members: The benefits were two-fold. First, the students were 'exposed to opposing points of view and thus were equipped to combat them Second the school itself acquired a reputation for academic toleration. Although LSE's foundations and even its aims are well recognized today for what they are - a design to socialize the world - the school itself enjoys a certain amount of respectability because it was the Fabian program merely to dominate opposing views, not to exclude them. But after nearly 80 years in this yein, the London School Of Economics is apparently headed for some rather traumatic changes.

For this spring Professor Hans Jurgen Eysenck. professor of psychology at London University, was

speaking in LSE's new theater building when he was attacked by a group of about 26 persons. According to the London Times of May 9, 1973, Professor Eysenck, age 57, "was punched, picked and spat on. His spectacles were broken and the side of his nose cut before, shocked and bewildered, he was dragged clear by members of the student executive.

Three hours later, the Times reported, other student leaders were attacked in the same lecture hall when they tried to address a meeting called by the LSE's Afro-Asian Society. It so happens that Professor Eysenck leans to a school of opinion which holds that blacks are not as smart as other races. He tends to attribute IQ differences between whites and blacks to heredity. In other words, he is voicing a point of view that is not popular in today's make - everybody equal climate of opinion.

We mention the history of LSE and Professor Eysenck's unfortunate experience for one purpose only. That is to point out that the pummeling he received is the natural and logical consequence of the Fabian version of Marxist doctrine.

That assertion, of course, will sound contradictory in view of the Fabian history at LSE, the tradition of tolerating opposite teachings. But look at the essence of Fabian doctrines. The Fabians say the state shall rule and may create any law necessary or desirable to that end. They say the state can do so because the state is strong. And this is the same claim made by the 26 persons who put Professor Eysenck down. They didn't want him to speak. They prevented him from speaking because they were physically able to do so. That's plain old-fashioned Marxian hardline. The attackers only did what the Fabian Society and the London School of Economics had taught. LSE is suicidal both in birth and tendency.



## U.S. Vote Blocks UN Hypocrisy in S. Africa

In casting only the fourth American veto in United Nations history, the United States recently blocked the latest hypocritical plan regarding Rhodesia and South Africa to emerge in the Security Council.

The veto, exercised also by Great Britain, blocked a resolution which would have greatly extended the unique economic sanctions imposed against Rhodesia. It would have ordered all countries to limit their purchases from South Africa and the Portuguese territories of Mozambique and Angola to 1965 levels. This date is when the sanctions against Rhodesia began, but since then some Rhodesian products went through these neighboring countries to foreign ports.

Thus, the object was to tighten the squeeze on Rhodesia through its neighbors, and ultimately to force the white-minority government to yield to

African majority rule. The case against Rhodesia would be much more just if the U.N. were not so extremely hypocritical and enacted similar sanctions against other governments. But in all the world, Rhodesia is considered unique by the U.N. It alone has worldwide economic sanctions against

Uganda. Last year, Uganda expelled at least '50,000 Asians who had lived in that country for several years or decades.

-Tanzania. There is periodic warfare between Tanzania and Uganda, with innocent civillans slaughtered. Other African countries also have periodic

-Rwanda. Between 10,000 and 20,000 Watusis were ruthlessly slaughtered in 1964.

-The Congo. Thousands were killed in recent years in the Gizanga secession, Simba rebellion, Katangan gendarme revolt, and mercenary revolt. This is one case in which the U.N. acted - and it did so against the populace instead of the

These are but a few examples in Africa alone where the pious U.N. sat on its hands because. presumably, they involved Black African disorders and rule instead of white rule.

The list, of course, does not include the world's most monstrous perpetrators of suppression - the Chinese Communists (responsible for an estimated 60 million deaths, according to a Congressional report) and the Soviet Union, which has killed millions of its own people and holds six current and three obsorbed European

countries in its vise We'll get much more excited over the basically non-violent suppression in Rhodesia of voting rights once the U.N. gets much more excited over the basically violent suppression of all rights which exists in many other parts of Africa and throughout the Communist world.

Exercise Bicycle By Lawrence Lamb. M.D.

Dear Dr. Lamb - With all the emphasis on exercising today. I feel my husband and do not get enough of it. We bought an exercising bike. What I would like to know is. how can we go about it. I mean, how much time to start with, and how should we increase the time. I have started with five minutes three times a day. Am I overdoing

Dear Reader - There isn't


any set rule for this. It also depends a lot on the type of exercise bicycle you're using. Some are fixed so you can adjust the tension on the wheel and thereby increase reasonably good physical condition to start with can ob viously begin at a higher level than those who are unaccustomed to any significant amounts of physical exercise. In general, and it has to be simply a general rule of thumb for the person I have not seen and not been able to examine or know what his exercise history is. I suggest that he start at a very level. Of course, if he already has any medical problems he is aware of he should talk to the doctor before beginning any exercise program.

For the individuals who appear to be in good health and have just not had any significant amounts of exercise usually suggest that they start bicycling for three to five minutes at a speed which is comfortable for them and at a tension which doesn't create very much stress on the legs. That is, it should be comfortable and well within the capacity of the person without any strain. Then, the amount of exercise can be increased about a minute a week. Always make certain to stay within a comfortable speed and tension on the wheel and never exercise at a rate that makes you feel that the legs are working too hard or that it causes the heart to beat too fast. If you want to take your heart rate while you're exercising, you can usually do it. For medically unsupervised exercise you should try to keep your heart rate below 120 beats per minute while exercising. If the exercise effort causes your heart to beat any faster than this, you are either pumping too fast or the

tension has been turned too tight on the exercise bicycle. Exercise bicycles are fine because they can be placed in front of the television set. Individuals who spend much time in front of the television set are the very ones who often need the exercise, and the exercise should be something besides reaching for potato chips and dip or, just as bad, bending the elbow. It also provides a way of occupying vourself while you're doing exercise. Pedaling at a very slow rate without any heavy load on the bicycle during your favorite television program is a good way to pro-gram a daily exercise activity. Exercise done during the evening newscast, for example, combines keeping you well informed and keeping you

federal revenue sharing dollars. Pampa has banked \$205,000 of the cash doled out by the Wonderful Wizards of Washington since the first of last vear. City commissioners have

decided to use it for capital expenditures such as police and fire equipment, departmental trucks and similar one-time purchases. They decided not to use it for

service projects because of their recurring nature and the possibility they might not receive funds at the same level in future years.

In other words, there is skepticism about just how lor. the federal windfall will last.

A government survey released several days ago shows that states, counties and cities across the nation are concerned about the future of the revenue sharing program.

The report revealed that 72 per cent of the 770 governmental units surveyed reported they planned to use the money for construction. improvements, or much-needed purchases of equipment.

If there is no aid from the **Environmental Protection** Agency on its order to bring the city's sewage treatment plant up to Texas Water Quality Board standards, Pampa may decide to pour the whole bagful of revenue sharing money into that project, which is estimated to cost approximately \$570,000.

Only time will tell how the money eventually will be spent locally, but it's a foregone conclusion it won't go into anything that has to be met from year to year.



Texas and the nation this year have felt the brunt of Mother Nature's violence, and tornadoes have roamed the skies. With summer, the hurricane season lies ahead. reminds the State Health Department

Both natural disasters are capable of causing unforeseen numbers of victims requiring immediate medical attention. plus the threats of disease brought on by unsanitary conditions, disabling of public utilities, contamination of water supplies and disruption of medical service.

Floods also may produce rapid buildups in mosquito populations, a nuisance as well as a health threat

When a disaster strikes, the Health Departmenbt joins with other state and local agencies and organizations to fight back with efforts to restore affected areas to normalcy. State disaster headquarters is in a sub-basement at the Department of Public Safety in Austin, where a core of public officials coordinate disaster activities

In the State Health Department, the Disaster Health Services Program of the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety provides additional resources at the point of need. This is a part of the Texas plan for disaster health and medical care.

Seventeen disaster relief districts, each with a physician directing disaster medical care. are tied into a district Civil Defense Council which coordinates activities of state agencies with disaster functions.

In case of disaster of severe threat - such as an impending hurricane along the coast, the Civil Defense Council is mobilized. Within each district are zones from which supplies and personnel requests emanate

The State Health Department sends representatives of the Disaster Health Services Program to each disaster area to help coordinate activities of other health department personnel. In the case of hurricanes, program personnel

Always quick to arrive on the scene are engineers of the Sanitary Engineering Division whose primary function is checking water supplies. Investigators from the Food and Drugs Division check damaged food and drug products, and Communicable Disease Services Section personnel may be called in to provide vaccines and serums if needed. Other state personnel may be assigned, and local health departments put

physicians, nurses, sanitarians and others on duty immediately.

Within minutes after a tornado dipped down into the heart of Lubbock the night of May 11, 1970, nurses and others picked their way through the rubble to check and salvage vaccines and get them to pre-planned emergency headquarters.

A disaster health representative of the State Health Department was on the scene of the tragedy within two hours even though the city telephones and electricity were knocked out and transportation disrupted.

The Corpus Chrisit - Nueces County Health Department had its personnel on duty when Celia slammed into that city on Aug. 3 of the same year. The State Health Department was also

The personal automobiles of two representatives of the Disaster Health Services Program, who were in Corpus Christi awaiting the storm. were severely damaged. In addition, district engineers and personnel from state headquarters were on the

Equipment from a Packaged Disaster Hospital was set up in a church at Aransas Pass to provide needed medical equipment after Celia.

Just recently the Health Department took over the medical inventory of a hundred 200 - bed Packaged Disaster Hospitals, similar to the one from which equipment was used during Celia.

A major disaster isn't the responsibility of one agency but demands the coordinated efforts of many to snap back after tragedy. During spring tornadoes which hit Burnet and Hubbard on March 10, for instance, the Texas National Guard responded quickly with trucks, personnel and helicopters

Representatives of the State Health Department were on the scene within an hour of notification, coordinating disaster health relief. Once a hurricane or tornado

has struck, there's little one can

In a hurricane situation, there normally is enough warning to allow residents to leave the area or take shelter in solidly constructed buildings

are pre-positioned in cities " If the possibility of tornadoes along the Texas coast to await exist, individuals should listen to radios and television stations for latest advisories. Some cities and towns have sirens and other devices warning residents to take cover. It's possible to move out of the path of a tornado if sighted in time.

The State Health Department and its local and regional units have responded quickly and effectively in past disasters. With the resources and personnel at its command, it stands ready always to meet the future emergency needs of the citizens of Texas.

These individuals have donated a total of 1,000 bushels of wheat and \$470 cash toward Gray County's ultimate goal of

Apparently rain halted operation in Oklahoma and in the Rolling Plains until dry, hot winds suddenly dried up the wheat in the Southern High Plains. I'm told many combine crews are skipping Texas and moving into Kansas

Yields are running high. Here are a few representative yields from farmers that have finished some fields. Frank Babcock made forty-two and six-tenths bushels on one 77-acre block. Henry Merrick made over thirty - five I'm told Vields are running from 30 to 40 bushels in the Grandview Community. On Sunday. June 17, the Groom Wheat Growers Elevator received 100 loads. On Monday June 18, they received 151 loads On Tuesday. June 19, they received 181 loads. Unloading became a problem and trucks began to back up. Raymond Maddox started dumping in his own barn when things got congested. The price has been jumping up and down but seems be holding steady at about \$2.42 at this writing. Test weight was running from 60-62 pounds and moisture was running as low as eight per cent on wheat ready to cut. Most wheat farmers are praying for another few days of dry weather. It is hoped that custom combine crews will move in and get at the mammoth task at hand.

CATTLE ON FEED REPORT

Earlier we mentioned the fact a clear message was sent to the Cost of Living Council when cattle feeders dropped their placements on feed twenty per cent in April 1973 compared to April 1972. This was a direct reaction to ceiling prices and the worthless boycott. Now a recent report shows feeders dropped placements in May ten per cent this year as compared to May 1972. Today Missouri Beef Packers have cut their kill back from 20 per cent to 30 per cent because of scarcity of finished cattle and due to the squeeze they are being placed into due to the ceiling prices.

Every feed lot in the country is current. There is a waiting packer buyer when a pen approaches being finished. A lot of light weight steers are being taken. Fat cattle are now on or near around \$47.00 per CWT. This is about as high as they can go under the existing ceiling.

Now folks I still stand behind my April prediction ... "Before this thing runs its course the housewife will be a great deal more concerned about where she can purchase a piece of beef than what it's going to cost." A lot of politicians are going to learn some good lessons in Economics. The American housewife will learn some also. When you tinker with the supply · demand economic law you usually aggravate the situation until it gets to be a real

You are now on the front end of America's first severe food shortage as far as red meat is concerned. The situation will get a lot worse before it gets better. By fall a lot of city folks will be trying to buy direct from the farmer in order to get some

beef in their freezer I'm amazed that the National Cattlemen's Organization have not followed the course of the American Dairy Association. Remember, they beat the freeze by two days and raised milk prices 10 per cent. They gave as the reason - feed prices had gone up. This seems to be a legitimate reason for a price rise. But what about the cattle feeders. Their feed prices took the same rise in price and you never heard one word except they dropped placements 20 per cent in April and 10 per cent in

Over the last decade I've studied these reports carefully and to my knowledge I've never seen a drop in placements that would come close to this alarming figure. Fact is most reports have shown a steady and constant rise, especially in Texas with the expanding commercial cattle feeding. This has been necessary to feed an expanding population. Also, the per capita consumption of beef has jumped from 63 pounds in 1950 to 116 pounds in 1973. Milk is an essential item in the diet of children. There seemed to be no squawk when milk prices advanced 10 per cent. Beef is the luxury item in the American diet - can some one tell me why it was singled out!

## Panhandle Water

The 1973-74 budget of the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3. South of the Canadian River, in Texas, was approved in a general called meeting on June 14, 1973

The tax rate for the District was set at 3 cents per one hundred dollar valuation. A special item for research was placed in the budget for the coming year. During the year the District will do some research on possible pollution to the underground fresh water formation from City sewage disposal systems

Directors of the District are Fred S. Vanderburg and John R. Spearman of Gray County and Raymond C. Blodgett. James B. McCray and Nolan. Poteet of Carson County. The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation takes in portions of Gray, Carson, Armstrong and Potter Counties.

Other Counties eligible to join the District are Roberts and Donley

For several years an indepth inter - industry study has been going on in the State of Texas under the direction of Dr Herb Grubb The Inter industry staff is attached to the office of the Governor These studies have been widely disseminated throughout Texas. The people of the High Plains had hoped that other areas of the state would develop a better understanding on our contribution to the other areas of the state and to the nation at

In this column last week this Columnist reported on the Environmental Symposium on Fresh Water Reservoirs that was held in Austin on June 11. 1973. I reported on the consternation wrought by Mrs. Char White among the High Plains delegates attending the Symposium. It would have been wonderful to have had this beautiful charmer on our side but she was not. One could readily see that Dr. Grubb's Inter - industry had made no impression on her or else she had never read it. Of one thing I am certain, the High Plains and Panhandle area is not going back to buffalo grass in the foreseeable future.

Listening to the address by

Mrs Char White I also arrived at another conclusion that we water users, irrigators, reservoir and dam builders had better get down to more adequate measures in the conservation of our water resources

In her address Mrs. Char White leaned heavily on the fact that the bond issue in August of 1969 that would have implemented the importation phase of the Texas Water Plan was defeated. During the question and answer period following her address, she was reminded that the bond issue failed by a mere 6000 votes. She was also reminded that the vote in the Panhandle and High Plains was favorable and that a sampling of the feeling of the many who did not bother to go rote that the vote could easily have been the other way. She was also reminded that a concentrated anti-import effort had been carried on by the Sierra Club in the Houston area on the eye of the election.

In the final analysis the Sierra Club did not defeat the Texas Water Plan, we defeated it by not carrying on a concentrated effort to get out the vote in our

In the near future the Texas Water Conservation Association will mail out copies of the speeches of those who appeared on the program. A complete text of the address of Mrs. Char White will be published at that

The final report of the National Water Commission was delivered to President Nixon on June 14, 1973. On June 28. the Senate Interior's Subcommittee on Water and Power Resources will begin its hearing on the far - reaching report. There are indications that the Federal government has retreated from many of its present water policies. Very strong objection has arisen toward the recommendation that the cost of flood - control be paid by property owners who would be protected.

The National Water Commissions' proposal that farmers move to where the water is, rather than taking water to places like the High Plains of Texas and New Mexico, is definitely not welcome to High Plains people

We can expect strong opposition to this also from Congressmen Bob Price, Jim Wright and George Mahon

our favorite grocery store because of improved grasses planted by Texas conservation farmers and ranchers.

In Fact, an extra 335 million oounds of beef is produced in Texas every year from grasses released by the USDA Soil Conservation Service.

Edward E. Thomas of Temple, state conservationist for SCS, said the figures came from a recent study conducted by his office. Our survey revealed that in

the last 20 years, 5.9 million acres of land has been planted to new grasses released by Thomas said 'Statewide, increased beef production is averaging 56 pounds per acre per year from these grasses. And the average climbs every year.

Thomas admitted that he didn't know how much this affected the price of beef for the housewife.

But take away that 335 million pounds of beef every year and prices would have only one way to go - up." he stressed

In the past 25 years, annual beef consumption has jumped from about 64 pounds per person to 113 pounds. Meanwhile, our state's population has increased by more than 50 per cent. That adds to a gigantic increase in the demand for beef

Without improved grasses and better conservation treatment of grassland, this demand would outstrip available supplies.

Thomas said 23 grasses released by SCS are being grown in Texas. Each has its own area of adaptability and is used to fill a specific

conservation need. Two grasses account for a major share of the acreage planted. Buffel-grass, released by SCS in 1949, has been planted on 1.8 million acres of land in Texas; increased beef production from this grass averages 74 million pounds annually

King Ranch bluestem. released in 1941, is growing on about one million acres. Other widely planted grasses include Pensacola bahiagrass, El Reno sideoats grama, and weeping

To illustrate how quickly some new grasses become popular with livestock producers. Thomas told of the success of Selection 75 kleingrass.

We released this grass to

Agricultural Experiment Station, in 1969," Thomas said. "In spite of the fact that seed are expensive and scarce. 132,000 acres have already been

established." And even though much of this land has not been grazed as yet, increased beef production from this one grass amounted to 11

million pounds last year. In addition to the increased beef production, the survey revealed that the new grasses have increased mutton production by more than 1.1 million pounds. Smaller increases were noted for milk. mohair, wool, and goats.

Increased beef production is only one benefit from improved grasses. Others include erosion control, reduced sediment damage to lakes and streams. fewer dust storms, and more abundant wildlife

Thomas said several other factors also contribute to increased beef production from Texas grasslands, such as better livestock improved grassland management. irrigation, and increased use of fertilizer


"Yet it's hard to grow more beef without having more blades of better grass." Thomas

The goal of SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs, and shrubs which have dual values for both wildlife and livestock. Such plants are needed for use in range seeding mixtures, travel lanes, or wildlife border plantings.

Strains of plants thought to have value for solving a conservation problem are grown and evaluated at the SCS plant materials center near Knox City

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in this work include Agricultural Research Service. Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A&M. -2 Abilene Christian College, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the state's 193 soil and water conservation districts.

Next time you go grocery shopping, think how bare the shelves would be without that commercial seed growers, in extra 335 million pounds of beef.





But Carrazco, police said, reportedly bought his way out of prison for \$100,000. Mexican police reported he escaped. "After he got out of jail he called Mexican authorities and told them who he paid." Castillion said. "That's the way he operates.

Their combine, a new Ford, was made in West Germany. It cuts a swath 22 feet wide through the wheat and has a hopper which holds 130 bushels of threshed grain.

really stops em is its metallic


Most combines are either green or yellow with a few red or metallic aluminum.





## **POLLY'S POINTERS** Zipper Too Long? Try These Methods

By POLLY CRAMEN

DEAR POLLY - If you cannot find a zipper to buy that is as short as needed, buy the shortest one possible, measure the desired length and then leave a bit more at the bottom. With a kitchen knife or other sharp pointed tool pry up the little prongs on the bottom of the zipper. Put the prongs back at the marked desired length, center on the zipper, push the prongs through its material and clamp them back down and then squeeze closed with the pliers. Be careful not to bend the prongs or bend them the wrong way. Use the pliers to pull out the teeth remaining below the new stop. Sew across this tab several times so the material will not ravel. Of course you can just cut the zipper off and stitch across the bottom to form a stitched "stop" (do this before cutting off the excess) but I prefer the first way as it looks like one just bought. — FRAN

DEAR POLLY - I am answering Mrs. V. P. N. who needs a shorter zipper than she can find to buy. This tip also is good to use when you have zippers on hand (saved from discarded garments) and wish to use them in shorter openings than they were made for. Stitch your zipper in the open-ing no matter how much longer the zipper is but stitch across the bottom at the desired length. Go under the outside of the garment and stitch across the zipper many times, staying close to the garment, and then cut off the unneeded part. I got this from a regular pattern and know it is the way to do the job and have used it many times.

Polly's Problem

DEAR POLLY - I would like to cover a lampshade with stamps but do not know what kind of glue nor even what kind of shade to use. How does one preserve the finished article? I hope some reader who has made one will give me some advice. — LILLIAN

DEAR POLLY - One of my Pet Peeves concerns polo and T-shirts with seams so irregular they will not hang straight on the line and then will not fold smoothly. Both side and sleeve seams are often terribly crooked and even on supposedly good quality garments. Surely there is a way they could be cut straight so the shirts could be neatly folded. They look great when bought but it only takes one washing to show up the poor work. - MILDRED

DEAR POLLY - Never throw away outdated dress patterns but save them to use as "fillers" when packing a carton to mail. They are lightweight and when crumpled up make good "stuffing" that will help save weight in these days when we are all so conscious of the high postage rates.

DEAR POLLY - I use an old wig brush to clean the brushes to my rug shampooer and am able to remove most of the lint that sticks in the bottom of its brushes. - AN-

DEAR POLLY - Recipes that are too long to fit on a 3 x 5 file card or those with pictures can pose a real problem. I solved this by using two file cards. One inch is cut off the top of one and the sides and bottom of it are pasted to a full size card placed back of it. This forms an envelope or pocket to hold the recipe so nothing is lost. - MRS. R. K. P.

of pictures on a roll

For example, if film costs \$1.20. processing \$2.20 and mailing 20 cents, total amount for the roll is \$3.60. For a 12-exposure roll, cost per print or slide is 30 cents.

Compare this figure with other offers - to find the best deal. Also check whether it's a savings over service provided by a local photo dealer.

These comparisons assure the best photographs for the least cost to make a totally "pretty picture," she quipped.





## Watermelon Pickles

'It's hard to think of eating watermelon any better way than just digging in and letting the cold juice run, but we've found twelve other ways to serve this delectable melon, Agriculture Commissioner John

C. White reports. The recipes are offered in a brochure published by the Texas Department of Agriculture, available in local supermarkets or from the Department. The serving suggestions range from melon punch to watermelon pickles.

Long a favorite home-preserved treat. watermelon pickles are easy to

2 pounds watermelon rind

2 cups vinegar

2 cups water 4 cups sugar

1 stick cinnamon 1 teaspoon whole cloves

I teaspoon whole allspice l lemon, sliced thin

Pare watermelon rind and remove all but a slight tinge of the red portion. Cut rind into pieces 2 x 1 inches and 1/2 inch thick or into 34 to 1 inch cubes. Weigh. Soak rind overnight in brine made by dissolving 4 cup salt in each quart water. Drain rind, wash in fresh water and drain. Cook rind in fresh water until tender. Combine remaining ingredients and boil together 5 minutes. Add rind a few pieces at a time and cook until rind is clear. Pack rind in hot sterilized jars, cover with boiling syrup and seal. Makes 2 pints. (Red or green food coloring may be added if desired.)

Making watermelon preserves is another way of utilizing the rind. Two recipes are included in the brochure.

Watermelon can be prepared in surprising and attractive ways. Recipes are included for watermelon ice. cocktain balls. fresh fruit combo, melon punch, frosty melon salad, melon sherbet, and a watermelon boat, great for parties.





VOICE OF BUSINESS

Phase 48, as you may remember, resulted from the failure of Phase 47. Phase 47 was, of course, a response to the widely acknowledged faults of Phase 46.

Phase 46 ... but maybe I'd better go back to the beginning. It all started with the first wage - price freeze in the summer of 1971. This freeze was supposed to halt the inflation that resulted from President Johnson's efforts to pay for both the war in Vietnam and the Great Society welfare programs without a tax

increase Like you and me. governments can pay their debts by asking for a tax increase, which is like a pay raise. Unlike you and me, governments can also pay their debts by printing more money.

When a government prints money faster than a country's businesses are able to make things to spend it on, prices go up, because there is more money to buy things with, but not more things to buy. This is

what caused the trouble in 1971. Freezes cause economic problems in the long run. because businessmen cannot tell what people want most when all prices are regulated by law rather than by what people are willing to spend. Since the important men in the government are smart enough to know this, they announced the freeze would be only

Phase II

And so it was. The first freeze was replaced by a more flexible series of controls called "Phase II." Under Phase II. prices and wages could increase, if the government approved.

The freeze and Phase II looked good at first, because the economy was slowing down anyway when they were applied. Prices and wages usually don't rise in a slow economy. But many people do not understand that, so they gave Phase II the credit for the moderation of price increases.

However, trouble was building up under the calm exterior of Phase II. Some important commodities began to run short, because businessmen could not make any money by supplying them under the Phase II price limits.

allowed wage increases much larger than Phase II was supposed to permit, because the government was afraid of them.

So, to make a virtue of necessity, the government officially ended Phase II about the time it would have come apart at the seams anyway. Phase II was replace by Phase III, which was very loose.

All of the pressure that had been building up under Phase II came out into the open in Phase III. Prices went up fast. Some back luck added to that. Bad weather in our Midwest farm belt and a worldwide shortage of food raised food prices much faster than usual


