Pact Signing Ends Long Labor War

MIAMI BEACH, Feb. 10 — UP — AFL President George Meany convenes his executive council Thursday to ratify a historic merger agreement with the CIO and end almost two decades of labor squabbling.

Meany and CIO President Walter Reuther signed he historic merger agreement Wednesday after conferences with top leaders of unions affiliated with the two great labor organizations.

Reuther said he would "gladly" step down and nominate Meany to head the huge new labor force of more than 15 million workers more than 15 million workers. Two Methods

Every now and then, some individual, noting our reluctance to praise excessive government comes up with the accusation: "You must be an anarchist!"

In most instances such an unwarranted declaration comes from some member of the left of center school of righteousness, who, confronted with the facts which history so loudly proclaims, finds himself impotent to refute them, and, logic failing, relies on accusation instead of articulation.

Let us answer the charge. There are two types of government. The natural, or notical placing of authority in the hands of those responsible is one type. Then there is the artificial type of government wherein authority is seized or acquired in any one of a number of ways.

We will discuss them in turn. But let us first survey. the need for government. Cooperation is the single essential feature of civiliza-

tion. Man, without cooperation, has great difficulty in By means of cooperation he not only can survive, but

he can improve and raise his standards of survival. Without cooperation, chaos would result. Or at least, man's individual desires and urges might

place him in opposition to other men. This situation which has NEVER occured in all of history is called ANARCHY. Never has a situation of onarchy prevailed in the pure

sense for two reasons. One reason is good. The other The good reason is that men are always willing to

cooperate voluntarily. Thus a situation in which the force of artificial government vanishes, immediately finds men voluntarily assuming whatever duties are necessary in order to preserve order and avoid chaos.

The second reason is that in the absence of the force of government, some individual or group, criminally inclined, will saize the rains of authority. This is government, however it is instituted.

Archy is the force of government, real, as in the case of artificial governments; persuasive, as in the case of natural gove nments. An-archy would exist at that brief moment in history

when force vanished, and no force of any kind were used. It's duration would be momentary. Then the forces seeking cooperation either voluntary

or involuntarily would assert themselves. Anarchy would then be a static condition. No such thing is possible. But people sometimes confuse anarchy

with mob rule. Mob rule is a type of government imposed at the sour of the moment in which people out of control do the very things artificial government does when it is in control. But this is not anarchy. It is mob government, using force, and is in fact one of the very worst types of

There are only two known ways of getting cooperation. One is voluntary. The other is involuntary.

The voluntary way is the civilized way. The involuntary.

way is the barbarous way. In primitive societies the involuntary way was the only way used. It was presumed that no one would do anything unless he was driven to do what he should do.

Societies founded exclusively on compulsion, in an effort to enforce cooperation, have managed to survive. There are a few examples extant today. Tribes in the Solomons, New Hebrides, and in some remote parts of Africa still rely exclusively on force, provided by an artificial government.

But these tribes have changed little if at all for hundreds of years. They will never change, so long as compulsion is relied on as the exclusive motivation. These tribes are not civilized. They are savage and

barbarous. They have survived, but that is all. Civilization begins with the first voluntary act of co-

operation. If it ends, it will cease with the last such act. Civilization is marked by the WILLING cooperation of persons, who do what they should do because they

But for the state to decide to undertake the manufacture and distribution of any particular products or to provide any particular services is not to destroy the values of those products or those services. The development and distribution of electric power, for example, by the state or any public agency. whether expedient or not, violates no principle. The argument against such action by the state has to do with degrees of efficiency and with the danger of uniting or concentrating political and economic power at one point. This kind of argument does not involve an assumption of the inherent incompatibility of functions of the state

and economic activities. Because most people believe exactly as Dr. Rennett believes, this question is an important one. Of course, if one has no standard of morals, or the standard of Russian Communism then the governards. 



'S THE LAW

Several changes in the new internal revenue code will favor individual taxpayers in the matter of allowable designations.

In the past, if interest was not set forth separately on installment sales contracts, it was not deductible. Under the 1954 revenue act, a deduction may be claimed equal to 6 per cent of the average unpaid balance of the installment sales contract, providing that this amount does not exceed the payments actually made.

Theft losses are now deductible In the year in which discovered, rather than in the year in which the theft occurred.

The deduction for charitable contributions is still subject to a limitation of 20 per cent of the taxpayer's adjusted gross income. However, an extra 10 per cent may be deducted if it is to a religious organization, a school, or a hospi-

Medical expenses may be deducled to the extent that they exceed 3 per cent of the taxpaver's adjusted gross income. In prior years the exclusion was 5 per cent. If the taxpayer or his spouse is 65 or over, the 3 per cent exclusion

does not apply. Under the new act, the cost of medicines and drugs must first be reduced by 1 per cent of adjusted ical expense that can be deducted is \$2,500 for each exemption (other than for old age or blindness), and limited to \$5,000 on a single return and \$10,000 on a joint return.

The working wife has long lamented that she should be able to deduct against her earnings the cost o fcaring for her children while she is working. Now, child care expenses are deductible if paid by a woman, a widower, or a divorced man. The deduction shall not exceed \$600 and may not be paid to a dependent of the person claiming the deducttion. The child must be under 12 or physically or mentally incapable of caring for himself. If the adjusted gross income shown on the tax return is more than \$4.500. a reduction of the child care deduction must be made.

One of the most drastic changes concerning deductions is that of depreciation. Two new methods of computing depreciation have been added that provide for a much faster write-off of depreciation in the early years.

One method is known as the "double declining balance" methed. Under this system, the normal life of the item is determined as in all other cases. This is converted into a percentage figure. and then doubled. This increased percentage is then applied in the first year against the cost of the item to be depreciated. The second year, the same percentage is applied against the remaining cost. and so on indefinitely until the item is disposed of

The second method is called the "sum of the digits" method. The sum of the years of useful life is determined. In the case of an automobile with a five-year life: 1, plus 2, plus 3, plus 4, plus 5, equals 15 The first year, 5-15ths of the cost is deducted as depreciation. The second year, 4-15ths; year, 2-15ths; and the last year, 2-15th. the third year, 3-15ths; the fourth

Both of these methods provide for greatly accelerated depreciation deductions. However, they can be applied only to new tangible property with a useful life of three years or more that was acquired after 1953. Different methods can be applied to different items as





