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Taste Of Socialism

The president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Charles B. Shuman, recently gave his views on government-in-business.

Mr. Shuman said: "Many of those who advocate government ownership of electric power, transportation and other corporate businesses do not realize the deadening and dangerous effects of government monopoly. Almost with exception, government ownership and operation of business results in higher costs (including taxes) to consumers and shortages of the product involved. Chicago's city owned transit system is costly and antiquated, the TVA area has a serious power shortage, and the Commodity Credit Corporation storage costs are far higher than those of private firms."

Mr. Shuman went on to point out that socialized businesses depend upon political decisions by Congress for capital funds — whereas free enterprise "attracts capital by business success rather than 'political pull.' " It can be added that any politically operated enterprise is almost invariably wasteful and inefficient - for the prime objective of the bureaucratic administrator is to increase his authority and prestige, and he will fight bitterly any attempt to reduce his budget.

There is no doubt that sentiment against government in business has increased in late years. Proposals that the TVA and other socialized enterprises be sold to taxpawing enterprise have received nationwide endorsement. We have had quite a taste of socialism -and most of us have found it bitter.

Appeal In Chicago

Long accustomed to political chicanery and graft Chicagoans are understandably greeting with yelps of joy the actions of a political novice whom they elected to the office of City Treasurer.

Morris B. Sachs, a clothing merchant and a Democrat, won a measure of national recognition when he was pictured with former mayor Martin Kennelly in a tearful pose following their primary defeat at the hands of the Cook County Democratic machine. On the principle that if you can't lick 'em, join 'em, Mr. Sachs; who despite defeat was a big vote getter in the primary accepted a place on the machine ticket in the general election, and led that ticket to victory.

Now he is operating his office on the basis of rank political heresy. He believes city employs should earn their pay — and already has fired three subordinates who sole duties seemed to be picking up their paychecks and doing political chores.

The machine boys don't like it, and booed Mr. Sachs at a recent party fund raising dinner. According to reports, Mr. Sachs doesn't mind a bit that nobody loves him but the taxpayers.
