





Can't Compete

Dictator Juan Peron of Argentina figures he's strong enough now to break with the Catholic church and discontinue the uneasy marriage which has existed between these two powerful contenders for the minds of the Argentines.

The Catholic church is the "state" church of Argentina. It is only logical to believe that sooner or later either the church or the state politicians would try to shed, oust, shade or destroy the other; for there can't be two Gods: Either a man worships at the shrine of the church or the shrine of the state. Either he believes the Gospels or the Code of Civil Law is the supreme law. When there is conflict, a man must cast his lot either with his church or his state.

There is a difference between freedom of worship and an official state religion. The Catholic church in Argentina has enjoyed the privilege of the official religion of the Argentine. As in Spain, communicants of other faiths have been persecuted and denied certain civil rights because of their insistence on worshipping in churches other than the official ones.

When a church is recognized by the state it can also be "un-recognized." Any alliance with a temporal, political power is a mortal alliance, limited in time, wisdom and duration.

The Catholic church will outlive Peron and all memory of him. Christianity, Judaism, Muslim and all other great religions will be practiced long after the persecutors have been forgotten. But the leaders of these great religions must learn

that when they make peace with politicians who seek to control morals, and when they accept political power, they are involved in a cease-fire until the state politicians can muster enough strength to crush them.

Ever since the city shifted from angle to parallel parking all over town a couple of years ago there have been loud demands that the city was under obligation to provide parking space for the customers of downtown merchants,

Some of the merchants of the city, or their landlords, have recognized their obligation - if they or their tenants are to prosper to provide parking areas at their own expense. They did not come crying to the City Hall in take care of them.


The present deal, if it goes through, would make those forethoughted merchants and landlords help pay for the parking lots of their competitors.

It also would require an aged eouple or widow with a home but no automobile to help pay for a parking lot they could not possibly use. If anyone says the parking lot would increase property values, we will scream! Those old folks are not interested in increasing their property values. That would increase their taxes and they are having a tough enough time paying the present ones. (It is highly questionable that

three or four comparatively vacant lots ever have increased the value of any adjoining property.) whether property values vere raised or not, all taxes are bound to go up eventually if this

money and no one will be able actually to see the increase on his ax statement, but it is only the beginning. Next thing we know the city having tasted the delights of socialistic invasion of the field of private enterprise, will be setting up a municipal bottling works. dry cleaning establishment, a taxi line, a foundry, a seed and feed business or a hardware and implement house.

If you have paid any attention to the way government runs business you can well imagine what such moves would do to your rate. you have not been paying atention, just take a look at the simple arithmetic of the parking lot plan.

The city proposes to pay some an effort to get the taxpayers tos \$47,000 for three lots. This does not include the cost of paving and installing meters. If the fourth lot is purchased that will hike the cost some more.

On these lots there would be approximately 38 meters, operated 10 hours a day at a nickel an hour six days a week, minus holidays. That means that if the parking spaces were used to the fullextent, they would take in about \$7,000 a year. But anybody who has any idea that any such revenue would be likely is dream-

The city has been operating 28 meters on the Missouri Pacific lot, just about a block from the site which it is proposed to buy. Everybody who has business at the railroad depot must pay money into those meters. But in ten months the 28 meters have grossed only

Is it logical to imagine that the meters on the proposed lots would do much better? Would they even

bring in the interest on the \$40,-000 which it is proposed that the city borrow from the banks at 3 1-2 per cent?

Freedom Will Stop War

Here is one of the best presentations I have come across as to the best and only way to end war.

People do not propose war and seldom wage it voluntarily. Strongly centralized governments with power to deceive their citizens by propaganda and to coerce them economic controls, excessive taxation, fiat money and conscription, are the makers of war. Under freedom, governments are is impossible.

If governments did not have large propaganda powers, they could not work up a popular demand for war.

If governments were not strong ly centralized with overgrown power in the hands of executives, the latter could not design and carry out such incidents as Pearl Harbor, in order to make war seem necessary. Only overexpanded government with great power can develop atom and hydrogen bombs. If the development of nuclear power were left to individual initiative it would be used for peaceful industrial purposes and not for war.

Deprive governments of the power to remove the intrinsic values from the monetary unit and resort to the printing press and inflation, and they could not finance large scale war.

Deprive them of the power of conscription, and they could not wage extensive warfare, unless the people almost unanimously approved.

Take from governments the power to fix prices, wages, control materials and set up quotas and rations and it is difficult to see how large scale war could be fought. War is possible only when governments have control of the economic activities of the people! Overexpanded Government Causes War


Moreover, war seems necessary only to strongly centralized governments. Under freedom, if a man is not happy in his own country he may go to another. If the Russians could do that today, the Kremlin would soon be without the capacity for aggression. If the Italians and the Germans could have done it in the 30's, there would have been no problem of 'vital space.

If money had intrinsic value and hence, were interchangeable all lands, and if there were no tariffs, quotas or cartels, money, raw materials and finished goods. country. There would be no problem of inaccessible raw materials or insubordination. or markets. What reason for war the raw materials and the markets of the world would be available without war. Under such conditions it is almost inconceivable that Italy, Germany, Russia, Japan or any other country would have been or would now, or in the future, be aggressive

No Reason to Fight If men, money and goods could go freely anywhere, what would there be to fight for? Not raw materials, not markets, not vital space! What else remains? Only the ambition of individuals - a Napoleon, a Hitler, a Stalin, a Roosevelt, but unless these were clothed with the power of a strongcentralized government, they would not have the means of enforcing their will to war.

Sound, honest money of intrinsic value, not subject to inflation, and governments of strictly limited power, without the right to interfere in the economic activities of the people, or conscript soldiersin otherw ords, Freedom, is the answer to the problem of war.

As Christians, let us continue to emphasize the importance of love, ne; hborliness, and generosity, but let us become aware that neither these alone, World Government, United Nations, nor disarmament unilateral or multi-lateral, will stop war till the basic conditions set forth above are achieved.

Ike however, has not complain ed or retaliated against revolt that involves two of his major and basic policies - namely, his proclaimed attempt to narrow the field of Government activity and regulation. The two unpunished offenders are Controller General Joseph Campbell and Jerome K. Kuykendall, Chairman of the Federal Power Commission.

As a former member of the Atomic Energy Commission Campbell voted against the Dixon-Yates contract, which is designed to circumscribe the Tennessee Valley Authority's jurisdiction and operations. As Controller General, he opposes the plan to permit TVA to issue its own bonds, thus relieving the budget of this tinancial burden

Campbell likewise condemns the Eisenhower highway program because of the indirect means of financing it proposed by the President. His attitude has furnished fuel to Capitol Hill Democrats.







Federal Publication

From listening to Harold Cooley, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, one would think that farmers were a bunch of John Aldens — too bashful to speak for themselves. This venerable old congressman from North Carolina has seen fit to have the Government Printing Office run off a number of 10-page booklets containing statements made before Congress during consideration of H. R. 12, a bill to amend federal law with respect to price supports for basic commodities. It would seem that this was real nice of the old gentle-

And whose statements did he choose to have the federal government print? Why, they emanated from those great agricultural economists and practical farmers Walter Reuther, president of the CIO; George Meany, president of the AFL; J. A. Beirne, president of the CWA-CIO; Jacob S. Potofsky, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, CIO; and William Pollock, executive vice president of the Textile Workers Union of America, CIO. Fantastic, you say, for the chairman of the House Agriculture Committee to do this? He did it.

Not only that, but the good gentleman from North Carolina saw fit to introduce these statements with comments praising the remarks made by these labor leaders on the complex subject of price supports for agricultural products. To cap it off, Cooley had the effrontery to send copies of this pamphlet through the mail under his "franking privilege." Free to the congressman from North Carolina, of course, but paid for by the taxpayers who neither asked for nor desired copies of this shocking violation of good taste and common courtesy.

Cooley reproduced no statements from leaders within agricultural circles. The answer is simple. Topflight agricultural people just didn't say what Cooley wanted them to say. These folks, and the organizations for whom they speak, approach the problems involved in price supports for farm products from the standpoint of economics and refuse to let politics cloud their thinking. This is not expedient for the chairman of the House Agriculture Committee because he is a firm believer in high, rigid support levels.

Farm leaders pointed out that these same high, rigid supports had brought about agricultural surpluses with depressing effect on commodity prices. In addition, the flexible support program voted by the last Congress hasn't even had a fair trial through one crop year. Labor leaders, on the other hand, sat up and spoke their pieces like good boys. Either as a reward to them or as punish ment for farm leaders, Cooley decided to rush into print — with taxpayers' money.

Cooley's action reminds one of the man who burned down his house to get rid of a squeak in the door. "Character." Cooley, as he is known in Washington, has dealt a severe blow to the possibilities of considering this subsidy topic in non-political terms.


Fortunately, in most of us, most of the time, the good traits triumph over the bad ones. In one sense, however, nearly all persons have not exist to a degree which can be considered abnormal.

There is, however, a serious mental disease, the most important feature of which is an exaggerated splitting of the personality, in which the individual shows normal behavior in some respects and goes completely haywire in others. One of the most dramatic examples - fictitious of course - is the famous story of Dr. Jekvil and Mr. Hyde by Robert Louis Steven-

This form of mental disease is known medically as dementia praecox or schizophrenia. It is one of the big mental problems, and even

today its cause is not known. It is most likely to start between the ages of 15 and 30. At first disorderliness and lack of cleanliness may be the only signs. Many victims also become unduly suspicious and feel that they are being perse-

As time goes on, hearing or seeing objects which are not there. changes in thinking and judgment, ealing and other alterrations in havior tend to arise. It is a dis-



It is perfectly normal for everyone's spirits to go up and down to a certain degree. We become cheerful or low in our minds from day to day, sometimes without any ap-

parent reason. In manic-depressive insanity, this rise and fall in spirits becomes greatly exaggerated. Furious bursts of energy lasting for weeks are followed in the typical case by depression in which the

victim may sit in gloom for hours doing nothing at all. There are variations in this picture, of course, and sometimes the depression is present alone with-

out the furious energy - or the other way around. These are not the only forms of mental disease but they are two of the most important.

It is felt that quite often the coming of these conditions can be recognized before they are fully established and that something can be done, at least in the former, to prevent full development of the

It is encouraging, too, that many sufferers from both forms of mental disease have been greatly helped and in some cases cured by electric shock treatments. In some also an operation on the brain has brought good results,

Why I Write A Column It is always a good idea to analyze the motives back of what one is doing. One can do that better for oneself than he can for sults, it is well to know your mo-

moral guides as the Golden Rule, the Ten Commandments and the tives. That leads me to analyze my motives in writing a column, Certainly it is not with the idea of winning an argument or for the purpose of humiliating anyone or trying to be noticed, as caildren quite often do. Life is too short for such a waste of time. I have too much to learn.

It certainly isn't from a financia: motive. Extra financial rewards would not buy anything that I want personally and would only add to my respons bility. Extra money might do more harm than good unless the beneficiaries helieve in liberty and understand its blessings. There is certainly no real financial profit in writing on ethical questions. If one wants to have a direct financial return from writing, one must write on other subjects than ethics or the science

of right and wrong. Since it isn't a financial matter, what are the rewards or the motive that cause me to try to

One of the first and primary motives is that writing on ethical questions stimulates the individual in determining right from wrong. It also helps determine what is right for government agents to do. And all political and economic questions are in the final analysis ethical questions - that is, questions of justice. Good Way To Learn

If one opens his writing to questions, it is one of the best ways to learn. If one cannot defend his position or is embarrassed by any question on things he is advocating or opposing, he must know that he is in error. The "still small voice" in an individual is a pretty good guide as to whether a thing is right or wrong.

I have so much to learn and such a short time to learn that I must use the most practical way know to gain understanding. There is no greater reward than greater understanding. Remember a philosopher said, "The feelings and emotions of a lover or an artist are as a feeble beginning compared to those of a philosopher standing in the presence of un-

veiled truth." When one is obliged to change beliefs in order to be logical then one is standing more in the presence of unveiled truth.

And if an individual doesn't want to keep on learning and developing, he certainly doesn't get a great deal out of life. If he wants to keep on developing he must have reverence for God or Eternal laws, If he does this then he will realize the truth of the statement: "Come grow old with me, the best of life is yet to come the last of life for which the first was made."



"While you have been right on some things," Freedman told the Democratic ladies, "we were more right than you on Russia. We believe that there is an essential difference between Russia and other dictatorships . . . We believe that because Russia did not become a dictatorship in a hurry, it is possible to negotiate with her.

Unfortunately, nobody in the audience thought to ask the speaker to elaborate on this odd remark, or to explain what basic difference it makes whether a country achieves totalitarianism and atheism overnight or over a long period of time.

Freedman's discussion of Eisen hower-Eden differences in the Far East, which generally reflects 10 Downing Street's viewpoint, indicates that the two western nations are still far apart on this question. He said:

"We believe that what happened in China was a Chinese revolution; that Chiang Kai-shek excommunicated himself by his mistakes from the confidence of the Chinese

That is the prevailing conclusion in popular and official opinion in Britain, although Eden does not explain it quite so brutalle as Freedman did.

Although it is no secret that the Eisenhower Administration favored Eden over his Labor opponents in the recent election, The Guardian correspondent demurred against the belief that British Conservatives and American Republicans are peas of the same pod.


