Breakfast Is The Key To Successful Weight Reduction



A doctor recently accused a bride of six months "of killing her hus-A doctor recently accused a bride of six months of killing her husband with kindness." Her husband had gained an excessive amount of weight. The wife, in her desire to feed her husband adequately and to demonstrate her cooking ability, simply had fed her husband too well. The doctor explained that overweight could become a serious concern. It could affect appearance, vitality, emotions, personal and public relations and life expectancy. Overweight is due to overeating—the result of eating more calories than can be used.

The couple asked the doctor's help in working out a reducing plan. The doctor outlined the total caloric intake that could be eaten each day. He stressed the importance of three meals nutritionally adequate except for calories. Breakfast, he pointed out, is the key to any successful reducing diet. Research has shown that skipping breakfast is a strain on the body, promotes unnecessary fatigue, slows down reactions and reduces work output.

A reducing diet breakfast follows a basic breakfast pattern recom-nended by doctors and dietitians. It should provide one-fourth of the total daily requirements. A basic breakfast pattern includes fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter. The 400 calorie breakfast pictured above shows that our bride not only could prepare attractive breakfasts but ones that fit a basic pattern—even on restricted calories.

The purpose of such an order is to allow the judge to determine whether the prisoner is being held lawfully or whether he should be set

The writ of habeas corpus prevents law enforcement officers from abusing the constitutional right of personal liberty and has been a jealously guarded privilege. The words "corpus delicti" are Latin, and, liberally translated, mean the elements of the crime or wrongdoing. Laymen incorrectly inerpret corpus delicti as meaning iterally "the body," as in a

Habeas Corpus - Corpus Delicti

Two legal phrases which are probably more musunderstood and misused by laymen than any other are "habeas corpus" and "corpus

nurder case.

Speaking technically in a legal sense, corpus delicti is that which must be proved in every criminal case. Such proof must show that an unlawful act has been committed and that it has been committed by a human agency. The mere finding of a dead body or a burning building does not mean that there is murder on the one hand or arson or the other. To prove murder, it must be shown that the death was unlawfully caused by a human agency. Contrary to popular belief murder can be proved even though the body cannot be found. 

Britain May Become One Big City LONDON -UP Britain, with

one-third the population of the United States jammed into a space the size of Arizona, is trying to keep from becoming one big city. The government has instructed 140 urban areas to lay out "green belts" in which further city expansion would be prohibited.

The action followed growing concern that the house building rate now some 300,000 a year - would soon make an asphalt jungle of this crowded island nation.

Duncan Sandys, minister of hous ing and local government, wrote local city councils asking them to set aside bands of countryside surrounding their borders "as soon as possible.

He gave London as the pattern. The six counties that form the world's biggest city already have laid out "green belts" 7 to 10 miles deep. London can grow no larger

Sandys (pronounced Sands) cit ed "the importance of checking the unrestricted sprawl of the builtup areas and of safeguarding the countryside against further on croachment.

He said the green belt plan would 1. "Check the further growth of

a large built-up area." 2. "Prevent neighboring towns from merging into one another.' 3. "Preserve the special character of a town."

Sandys timed his order to fo low public horror over the just released report on highway deaths in the first half of 1955.

It showed an average of 1 deaths a day on Britain's over crowded highways, many of which are little more than an unending chain of neighboring cities' main

streets. January through June were the blackest months since the war. Road accidents killed 451 persons and injured 24,241.

Although Britain has less cars per capita than the United States, it has the world's largest number per mile of road - an estimated 19 compared to barely over 15 in the United States.

Historian **Doubts Villa Buried Gold**

MEXICO CITY -UP- Mexico's leading authority on Pancho Villa said Thursday Villa's gold may be hidden in Texas but he "wouldn't spend a cent looking for it."

Rafael Munoz, author and former foreign ministry press secretary, termed "fantastic" the story of Dolores Vasquez of Brawley, Calif., that Villa buried \$1.5 million worth of gold coins in Texas graveyards.

Munoz, who has written two books on the famous revolutionary, said Villa was a "free spender, not type to bury money.'

He said the only time Villa ever got his hands on any large amount of gold was when he "hit the jackpot" in a Chihuahua bank

The bandit drilled a hole in an fron column inside the bank and nearly a quarter of a million dollars in gold coins spilled out of the hiding place like a slot machine payoff. The coins were spent

to buy supplies in United States. "The only things Villa ever buried were caches of arms and ammunition throughout Chihuahua state," Munoz said, "That was how he was able to outsmart Mexican authorities who, for six years, always thought they had him at the point of exhausting his sup-



Pattern For Defeat

If a horde of armed men, wearing the uniform of a foreign power descended on these shores the American people would quickly unite in defense of their country. If something in the neighborhood of sixteen million troops were to move into this nation, there would be little difficulty in convincing Americans that the situation was serious. Certainly, a crisis would be at hand.

These foreign solders would, of course, move in on America's industrial might as target number one. There would be little point in directing their military coups against the harmless citizens. Instead, every conceivable tactic would be employed to take over our mills, our factories, our mines and our transportation and communication systems. One can imagine the bitterness with which we would oppose step by step, inch by inch, such violent, murderous aggression.

There is fair reason to suppose that should such an event occur, and the attacking forces carry the day, Americans would never stop fighting to regain that which was rightfully theirs. There would be clandestine meetings, underground movements. And every effort would be made to overthrow the foreign tyrant.

The reason there would be staunch opposition to such brigandage is that there would be no question in the mind of any American as to the nature of the enemy he faced.

Unfortunately, while what we have sketched above is highly imaginative and improbable as we have outlined it, the fact is that a military army sixteen million strong has invaded these shores, and is in the process of taking over our industry, our entire free enterprise system, but we Americans don't seem to know it is going on.

This army is composed of union members. The leaders of this military machine of the cold war are dedicated to seizing and exploiting all capital and equipment. Indeed, they propose to destroy the American way of life, which is based on individual rights and duties, and to supplant it by a foreign way of life in which all individuals are dependent upon the state. For some years this war has been going on. And gradually the targets of the un-American ideologists have been attained. At first there was wide opposition to the IWW, the Bolsheviki and their fellow travelers. But as time passed, we learned to live with unionism because its aggressive designs were masked in a program of GRADUAL

Now the pattern of union dominance is clearly seen. And only in a few isolated places, such as the Kohler works in Wisconsin, do men of staunch Americanism fight to the last ditch to oppose the creeping ruin imposed by the union oligarchy.

The reason there woul dbe staunch opposition to tion's mightiest industries taken over and subjected to the tyranny of union bossism with scarcely a whimper over what was happening. Ford, General Motors and Big Steel have bowed to union coercion. And still the American people sleep.

Walter Reuther, cleansed by public confession of his intellectual affiliation with Moscow, has still never seen fit to reject socialism as the new Sovietized way of life in America. He is now gearing himself to enter the American political scene, either as a contender in person for the throne, or with his hand-picked stooge to become the puppet ruler.

The seriousness of our situation is seen, not so much in the apathy of the great masses of Americans who do not belong to unions but who do little if anything to appose them. Our danger comes instead from the businessmen and industrialists who are certainly smart enough to know what is happening, but have decided to let the unions get away with anything they want, so long as the same gradual approach is used.

Certainly, any entrepreneur capable of running General Motors or Bethlehem Steel is able to read the handwriting on the wall. Every year the labor bosses make a new demand. Every year, the management of these big industries gives a little more to these racketeers, whose contribution to the traditionally American way of life is less than nil. Since this has happened annually since the days of FDR, it is only logical to assume that it will continue to happen every year into the dim and distant

With each gain in the power of the union the cost of living for all of us goes up. What actually happens is that our dollar is watered down so that it will not purchase what it should. Good will become more and more scarce. Ultimately fewer and fewer people will work. But the end is seen in the objectives revealed at the beginning. This is a foreign invasion. The aim of the unioneers is to change the American way of life by converting it into a socialist economy, totally dependent upon the force of government. It is that industry itself shall be progressively weakened until ultimately the government shall take it over. Then, with unions dominating our political scene we shall be vassals just as surely as the German people became serfs under Hitler through precisely the same process.

We don't have to succumb to this fabian attack. But unless something is done drastically by the businessmen themselves to off-set the union blitzkreig, then

This is the age of trial for freedom of enterprise. Businessmen must take a long-range view and do their best to preserve the American way of freedom for the individual, even though it means struggle against union violence and pressure.

If this is not done, then it is merely a question of time before ultimate and final surrender.

It goes into the European Parliamentary Union, the Socialist Movement for the United States of Europe, the European Federalist Union, the United Europe Movement and the coordination of the Movements for a United Europe. It also goes into the French ideas of a European Union and the various other schemes of having a one world planned economy It shows the errors of all these

Here is a paragraph that shows the philosophy of the book:

There is no other logical explanation conceivable for poverty and chaos, but that man's ideas governing his actions have brought them about. Indeed, if we look at countries with the poorest living conditions, we will perceive that their ideologies and principles of life are most hostile to individual freedom and to capital accumula tion and production."

The above is certainly verified by a careful reading of history. Under the chapter "On Peace and Present-day Ideologies" Mr. Sernholz observes:

"There is only one reason for an unsatisfactory operation of the market economy: it is government intervention. A market economy that is crippled and mutilated, modified and hampered by a host of government regulators and planners can no longer operate as smoothly as a free market economy. Government interference is intended to have certain effects and, indeed, always has. But as far as its actual effects are concerned, whether intended or unforeseen and undesirable, the market economy must be acquitted from all responsibility. Ituman principles of justice and fairness forbid us to condemn someone for a crime which not he but someone else committed. And justice and fairness also forbid us to condemn the market economy for undesirable conditions which someone else brought about. How, for example, can the market economy be declared responsible for inflation and its concomitant effects? It is the government that regulates the money supply. How can we blame a butcher or baker for a crime, in this case inflation and its effects upon prices, which the Secretary of the Treasury and the governors of the Reserve Banks committed? How can we possibly blame the market economy for periods of depression and unemployment if our economic planners and regulators conduct policies resulting in depression and unemployment? But this is precisely what our progressive economists are trying to do. They blame the market economy for the interwar period with all its deficiencies, its wounds and mutilations, which, in fact, the planners themselves inflicted upon

The Nature Of Business Cycles Under the above heading the author explains why we have business cycles, in this manner:

"Socialist or welfare planning means chaos internally aswell as internationally. An economic crisis is inevitable as soon as a government or pressure group empowered by government interferes with the smooth operation of the market economy in order to realize ambitious schemes of progressive planning. On the other hand, there are full employment and prosperity when business is allowed to operate profitably, When profits are improving, business expands. When profits decline or when a decline is anticipated because of unfavorable political, monetary, labor, marketing and other conditions, business contracts. Profits, according to business terminology, are the excess of gross income over costs of which labor costs are overwhelmingly important. It is obvious that business must decline when labor costs are forcedly increased either by government or labor unions in utter disregard of profits. Also, the government policy of inflation and credit expansion always results in a cycle of boom and depression. In the beginning everything looks fine. Prices rise and profits increase because of the rise in prices and the low business costs. Business begins to expand. The demand for the several factors of production - land, capital, and labor - increases. We have full employment, even labor shortages. The increased demand for the production factors naturally raises their prices, which are business costs. Costs are climbing. They climb until they reach the point where business is no longer profitable. At this point the downfall begins. We enter a period of recession and readjustment. It lasts until the costs have






