BANDUNG - UP - Premier Sir John Kotelawala of Ceylon proposed that Formosa be placed under & trusteeship and that the United States withdraw the Seventh Fleet from Formosan waters.

The proposal, made in a press conference at the Afro-Asian conference in Bandung, would write an end end to the Nationalist government of Chiang Kai-Shek and leave the Chinese Communists supreme. Matsu and Quemoy would be given to Peiping.





Turning Up

One thing can be said about the Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government, on which Mr. Hoover is chairman. It continues to turn up the most revealing examples of governmental mismanagement in the history of mismanagement.

Of course, Mr. Hoover's commission immediately and inevitably recommends a house-cleaning and a consolidation. And it is true a house-cleaning and a consolidation would help to eliminate some of the gross stupidities and extravagances. But in the final analysis, government isn't so good at

operating things that private people should be operating, so there won't be any lasting good to come from all the effort put out by Mr. Hoover and his helpers. Not unless or until he recommends that certain gov-

ernmental agencies just naturally terminate their functions. Which is a pretty stiff order for a former politician. But speaking of mismanagement, we have now

commission's report on government in the transportation business. And Mr. Hoover reports some lulus, which ought to show us where some of our tax money has been

It cost the taxpayers \$250 million a year to move household goods, mostly for military personnel. Storage of these same goods takes 3,500,000 square feet. The task force concluded that almost 1,700,000 separate movements have taken place. A great many of these moves were temporary in nature. Which means that the government moved everything and then moved it all

In this connection Mr. Hoover's statisticians looked down their noses at such practices as packing a single overshoe in a box which cost more than the article. Or crates built around junk tricycles. Or a huge wooden crate to carry a dime store lamp, and another for the paper shade.

The overseas shipment of private automobiles of service personnel has increased at the rate of 6,000 per month, it seems

In fiscal 1954 this sea lift occupied 916,409 measurement tons of shipping space, which is equal to one-third of the capacity of the total nucleus fleet dry cargo traffic between the United States and all foreign ports. Add to this the dilemma faced by the Hoover Commission when it tried to unsnarl the mismanagement found in the competing overseas operations of government and private shippers. The government is subsidizing both airlines and steamship lines. But the government military arms are operating their own transport services.

If the privately owned but publicly subsidized carriers could get more business, they would be able to cut back the amount of subsidy they receive. But since they are competing with the government carriers, it doesn't seem that much is going to happen. Thus the report finds both military and civilian carriers deadheading in either direction, with the taxpayers paying three times; once for the military carrier, once for the subsidy, once for the actual transportation.

As we said before, when the government gets in the saddle, whoever wins, it just never is the taxpayer, and mismonagement comes in large doses.

BETTER JOBS

New School Magazine To **Put Parents Off Guard**

I have Volume 1, Number 1, of a magazine called "Better Schools" issued March 31, 1955. It is issued by the National Citizens Commission for the Public schools. The Rockefeller and Carnegie foundations have made grants to the National Citizens Commission. The magazine is a free publication. It says: "Copies of "Better Schools sent free on request to you or your friends." They have a lot of tax-free money back of the magazine. Those people who have different ideas on education than the National Citizens Commission are obliged to pay taxes on any profits they have that they want to use to promote education that is not based on might-is-right.

The National Citizens Commission hopes to have 50,000 community conferences on government schools during 1955. There are a little over 50,000 school districts in the United States.

The reason I say that this magazine is trying to fool the parents is that it attempts to make the public believe that "Local communities will determine the standards of education, too, regardless of what is done on federal and state levels." Any individual who has had any experience with taxsupported schools well knows that the local communities through their representatives do not control the policies of the schools. They cannot hire a teacher who is not recommended by the state. They cannot use a textbook that is not recommended by the state. Under tenure laws they cannot fire a teacher they believe bad. And the National Education Association bureacurats completely determine the textbooks that shall be printed and used. They determine that we shall have "progressive" education. The local board has nothing to do about it. Yet this National Citizens Commission is sponsoring these community conferences in an attempt to make the citizens believe that they have something to do with the real policies of tax-supported schools.

If one reads this magazine even casually, he notes the deception. The Director of the National Citizens Commission, Henry Toy, Jr.,

"1955's community conferences bringing together people from all segments of the population for dispassionate deliberation can be the necessary preliminary to intelligent, lasting action.

In another section of the 12-page tabloid the magazine asks: "Who should be invited? How to

achieve a representative group of participants and whether experts are needed is considered. The booklet suggests the preparation of a checklist with percentages for various segments of the population needed for representativeness." How many people who are

enough interested in education that they do not believe there should be a monopoly of education by the government will be invited? Evidently not a single such person. The conferences will be loaded only with people who believe in might-makes-right "education" or some form of collectivistic "edu-

The National Citizens Commission would leave the impression that the community conferences will decide what our schools should accomplish. Of course, they cannot be specific on what tax-supported schools should accomplish because they dare not go into ethical and moral questions. They cannot discuss liberty. The leaders of the National Education Association are committed to pragmatism. They advocate that there are no eternal principles-that whatever works is right, and they are to be the judge as to whether or not a course of action works. If there are no eternal principles, then of course they are wondering what our schools should accom-

Those people who believe in the Golden Rule and the Commandments definitely believe that the first duty of education or any school is to teach the pupil the difference between right and wrong as measured by the Coveting Commandment and the Golden Rule. But since public schools that are tax-supported violate the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment, they have no specific objectives as to what the schools should attempt to accomplish.

Will Not Asswer Questions It will be remembered that this column has repeatedly offered any of the 35 members of the National Citizens Commission \$500 if he would answer questions as he would before a court to determine whether or not tax-supported schools are in agreement with the Golden Rule. And this column has repeatedly offered anyone \$500 who would get any member of this Commission to answer questions for \$500 on what they are advocating that affects the lives and the well being of every citizen in the nation and the world.




