Polio Verdict To Be Made At Science Meeting Tuesday

By DELOS SMITH

ANN ARBOR, Mich. -UP- Dr. Jonas E. Salk has prepared a minutely - detailed and reasoned scientific report which shows that his anti - polio vaccine is an unqualified success, it was learned Monday.

Dr. Salk will read his report Tuesday at the same scientific meeting at which Dr. Thomas Francis Jr., will deliver his long - awaited report on last spring's mass testing of the vaccine in 1.8 million children.

The Salk report is based on Salk's own testing of his vaccine adults in the Pittsburgh area. It was prepared without knowledge of the contents of the Francis re-





Laws Or Men

In some ways we of the Western Hemisphere are not so wise nor so honest as the ancient Orientals. The fundamental conception of the Confusian regarding all government is that government must of necessity con-

Therefore, the Chinese, long before the Red era of Mao, decided that the caliber of men to get into government offices was more important than the functional operation of that office.

In ancient China, a single magistrate was quite sufficient to govern any district. Of course he had his staff, but there were few if any minor bureaucrats. Disputes which exceeded his jurisdiction were sent on to the king, who also had few officials other than advisors.

The result was that government in China, as government composed of men, was startlingly humane and amazingly unencumbered by professional politicians. It remained small and inoffensive until the burning of the books in 212 BC and the rise of Ching (Shi Hwang-ti) as one of the first advocates of a United Nations in world's history.

But this was ancient China.

Still, the basic concepts of government by men pre-vailed until Sun Yat-sen. The Chinese concluded that a good man in government would tend to make the government benign and non-regulatory. The form of the government did not matter. If the man was good, a bad form could still be harmless. If the man was bad, even the best form would be powerless to stop the evil of the man. With this as the paramount philosophy in the Chinese hegemony, the Middle Kingdom was blessed for centuries with kindly and gentle kings.

The Western conception of what makes a good government is diametrically opposed to the Oriental beliefs. Having been cursed for years with tyrannical and oppressive rulers our ancestors concluded that men in government were universally bad. They reasoned that the only way to have a good government was to have a government of laws rather than men. We put down in writing what governments could and could not do. And thereby we concluded that we had provided humanity with the best of all possible forms, not subject to the vagaries of a passing personality.

Alas, we are wiser now.

We have discovered that laws, also, are written by men, interpreted by other men, enforced by still other men, and by-passed by other men. They are then amended by men, obfuscated by men, and ultimately repealed by men . . . so that there is no permanence in law. We know now that there is no assurance in law per se.

But we also know that there is no trusting a man in power who feels that he is the law. And thus we come to the great awakening. Perhaps the Chinese, who reasoned their way through

this impasse some 2,000 years before Christ, came closer to the truth than we. In any case we should now know that government of

laws or men contain flaws which make them untrustworthy. There is only one kind of government on which we can universally depend. That is self-government, the rule of each individual by himself. To this end our spiritual teachings guide us. To this end all life provides experience. To this end our education, were it not dominated by coercion, would enlighten us.

Thus, self-control is a greater boon to humanity than any man in office or any group or body of law. Selfcontrol and self-discipline are the dominating characteristics of freedom. And where freedom pertains, governments of either laws or men atrophy through lack of use and dwindling importance.

The single characteristic of all barbarianism is the involuntary act. Forct is the only rule. All men are compelled in all actions.

The single characteristic of civilization is the voluntary act. Self-discipline is the dominating rule. All men govern themselves in all their actions by use of conscience, mutual respect, the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule. Civilization began with the first volunteer. If it is to end, it will vanish with the last.

"Four U. S. Presidents and five Secretaries of State refused over a period of 16 years, to rec ognize the lawless and Godless re gime of communism in the Soviet Union. One of history's best records of our reasons for this bipartisan policy of non - intercourse with communism was presented State under Woodrow Wilson, in 1920-thireeen years before Franklin D. Roosevelt extended the magic wand of formal recognition to world-wrecking communism. Colby's words still might serve well as the preamble to a new UN Charter outlawing all communist nations:

"Said Secretary Colby in 1920: " 'It is not possible for the government of the United States to recognize the present rulers of Russia as a government with which the relations common to friendly governments can be maintained. This conviction has nothing to do with any particular political or social structure which the Russian people themselves amay see fit to embrace. It rests upon a wholly different set of facts. These facts, which none disputes, have convinced the government of the United States, against its will, that the existing regime in Russia is based upon the negation of every principle of honor and good faith, and every usage and convention. underlying the whole structure of international law - the negation, in short, of every principle upon which it is possible to base harmonious and trustful relations, whether of nations or of individ-

" 'The responsible leaders of the regime have frequently and openy boasted that they are willing to sign agreements and undertakings with foreign powers while not having the slightest intenton of observing such undertakings or carrying out such agreements

" 'Indeed, upon numerous occasions the responsible spokesmen of this power, and its official agencies, have declared that it is their understanding that the very existence of Bolshevism in Russia, the maintenance of their own rule, depends, and must continue to depend, upon the occurrence of revolutions in all other great civilized nations, including the United States, which will overthrow and destroy their governments diplomatic agencies, to promote such revolutionary movements in other countries. * * *

"Inevitably, therefore, the diplomatic service of the Bolshevist government would become a channel for intrigues and the propaganda of revolt against the institutions and laws of countries with which it was at peace, which would be an abuse of friendship to which enlightened governments cannot subject themselves."

"All of this sound historical logic was rejected and repudiated, first in 1933 when Roosevelt recognized Russia, and again in 1945 when the Soviet Union was admitted into the UN. "Alger Hiss was a principal ar-

chitect of the UN. At the historic Yalta Conference of February. 1945, which set the date for the April San Francisco meeting creating the UN. Hiss was at the right hand of the feeble and dying President Roosevelt. When the question arose of three votes for the Soviet Union, against one for the U. S., the matter was referred to a special committee of experts. This committee, as the world learned some three years later, consisted of Gladwin Jebb for Great Britain, Gromyko for the Kremlin and Alger Hiss for the U. S. This was the committee which finally agreed that the U.S.S.R. should have three votes in the UN!

"Senator Karl E. Mundt, South Dakota, who was for many years a member of the Committee on Un-American help keep China free. Activities, has devoted many months to constructing an hourby-hour chronology of the Yalta deliberations. He told the Senate on January 25, 1950:

"It is more than an item of passing interest that we hear how Alger Hiss was moving into positions of influence and authority at Yalta, First, (in Washington) he was one of a group of six advisors to the Secretary of State to make up the advance preparations for Yalta. * * *

'Then, we find him being included among those sitting with the President on the porch at Yalta reviewing proposals for the daily agenda at the conference. Then we see him :elected as one of those sitting behind the President in the inner council chamber, to counsel with him, to whisper suggestions to him, to make his influence felt on matters of vital significance, and to supply the President with inforation, or misinformation, as the case might be, for making world-shattering and

world-shaking decisions." "When the UN was established, at San Francisco in April-July, 1945, Alger Hiss was the Secretary General of the conference, with a staff of 300 hand - picked assistants in the Secretariat. Time

magazine then reported: 'Alger Hiss will be an important figure there. As Secretary-General, managing the agenda, he will have a lot to say behind the scenes about who gets
