



You will need: 1/4 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar; 1 egg; 1 cup chopped drained cooked prunes; 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind; 1 cup sifted enriched all-purpose flour; 1 cup whole wheat flour; 3 teaspoons baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt;

cup milk; 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Cream shortening and sugar to gether. Blend in the egg, prunes, and grated lemon rind. Then sift dry ingredients together. Add the dry ingredients alternately with milk, stirring only enough to blend. Add the nuts. Pour the batter into a greased bread loaf pan and bake about 1 hour in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F.

Use the small size prunes in making this bread, if you wish to be thrifty. They made up the largest share of last year's prune crop, so they are more plentiful and cheaper than larger prunes, says the Agricultural Marketing Service.

## Think It Over

Our nation is in debt. The staggering total of this debt is now approximately \$280,000,000,000. This is a large figure, but it includes only the amount of money our federal government has borrowed.

Our cities, counties and states are in debt, too. And as individuals many of us are mortgaged up to the

Economists say that the amount of money that is owed in this country by us is between \$600,000,000,000 and \$700,000,000,000. These figures are astronomical. They are so big they are nearly meaningless,

We do not think readily in terms of light years. Most of us will never see so vast a sum as a million dollars. But a single billion is a thousand million. Again we are way over our heads.

How much is a billion? Let us suppose that we actually had a billion dollars. Let us convert it into \$10 bills. Each of us is quite familiar with a \$10 bill. How many such bills would we have with a billion dollars?

Well, if we laid them end to end they would stretch along the Lincoln Highway from San Francisco to New York, then back again from New York to San Francisco. then back once more from San Francisco to New York, and there would be enough left over to retire on.

Let's look at it another way. Let us suppose that Julius Caesar was a billionaire. And that on that fateful Ides of March in 44 BC he not only avoided the daggers of his fellow politicians, but that he was endowed with eternal life. Let us suppose, then, that on that day, March 15, 44 BC, Julius started out to spend \$1,000 every day until he used up his billion. How long could he

Well, if this highly fanciful tale were true, he'd still be at it. He would have spent a thousand dollars every day through all the years of Rome's ascendancy. He'd have spent a thousand every day through all the dark ages. A thousand would have been spent every day through the Renaissance, and a thousand dollars every day since Columbus came to America. He'd still be spending. In fact, as of today, he still would have more than seven centuries ahead of him at the same mad pace.

This is what it means to have a billion dollars. Now, let us remember that we owe \$28 billion just to our federal government, by its own decrees and decisions. When do you think it will be paid?

The child who has not acquired the ability to read is not to be promoted in the early grades. A new directive requires that any pupil who is two years retarded in reading ability shall be held back, shall not be promoted. Pupils not able to read with some facility at the end of grade II shall be held back and may be transferred to retarded or opportunity classes where they may receive more personal instruction,

In these days when everything educational is measured by progress unhampered from one grade to the next, New York City seems to be out of step, so far as being the metropolis of North America is concerned. Why all this fuss? New York has decided that promotion in the schools shall be ac cording to achievement, and that reading is the solid rock foundation of education which will fit the pupil for the road ahead. The child who has not learned to read and write with some facility, and the child who backs away from the fundamentals of arithmetic, isn't a very good candidate for the training which comes later in the schools. Such a child hasn't been provided with the tools with which to face life after school years. New York apparently has decided to do something about it even if regular promotion schedules are upset. David S. Mussey's book on "Ethics as a Religion.' He goes into the question of theism and deism:

"The name 'Theist' is derived from the Greek (theos) word for God. The Latin for God (deus) furnishes us with another type of believer - the deists.

"For the deists God was no less real than for the theists. But he was not a personal God. He was the creator of heaven and earth, and, having seen that his work was 'good,' he left it to pursue its appointed course. Man was not an object of his continual care. Nature furnished sufficient evidence of his benevolence, and the 'natural religion' of the deists meant living in accord with the harmony of nature.

"Most of the fathers of our 18public were deists: Jefferson, Madison, the Adamses, Paine, among others. They did not believe in the inspiration of the Bible or in miracles or in the orthodox plan of salvation. For them Jesus was not the second person of the Trinity, but a revered teacher of the good life on earth. They regarded a man's theological opinions as a matter of private interest, not to be forced on others by church or state. Thomas Jefferson was the most articulate of this group of men. He was accused by his orthodox critics of being a 'French atheist': but in fact his attitude toward religion was deeply reverent. He made a synopsis of the Gospels. In his magnificent Statute of Virginia for Religious Liberty (for which he asked to be remembered, along with the Declaration of Independence and the founding of the University of Virginia) he wrote: 'Well aware but follow involuntarily the evidence proposed to their minds; that Almighty God hath created the mind free, and manifested his supreme will that free it shall remain, by making it altogether insusceptible of restraint; that all attempts to influence it by temporal punishment or burthens, or by civil incapacities tend only to beget habits of hypocrisy and meanness . . . that to compel a man to furnish contributions of money for the propagation of opinions which he disbelieves and abhors is sinful and tyrannical; that our civil rights have no dependence on our religious opinions any more than on our opinions in physics or geometry . . . and finally, that truth is great and will prevail if left to itself, errors ceasing to be dangerous when it is permitted freely to contradict them: We, the General Assembly of Virginia do enact that no man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever, nor shall be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or shall otherwise suffer on account of his religious opinions or beliefs; but

## BID FOR A SMILE

#### The Doctor Says By EDWIN J. JORDAN, M. D.

A curious disease which was first described some 25 years ago has, within the last five years, begun to receive the attention it deserves. This disease is known as cat-scratch disease.

Several hundred cases have been reported from Europe and America during the past few years, and the number of studies of this disorder reported in the medical journals seems to be constantly increasing. ONE REVIEWof this disease,

for example, dealt with 160 cases in 27 states and eight foreign countries. Twenty-seven of these had been studied by the authors of the report. In almost all of them there had been contact with cats. Most of the patients had been actually scratched by these animals.

Usually there is a period of about three to seven days between the time of the scratch, or original injury, and inflammation at the place where it occurred. This is followed by a further delay of which was originally injured.

The glands in the armpit are most frequently involved. This is not surprising since one would expect the hands or arms to be

About two - thirds of the patients afflicted with cat-scratch disease have fever. Some of them have general symptoms such as headache, weakness, aching or chilly sensations, as well as the lymph gland enlargement.

Baby Turkey Rosemary (Serves 4-6)

One 6-pound fresh baby turkey, Maldon salt (if available), 1 cup turkey stock, Java pepper, 3 clov-1 onion, sliced; 1 spring carrot, sliced; 1 slice lemon, 11/2 teaspoons rosemary, 8 small white onions, 14 pound sweet butter, paprika, 1 tablespoon flour, dash of lemon juice.

Put the peeled feet in a saucepan with the neck, heart and gizzard. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, cloves, onion and carrot, slice of lemon and 2 cups cold water. Bring to a boil and simmer gently, partially covered, for 1 hour. Strain the stock. Sprinkle the inside of the turkey with salt and pepper and put it into the cavity 1 teaspoon rosemary, the small onions, peeled and parboiled for 15 minutes, and 2 tablespoons of sweet butter.

Fasten the legs and wings close to the body and brush skin generously with 4 tablespoons melt ed butter. Sprinkle with a little salt and paprika and ½ teaspoon rose-mary. Bake in a preheated oven (450 degrees F.) for 30 minutes. Add 1/2 cur of the turkey stock to the pan juices and continue to bake for 45 minutes, or until done, basting every 15 minutes with the

pan juices. Remove the turkey to a serving platter. Place the baking pan over moderate flame. Add the remaining stock and bring the liquid to a boil. Stir in bit by bit 1 tablespoor butter rubbed to a paste with 1 tablespoon flour. Correct the seaning, add the dash of lemon lice, and strain the sauce into a







## IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS \*

In the United States a defendant in a criminal action is presumed to be innocent until his guit is established beyond a reasonable doubt. His guilt or innocence is established at his trial - not when he is arrested.

With this concept in mind it is not hard to see why the right to bail in criminal cases is guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, willi the exception of capital cases. A capital crime is one which the | punishment may be death. In Texas murder, treason, rape and robbery with firearms are capital offenses.

All prisoners are bailable in Tex as except where proof is evident that a capital offense has been com mitted and it is probable that a jury will assess the death penalty.

An officer making an arrest is required by law to take the accused promptly before a magistrate. It is the duty of the magistrate to examine into the truth of the accusation made. He determines whether the accused should be discharged or bailed or held without bail. If bail is set for the defendant, the magistrate must determine the amount. The law provides a procedure for reviewing these decisions before the Court of Criminal Appeals,

When an accused is on bail when his trial commences he has the right to remain on bail during the trial of his case. Where the punishment of a defendant has been assessed at confinement in the penitentiary for fifteen years or less the defendant has the right to remain on bail pending the appeal of his case. If the penalty is more than fifteen years the defendant is kept in custody from the moment the jury returns its ver-

The Constitution also says that bail may not be set in excessive amount. What is considered a reasonable amount depends largely upon the circumstances and the risk involved. Bail must be set high enough to assure the court and the state that the person will not run away, but will return and submit to frial on the date set.

The judge usually will ask the prosecuting attorney for recommendation as to the amount of bail. The accused's attorney may then ask that the amount recommended be reduced, giving his reasons. The judge will settle on an amount ne believes reasonable to assure the accused's presence at the trial.

Occasionally we read of someone "skipping bail". This means that he failed to show up in court at the required time. In such cases the court can order his bail forfeited. The person is still subject to rearrest and prosecution, however. (This column, based on Texas
