## Freshen Up Aging Slipcovers, Curtains With Few Tricks To Give Longer Wear

Coax another season's wear from aging slipcovers and curtains with a few tricks to freshen them up. Even those that look weary, worn and faded will sometimes respond to restorative treatment. It's worth a try.

First, they'll need a thorough cleaning. When I'm trying to prolong the life of a cover until I can afford a replacement, I treat the fabric to a gentle but thorough washing. You might prefer to have the article dry-cleaned, especially if you're not sure of the fiber content.

If you decide to launder the cover, check it carefully. Look for fraying seams, loose or worn welting and closures (such as slippers) that are parting company with the fabric. If a seam is badly frayed or wetting has pulled loose, repair or restitch the seam before you dump the cover in the washing machine.

I have the best results when I soak the cover for a half hour or more, then wash twice (for short periods) in softened water and detergent. As soon as the cover is rinsed, reach for the starch bottle. A light starching gives threadbare fabric some backbone and, I think, improves its appearance.

To get an even, light starching, starch while damp in the machine or basin. Light starching will increase the soil resistance of either smooth or rough-finished fabrics. If you're starching dark-colored

fabrics here's a trick worth knowing: Saturate a fabric with solution by dipping and squeezing several times, then evenly squeeze out or extract excess. Let the fabric damp-dry; then iron. M. L. Huckabee, textile technical service adviser of a large starch manufacturing company, tells me that this method will insure against the water spots and streaks that occur when dark fabric is dried completely and then redampened before ironing.

Some slipcovers require pressing, especially around the skirt. But ease them back onto the couch while still quite damp, to avoid shrinkage. Lined draperies, washed for the first time after a lifetime of dry-cleanings, will probably need some postwashing alterations. The drapery fabric will shrink, while the lining may not. Iron and reset the hem. If floor-length drapes shrink to an awkward length, trim them off to window-sill length. You may find, as I did, that you like them even better.

Give the covers a touch of make-up in the form of new trim. A few yards of ready-made fringe, cording or braid in a contrasting color tucked around cushions pep up appearances. So does ball fringe swung across curtains. If drapery headings are heavily streaked even after washing, make or buy a simple cornice to hide the damage that sun and soot have caused.

Dr. Hunt Of McLean Dies

McLEAN — (Special) — Dr. Preston Hunt, 89, who gave Texarkana a charity hospital upon his retirement in 1949 after nearly a half-century of practicing medicine, died Sunday in Highland General Hospital at 1:45 p.m. Dr. Hunt had lived in McLean with his brother Claude Hunt since 1952. He had been in failing health for a number of years. He entered a Wellington hospital April 17, and was transferred to Highland July 5. Dr. Hunt received his license to practice medicine in 1900 and was a majority stockholder in Texarkana Hospital before his retirement. At that time he gave his stock to the public with the provision that the institution be administered by a board of physicians acting as trustees. Born Feb. 5, 1866, near Tupelo, Miss., he moved to Texarkana where he served for a time as agent for Crest News Service. He was a member of the Baptist Church. Claude Hunt said that his brother was president of a regional medical association for Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas a number of years ago. Funeral services are pending with Claborn Funeral Home.

Wolf Creek Dam Project Discussed

PERRYTON — The future of Ochiltree County's Wolf Creek Dam reconstruction project will be discussed today in Ochiltree County Commissioners Court. The original dam was washed out a number of years ago, and a new one has been under consideration for some time. Means of financing the new dam are the principal hold-up at this time. It has been reported that a portion of the cost could be paid from the general fund of the county and that the rest could be paid for by bonds. Today's meeting will be the discussion of bonding rates and details of a bond issue which will be held today between the commissioners court and several bonding companies. Once details of a bond issue have been ironed out, the next step will be an election to determine if the people of Ochiltree County will approve or reject such a bond issue, if the amount of \$150,000.

association in 1951-1952, allied activities have taken up much of his time, especially with Top o' Texas Rodeo Association. He once headed quarter horse show committee. From 1938-1950 he was president of the school board at Lefors. Vincent, who looks to the future of his native Panhandle with considerable optimism, meanders back over his boyhood with nostalgic delight. He remembers Pampa's first school taught by Mrs. Townsend which he attended here shortly after his arrival in 1902. Vincent, six at the time, came here with his parents, Wiley and Catherine Vincent, from Vernon. They lived over where Culberson Chevrolet is now. The Lard boys, Frank and Jeff were earlyday classmates.

Canadian To Red

Canadian To Red "One fire back in 1910 looked as if it was going to destroy Pampa. I've seen the fires get so bad they'd stretch from the Canadian to the Red River," Vincent recalled. "Those were the days, between 1902 and 1908," Vincent said, "when 30,000 head of cattle were shipped annually from Pampa to Kansas City and Chicago. Steers sold for \$20, cows, \$15 and Yearlings about \$8."

Work Changed Little

Cowboying in essence Vincent feels hasn't changed to much, "but the hours are less, and there were no pickup trucks in those days," he said with a chuckle. Vincent, who makes his home with his wife Edna, three miles south of Lefors, is presently working to make a cowgirl out of his granddaughter, Shirley Vincent. "Though she's but six," Vincent said, "she goes with me and her father Edward to the pastures and makes a cowhand."

Hard-working rancher Vincent

Hard-working rancher Vincent was back on the place. And a mighty good place it is. Here last week when the Texas A&M range management course passed through the area, he was one of the two places selected by the course instructor as outstanding examples of range management in this area. Not bad for an ol' boy who considers himself a ranch hand. The first dairy cattle brought to continental United States arrived in the Plymouth colony in 1624.

Hoppers Still Menace Area

County Agent Ralph Thomas said today that the infestation of flea and grasshoppers in the county is still of concern to local farmers, and that spraying is definitely recommended. In the McLean area, Thomas said, the infestation in the cotton by flea hoppers is light, but immediate spraying is suggested to help keep down the build up. Treatment called for is one pint of six pound toxaphene to the acre. Thomas is not recommending any treatment on the plains until further study. "In this late cotton year, you want to hold all the fruit. It may be damaged later by frost and cut the yield," according to Thomas. This first crop he said was very important because of the lateness in the year. Cotton is growing all over the county because of sufficient moisture with little insect damage to date, though Thomas pointed out the grasshopper problem is still with us.

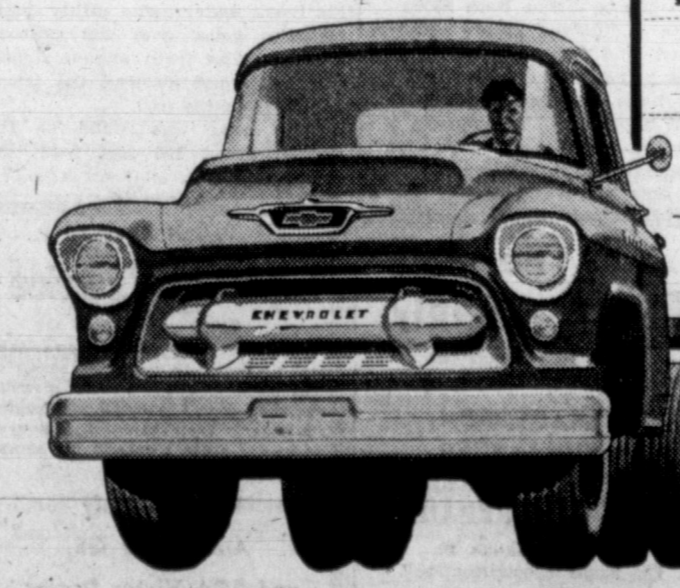

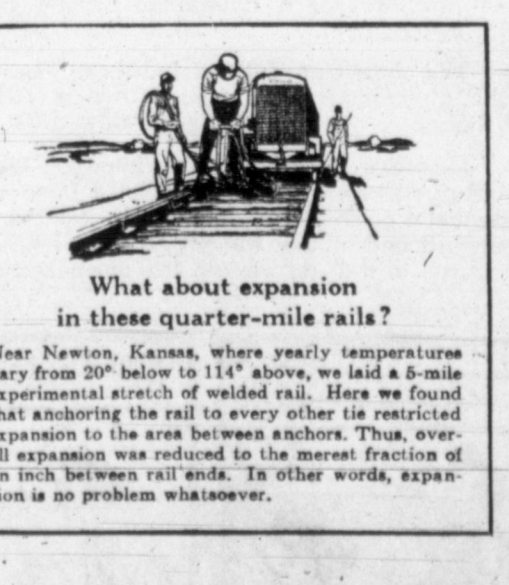

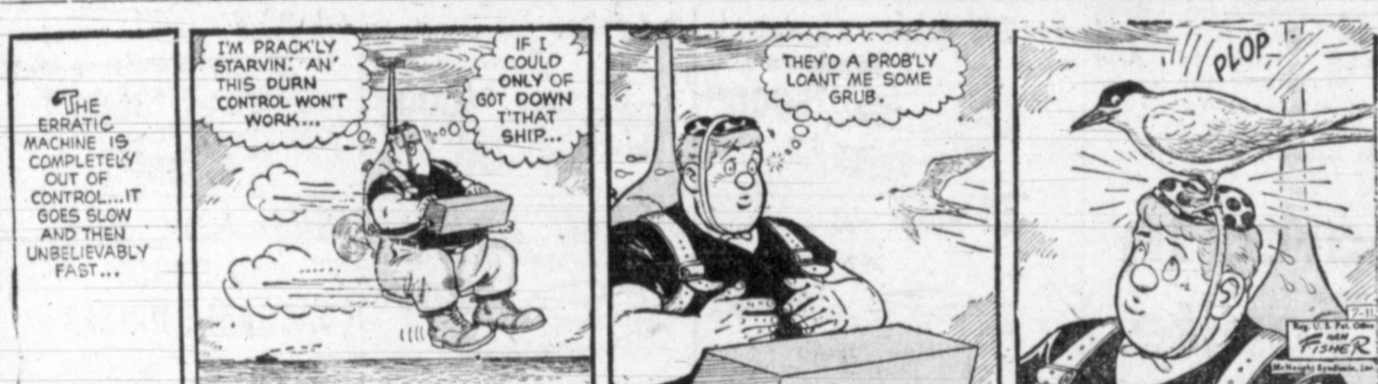

LAMESA, Tex. (UP)—Lamesa was hard put to it Monday to supply the water needs of the populace, so much so that the mayor asked for voluntary water rationing. Lamesa experienced a water shortage Saturday night, the second one in the last week. Mayor Bob Crawley urged citizens in a statement to refrain from unnecessary use of water until the situation is better. Monday through Friday, he said, are the worst days. That's when laundries and general household use takes the biggest drain from town reservoirs. Four of the 14 wells which yield water for the reservoirs have been pumped dry, he said, and the pumps are drawing on air. A new well will be tied in Wednesday, Crawley said, which will yield 400 gallons per minute. Pressure on the 10 wells still giving up water is only fair, he said.

Texas, Beaver Oil Play Heavy

PERRYTON — (Special) — Texas and Beaver county wells took the oil spotlight during the past week, with the Carter Oil Co. No. 1 Sutton coming in as an oiler and tests at the Carter No. 1 Manning just west of Gray showing good signs of oil.

The Sutton, located southeast of Hardesty, has been completed at a daily production rate of 504 barrels. Estimated gas production was 75,000 cubic feet per day.

Testing data on the new Hardesty field producer showed the Sutton recovering 106 barrels of load oil and 28 barrels of new oil on the first 14 1/2 hour test. It has been fractured once and then flowed 128 barrels on the six-hour test. Gas-oil ratio was 158 to 1. Total depth was 6,570 feet with 5-inch casing.

MAKING A GO OF LIFE

By ROY L. SMITH Read Deuteronomy 4:28-35

The skills of the human spirit are amazing. The third fact to be observed in studying the spiritual life of man is that the human spirit is capable of developing such skills. Its capacity for good work while under terrible strain is conspicuous. It must be remembered that the terrors of war do not produce heroic spirits — they only reveal the powers which are resident within the human spirit.

A giant 150-mm. shell crashed through the solid masonry which made up the wall of an ancient Italian castle, and laid bare a system of subterranean passageways which lay underneath it.

In similar fashion war stripped away the spongy accretions of sophistication with which human life had been overlaid, and revealed the rugged capacities resident within nations and individuals. Doctors performing incredible operations under gunfire, nurses standing amid piles of bloody flesh with white lips and steady hands.

That is the kind of human nature we have available for the tasks and problems of peacetime. The awful days of conflict did not make men heroic; the capacity for heroism was there all the time and is still there.
