COMANCHE, Tex. -UP- The halt and the lame came by the hundreds Monday to the ranch of Jesse F. Reese to cover themselves, at a cost of more than a dollar an hour, with dirt from a mildly radio-active pond he has.

Reese, 52, a farmer, is making \$200 or \$300 a day from sick persons who hope to get some benefit out of dust the Atomic Energy Commission won't bother with. He lives 12 miles from Comanche at the end of a dusty mesquite-covered road called "Uranium Ave-

The sign was put up, he said, by Mrs. Fred Hall, a neighbor, who got tired of visitors asking her where his farm is. Reese now has three buildings on his 260-acre place where persons with arthritis, rheumatism, spasmatic colon. headaches, sinus and cancer sit from morning until late night.

Their feet are covered with dust by an attendant. They can bury their hands in a box of dust in their lap. For those with neck and head ailments, there are socks full of dust which they can drape around their necks or across their

Reese will not say that this will help them at all.

In fact, before he-will let them sit down, he makes them sign a statement that they are visiting his ranch voluntarily, that they assume full responsibility for the "treatment," that nobody has asked them to come to the farm and nobody has promised them that they will be helped by the dust. · Nevertheless, people flocked to Reese's place and the number is growing every day. He charges each visitor \$2 for burying his hands and feet an hour-and-a-haif. He said experts have advised him

that this is about as long as the visitors should cover their hands and feet with the dust.

Numbers Grow Reese estimates 5,000 or 6,000 persons have visited the ranch since one day in 1953 when a man from Washington state knocked at his door and asked whether he could sit in his pond.

The free and equal rights of American citizens have been established and each class is taxed, not according to the individual citizen's equal obligation to government but occording to the citizen's individual initiative and individual productive ability. The progressive system of graduated income taxes against earned income penalizes the ambitions, the initiative and the personal advancement of each citizen.

Annual taxes are withheld from individual citizer's wages from payday-to-payday without consent or individual authorization; other citizens are forced, against their free will to make detailed reports, inform upon and collect income taxes from their employees under criminal codes that allow neither compensation nor reimbursement for costs of collection, keeping the records and transferral of monies collected. Nor is the employercollector allowed a legal margin between honest error or business failure and criminal intent.

The American Citizen has been deprived of his rights of freedom guaranteed by Article VI of the Bill of Rights:

Upon suspicion only, the Collector of Internal Revenue or his agents may file liens for seizure of the citizen's bank accounts, his papers and his property; such liens are published in the public press without the citizen's prior knowledge or defense; the citizen is subjected to unjust and extra-legal hearings in "kangaroo courts" presided over by deputies of the Collector of Internal Revenue and forced to furnish evidence against himself that can be used in his prosecution in open court.

The American Citizen has been deprived of his rights of freedom guaranteed by Article VII of the Bill

In all matters of time of payment, amount of payment, and method of payment, the citizen is subjected to the flexible rulings of the Collector of Internal Revenue; he is assessed unjust and unreasonable fines in the guise of interest and penalty, and he is still held under threat of criminal prosecution. The rules of common law have been superseded by the codes of the 16th Amendment.

The Amercian Citizen has been deprived of his rights of freedom guaranteed by Article VIII of the Bill of Rights:

Excessive fines have been imposed; cruel and unusual punishment has been inflicted upon citizens who have been convicted of lateness in making income tax payments and failure, for any reason, of fulfilling orders of courts in making income tax payments.

Then Matthews writes: "Why higher education engenders more softness toward Communists, than elementary education must have a reason or reasons which ought to be the object of serious search by educators. 



LAMESA, Tex. -UP Lamesa was hard put to it Monday to supply the water needs of the populace so much so that the mayor asked for voluntary water ration-


Lamesa experienced a water shortage Saturday night, the second one in the last week, Mayor Bob Crawley urged citizens in a statement to refrain from unnec essary use of water until the situation is better."

Monday through Friday, he said, are the worst days. That's when laundries and general household use takes the biggest drain from town reservoirs.

Four of the 14 wells which yield water for the reservoirs have been pumped dry, he said, and the pumps are drawing on air. A new well will be tied in Wednesday Crawley said, which will yield 400 gallons per minute.
